Following are vignettes of present campus and church Christian outreaches, considerations of their impact on participants and beneficiaries and of the continuing challenge to each of us to follow Christ's example of servanthood.

# Student Christian Service — Gateway to a Way of Life


"Students are doing some of the hardest kinds of personal evangelism now ... encountering child abuse, alcoholism, illiteracy and ignorance---"

Speaking are translator/linguist Robert Longacre, Class of 1943, Christian Missionary Alliance Pastor Douglas Peterson, Class of 1973, and current Senior Robert Tice. The first two comments suggest what superficially might appear to be serendipitous results of student exposure to Christian service opportunities at Houghton; the last affords an insight into present activities and hints at the future impact participating students may have upon graduation.

Three decades ago outreach activities at Houghton, apart from the Foreign Missions Fellowship, went by the name of Torchbearers. Ministries conducted under the present name, Christian Student Outreach, include operation of two coffee houses, nursing home and hospital visitation, classes at Craig Colony, evangelism on nearby campuses and operation of Bible Clubs.

One of the coffee houses is located in Dansville — MILIEU featured its ministry in 1972 — and a second in the Houghton Campus Center. Efforts of students have resulted in conversions of young people, of feature coverage in a regional newspaper and at least in one student's coming to Houghton. Unsaved and attending another college when he first visited the Dansville coffee house, he is now at Houghton and active in Student Ministerial Association. The nursing home ministry reaches facilities up to 40 miles from campus and has brought numerous letters of appreciation to

Christian Life Coordinator Richard Bareiss. Students visit weekly and plan several special events annually. Other students go room to room in nearby hospitals encouraging patients, offering a sympathetic ear. Additional students pitch in for occasional parties. Notes Bob Tice, "if our motivation is asked, we share it."



Tice, whose independent study project on the motivation and nature of Christian Service has involved him in all the outreach ministries this year, said of the ministry on secular campuses: "So far there have been no conversions, but we have some good relationships established. Generally these students are very comfortable, nothing is forbidden them." Six students are regularly involved in Bible studies on a nearby campus and Bob adds, "it provides growth for ourselves."

Another ministry, begun in the early 1950's continues, though curtailed by

reduced participation. That is Sunday classes for residents of Craig Developmental Center in Sonvea, NY, Unce among the world's largest epileptic colonies, the center's purpose was changed in 1969 to accomodate the mentally retarded. Protestant Chaplain Lester Wilcox, a Marion College graduate on the staff there since 1957, says that ministry is now harder. Formerly, many of the classes were quite similar to a typical gathering in a Church School. As the population has changed, so has the capability of the clients. Now the people are less verbal...some with severe and profound mental retardation, making teaching more difficult. The emphasis now is primarily on the relationship aspects of ministry--just being there and

cites benefits accruing to those who do participate. Students gain practical experience in making their faith real to others...it helps them escape use of traditional church phrases in communicating faith and experience...and will often motivate a student to become an advocate for the mentally retarded or disadvantaged," He cited a recent graduate Anne Lodge, who, working with Chaplain Wilcox, convinced administrators at Craig to allow three resident children. to attend a private summer camp where Anne was working. The door is now open for others. Houghton students are the only volunteers at Craig serving with a Christian Emphasis. •

we could do." She and Doug carried the ball from there and over the years the program has grown.

Last fall SAGA food service donated 50 free dinners for ACO children visiting campus. December's party included boots for all the children, articles of clothing and other gifts. Students provided skits, music and snacks. More than 100 students are involved in each party. Fewer members participate in regular area family visitation--a fellow and a girl per family. This is done because each contributes strengths that may be missing in the home situation. Noting a perennial problem. ACO officers say they need 20 more men students to be able to serve all families they're aware of through church and county agency channels.



When she left Houghton to attend Columbia University's Nursing Schools, Ginny took with her a love of children realized through her ACO experiences, along with the conviction that one should "be involved even if you feel inadequate. If you commit your efforts to God, He will bless, you will grow and people will be touched." In 1974 while she was nursing in Boston, she took a threemonth leave to work at the Wesleyan hospital in Kamakwie, Sierra Leone. "It was a life-changing, eye-opening experience." That opportunity came at

showing love....bringing the people together on Sunday with teachers who love God, who help lift the people in outlook, broaden their experience and keep them aware of God's presence."

Wilcox suspects these obstacles are behind the drop in Houghton student participation. Orginially there were 20 classes, later reduced to 10, now down to six. He notes that the program is of definite value that "clients really look forward to the Bible Classes and are quite onety and sad when classes are interrupted by college breaks." While the work may be discouraging, Wilcox

## **ACO 10 Years Later**

Allegany County outreach, begun in 1970, came about as the result of a Senate sponsored Christmas party which 30 area children attended. Students Steve Delventhal, Virginia Forthmann and Doug Peterson organized a clothing drive after seeing how the children attending the party were dressed. Ginny recalls, "I'd had such a memorable evening, I began to think what further

## 80 Years of Missions **Emphasis**

Eighty years ago, Mary Lane Clarke, Class of 1892 valedictorian, became one of Hougton's first missionaries when she traveled to Sierra Leone, W. Africa, there to spend much of her life in evangelism and Bible translation.

Mrs. Clarke's Houghton successors on mission fields have numbered in the hundreds, but the emphasis on missions as known here today through the Foreign Missions Fellowship was established after World War II when military veterans completing their educations, shared the needs they'd encountered overseas. Spearheading this resurgence were alumni like Luke Boughter and Dow Robinson. Whereas before the war interest had centered on Wesleyan missions, the post-war emphasis was less parochial, urging involment with all evangelical mission efforts.

Through missions Houghton alumni have frequently had a stake in front page news stories. When the United States pulled out of Vietnam in 1975. Wycliffe linguists John and Carolyn Miller were caught in the power shift and with their youngest daughter Imprisoned there for nine months. Now Houghton alumnus Ron Trail, his wife and three sons are teachers in Afghanistan--said to be safe for the time being. Their two older sons are enrolled at Houghton, Daniel having just returned from a Christmas visit in Kabul.

World events, the presence of international students and missionary children on campus all interact with tradition and continuing emphasis on Christian responsibility for world evangelism to strengthen the Foreign Misslons Fellowship. During the 1970s many college students received direct exposure to missions through summer internships partly sponsored by F.M.F. Last summer 10 students--all women-engaged in ministries ranging from literature distribution in Japan and medical work in Sierra Leone, to housekeeping for a Christian boarding house in France and street evangelism in Peru.

During the recent Christmas holiday 45 Houghton students joined the 18,000 collegians from across the nation at the 12th Urbana. With their exposure to figures like John Scott, Billy Graham and Elisabeth Elliot came fresh recognition that "whether or not you become a cross-cultural missionary yourself, it is important that all Christians support missions in the fullest sense." Now because of growing interest in missions, Urbana planners will schedule the conference bi-annually instead of every third year. Thousands of would-be registrants were turned away in 1979.

"I believe that a new isolationism is on us . . . Nowadays it is expressed..... 'Let's go to the inner city, let's take care of the needs of starving blacks. and people of Mexican parentage, the Indians, and so forth in our country, before we worry about the rest of the world' ... Jesus says, 'this you should have done and not to have left the other undone.' We are to reach the whole world, all men everywhere, at home and abroad---"

("The awakened Christian conscience [must not think] that attention to social issues and international issues of our time can make up for a lukewarm interest in evangelization, or think that attention to evangelizing the individual is going to make up for our lack of concern about changing the world in respect to things which can be changed by concerted action.")

Here F.M.F. continues to support 12 alumni missionaries and has a 1979-80 budget of \$23,900. \$8,000 had been received at Christmas break. Under the leadership of President Roy O'Shaughnessy, son of missionary parents in Rhodesia, the annual November conquest brought nearly 20 foreign missionaries to campus. They addressed students and community residents in Chapel services, at evening rallies and classroom visits, and were available for personal consultation and interaction during meals and in the Campus Center exhibit area. Earlier in the term Peace Child author Don Richardson spent two days in Houghton speaking and consulting.

Students meet daily at 5:00 pm to pray for specific nations, mission needs and people. In an effort to communicate the missions imperative, teams consisting of missionary children, internationals and other interested students solicit engagements in churches up to 90 miles from Houghton, "challenging toward commitment, clearing up misconceptions and informing about the current status on foreign fields." .



## Ministry to Prisoners, Concernforthe Hungry

The Christian Education Club and Student Ministerial Association carry on ministries ranging from fasting to provide food for the world's hungry to conducting jail services.

CEC provides teachers for various area church youth activities — Sunday School classes, Pioneer Girls, CYC. SAGA food service reimbursed CEC's fund for Dominican Republic relief last fall when nearly 350 students fasted. The club sponsored fund raising events to underwrite assistance to World Vision's Cambodia hunger relief.

Last fall the members studied "A Christian Response to Homosexuality." Later they learned about Christian Education Careers and in November they participated in teacher training workshops in Buffalo. During December they planned a Christmas program for a children's home in Pennsylvania. With the Houghton Church, the club will co-sponsor a Christian Education Conference here featuring Donald Joy, March 24-27.

Student Ministerial Association members engage in a letter writing ministry, corresponding with 20-30 Attica Prison inmates, offering friendship, counsel and pre-release assistance. In several cases contact has continued after a prisoner's release. With the cooperation of the Allegany County Sheriff, several students are conducting Tuesday night Bible studies in the county jail at Belmont for eight to 10 prisoners. With the assistance of the SMA the college chess club has played Attica inmates and in 1978 the Senior class basketball team played an Attica team.

Yet another service of SMA is providing students to counsel with local boy scouts working on their God and Country service awards.

Addressing members of the Christian College Consortium, President John Dellenback warned that if the Christian service motivation is ever lost at member colleges, a major reason for their existence will be gone. Houghton's Coordinator of Christian Life, Richard Bareiss, is presently completing a doctoral program at Bethel Theological Seminary. His thesis is titled, How to More Effectively Involve Christians in Christian Service. As a part of his research, Bareiss ordered a random computer sampling of 20 percent of Houghton graduates between 1965 and 1972, persons he believed

would respond from the perspective of being in mid-career. His survey asked alumni if they had been involved in Christian service while at Houghton, and if so, had that involvement contributed to their Christian growth. Third he inquired if they were presently engaged in such service and if so, what were their motivations. Eighty-five percent of those indicating Christian service participation in college have continued their involvement. Of those 39 percent felt their early commitment was a major factor in their present participation, 56 percent considered Houghton experlences contributory. Responses to the question on motivation broke down into four categories.

I serve because of: (1) God's love for me, (2) My love for God, (3) Perceived needs of other people, (4) Inner factors such as: I feel useful when participating, it helps me grow, I feel blessed of God. A handful listed a reward motive or "desire to escape God's wrath."

Bareiss hopes to use this information to recommend structuring of various religious activities to nurture the service motivation, by so doing to gradually increase the pool of Christian youth active in the various ministries discussed in these vignettes and to provide a foundation for effective lifetime service.

## Houghton Church, Stressing Worship, Nurture and Mission

Since its founding in 1852 the Houghton Wesleyan church has grown to a present congregation of 225 resident family units and about 900 students—the balance generally weekending at home or attending other churches. Says Pastor H. Mark Abbott, "the church focuses its purposes in three areas: Worship, Nurture and Mission."

The first purpose seeks fulfillment in worship services structured to meet the needs of communicants from a wide spectrum of denominational backgrounds, and stimulate individual worship. When college is in session services are held in Wesley Chapel on the campus.

A broad Christian Education program and youth ministry gives substance to the church's nurturing purpose. Twentyfive college students participate in the program and last year three seniors received special recognition for service to the church in choir, Pioneer Girls and children's church during each of their four years at the college. An undershepherding program divides Houghton into 21 groups for fellowship, communication and mutual ministry. Each year a family enrichment conference is planned to meet crucial needs in family life. Twenty children from area villages are enrolled in the church sponsored Valley Nursery School which operates three days weekly.

The church's mission-outreach function includes financial support to eight missionary families--five of which include Houghton graduates-- and an annual missions conference. The church sponsors two Christian Life Emphases Weeks and the three-member pastoral staff is available for counsel, speaking and program assistance for college and academy students and groups. Serving with Pastor Abbott- now in his third year of leader-ship - are Assistant Pastor Geoffrey Kotzen and Youth Pastor Norman Jones, a 1978 alumnus.


Fresh vision in recent years has led the church to undertake new ministries in the larger community. Purchase of a 12-passenger van last summer helped launch a transportation ministry for seniorcitizens and in the past year volunteers have winterized the homes of a dozen low-income families in Northern Allegany County. Local political involvement has included the spearheading of a successful petition campaign to secure a public referendum on Off Track Betting in Allegany County, a voter registration program staffed by Student Ministerial Association members and formation of governmental action subgroup within the church Community Service Committee. Dean of Student Development, Charles Massey is chairman of that committee and coordinates much of the local social ministry.

Last summer Pastor Kotzen initiated a Letchworth State Park ministry with two dozen children of campers and vacationers participating in a VBS type program. The church also participates in sponsoring early Sunday morning worship services for vacationers at nearby Rushford Lake. Following a visit to inner city ministries in Buffalo, church youth produced decorated liturgical banners for the Buffalo City Mission.

Other ministries involving church communicants include the Northern Allegany County Food Co-op which in December processed 180 orders for 6,000 pounds of food; and Love in Action, a non-profit agency currently sponsoring Houghton's second and third Southeast Asian refugee families. Now that the 80-bed Houghton Health Care Center is about to open, still other avenues of service are anticipated.

A large Christian Education facility was added in the late 1960's, otherwise the plant was essentially unchanged from its construction in 1934. In 1978 the congregation began a \$76,000 renovation that included complete redecorating of the interior, instalation of new restrooms, a baptistry, and redesign of the choir loft, plus total rebuilding and expansion of the pipe organ by alumnus Eugene Burmaster '51. (Houghton College is contributing \$20,000 of the renovation cost because of its use of the instrument for practice.)

As the 1980's begin, inspiring leadership and responsive people are giving what Pastor Abbott describes as "a uniquely cosmopolitan rural congregation" broad opportunities for ministry to the whole person, locally regionally and world-wide.

#### FIRST TEAM ALL AMERICAN: STEVE BURKE

Steve Burke was named to the NAIA First Team All American squad as well as to the District 31 First Team and the N.Y. State Second Team, At the NCCAA Tournament Steve was named to the All Tournament Team and was further honored by being named the Tournament's Outstanding Player. Steve is now looking forward to a professional career beginning with the Buffalo Stallions of the Major Indoor Soccer League who made him their number one draft choice.

Steve finished his Houghton career with season records in goals (20), assists (12), and total points (32). His two year total of 57 points is only one short of the four year record held by Dan Irwin and Patrick Okafor.

## NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR: DOUGLAS BURKE

Soccer Coach E. Douglas Burke was named Coach of the Year by both the NAIA and the NCCAA. He was also named as the Sportsman of the Year by the Olean Times Herald in its year-end review.

Coach Burke led the 1978 squad to a 17-2-0 record and then bettered that in 1979 as the Highlanders scrapped to an 18-2-1 record and a National Title. Burke's overall Houghton record is 133-56-20.

#### SOCCER SQUAD WINS NCCAA NATIONAL TITLE

The Highlanders invaded the NCCAA Tournament for the first time and marched straight to a National Title. In the first game they took Central College (14-4-1) by a 4-1 score. It was over in the first half as Houghton took a commanding 4-0 lead on a windswept field. Houghton's team balance was illustrated by seven different players doing the scoring - Doug Johnson, assist by Jon Ortlip; Tim Edwards, assist by Steve Burke; Peter Roman; Robbie Jacobson, assist by Steve Lindahl. On defense Jon Orlip had an excellent game: Kevin Austin had three outstanding saves out of his 11 total; and Al Bushart shut out Central's high scoring (38 goals) Nwankwo without a shot.

The Highlanders met Trinity College (11-7-1) in the Championship — a 6-0 shutout. The combination of Johnson and Burke clicked again as Doug melted a pass by Steve for the only score of the first half. The second half became a runaway as Doug Johnson assisted by Tim Edwards scored again; Robbie Jacobson scored the next two on assists by Brian Davidson and Steve Burke; then Davidson and Bob Chiapperino got unassisted goals to finish.

Five Houghton players made the All Tournament Team: Doug Johnson, Peter Fuller, Jon Ortlip, Steve Burke, and Kevin Austin. The Most Valuable Defensive Player Award went to Jon Ortlip. The Most Outstanding Player Award went to Steve Burke.

Other honors: Peter Fuller, NAIA All American-2nd Team, NAIA Dist. 31-1st Team, and NY State Honorable Mention; other Dist. 31 All Stars, Doug Johnson, Jon Ortlip and Steve Burke.

Tennyson And His Publishers. June Steffensen Hagen, Macmillan Press, London/Penn State Univ. Press, 1979, 309 pages, \$17.50 hardcover. A 1962 graduate and business manager of Victorian Studies Bulletin, Dr. Hagen teaches English at The King's College, Briarcliff Manor, NY. The first book devoted to the people and circumstances surrounding the publications of a major Victorian poet, it illuminates the forces brought to bear on the publishing of poetry. Publishing forces described include the vagaries of audience and market, the idiosyncrasies of publishers, the exigencies of family and household, the fluctuations of reputation and the fear of piracy. Alumni are invited to join Bruce's classmates and present students in contributing to the scholarship.

The Robert W. Woods Memorial Scholarship, memorializing the late emeritus music professor and choral director has been established as the result of a \$27,558 bequest from Mrs. Woods' estate.

## Faculty Sabbaticals: Time for Research, Foreign Travel

Three faculty members have begun semester-long sabbatical leaves. They are English Professor Lionel Basney. Associate Professor of Bible and Philosophy Laurence Mullen, and Biology Professor Anne Whiting.

Dr. Basney has a particular interest in Samuel Johnson and hopes to research several scholarly articles on Johnsonian subjects ranging from The Great Dictionary of 1775 to study of Johnson's concept of the mind and how it works in fields such as literature, morality and religion. And he hopes to develop for possible publication a piece on Johnson's Christianity.

To advance this research Basney will be working in the special studies room of the New York Public Library and, if he receives a NEH grant, exploring unpublished Boswell materials next summer at Yale. Last year under a similar grant he obtained experience in reading handwritten 18th century manuscripts while at City University of New York.

Beginning in April, Basney, his wife and two daughters plan to spend six weeks in England renting an apartment, perhaps near Oxford University. In England he hopes to see Devon, the Lake Country and visit the Johnson Museum in Letchfield, Staffordshire. Basney has worked casually for the museum "as an unofficial American agent."

"My excitement is beyond expression. It's a long-time dream come true." That's how Professor Mullen views his upcoming leave. Describing the new Ethics syllabus he expects to develop he says, "I've taught it for 14 years now to some 2,500 people and I want to gel down some of my ideas, re-engineer my strategy." He also plans research on John Wesley for an article he expects to write about Wesley's reading and philosophical interests.

Multen will lecture at Bethany Bible College this winter in his native New Brunswick, and do further research on the Reformed Baptist Church of which he was a member until its merger with the Wesleyan Church in 1966. A former

pastor and Bethany teacher, he is already an authority on that history.

During March and April Mullen will visit radio station ELWA in Liberia, then spend 10 days at the Wesleyan work in Sierra Leone-Bible school and hospital. Following will be a month in the Republic of South Africa. Two of his former Bethany students are missionaries there and the work which the Reformed Baptists pioneered in Natal, Transvaal continues to the present. He will preach to church congregations and at a Swaziland Bible School, offer evangelism lectures at the Wesleyan Bible College in Brakpan, Zimbabwe, and visit Kruger

National Park. Mrs. Mullen will continue teaching at Fillmore Central School.

Dr. Whiting will spend her leave "strengthening my background for teaching general ecology." She plans to gain first-hand experience studying major plant and animal community units previously unfamiliar to her, and to develop a slide collection for use in illustration. She has applied to two research participation programs - one offered by the University of California in a desert region, the other sponsored by Earthwatch of Massachusetts to a tropical area. Should she be unable to attend either program, she will join study tours. either to Baja, CA; Trinidad and Tobago; or the Galapagos Islands. In preparation for her sabbatical, Dr. Whiting spent two weeks last summer in the Great Basin Desert, NV. and visited a salt marsh and pine barren in New Jersey.
