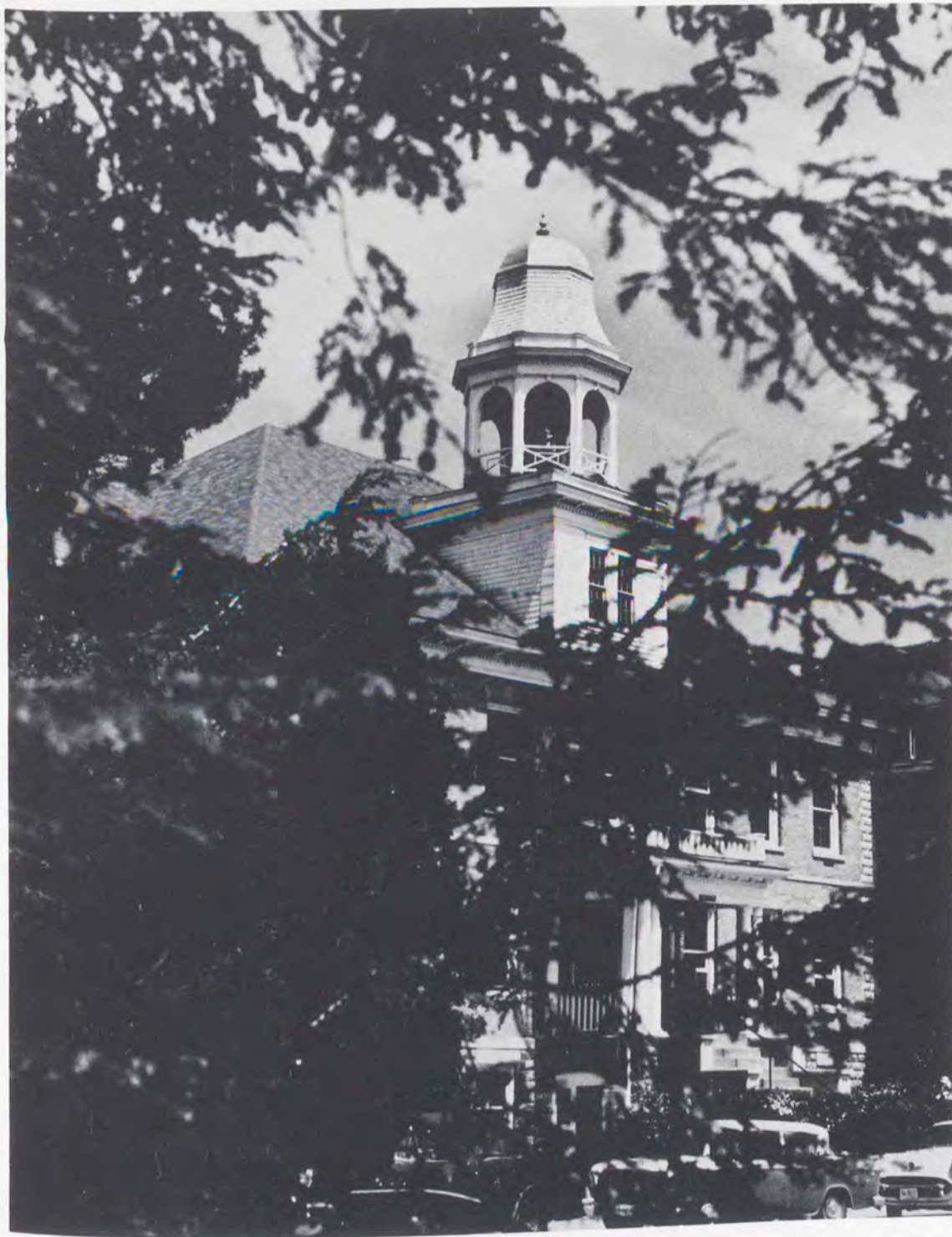

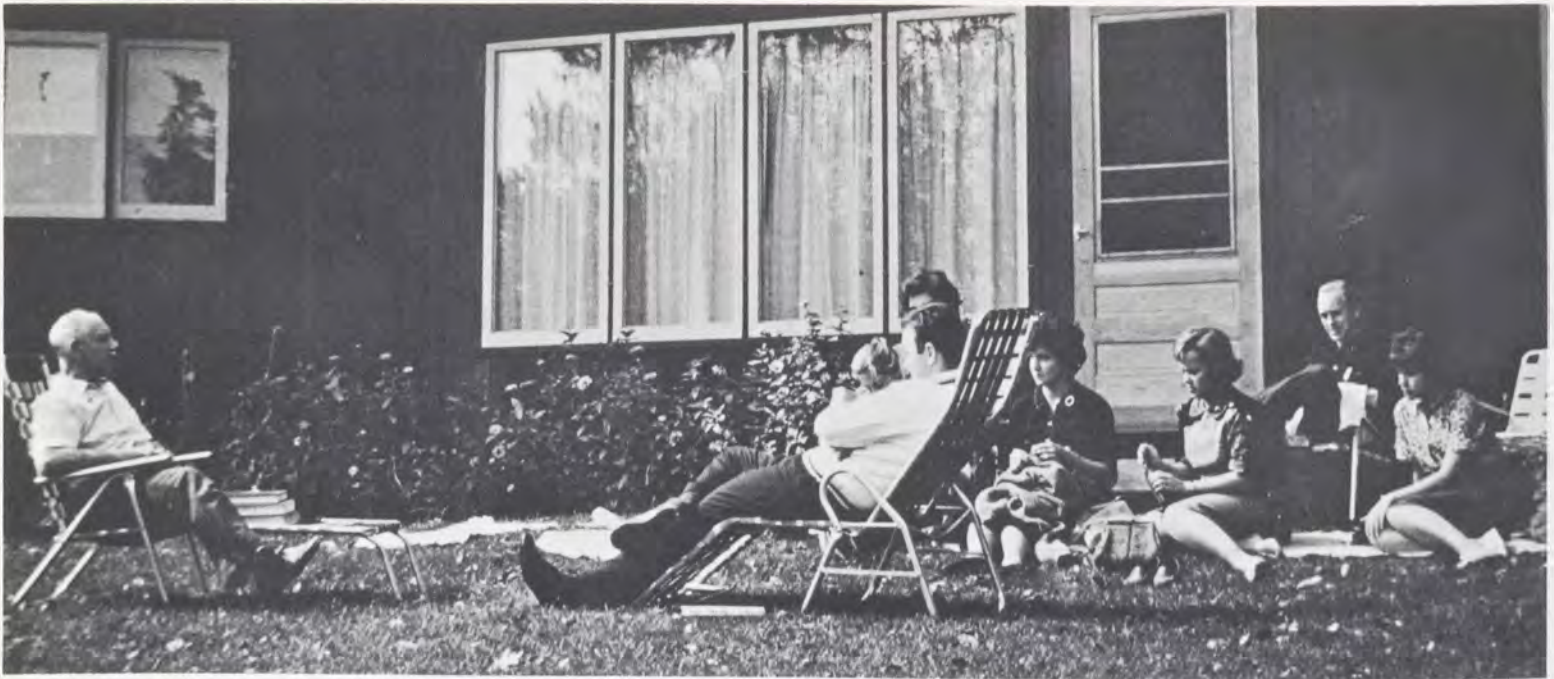

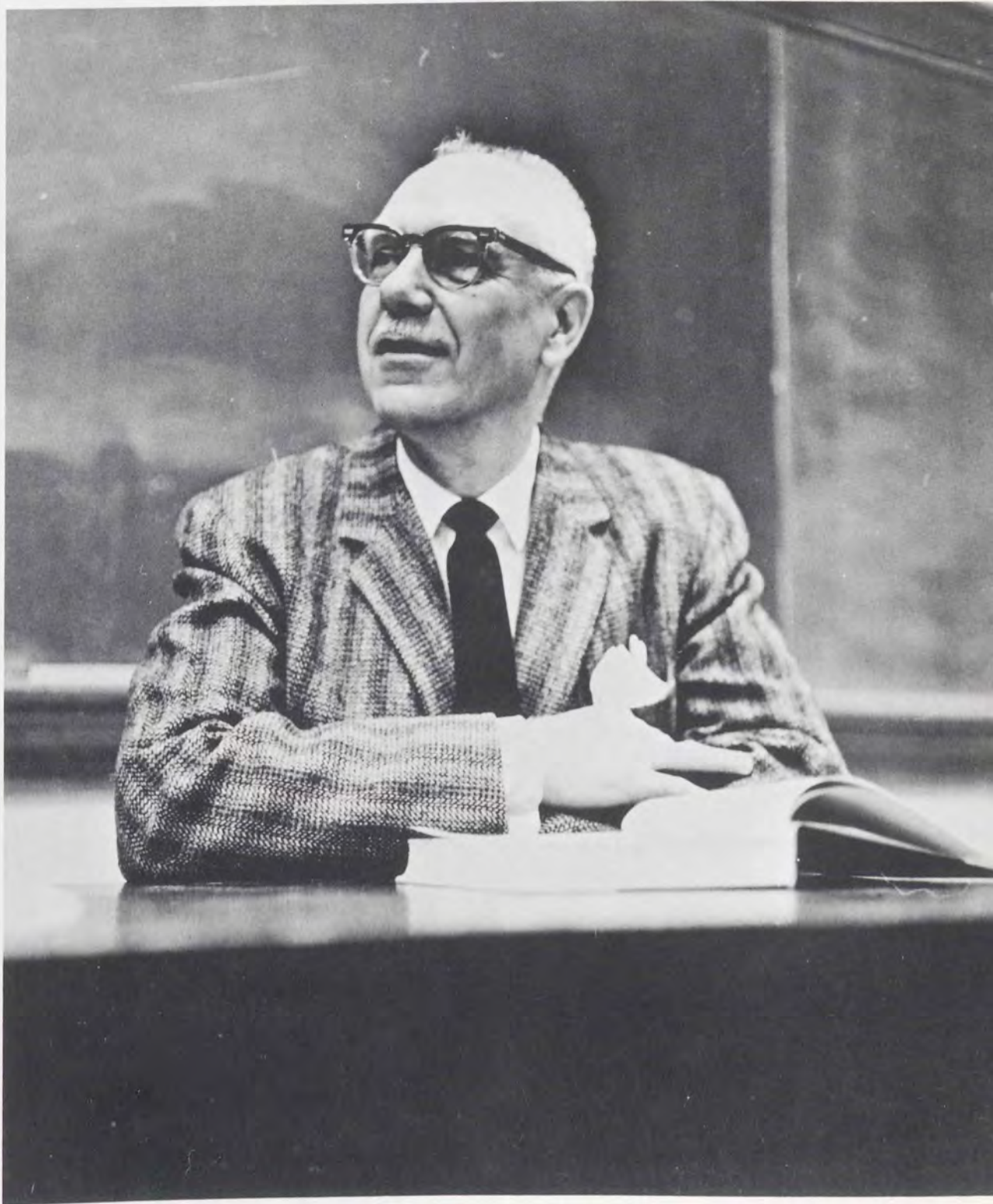
## Dedication

# Houghton College 1883 - 1963

*Eighty years of history accrue some memorable stories and photographs. Though the ultimate goals were distant and the facilities limited in the early days of the Seminary, there still existed graduates, registrations, bands and humorous posers-for-pictures. Apparently, too, there were activities less familiar to our time, since we are ignorant of the exact nature of the send-off to "Beat Chesbro."*

One measure of time at a college is the progress of building the physical plant. On the present campus, Fancher and Gaoyadeo Halls were first, followed by Bedford Gym and Science Hall; the second wave brought East Hall, Alumni Field, Wesley Chapel and Shenawana Hall. Another scale of the years is the size of the trees. The spruce next to the gym was dwarfed by the building once, but now the tables have turned.

The number of major buildings has more than doubled since the first Boulder; the student body has increased tenfold. Yet since the past has value mainly in comparison with the present, our proper concern is today.

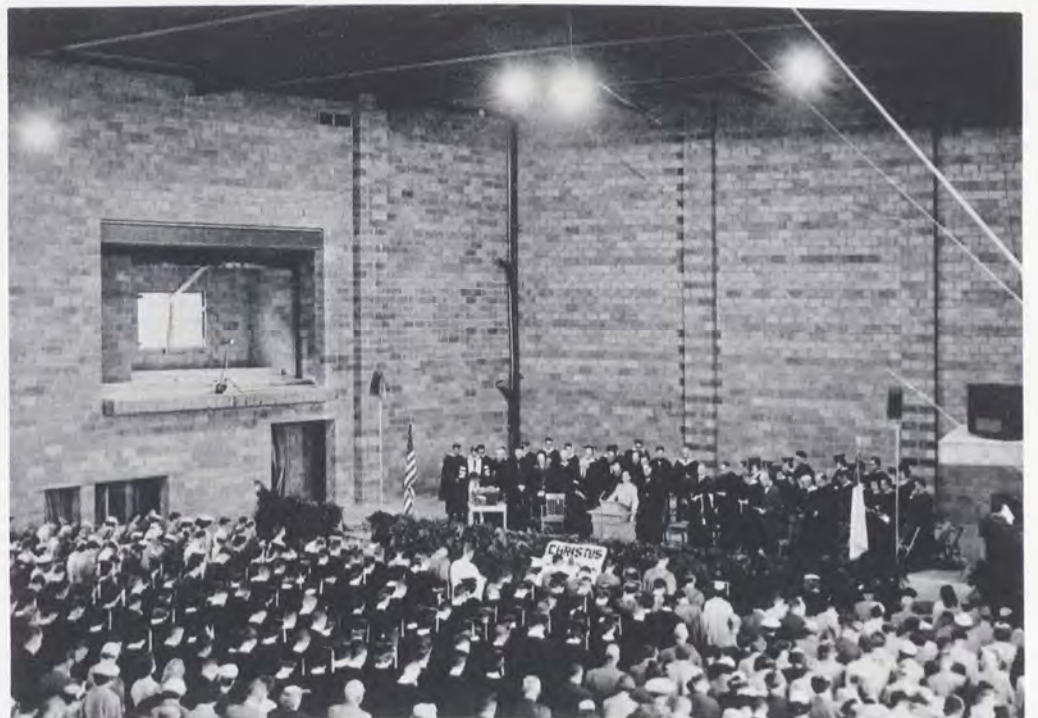

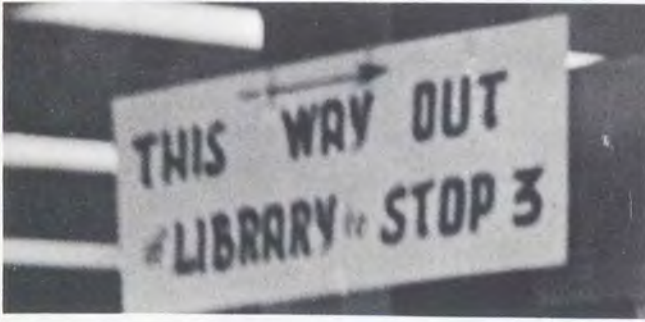






*Patterns of shadow

*The senior realizes that the freshman fervor is simply relief at being able to appear bareheaded.*



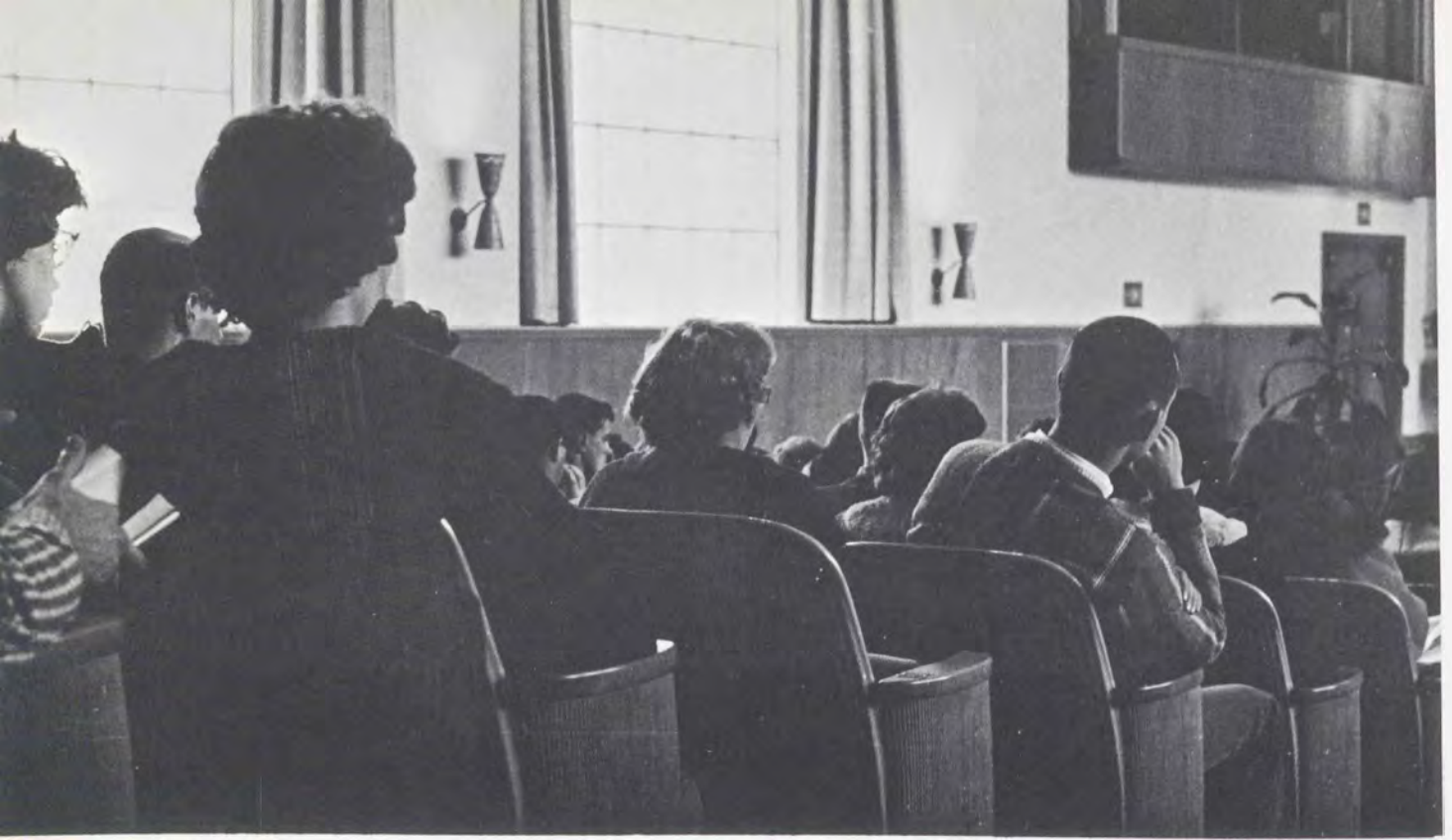




*Homecoming is traditionally a sun-splashed, top-down weekend. New students and alumni, faculty and football players stand to watch the long parade climb the hill.*

*The afternoon is a time when the ball-carrier is rewarded with cheers and a touchdown, and beauty is acknowledged with a flowered float and red roses.*





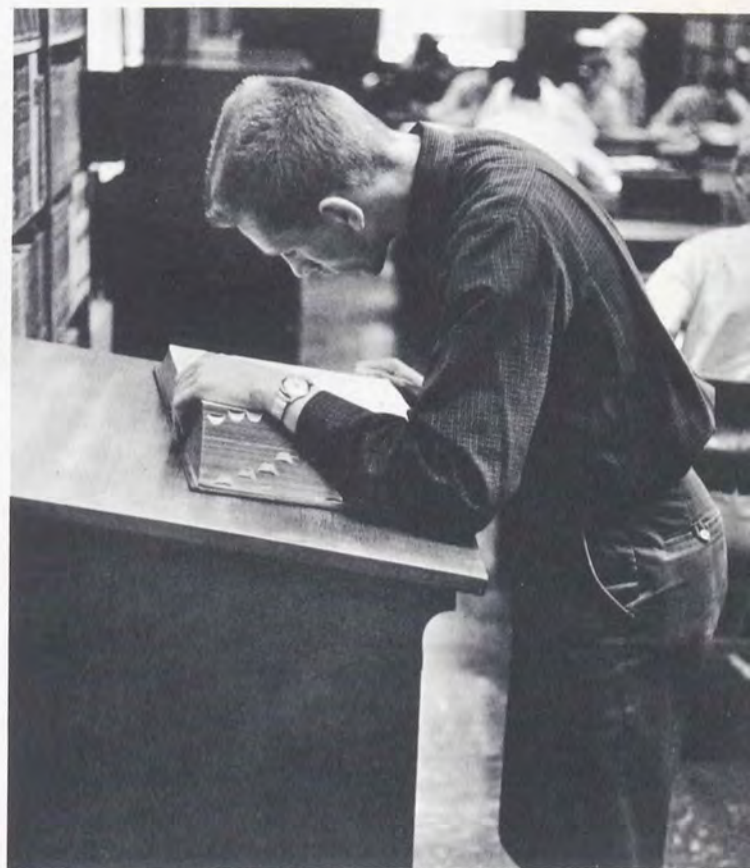
*Chapel is always a fascinating place. From the lectern come challenges and sincere advice; those awake generally profit. Only an occasional knitting needle breaks the silence.*

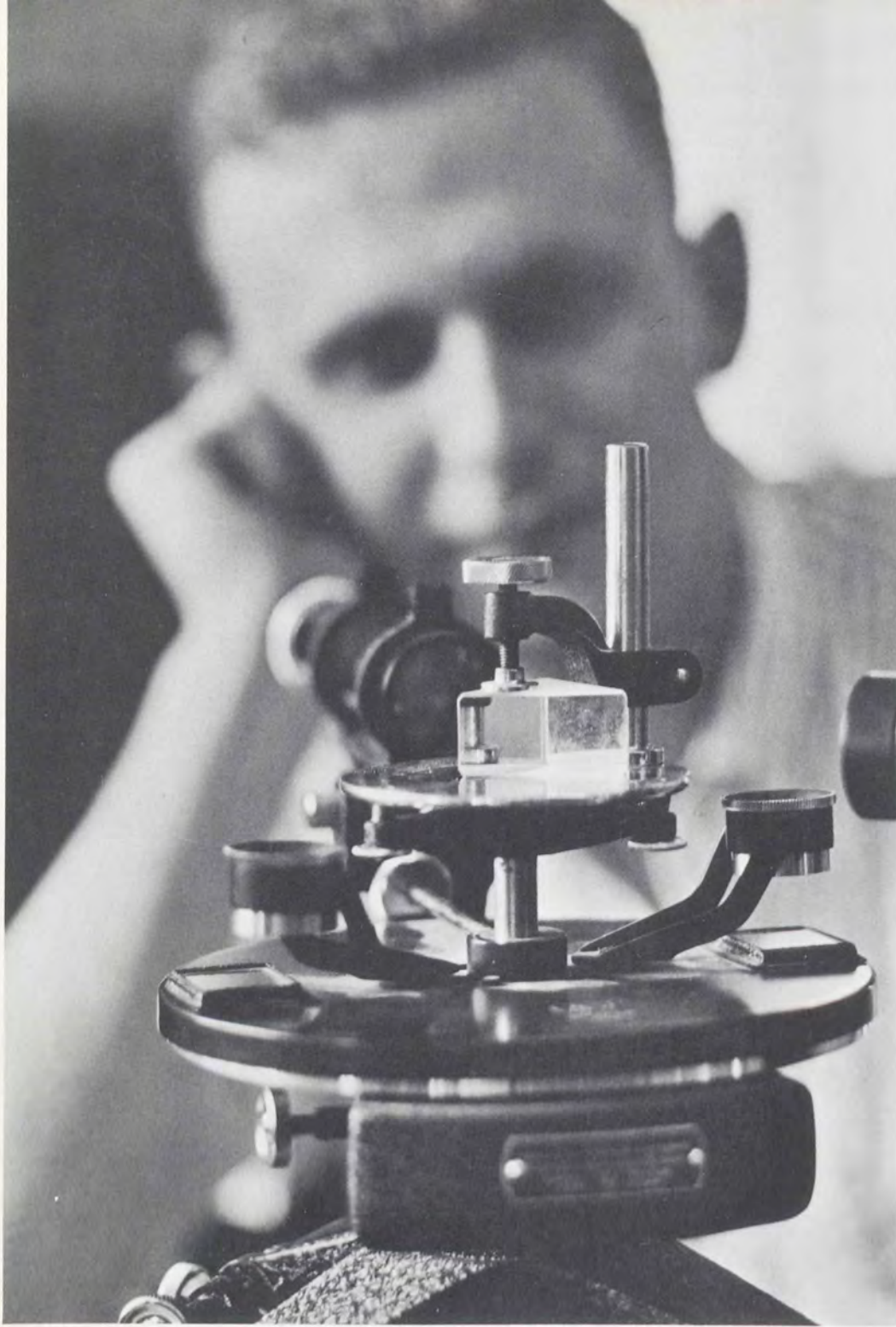

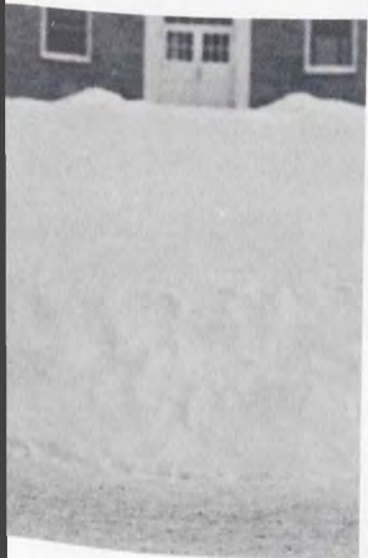
*Lab is a proving-ground for some students; others consider it a kind of all-afternoon trap. Some spend their time in more intriguing ways.*

## English and Speech

To know the English language is to know the major mode of expression in the modern world. It is the function of the English Department and its related club to stimulate correct and imaginative use of this language. While "Dr. Jo" Rickard, chairman of the department, spent her sabbatical leave at Columbia University and in the United Kingdom, English majors met a new instructor, Mr. William Greenway.

Following the theme of Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, the English Club began the year with a feast at the Tabard Inn. Mr. Greenway, faculty advisor, served as host. The Pooocks highlighted the Christmas party by showing slides catching nature's moods, and integrating these with descriptive passages of poetry. In other programs Professor Ray Hazlett lectured on building a personal library, current books were reviewed, and members read drama. For WJSL's "Now On Display," the club produced a half-hour reading of native American poetry. President Judith Errick directed the organization.

The Speech Department's offshoot, the Expression Club, aims to develop vocal communication. A WJSL production of Dickens' "A Christmas Carol" was the highlight of the club's first semester activities. Featuring Professor Alfred Campbell as Scrooge, the radio play was edited by Lionel Basney, coached by the advisor, Mrs. Edna Lennox, produced by President Gladys Gifford and (still with us?) directed by Linwood Kemp. Second semester activities included speech contests, choral speaking, and another radio production.

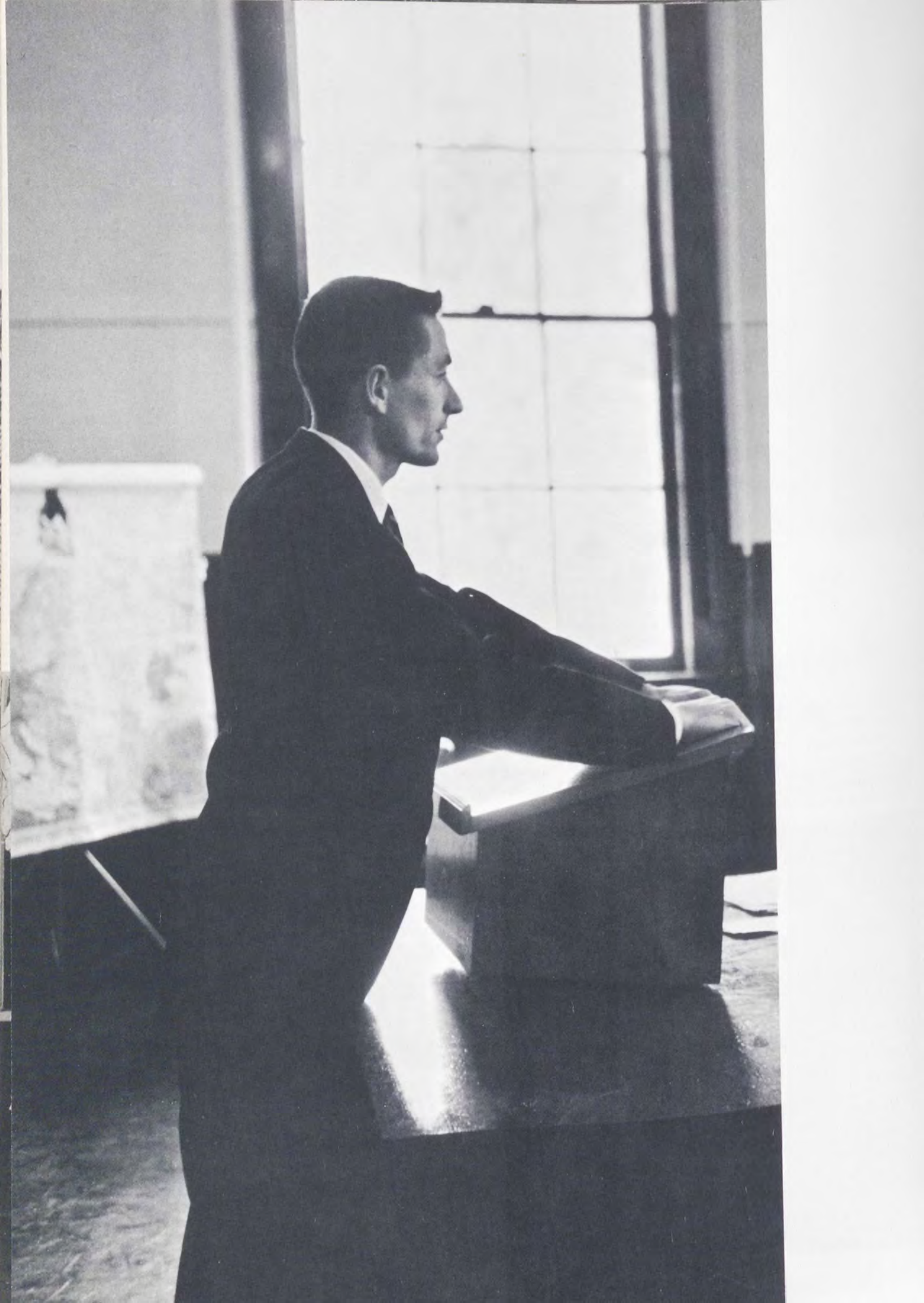

# Social Sciences

The social sciences are tri-directional; historians reach into the past, psychologists work in contemporary thought, and teachers look to a future in elementary, secondary and physical education.

Dubious achievement: the Physical Education Department this year forced its trainees to face the present in eleven minutes of Royal Canadian Air Force exercises each class.

A meeting with the thirty Psychology Club members finds Professor Abraham Davis explaining personality problems in speech therapy, or a Wellsville teacher relating problems she has encountered in teaching mentally-retarded children. A film, "Psychotherapy in Process," showed Carl Rogers practicing his client-centered analysis. The club visited the Elmira Reception Center, a corrective institution for young men, to observe methods of rehabilitation. In October, the club float won a Homecoming parade award. The entry illustrated the contrast in the treatment of the mentally ill—chained and beaten in past years, psychoanalyzed today. In January the club presented a unique program over WJSL. Psychology of conversion was discussed from liberal and fundamental Protestant viewpoints.

The Student Education Association has a membership of 142, tenth largest in New York State. An Ed Club meeting might include an informal discussion with a young teacher, a student-teacher panel discussion, or a movie on specific instruction techniques. Each spring a formal investiture service is held in honor of graduating seniors.

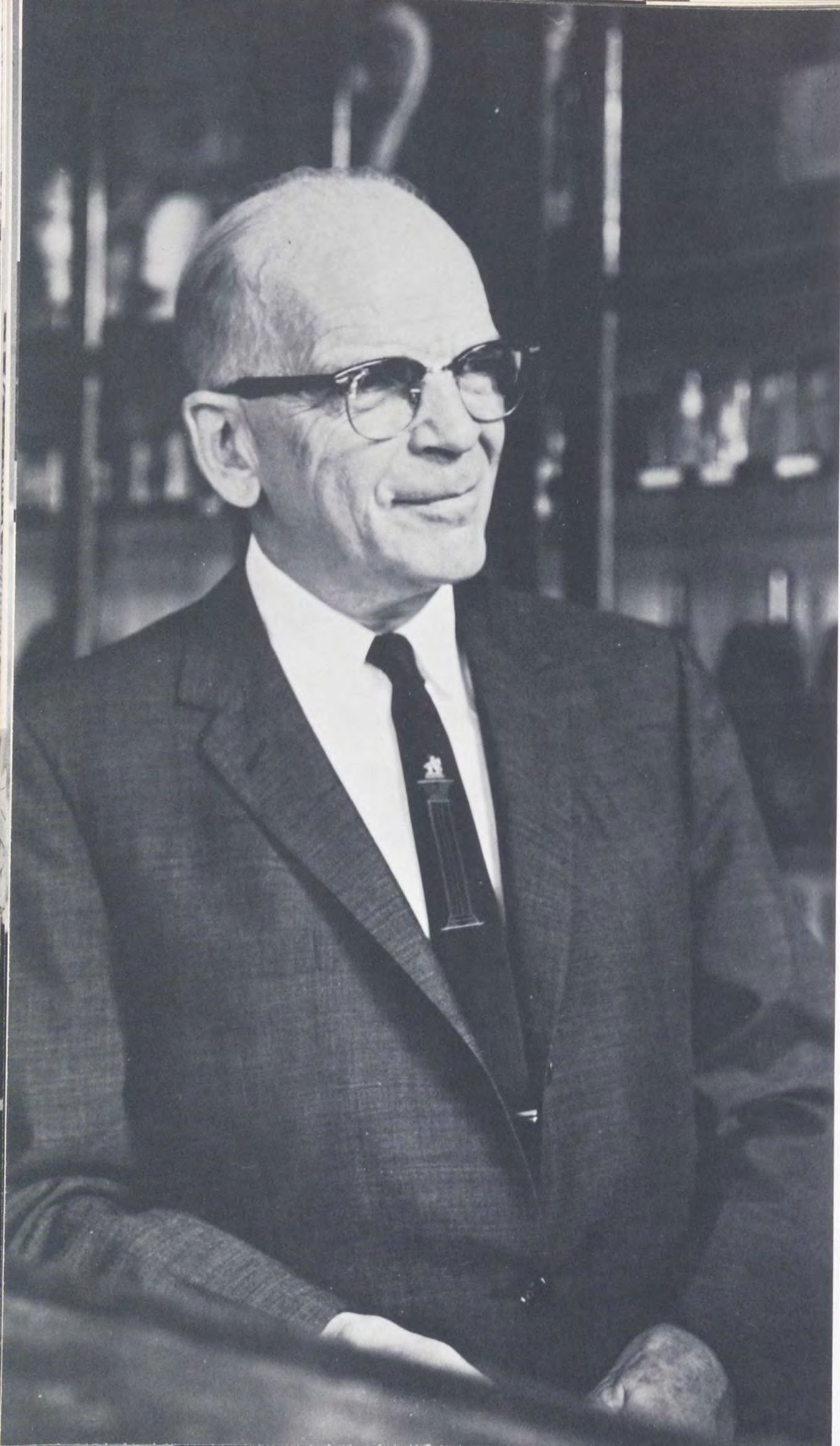

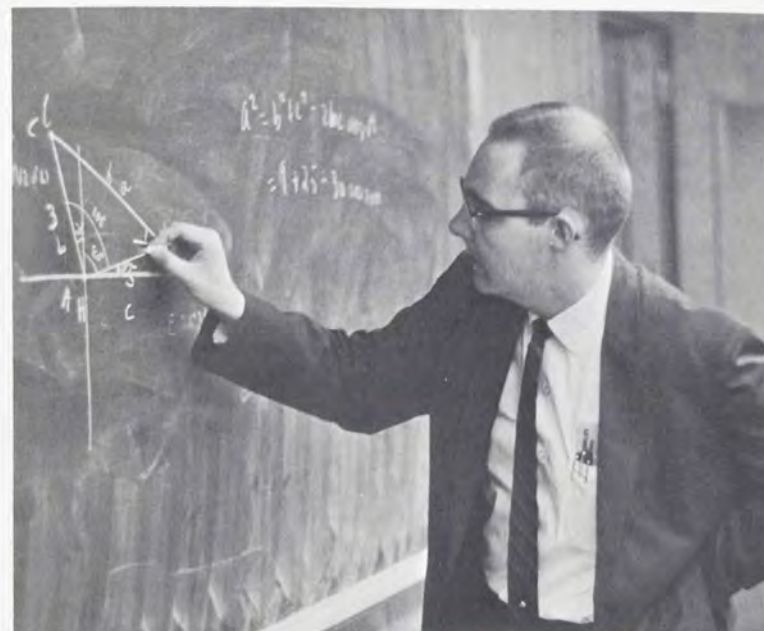

## Science and Mathematics

Involved in the Quant lab, free to watch the zoology lab aquarium or staring at Mr. Pocock's diagram: nearly everyone has had some acquaintance with the Division of Science and Mathematics. The Science Department is in a year of change, with three professors, Shannon and Calhoun of chemistry and Thomas of biology, on leave. Mr. Correll joined the chemistry staff, Mrs. Pinckney became biology instructor and Dr. Eastman's arrival doubled the size of the physics department. In addition, new laboratories were installed for biology, botany and physics.

Two departmental clubs were active. The future doctors and nurses of the Pre-Med Club listened to several excellent speakers, among them Dr. Gold, from Son-yea, who vividly described the professional art of autopsy, applying this specifically to the brain-damaged patient at Craig Colony. After his lecture he displayed and dissected several unique human brain specimens. Dr. Benninger, from Buffalo, explained an operation used at Children's Hospital to straighten deformed young spines. The braver members watched operations in color at the frequent club movies.

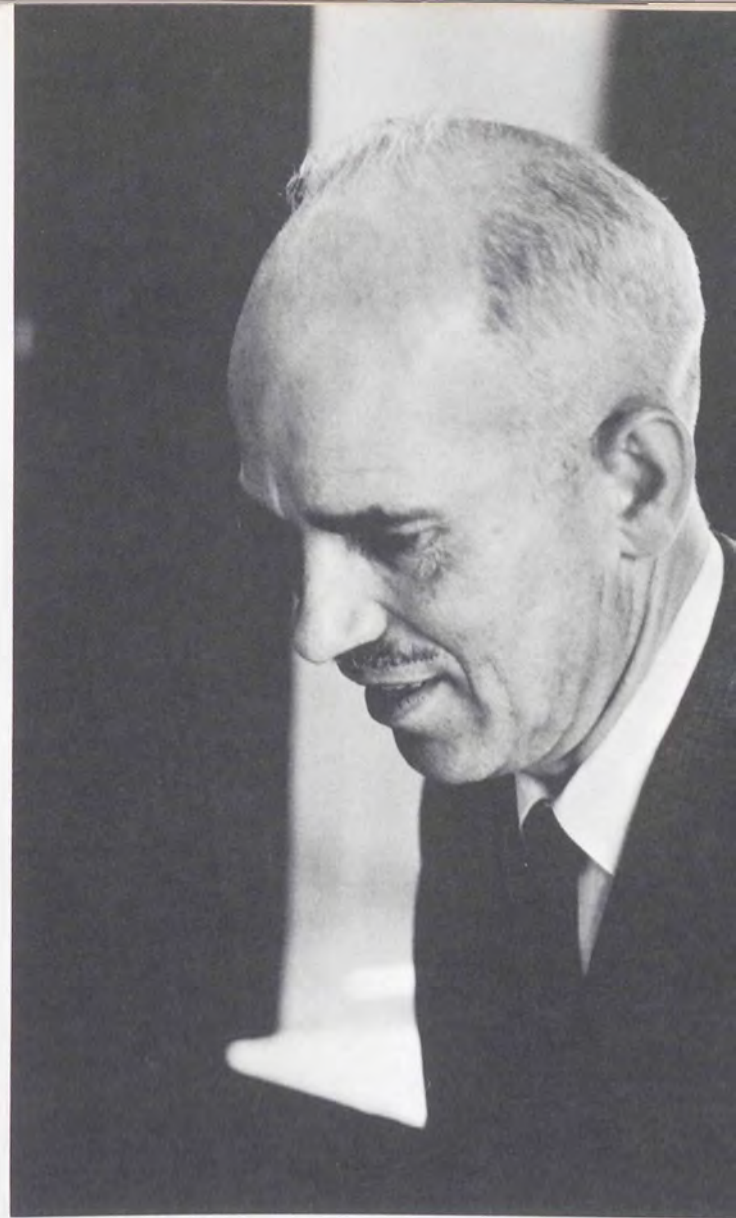

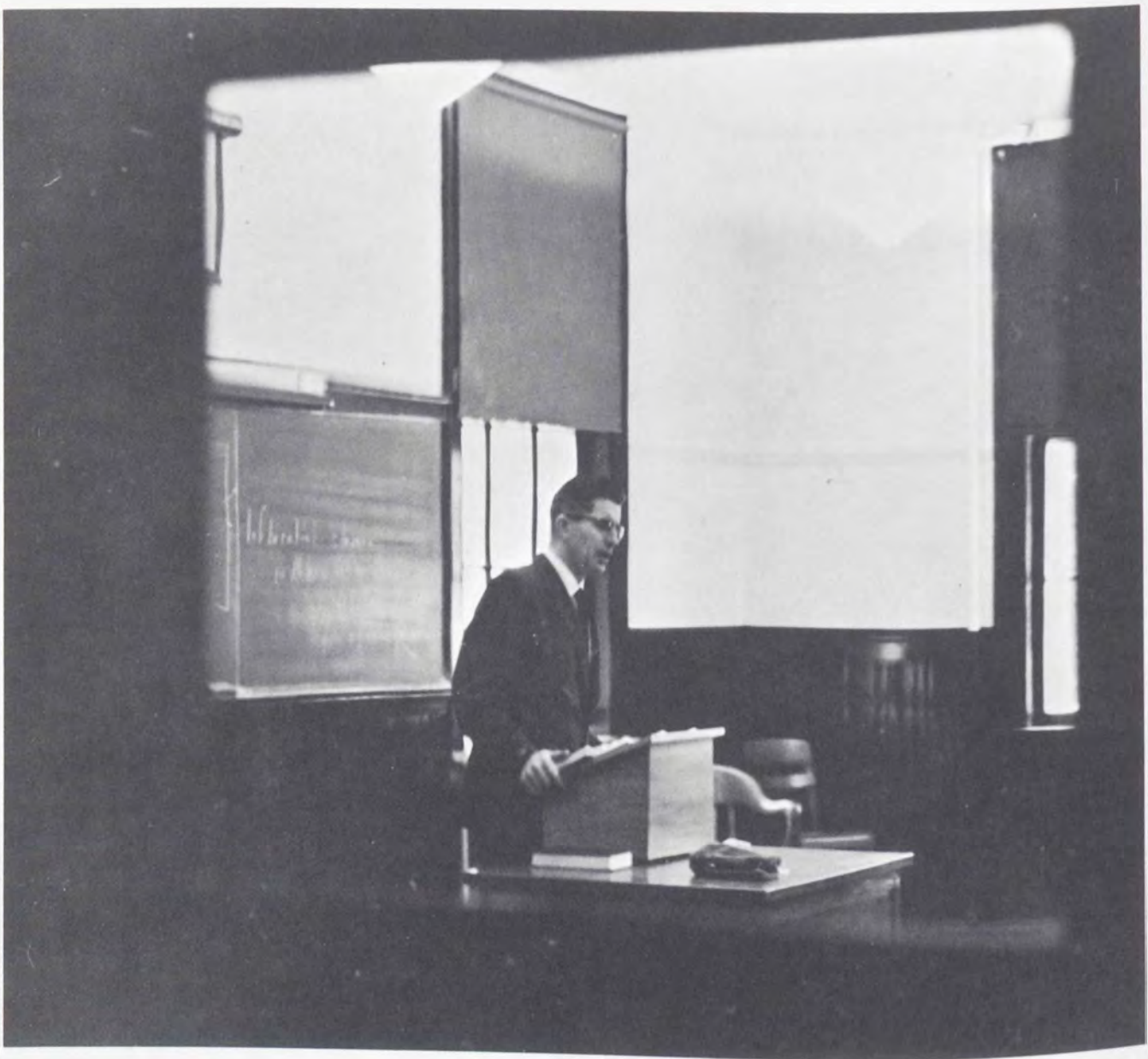

# Theology and Christian Education

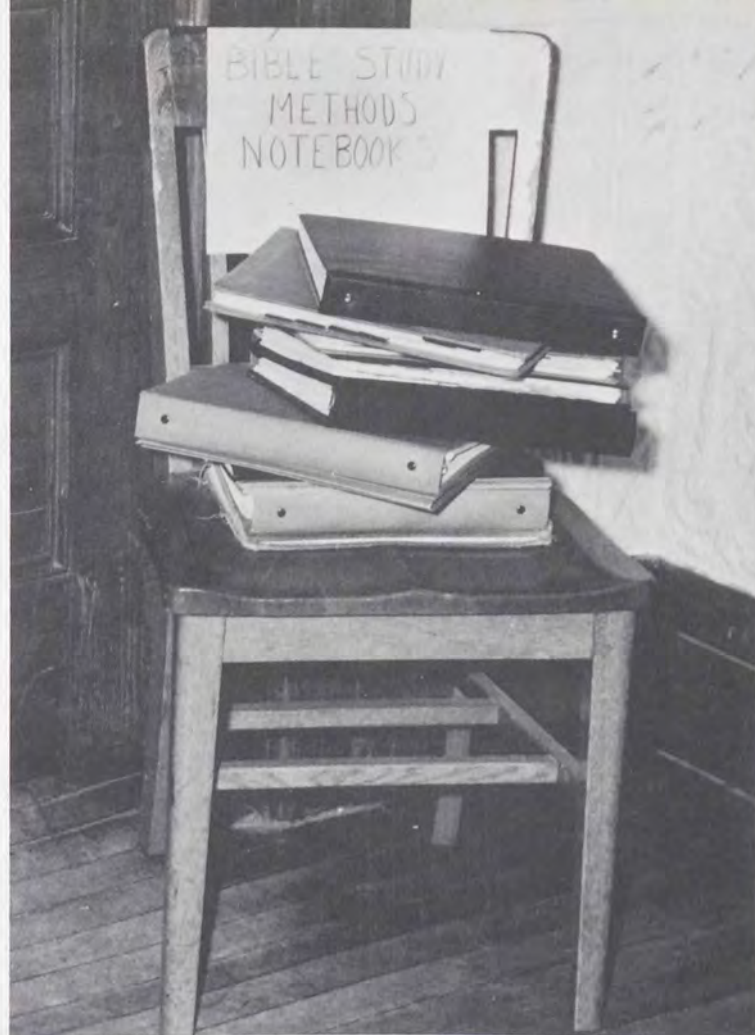
Courses in the Theology Department can be hard—just ask freshmen meeting Bible requirements, juniors working on Christian Education majors, philosophy majors studying Kant, and pre-seminarians completing the Comprehensive Major in Religion. To teach theology can be even harder, especially when unexpected circumstances cause irregular course assignments. Not ones to run from responsibility, in the first semester Dr. Hall taught 21 hours, Dr. Wilson added Comparative Religions to his schedule, and Dr. Ries suddenly found himself also instructing Life of Christ.

Results of the year's work included Theological Class Night, seminary acceptances, and lives influenced by vigorous thought.

Students in the Christian Education Department taught released-time and Sunday School classes and learned methods of home and foreign evangelistic work. A related organization, the Christian Education Club, sought to acquaint its members with the field's new methods of communications by bringing outstanding Christian educational authorities to the campus to speak at monthly meetings.

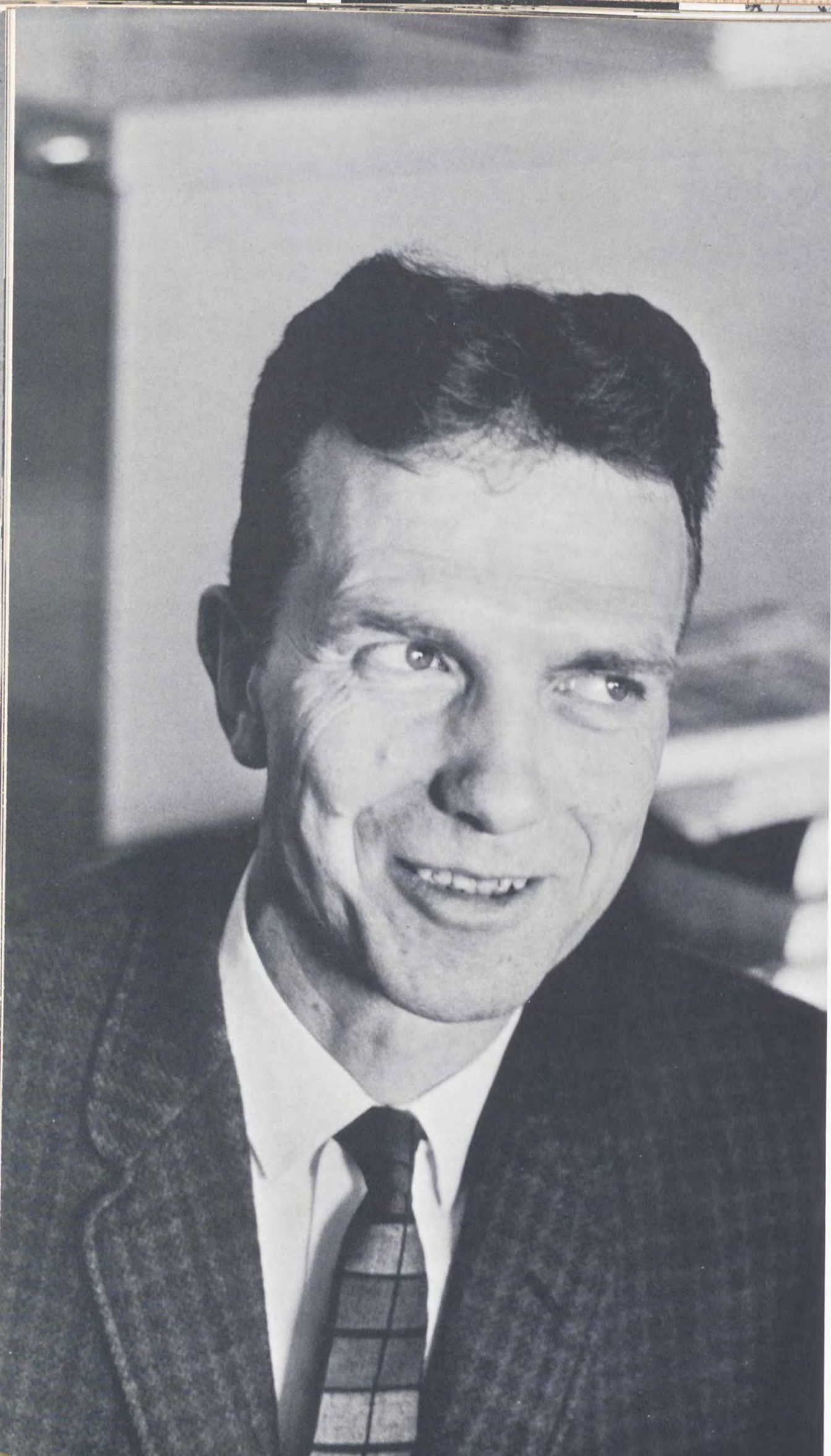
The year's largest undertaking was the third annual Christian Education Conference held March 12 and 13. Wistful notes of a piano thin out over the quad late at night—a bold and brassy trumpet trio echoes from Fancher in mid-afternoon—an organ prelude creeps, climbs slowly to the ceiling of the auditorium in early morning. These are the times, the faces, the moods of sound. A woodwind quintet moves together, a quartet pauses and blends. The full swell of voices and organ in "Worthy is the Lamb" convinces one that at Houghton music is not merely enjoyable; it is essential.

Fully accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music, the College Music Department provides excellent instruction in many areas of theory and practice. The organ department was bolstered this year by the return of Dr. Finney and the use of the Holt-camp pipe organ in Wesley Chapel.

The Division's other half, the Department of Art, brightens an art lab and a campus with poetry in color. Seldom is the Divisional cooperation as obvious as it was in the Oratorio Society's December presentation of *Messiah*: the huge, backdrop paintings of Christ added greatly to the worshipful mood of the service.

The Music Department's related Music Education Club plans both social and informational functions for its members. Halloween parties, carol sings and other outings intersperse the regular meetings, in which student teaching and music in general are discussed.

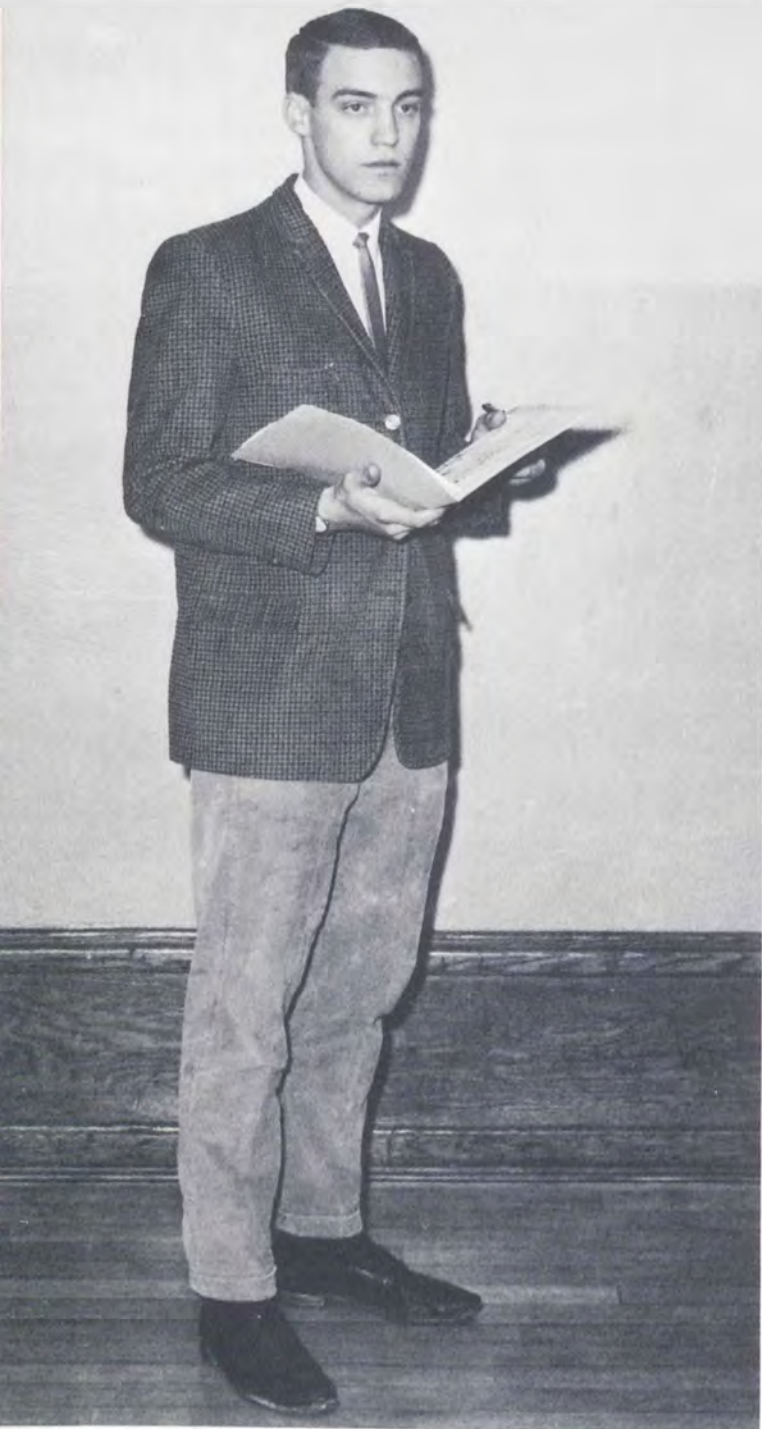

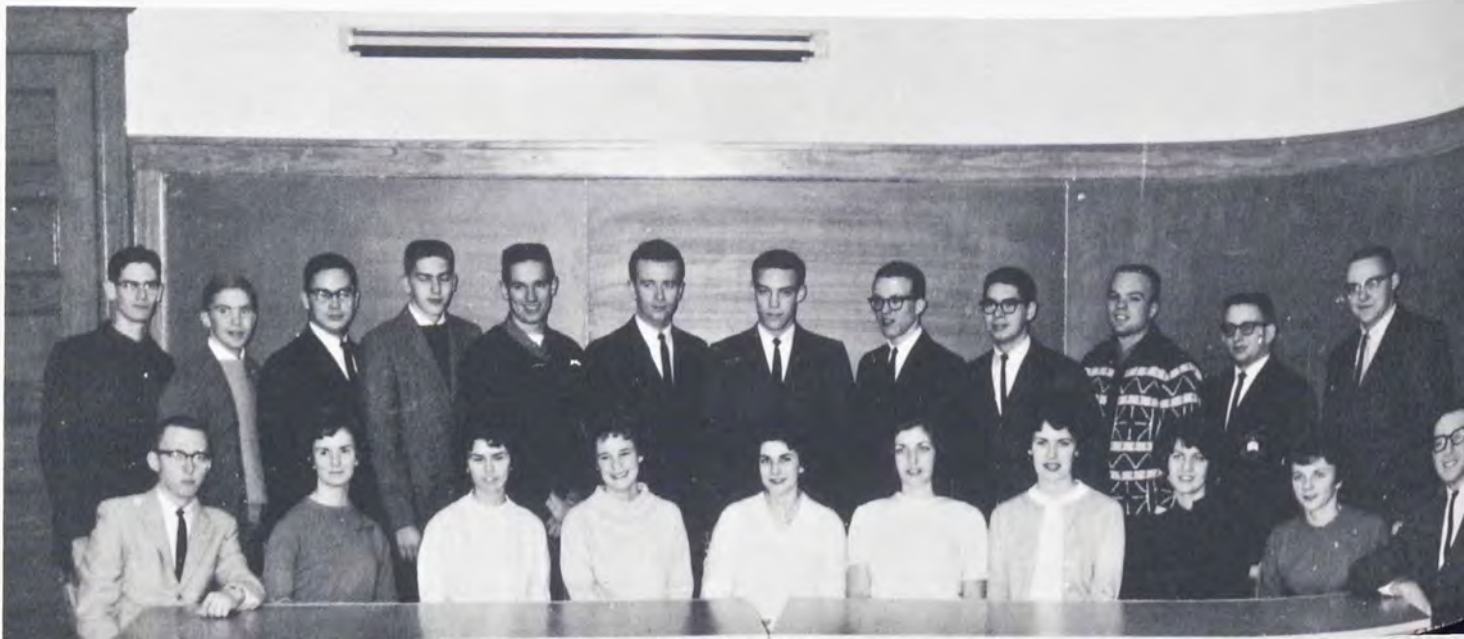
## Student Senate

The 1962-63 Student Senate had a productive year. If not always agreed with, the collegiate viewpoint was nevertheless well-represented. Judge Charles Green presided over a just and hilarious Honor Court in September, climaxing a hectic freshman initiation. The Christian Leaders' Conference, held in October, drew student executives, class chaplains and senators. Senate's resourceful P.R. Committee planned the complex October Homecoming Weekend, organizing the parade and the halftime program at the football game with surprising precision. Later in the month the Senate led in a well-accepted first: a United Nations Day Program. This featured a vigorous panel discussion in chapel among students from five countries, a film, and an international culture display. In November, Senate sent five representatives to the regional AAES Convention at Eastern Pilgrim College in Allentown.

The four feet of snow on the quad stayed cold for the Winter Carnival and traditional snow sculpturing. Senate again planned an exchange program with Roberts Wesleyan. In February, Senate delegates traveled to attend the annual Washington Seminar.

During the year Senate instituted a series of informal coffee hours on current problems; discussions of the India crisis, the ecumenical movement and the Mississippi riots were more stimulating than the non-existent coffee. The Senate forcefully presented for approval its programs and policies through a fifteen minute, bi-weekly program on WJSL. A *Star* column also informed the student body of the Senate calendar of events.

The church fills, then quiets—the choir marches in. Two lines, single file, white sash against black robes. An H on the sash, its owner thus identified as a member of the Houghton A Cappella Choir. All forty singers finally in place, each greeted by upturned, expectant, questioning faces. The moment of truth nears—all eyes on Director Robert Shewan. There is no tension, only excitement. Tension has been left behind in pre-meeting prayer. The pitch, then the gloriously-alive bars of “Oh Rejoice Ye Christians Loudly.” More anthems, a greeting, an offering, and into the heavy music of Bach and Brahms. Then, another shifting of mood into a Negro Spiritual, Frank’s “Psalm 100,” the Russian-composed “Psalm 121,” and a well-known hymn. The close comes with a pastor’s benediction, but the atmosphere lingers as the choir, without director, harmonizes the complex “Amen.”

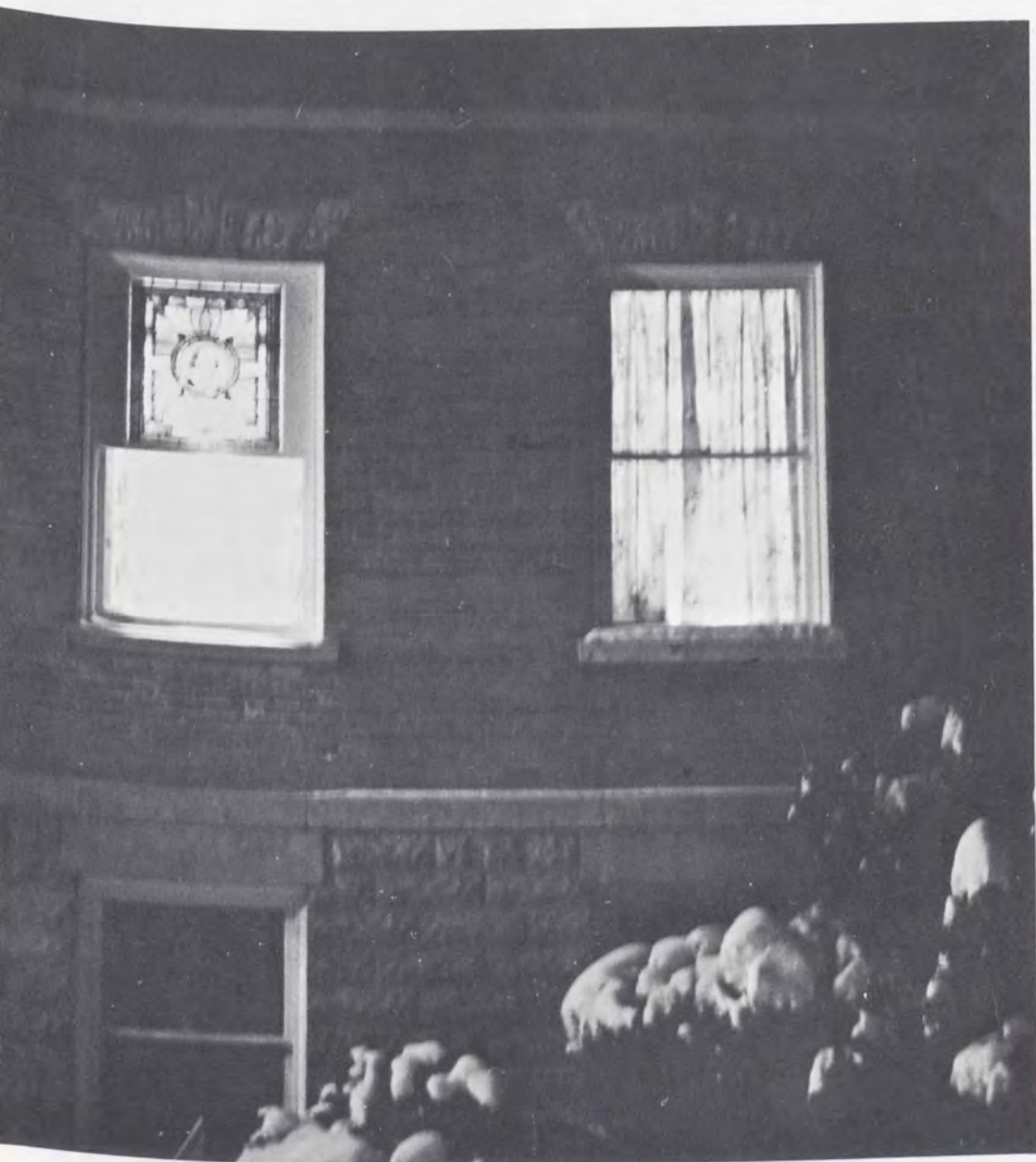
## Madrigal Singers

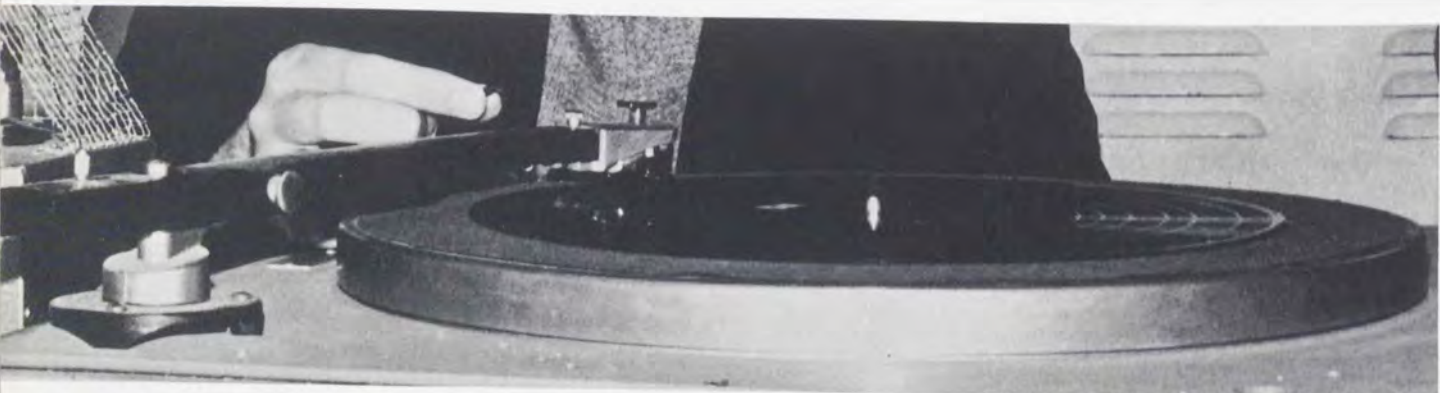

## Foreign Missions Fellowship

Lump together chapels, display tables, interviews, prayer meetings and large budgets and you have Houghton's Foreign Mission Fellowship, the missionary arm of Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship.

"Fit for the Master's Use" was the theme of FMF's three-day Missionary Conquest in the fall of 1962. Mr. Dennis Clark, from Evangelical Literature Overseas, and the Rev. Jack Shepherd, Director of Studies at Nyack's Jaffrey School of Mission, headed the eighteen-member missionary delegation. In addition to classroom lectures and personal interviews, these mission representatives led nightly, dormitory discussion groups. Complementing this, the display room in S-24 illustrated the forces confronted by missionaries today in every part of the globe.

Throughout the year, Wednesday was a day of missions emphasis; FMF's weekly prayer groups also corresponded with missionaries and reported on their current needs and accomplishments. Modern Missions in Action met bi-weekly after the prayer time and featured that day's missionary chapel speaker, usually accompanied by audio-visual aids.

The newest phase of FMF outreach is the work of deputation teams. Groups consisting of international students, missionary children and those planning for foreign service have gone into churches in Western New York to conduct missionary-emphasis services. Panels, discussion groups, slides and other means were utilized to present concepts of missions to church members.

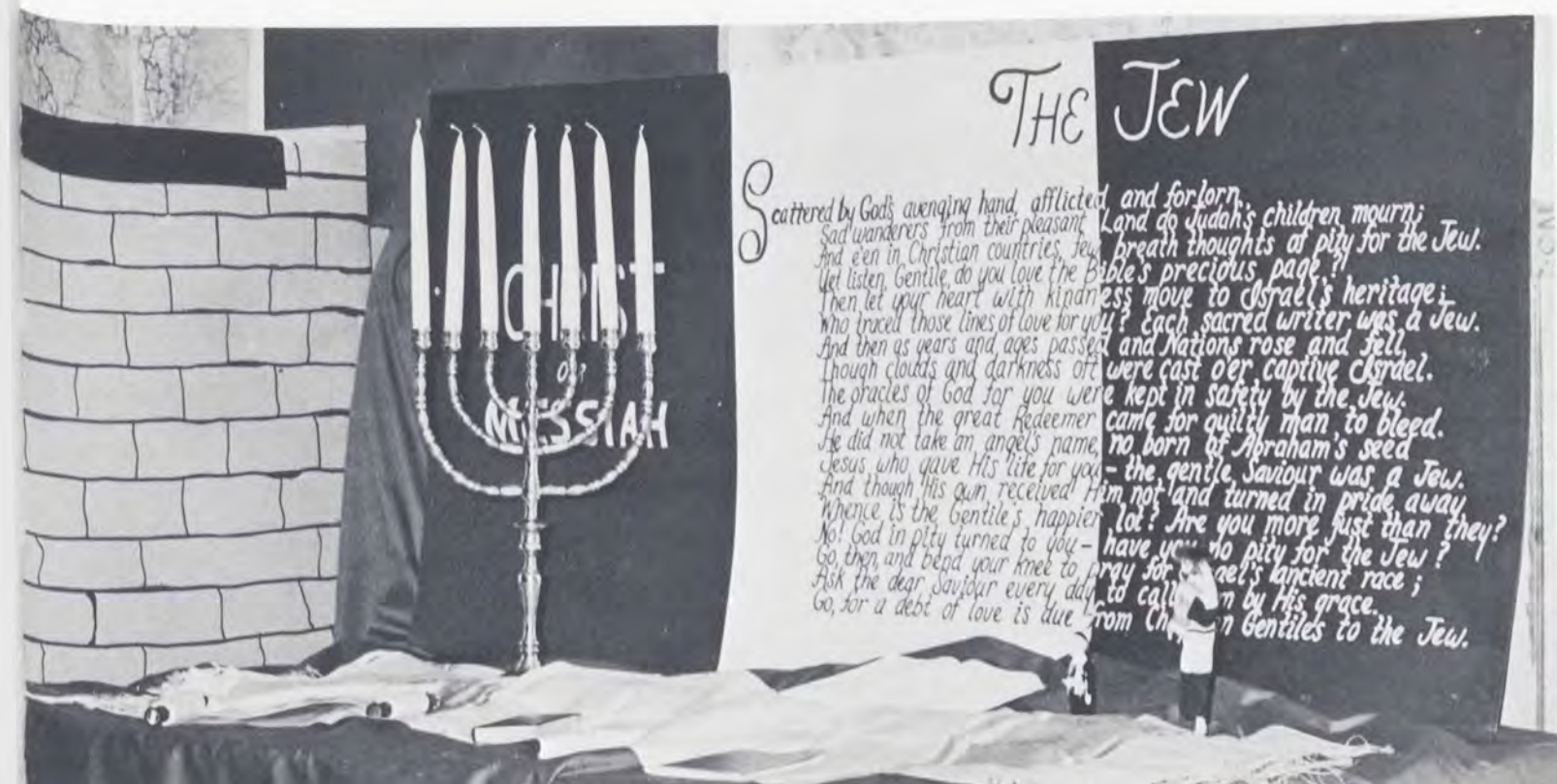

# Football

Tackle football came to Houghton in 1962 for the first time. Gold took three straight and ran its string to nine consecutive victories, but the games were close and exciting.

There was unusual depth in the squads, due to night practice made possible by floodlights newly installed on Alumni Field. The Athletic Association provided game programs and Paul Mouw announced a public-address system play-by-play description of the game. The crowd on that unusually warm, October day was one of the largest ever. A notable fact, in addition, was the spirit and desire to win displayed by both teams.

Coach Wells' men put together the first scoring drive of the season when they capped an eighty yard march near

the end of the first quarter with fullback Jim Titus going over from the one. The try for the extra point was fumbled and that ended the scoring in the first half.

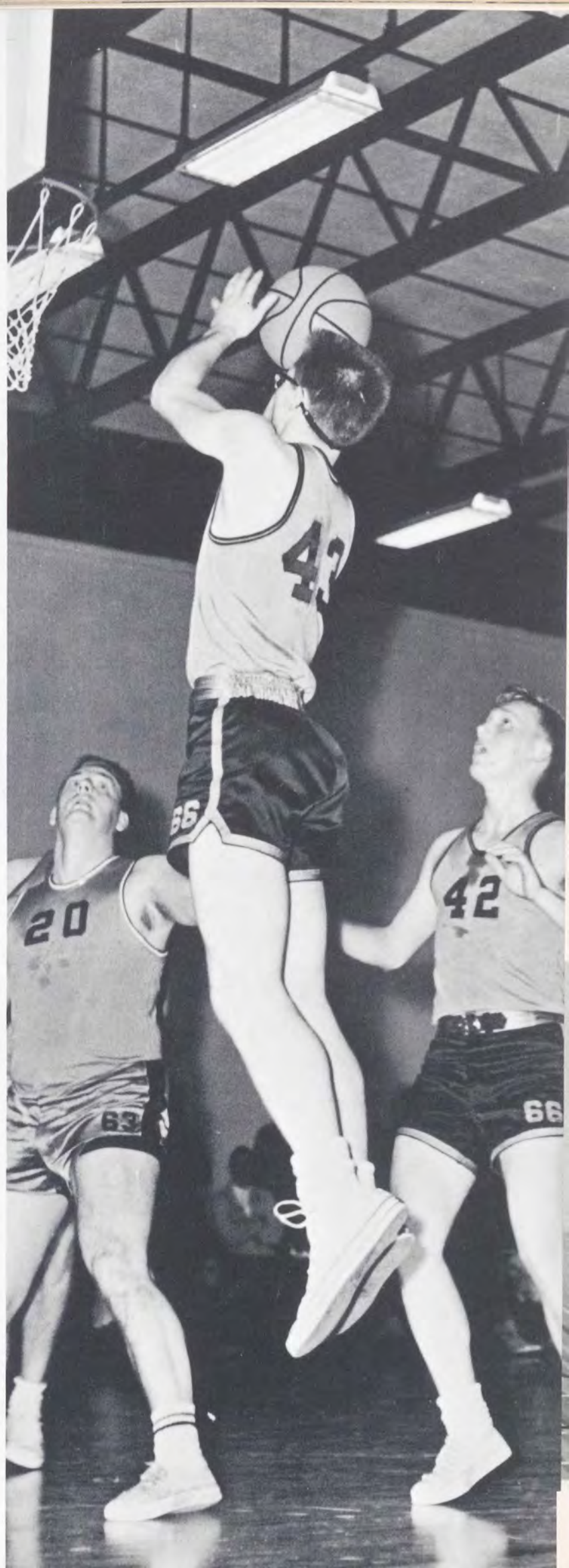

# Track and Field

Despite the efforts of Jim Hamilton and Joe Kickasola, both Purple and the freshmen were victorious in the '62 track tourneys. In the color meet, it was the awe-inspiring efforts of Purple women that produced a 92-86 overall edge.

In this meet, Gold's Hamilton garnered sixteen points with firsts in the high hurdles, pole vault and 220-yard low hurdles, plus the anchor leg in the relay victory. His low hurdle success and the relay effort produced new college records. Closing his college track career, Joe Kickasola won the javelin throw and the 100-yard dash. Placing also in the pole vault and the low hurdles, he compiled sixteen points for the Gladiator effort.

Dual winners Pete Schreck and Jim Buck led the Pharaohs. Schreck captured the broad jump and 220-yard sprint and Buck the 440 and 880-yard dashes. Heading the women's attacks were Karen Greer, Gail Gardzinir, Sharon Johnson and Jeanene Ross for Purple and Stef Souder and Mim Paine, a record setter, for Gold. A woman's relay record set by Purple was one of four shattered marks.

In class competition, the spiked-shoe set also exploded for a pair of new records. Women again were the decisive factor as the frosh handed the second-place juniors a nine-point defeat. Two other marks were set, only to be broken in the color meet. Triple-winner Hamilton was again the men's star as he established a new pole-vault standard. Freshman Gail Gardzinir set a baseball-throw mark and also won the soccer kick.







## Baseball

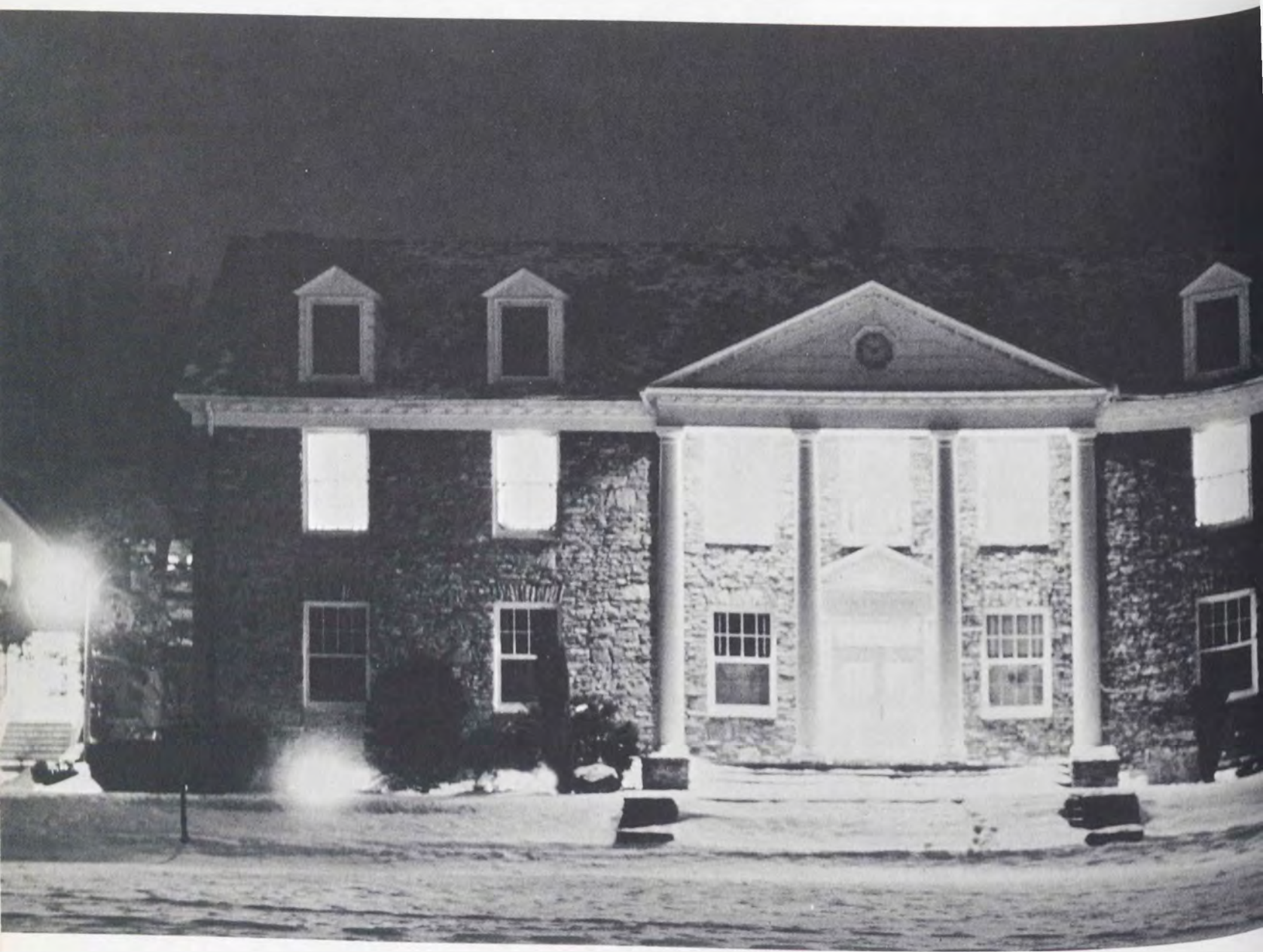

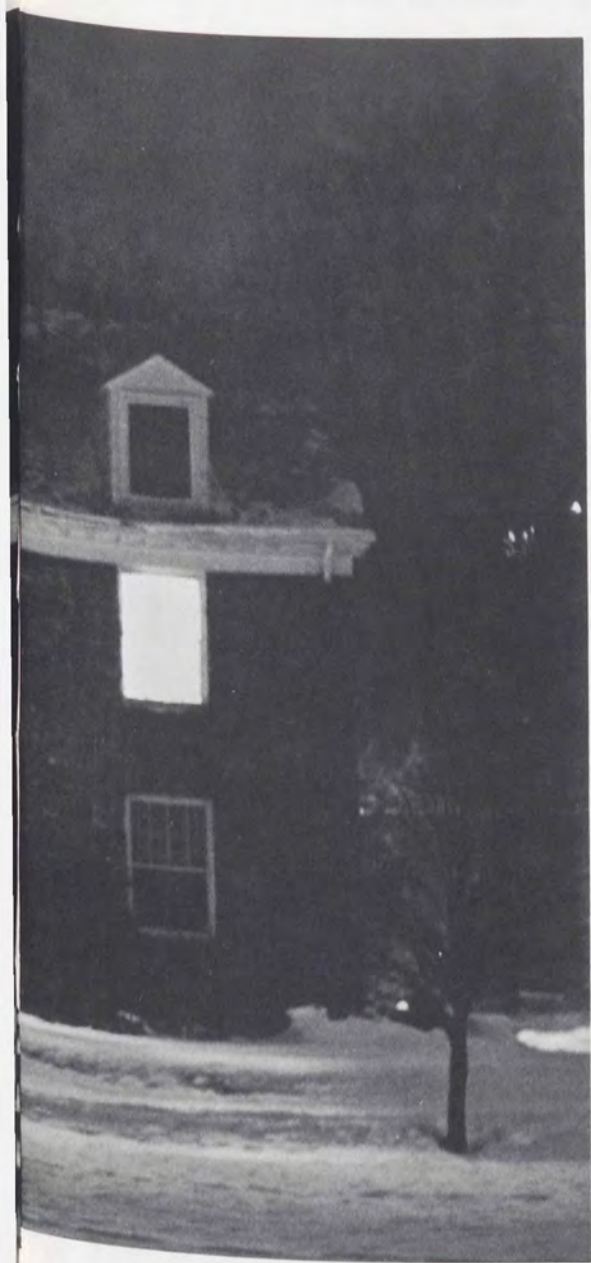

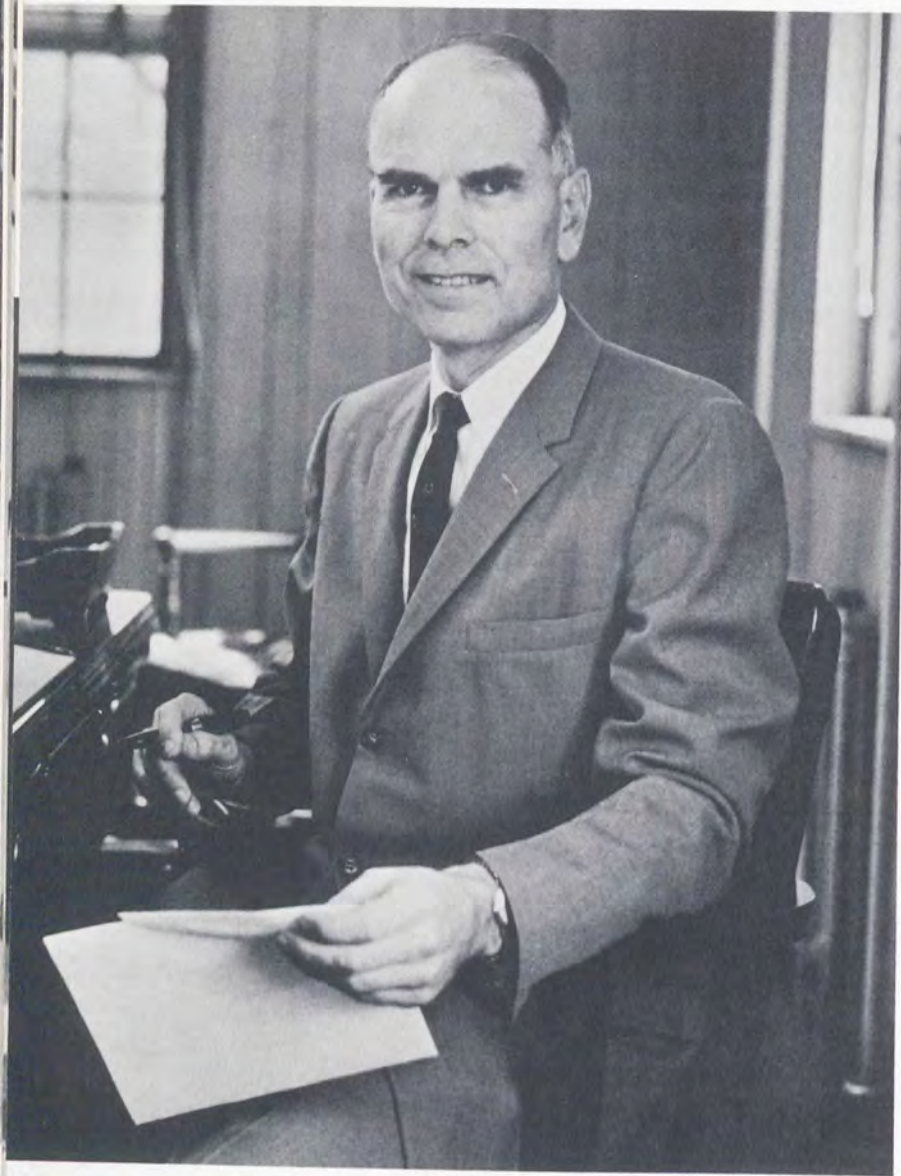

# Administration



## The President

More than anyone else, Dr. Stephen W. Paine is Houghton College. His Christian wisdom and steadiness are outstanding in an administrative position which involves settling conflicts in every quarter. Any group can insist that its way is right, but only Dr. Paine is given the job of pleasing them all.

The yearbook was dedicated to him after his first year as President—that was in 1938. He has been dedicated to Houghton for even longer than that: this June makes thirty years on the faculty. Back then you would often find him on the tennis court or basketball floor; even now he is more likely to be at a game than we are.

We see him most in chapel, where his eloquently simple prayers and straightforward presentations are a pleasure to hear. Yet he is also appreciated when engaged in one of his somebody-has-to-say-it lectures: who but a scholar could so delicately rephrase the delicacies?

Dr. Paine has seen Houghton through a war and a student boom, and with new pressures his patience has grown. His is a controversial place, and he fills it with the integrity of a great faith and a great devotion to the Lord's work here. His disciplined life has led to unquestioned respect; he serves his God well because he knows Him.





## The Vice President

This is the year of retirement for one of Houghton's great men: Claude A. Ries, B.A., M.A., B.D., Th.D., Professor of Greek and Biblical Literature and Chairman of the Division of Theology and Christian Education—a man students come to the college to hear. Speak of teachers, of preachers, of counselors, and his name appears; speak of saints of God in Houghton, and people think of Dr. Ries.

They dedicated the *Boulder* to him in 1949—"to this man of unfeigned godliness and humility," they said. That year concluded a quarter-century of service here; now the span has grown to 39 years, and still his lectures, his prayers, and his life inspire a town and all who know him.

He is open to the truth, and it has so nourished him that he has become a standard for others. When he goes the college will be different; though colleges are used to carrying on, the gap he leaves will be bigger than another man alone can fill.

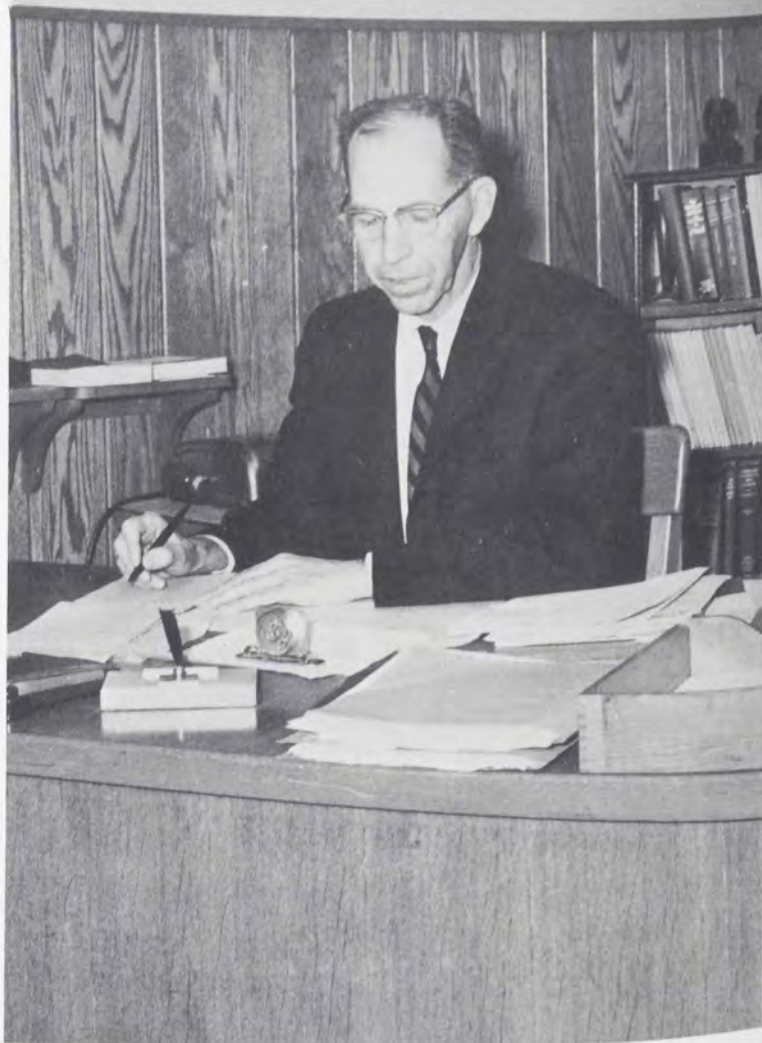
# Dean of the College
