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Friday's Forum Fray

In a special SGAsponsored forum held last Friday during the chapel hour, Dr. Tony Campolo, sociology professor at Eastern College, spoke about homosexuality and Christian responses to those struggling with sexual orientation issues. A self-proclaimed "conservative," Campolo believes

that homosexuality is unbiblical, based on the Church's traditional interpretation of Romans 1. In his presentation, Campolo addressed the issue of homosexuality from several aspects, including social science, scripture, Evangelicalism, and political policy. But his underlying theme was a call for Christians to love unconditionally by bearing one another's burdens, regardless of the nature of the burden. His mission, he explained, was to be a voice for members of his Houghton audience silently struggling with homosexuality.

According to Campolo, the causes of homosexuality are unknown. In his own research, he has interviewed over 300 homosexual men, none of whom remember "choosing" to be gay. Though many studies point to genetics or social conditioning as the cause of/



reason for same-sex attraction, Campolo maintains that "there is no statistical evidence to support any given theory." More conclusive, however, is evidence pointing to suicide over gender-identification as the second-leading cause of death among teens, which has prompted Campolo to spread the message that "you don't have to legitimize a lifestyle to love someone."

"I'm tired of church-legitimized gaybashing," Campolo declared, citing Christian videos depicting a fierce "Gay Agenda" as an example. Generalizing the obscene behavior of a small group of zealous homosexuals is slanderous to the rest of the homosexual population. He also condemned the falsified Paul Cameron studies for nurturing gay bashing.

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Forum Response: An Interview with Dr. Terry Paige

Throughout his speech, Campolo repeatedly stated that Jesus never condemned homosexuals. He asked why Christians, then, do not attack the remarried divorcees who Jesus overtly condemned, but aggressively attack homosexuals, who Jesus never condemned.

Responding to Campolo's "misleading argument," Dr. Terry Paige pointed out that Jesus does speak against-homosexuality when He cites the order of creation as instructive of God's will in marriage (see Matthew 19). "We may take Jesus' example here-and the teaching in Genesis-to refer to the issue of 'homosexual marriage' also. It is just as much against God's will as divorce...it violates the order or creation." Jesus held a much more conservative position on sexual morality than the rabbis of his day, who had made divorce "easy as pie," says Paige. Jewish culture, because it already condemned homosexuality, did not lend itself to exhortations by Jesus about the immorality of homosexuality.

Also troublesome to Paige was Campolo's assertion that scholars do not know the exact definition of arsenokoitai, the Greek word translated "homosexual" in I Cor. 6:9 (cf.

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Ensemble Acts Up

A.C.T Out Group Tackles Diversity Issues

On Thursday, Feb. 17, the A.C.T. Out Ensemble performed "Diversity and Tolerance: Beyond Black and White." Nancy Murphy of the Counseling Center brought the social action group here in order to debunk myths and stereotypes surrounding diversity issues.

The touring ensemble consists of five actors and a facilitator. After the skits, the actors stayed in character and interacted with the audience. Barriers surrounding the difficult topics began to break down. The Founder/Director/Facilitator, Jessica Weiner stated, "The level of discussion and opportunity that people take to go deeper is our goal. We did that here tonight."

Houghton College received a great compliment as Weiner stated that the Houghton audience was among the most humane audiences that she ever worked with, as each member of the audience was respectful and considerate to each other. Weiner was also amazed at the importance the audience placed on forgiveness. After the performance, one of the actors explained that audience members often stand up and have shouting matches at each other and many unpleasant words are exchanged.

This compliment could have long range effects on the Ensemble, which does not have an evangelical background. Preceding their visit, members of the Ensemble expressed to Murphy their nervousness about performing in Houghton's culture. They adapted some of the language in their skits and learned about the Christian environment and lingo but were still unsure about how to receive us.

That uncertainty changed after their visit. Murphy stated, "I think that we may have inadvertently broken down some misconceptions they may have earlier had about students

"Vegetarians...do you know what lifestyle you ruin?"

I'm writing this letter in response to the February 9th article written by Jea Adams about eating as a vegetarian. I am not going to judge people who are vegetarians, but I want them to know what lifestyle they are ruining by eating vegetarian diets.

I grew up on a diary farm.

But when I was 16, my dad had to sell our cows, because we could not afford to keep farming. What caused this? It was caused by the low prices farmers get for their products.

Right now, when a farmer takes a cow to be butchered, he is only getting on average 75 cents/ lb. So, if a cow weighed 1500 pounds, he would get approximately \$1075. Out of this the farmer needs to pay feed bills, insurance, the National Beef Council, and the auctioneer, or seller. Also, unless the farmer has his bypactical processing a percentage. All taken into account, the farmer may end up with only \$300 or so.

What is the cause of the low price for beef? Supply and demand. Since more and more people are becoming vegetarians, and people are afraid of the steroid and hormone use in cows which has been proven harmless, beef farmers are left with the excess number of cows they were

unable to send for butchering. This, in turn, lowers the price given for the cows that are butchered.

As for dairy products, last month, New York farmers made an average of \$13.50 for every one hundred pounds of milk produced. This may seem fair, since a gallon of milk weighs approximately 8.4 lbs. But again, there are expenses taken out of that check. Farmers must pay the milk hauler, plus feed bills, electric and other utilities, the milk companies such as Upstate Farms and Dairylea, and federal taxes.

Farmers end up with only about one half of the original paid amount. Other expenses include mortgages, equipment maintenance, building maintenance, and new equipment. In addition, the price of farm equipment has gone up more than 375% since the late 1950s, but the price of milk and beef leveled off in 1975 and has since remained unchanged.

Farming is the industry that this country was formed on. I am sometimes ashamed to call myself an American, when the American government doesn't even watch out for those who are feeding us, and feeding people all over the world. Remember, without a farmer, you would not have any of the food you eat. Here's a little food for thought, think about the lifestyle that is being lost when you do not eat meat.

In order to put the system on sound financial footing, he hopes to put the trust fund in a 'lock box' so that the revenues in the fund will only be used for paying retirement benefits. Politicians on the hill have had the

habit using revenues in the fund to pay for pork barrel spending and new government programs. He also hopes to reserve 62% of the budget surplus for Social Security and also

allow workers to privately invest a portion of their dollars they would otherwise pay to the government in payroll taxes.

ON EDUCATION: John McCain believes that the nation's education system is failing our children and stresses that education reform is not an option but a must if the country is to remain strong and our children be prepared for a future worthy of their potential. He looks forward to a nationwide test of school vouchers to make school choice a reality. Rewarding good schools and forcing under performing schools to improve will yield tangible benefits for the children of America. John McCain also proposes voluntary teacher testing by state and local education authorities for if we expect our kids to be excellent we must their teachers to be excellent as well. The Senator also believes that an enhanced Education Savings Accounts be provided in order to empower families as a way of helping families finance the educational needs of their chil-

More Than A Mascot:

How'd We Become Highlanders?

In 1967, Houghton moved to intercollegiate athletics and adopted the colors of purple and gold. But we fielded our teams without a name. So, a survey was mailed, in which students could choose from several titles including Braves, Warriors, and Chargers. But the two-to-one favorite was *Highlanders*, originating from the German and Anglo-Saxon words for "city on a hill."

At the Homecoming banquet Ruth Luckey helped promote the name by reading "Highlander Legend." The poem was her Hiawatha-style retelling of Houghton's settlement by a highlander named Angus. When he stumbled across Houghton's wild country of jagged rocks and trees, it reminded him of home. "So he built a sturdy cabin / In the hills of Allegheny / High above the rambling river" (21-23).

The first Highlander mascot, John Thompson, appeared on game sidelines in 1970, carrying an old set of Scottish bagpipes. He wore the purple-and-gold, Old MacMillen tartan, and quickly won his way into the hearts of loyal Houghton fans. He wasn't popular with the Roberts Wesleyan crowd, though. On the eve of Homecoming Day, Thompson was kidnapped by several of his Roberts friends, then chained to a bed on the Roberts campus. During the night, in a Herculean feat of strength, Thompson broke free and called Houghton Security for a ride back to town. Thompson says he rode back with



"half a set of handcuffs on [his] wrist." After the game the next morning, John Thompson was triumphantly carried across the soccer field. When he pointed out the guilty party, they were promply thrown in the pond by a large Houghton mob (100 strong). The kidnappers knew it was all in good fun, and so smilingly endured their dip, as well as their wet bus ride back to Roberts.

Even today, the Highlander spirit lives on. It lives on in a group like the HC Highland Pipe Corps, who struggles to promote school spirit, despite their insufficient school funding. Highlander spirit also thrives in the hearts of all Houghton athletes, and in all devoted fans. In 1745, Scotland groaned under the oppressive rule of rich English lords. The lords banned kilts, weaponry, and tartans because they were symbols of defiance, allegiance, strength, and unity. Scottish men were made to wear pants and abandon their family colors.

Even now, jealous lowlanders occasionally mock the fierce pride of highlanders. But it's as they say, one must not forget the number of people "kilt" for calling it a skirt.

Library Construction Update

Months of construction have passed and the walls to the new wing of the library are finally complete; however, students will not be able to utilize the new section until next semester. It is currently lacking windows and carpet that will be put in place during Mayterm. Not only will the new wing get fresh windows, but the entire building will soon gleam with fresh glass.

The wing on the third floor of the library will house additional books and will be wired for laptop use. In order to prepare it for use, however, walls on the third floor will be removed and all of the current shelves will be realigned. The archives, which are currently located on the third floor, will be moved to the new wing of the basement which is wired with tempera-

ture and humidity control donated by an alumnus, thus preserving the archives in a more efficient manner. Their move is due largely to the fact that the restrooms on the third floor must be enlarged to make them handicap compatible cutting into the space where the archives are currently located. The new wing will also allow for three group study rooms.

During February break, the preliminary work for a concrete pour in front of the library will begin, which will put the entrance on the same level as the road, eliminating the stairs. This entrance, one of the more aesthetically pleasing changes for the front, will be composed of glass instead of the current stone.

The library renovations are to be completed during the summer so that students may better employ its sources.

Since childhood Schulz wanted to be a cartoonist, and though his only training had been an art school correspondence course, his cartoon strip "Li'l Folks" was purchased in 1950 by the United Features Syndicate, which distributed it under the now-familiar title PEANUTS. 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bands, exciting coffeehouses, a variety of activities, such as laser tag and other fun activities.


I would like to get suggestions from the student body as well, in order to make CAB the students CAB. If elected I would love to see CAB take off and soar the heights of great entertaining success.



Early, Extended Break Approaches Rival Roberts Edges Houghton

Friday marks the beginning of this year's February break, which runs until March 6th. In the past, February break has traditionally been the shorter break, essentially a long weekend, while Easter break usually lasts a week later in the semester, March or April.

The reversal of the breaks this year has caused students some puzzlement and frustration. "None of my friends at other colleges have a break at the same time, so it's disappointing that I won't be able to see them," said junior Jea Adams. "But I'm definitely feeling a whole week off after this stressful first half semester."

Tim Mayhle expressed great disappointment about the timing of the break. He thinks it is way too early because, "I haven't been lifting weights long enough to look good on the beach." Other students, however, like the change. "The timing of this break is perfect," said senior Kit Andersons

"The height of the ski season is in full swing and thus I am happier now than I have been in four

The reason for the longer February break and shorter Easter break this year, according to Ketha Boesflug in the Student Life Office is simply that students and faculty on the calendar committee felt that the week-long break should not be so near to the close of the

The calendar committee, comprised of students and faculty representatives, prefer the longer break in the middle of the semester. The decision over which break should be longer is dependent upon when Easter falls each year. The calendar committee meets to decide on exact dates of the breaks and then sends its recommendation to the Curriculum Review Committee who usually ends up sending it back requesting some changes. The process on the average takes about four months follows specific state regulations.

In describing his vision of Christians bearing each other's burdens, Campolo likened the struggling homosexual to the struggling alcoholic. He emphasized the need for honesty among believers struggling with sin and raised this question: how can you let others help you carry your burden if you can't tell people who you are? If you want support, he says, "You gotta come out."

Campolo is also a visionary in regard to social policy concerning homosexuals. While the law, he explained, exists to keep individuals from threatening the well being of others, it should not have the power to deny homosexuals their basic human rights. According to Campolo, these basic rights include the freedom to teach in public schools and serve in the military. He cited "no taxation without representation" as one way of viewing at this issue: If homosexuals cannot be represented in the military, they should not be taxed. He stated "Love requires Justice" and described a democracy as a place where it is safe to be the minority.

Campolo criticized Christian preaching and attitudes that leave unhealed homosexuals feeling rejected by God and despised by Christians. In his own studies, Campolo has encountered very few homosexuals who have become free of homosexuality. An overwhelming number of gays, Campolo maintained, will pray and

earnestly seek change, but afterwards will continue to experience homosexual feelings. "I believe in a God who can do anything," he proclaimed, but quickly added that he has not seen "a lot of deliverance" among Christians struggling to overcome homosexuality. Communicating to these people that their failure to change is due to insufficient faith in Christ is "a terrible thing to do." In contrast, Campolo pointed to Paul's encouraging words in Romans 8, ("nothing can separate us from the love of God") as the "core of Scripture" that should inform our reactions to struggling brothers and sisters.

Campolo concluded his message by leaving the audience with three questions to discuss: 1. Jesus condemned divorce and remarriage as an adulterous sexual relationship, yet our churches are full of remarried divorcees. Why do we so aggressively attack homosexuals, whom Jesus never actually condemned? Where is the biblical consistency? 2: If he is right that gays do not change, what should our response be as the Church? As a society? 3. How should we respond to rising referendums that will limit our rights? Specifically, he suggested that we should remove sex education from public schools and address it in the "context of spiritual values."

Campolo conceded, "I never talk about this without losing some friends, but I'd rather lose some friends than allow people who suffer to have no voice," earning him a standing ovation.

Seniors Represent in Final Home Game

On senior night, the Highlanders arguably played their best game of the season, giving archrival Roberts Wesleyan College a run, before succumbing 74-62.

Houghton opened with a 12-4 run, capped by a Kurt Sauder three pointer five minutes into the game. Though the Raiders responded to take a 26-18 lead, the Highlanders would not turn down the pressure. They answered with a 12-5 run to trail by just one (31-30) at the half.

Eli Knapp was the spark for Houghton in the first half. The senior connected for two three pointers and a team-high eight first-half points.

Houghton struggled to maintain the momentum as the second half began. Roberts scored

seven-straight points to pull ahead 38-30, but three pointers by Sauder and Knapp trimmed the deficit to two, and an 8-4 run, capped by another bucket by Knapp, gave Houghton a 44-42 lead with 14 minutes remaining.

Roberts used a 13-2 run over the next four minutes to take a commanding 55-46 lead. The Highlanders were able to pull within five (62-57), but wouldn't get any closer as Roberts hit six free throws in the final 1:20 to seal

Knapp had a career-night in his final home contest, leading Houghton with 15 points and pulling down three rebounds. He also connected on 3-of-5 three pointers. Senior Kurt Sauder also turned in a solid performance with 12 points, three rebounds, and three

Parmar Selected in A-League Draft

Sanjeev Parmar, a threetime NAIA All-America selection in men's soccer at Houghton College, has been drafted by the Toronto Lynx with the 49th pick in the 2000 A-League Draft.

Parmar, who hails from Campbell River, British Columbia, Canada, was one of 77 players drafted and one of just eight NAIA players taken in the draft held on Sunday in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

Parmar, a four-year starter at midfield for the Highlanders, tallied 21 goals and 30 assists during his career. He is a two-time Canadian U-17 National Champion as a member of the British Columbia provincial team, and in the summer of 1998 he played for the Jackson Chargers, runners-up in the Premier Developmental Soccer

"Sanjeev is one of the most committed players I've ever coached on the amateur level," said Houghton coach Dwight Hornibrook. "I think he is definitely good enough to play in the A-League. It's a great day for Sanjeev Parmar. It's an exciting thing for him to be rewarded for his efforts, and it's also an excit-



ing time for Houghton College and for our program. It proves that players can come here and be recognized and benefit from the Houghton experience."

Parmar will participate in the Lynx's training camp in Toronto, March 6-8.

The A-League, a Division II league with 26 teams from coastto-coast in the U.S. and Canada. is the highest level in the United Soccer Leagues (USL) system. The USL is the official developmental system of Major Leag Soccer (MLS).

Houghton's all-time leading goal scorer, Jamie Wellington, played in the A-League with the Carolina Dynamo and is now a member of the Charlotte Eagles in the D-III Pro League.
