


















A sunny fall day outside in front of the bridge going into fourth floor of Irma Lambein Hall.

## HIGHLANDER




The Highlander adventure is a time for first year students to go through struggles they most likely never had to deal with before. They are to venture into the unknown and overcome any obstacles that lie in their path. Thus, everyone who goes into the Highlander program will come out of it with a high self worth and a strong tie to their fellow classmates.

Upon arrival, each newcomer is given a warm greeting by their group leaders. Each leader has been well trained in the Highlander program and in many cases have experienced it themselves. Once all the members of each group arrive the adventure begins.

There are three main sites each group is taken to. First, the groups are taken to a scenic location in Pennsylvania. Here they are taken backpacking. Once the destination is reached, the groups are then transported north of the boarder. In Canada, the Highlander leaders teach their groups how to rock climb. For many of the participants this is their first time climbing. After everyone has finished this portion of their adventure, the final site awaits them back at Houghton. When the groups get back to the college, they are introduced to the Ropes Course. It is here that the students encounter obstacles that may only be overcome with group participation. It is at this point each person in the group becomes equal. When the Ropes Course is finally mastered, everyone who had a hand in the success of their group walks away with a feeling of pride.

This whole experience benefits one's body, mind and soul. The body is given a work out like never before. It is asked to do tasks that are not normally required of it. The mind is challenged with how to overcome the problems presented in the Highlander program. Some problems may be logistical like how to make a camp fire while other problems may deal with interpersonal skills like communicating ideas with others. All in all, the Highlander program gives each person the self confidence they need to make it through their college years and beyond.

The Highlander adventure demands 100% out of its participants. Each person comes away with a feeling of self worth and of group worth. 





Every semester students, under the direction of Bruce Brenneman, produce a play that was pre-chosen. Every aspect of the production is done by students. Not only do some students refine their acting skills, but the majority of the work is done behind the scenes. Students work on everything from lighting to stage design. Students also have a hand in changing the sets, doing the makeup, clean up and every other aspect of the production. When the production is finally put on for the general public, thousands of man hours have been invested into it to ensure a smooth run.

This year's play was Flowers For Algernon by Daniel Keyes. The play was about the life of a mentally disabled man named Charlie Gordon, played by Jason Kruszka. As the story progressed, one learns that Charlie has been placed into an experiment to try to increase his intelligence. He was instructed to write all of his ideas, feeling and anything else that came to mind in what came to be known as the progress reports. Charlie's progress was kept under close supervision by Alice Kinnian, played by Heather Neudeck, Dr. Strauss, played by David Lorber, and Professor Neomur, played by Gerry Carpenter. The experiment on Charlie was parallel to the one on a lab rat names Algernon. It is interesting to note the similarities between Charlie behavior and Algernon's. These play productions not only teach the students about the mechanics of production but also they demonstrate the power of the theater.






















With a myriad of new faces and a host of returning stars, the 1994 women's soccor team jumped out to an impressive 8-0 record this season and never looked back, posting their best season ever as a team.

It was a record breaking season for the ladies in many respects. Freshman goalkeeper, Amy Lemon's 10 shutouts set a Houghton record. The teams' 15-4-1 final record set a school record for most wins in a season. The ladies were ranked as high as 13th in the NAIA national polls and just barely missed qualifying for Nationals, losing to the University of New England at Regionals. 


















# **GETTING TOGETHER**







# **PACE**

Ninety eight students graduated from Houghton College's adult degree completion program in 1994-95. Known as PACE (Program for Accelerating College Education), the program culminates in the Bachelor of Science degree in as few as 15 months. Four class-cohorts earned the degree through courses at the Buffalo Suburban Campus (West Seneca), and two additional cohorts completed the program at the Southern tier site (Olean).

These adults returned to college after some years of absence, continuing to carry work and family responsibilities while attending PACE classes. Outside of class sessions they managed a heavy volume of independent study and conducted a final research project.

Students bring a wide variety of backgrounds to the program: academic, vocational, social, and religious. These varied backgrounds enrich the learning of other students as they share their experiences during class sessions. Throughout the fifteen month program, strong friendships develop among the students. They share each others joys, difficulties, and successes, and they celebrate together at one of the two commencement ceremonies held at the Main Campus, either in September or in May.

PACE now proudly claims 160 graduates as alumni. Since completing the program, a number of these alumni have entered graduate studies - in business, in education, in nursing, and in theology. The achievements of many others have been recognized through vocational advancement or through improved opportunities in new area of employment.

PACE, initiated in 1991, has established itself as a strong and viable program among Houghton's many degree offerings, and will continue to provide opportunity for degree completion to some 120 entering adult students each year.

# WORLD MISSIONS FELLOWSHIP



The World Missions Fellowship has had many people turn out for their weekly prayer meetings held in the NAB. This year WMF was headed up by the President, Kin-Ho Chan; Vice-President, Kim Tsui; Secretary, Victoria Silveri; Correspondence Secretary, Heidi Brautigan; Administrative Assistant, Lora Graham; Treasurer, Kathy DePeal; Publicity Coordinator, Sarah Bisbee; Prayer Coordinator, Kristen Kvasnica.

World Mission Fellowship found many ways to make its presence known on campus in 1994-95. In addition to its traditional emphasis of informing the college community about missions, the organization increased its focus on student involvement in mission.

The group's regular activities included weekly meetings, monthly prayer vigils, and launching Adopt-a-Nation, a program of praying globally which generated tremendous campus support. A series of outreach ministries were also well-received. 

In 1994-95, The Star printed seventeen issues, expanding from bi-weekly to weekly distribution during the second semester. The editors were supported from faculty and staff members like Dr. Richard Wing, advisor Kathie Brenneman and the Public Information Office.







The 1994-1995 school year was exciting for the Student Senate as they completed a two year long process of writing a new Senate Constitution, which was approved by the Student body. The new constitution calls for the establishment of new positions: The Speaker of the Senate who will chair Senate meetings, and the Commissioner of Activities, who will take away from the vice president the role of directing the Campus Activities Board. Other positions have had their names changed: the secretary and treasurer will be referred to as the Commissioners of Communications and Finance, and the whole organization will be called the Student Government Association.







## ISRAEL TRIP


Ever since I was a child I have heard stories about people who lived in a land called Israel. This March I finally saw Israel! The Holy Land!

### CLEW fall of 94






## CHAPEL DAYS
