#### Editorially Speaking ... Implications of the Soviet Attacks Thinking Seriously ... Thoughts On Faith Academic Rating The news from Europe last week contained two incidents that could

Muskegon college, located in Michigan, has recently completed a survey by states of the teaching faculty in accredited colleges and universities to determine the percentage of earned doctor's degrees.

The median percentage for New York State was found to be 30%. Houghton college has a percentage of 35%. Thus it is above the state average and is helping to pull the state median upward.

Houghton college is higher than the median percentage of all but seven of the surveyed states. Four of those states which have a higher median average than Houghton have a maximum of three accredited colleges; two others have ten or less.

What do these statistics mean? Undergraduate students here receive instruction from persons with academic achievement and years of experience. In large universities many undergraduate classes are left to graduate students whose first interest is their own studies.

In keeping with the objective of Houghton college in providing education which is "low in expense, fundamental in belief, and high in scholarship," we feel that these unbiased statistics from another college uphold the claim of high scholastic standards.

This fact is confirmed in another way-by the work which our students have done in graduate schools . Of 426 persons for whom reports were made, only 8 failed to do satisfactory work, and all of those 8 received C averages here. Forty-four C students did minimum satisfactory work, 198 did good work and 63 did excellent work. Two thousand feet in the air winging its way through the misty morning sky, a transport plane carries a small detachment of men who are known by the title of Paratroopers. Their job is to strike at the enemy by dropping from the vastness of the

Standing near the open hatch we can see the strained face of the first man to jump. His eyes are fixed on the empty blue sky and his hands nervously tug at the rigging of his parachute. The great ship rocks to and fro in the powerful arm of an air pocket, but the terrific thrust of the engines lifts the monstrous frame from the shadow of danger. Slowly the pilot banks the plane, and one by one the men disappear into the sharpness of the morning air. Thirty men make the jump but only twenty-nine chutes open. Somewhere below lies a man crumpled and dead. Before that man made that fatal jump, he spent a tedious hour packing cach tiny silken cord in its place. Each fold of the clute was manipulated by the man to the closest degree of perfection that was in his power. When he launched himself from the hatch of the ship he had faith that his parachute would open-faith through his works. Faith in human works bears the ever-constant denominator of failure. Man may labor endless hours at invention, deduction, and discovery, but in the product of his labor he finds no perfection. Man cannot reach in his accomplishments a point where complete and unfaltering faith can be sustained. If man creates in himself that faith, he will find himself falling like the paratrooper through space, helpless of his circumstance. He will be reliving the failure of his past decisions. In the things made by the toils of men there is no basis for complete faith, but in the works of God there is certainly purpose. Faith in the things of God is perfection.

Down through the ages faith in Christ has brought success and perfection. Our scientists and doctors of today search for cures to illnesses by experiment and research. The Lord Jesus cures our ills by research of the Heart. The blind men of Capernaum became whole by their faith. Peter walked upon the sea only through the power of faith in the Master. 




