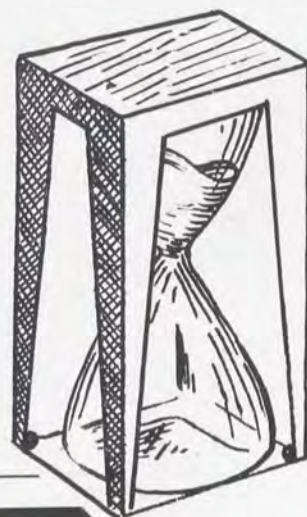

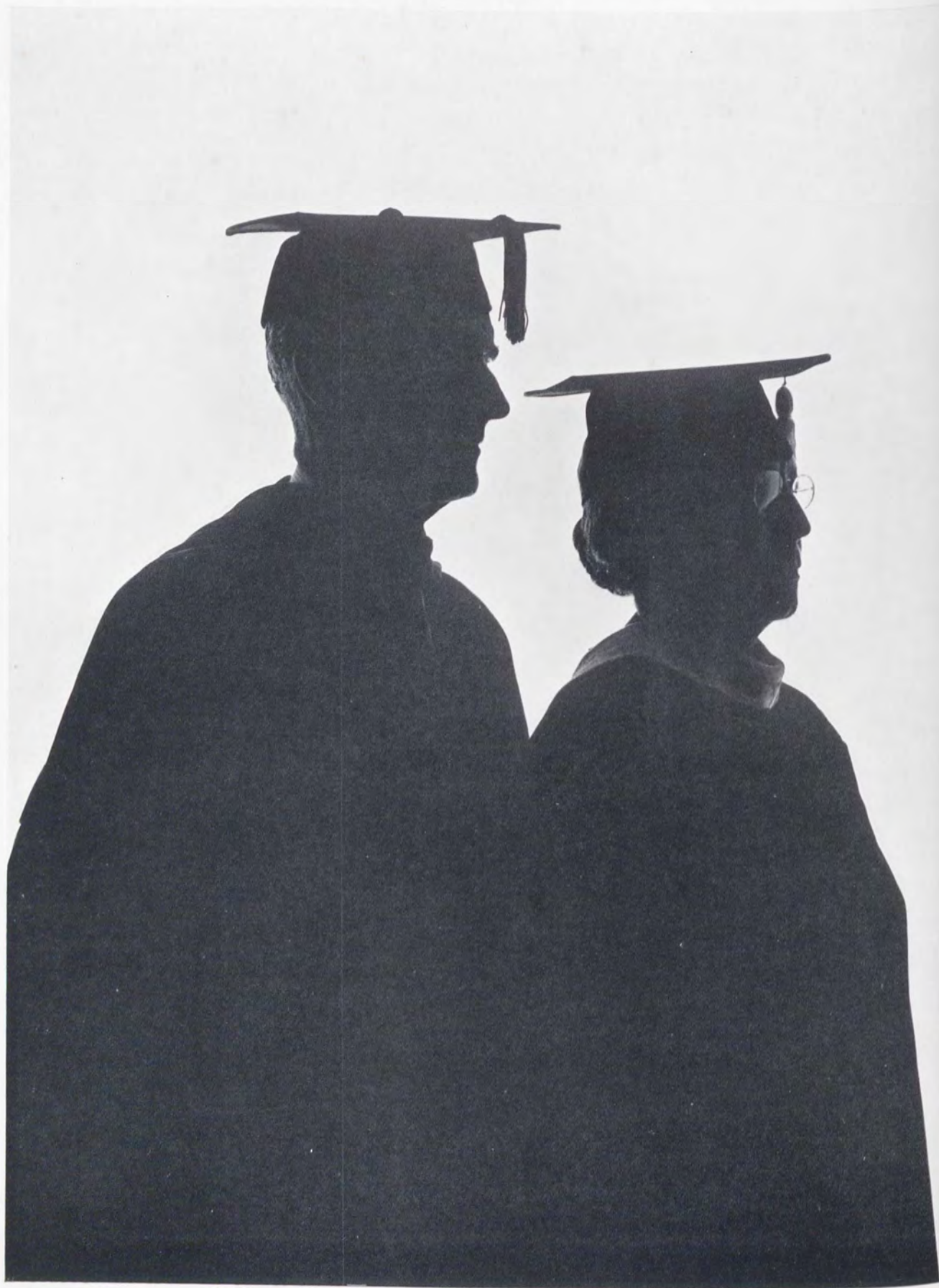

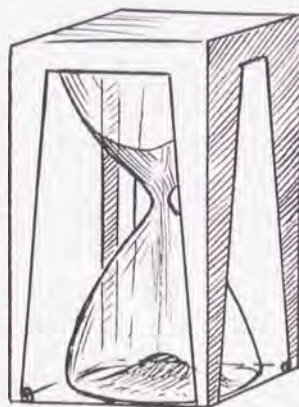
Under Dean Lynip, Houghton's high scholastic standards as well as her Christian testimony will continue to be upheld.

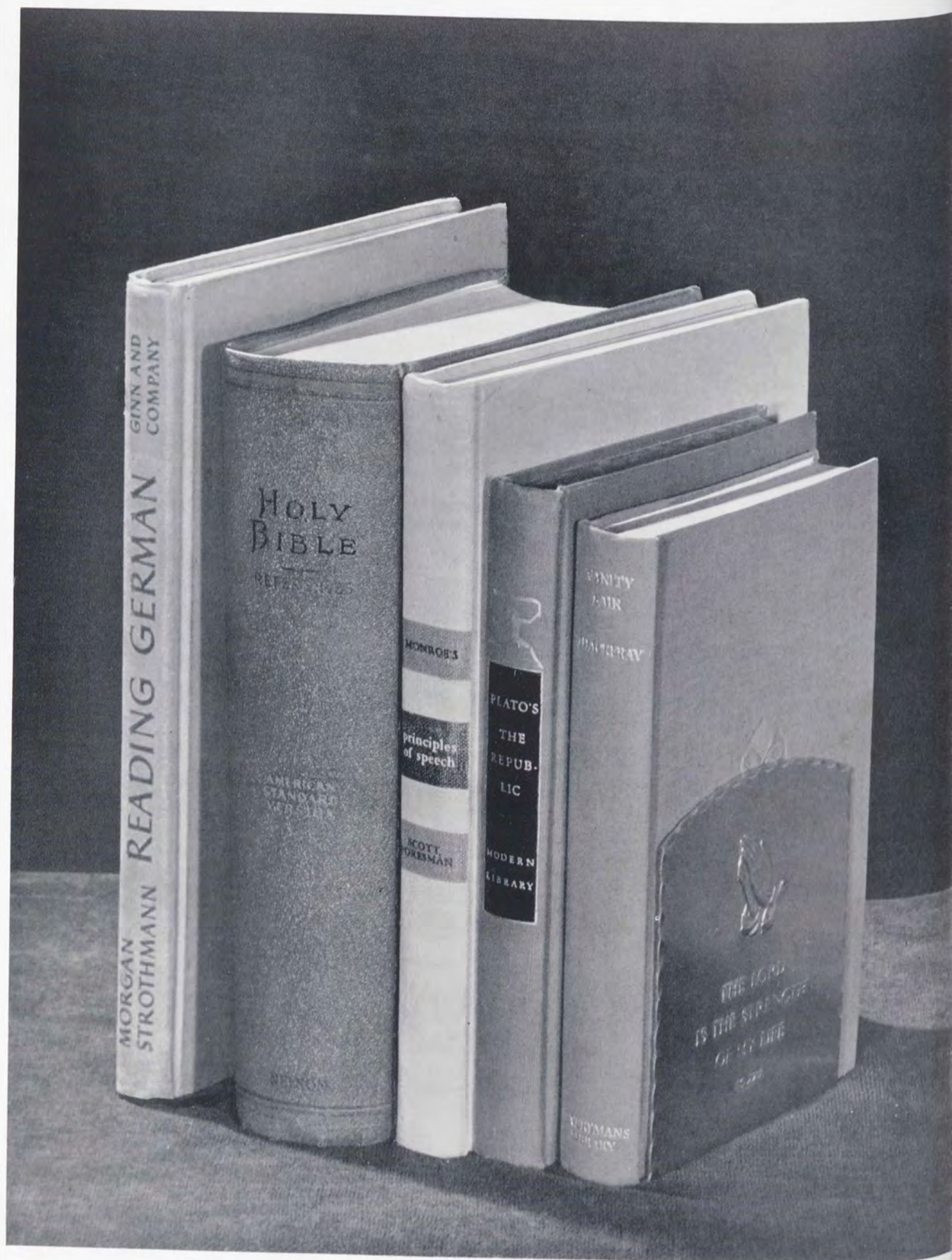

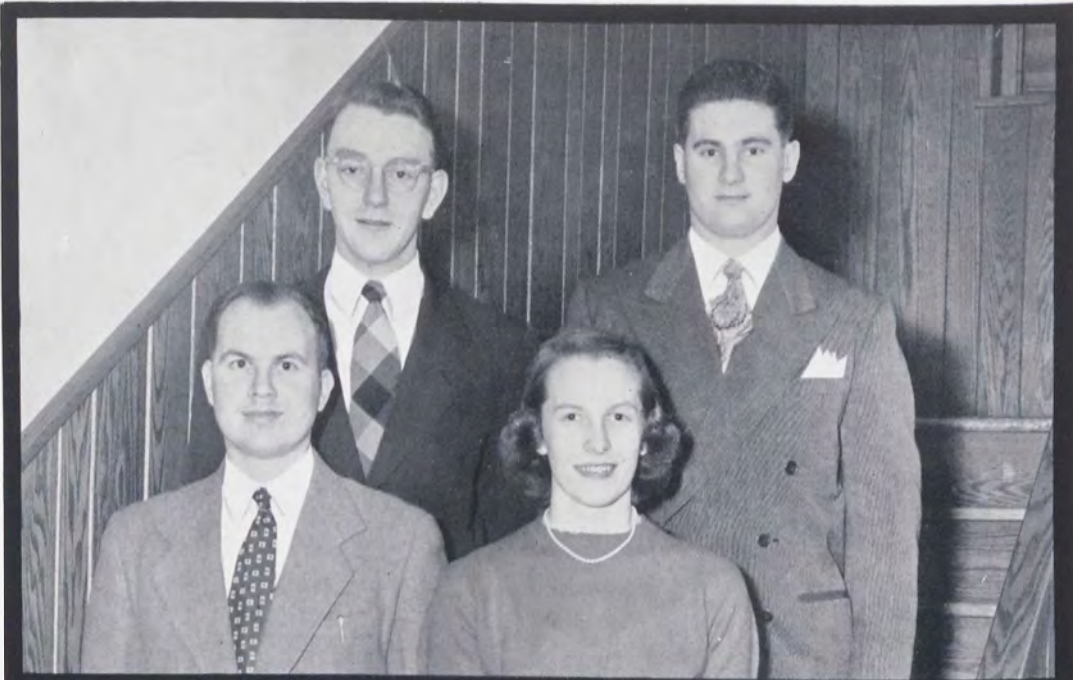

drama took their toll, while the dazed music majors went around in perpetual circles.

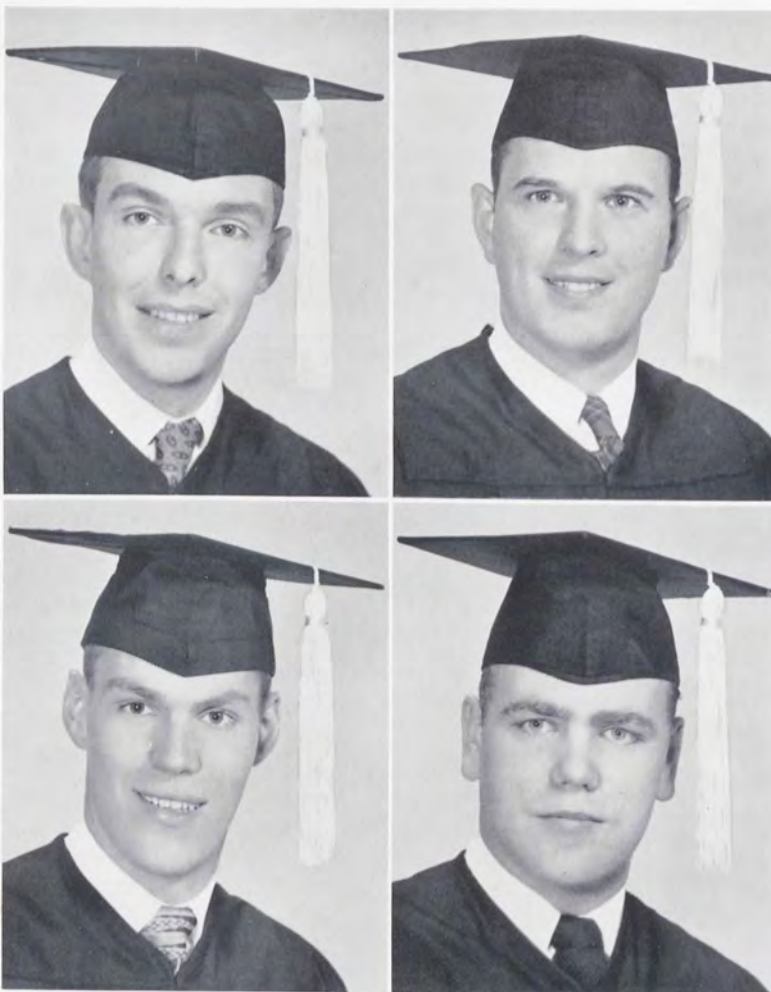

the guidance of our faculty advisors, Dr. Luckey and Miss Kinlaw, we began to take our part in class activities.

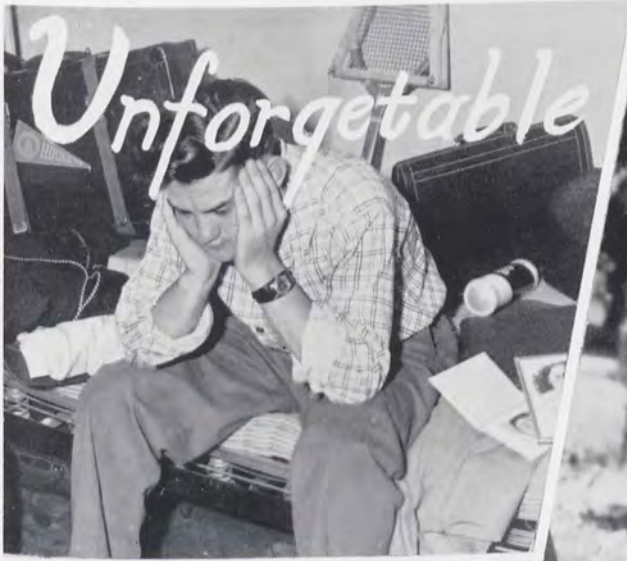

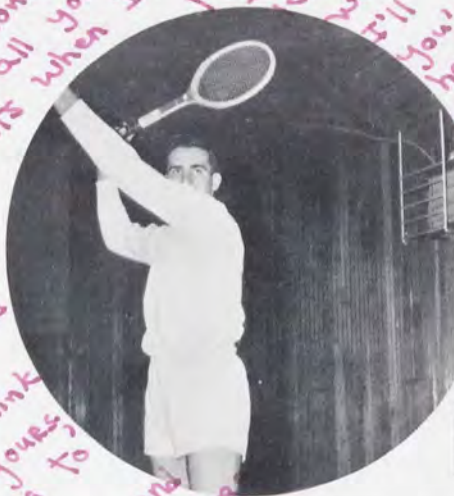
JUNIOR MEN'S BASKETBALL
