Program Notes

Blue Soliloquy is a piece for unaccompanied horn. It was commissioned by Richard Chenoweth, with assistance from the International Horn Society. Blue Soliloquy is written in an ABA form. The A sections have a slow, somewhat free tempo. The B section is quicker and heavily influenced by the style of jazz. Extended techniques, such as flutter tongue, shakes, pitch bends, and portamentos, are used throughout the composition.

Haydn's Second Horn Concerto in D major was written around 1781. Franz Joseph Haydn was born in Austria. From an early age, he was trained as a classical musician. His schooling led him to serve Prince Esterhazy until Haydn died. He also developed a close friendship with Mozart and taught a young Beethoven briefly. This concerto has three movements: allegro moderato, adagio, and allegro. The first movement is very light-hearted and builds off of several recurring themes.

Franz Strauss was born in Bavaria and was trained on several brass instruments, violin, clarinet, and guitar. His primary instrument was the horn, and he joined the Bavarian court orchestra in 1847. Strauss was also a professor and a conductor, in addition to being an avid composer and performer. *Fantasie* is an earlier work of Strauss's. He takes a simple theme and transforms it through five unique variations. The piece is a technical challenge in endurance, finger coordination, and musicianship.
