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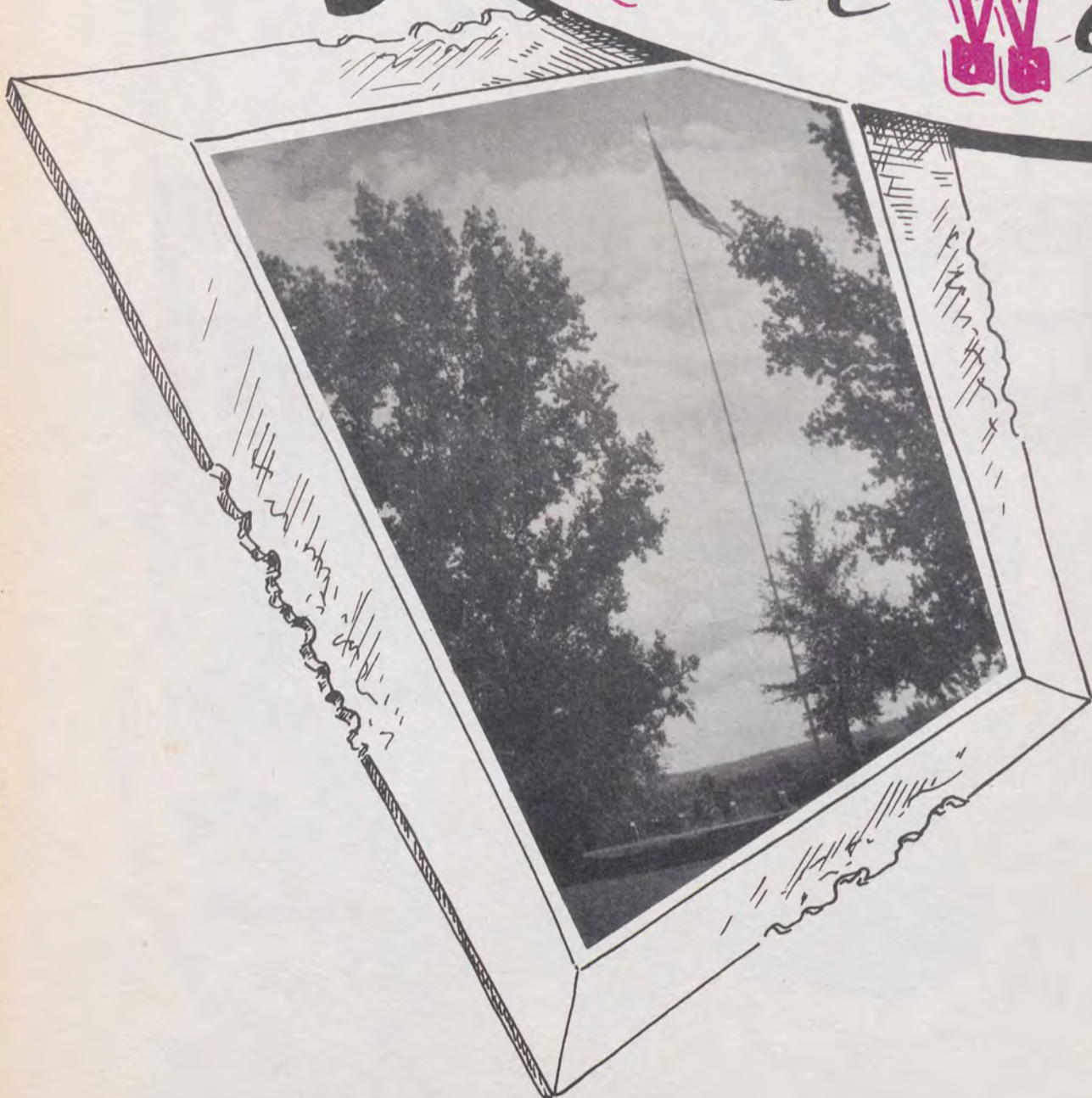

—Professor Frank Wright has been a vital part of Houghton College. For a quarter of a century he has given encouragement and inspiration to Christian students.

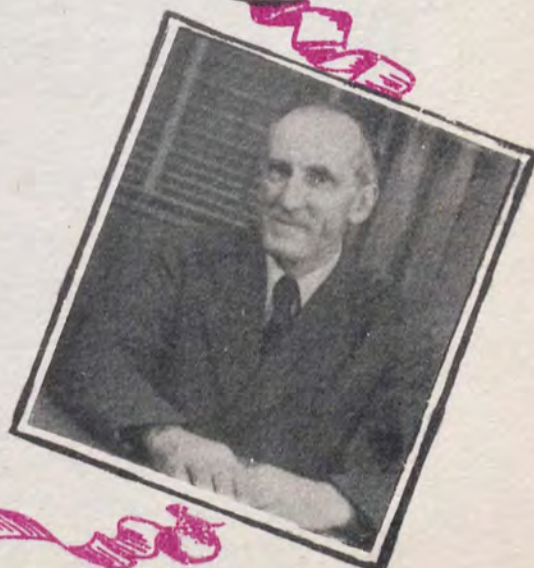

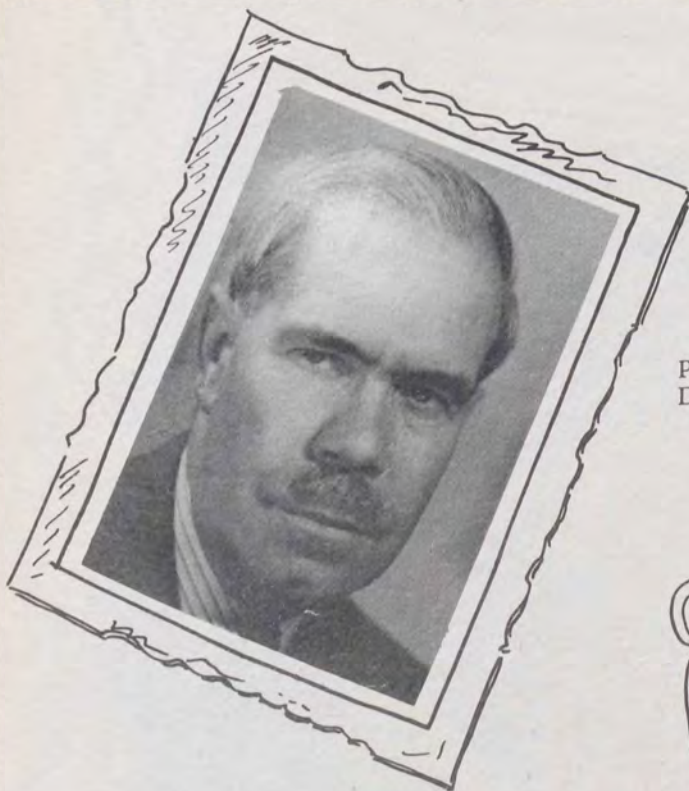

The school year of 1944-'45 went by like lightning. As juniors we took the new frosh class under our wing, helped them organize, and gave them a grand party at Letchworth. I had three "little sisters" to introduce to college life. Then, there was *Boulder* and more *Boulder*. We gave the seniors a banquet in the spring and spent hours making a plain hall into an Elizabethan coffee house.

And this, my last year in Houghton, has been full of wonderful memories. Fellows we hadn't seen for years came back to school. It seemed good to be released from the tension of war. Our class had frequent parties, for we realized our days together would soon be over. Then there were senior portraits, measurements for caps and gowns, the honors banquet, the junior-senior banquet, skip day, and before we knew it, commencement! It was all over in a flash.

So that's the end of college . . . but there's more behind this A. B. degree — things I never could put into words. You can count on it that I'll be a loyal Houghtonian all the days of my life.

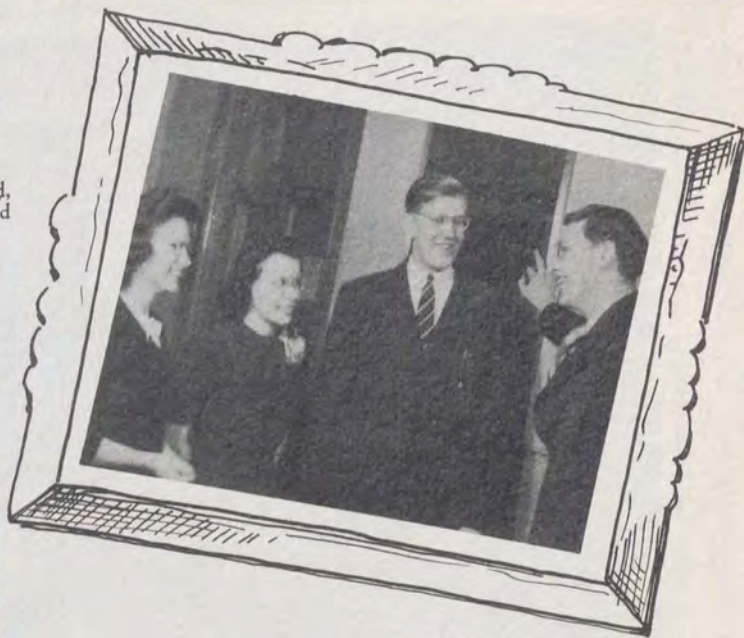

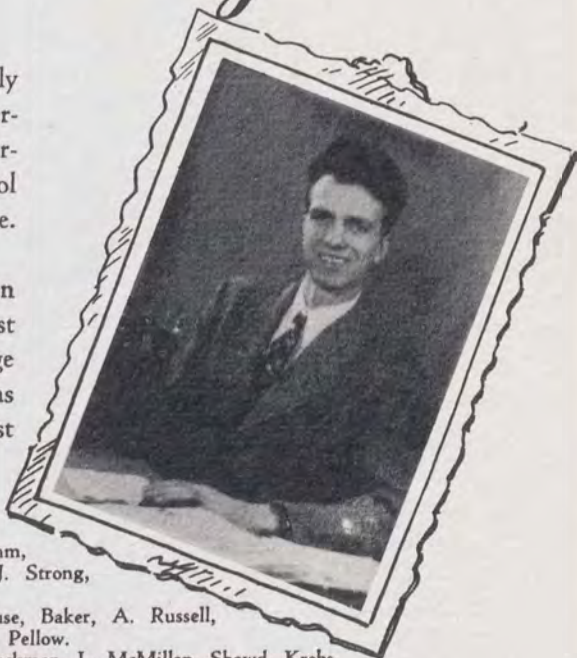

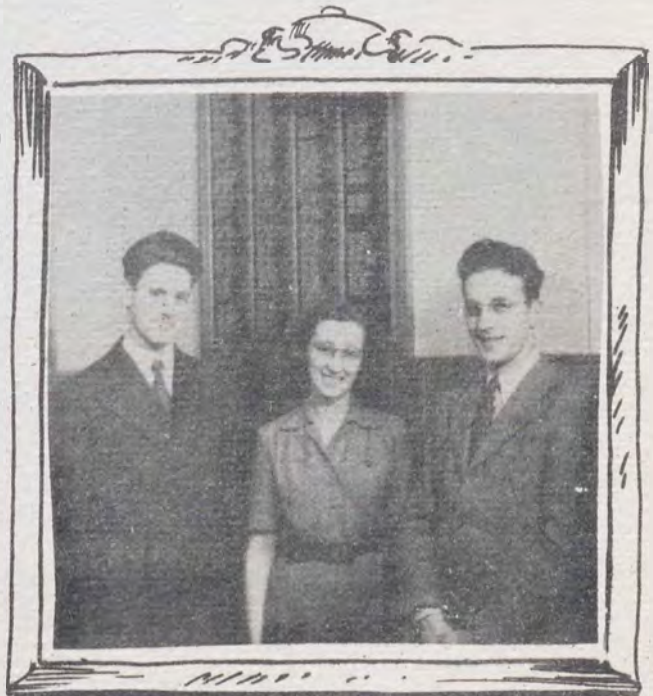

~ PURPLE ~

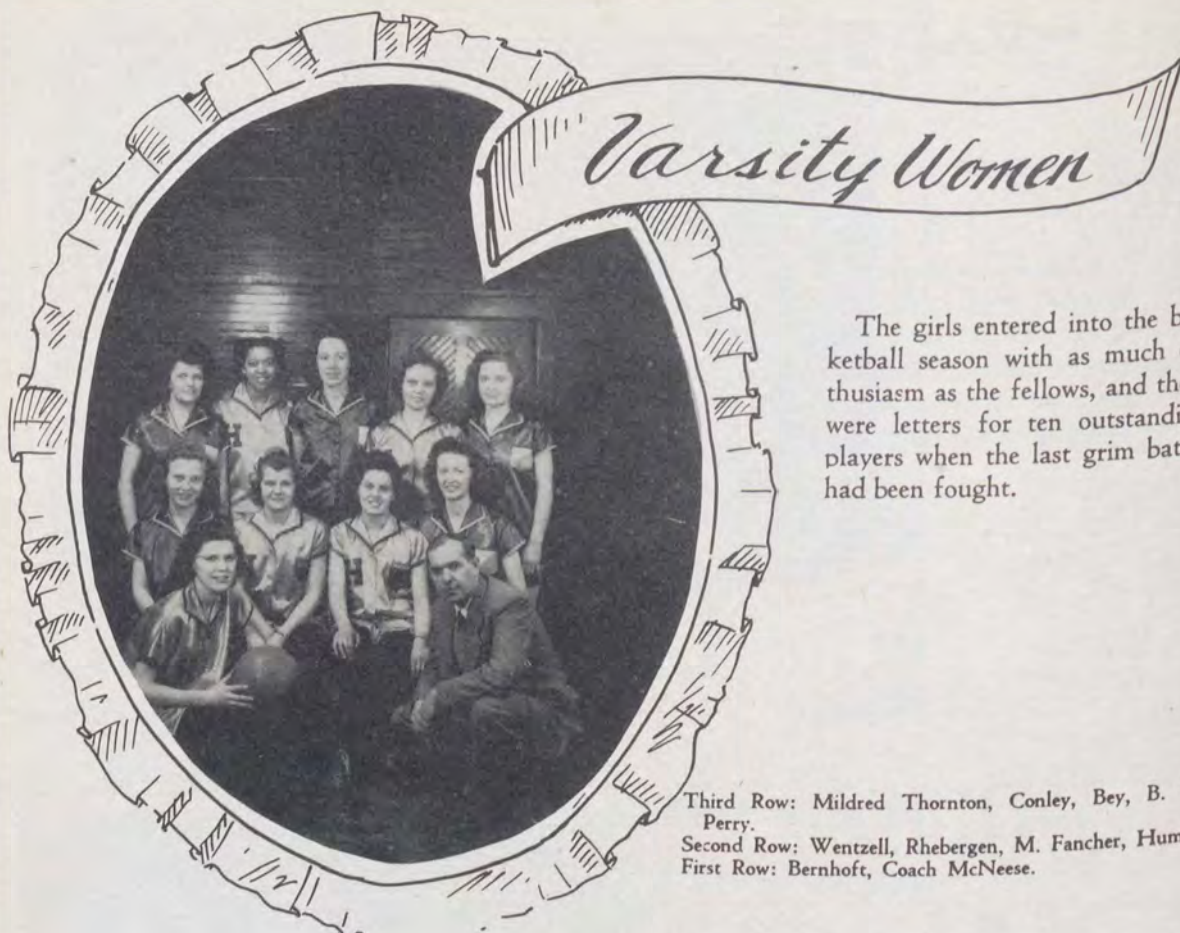

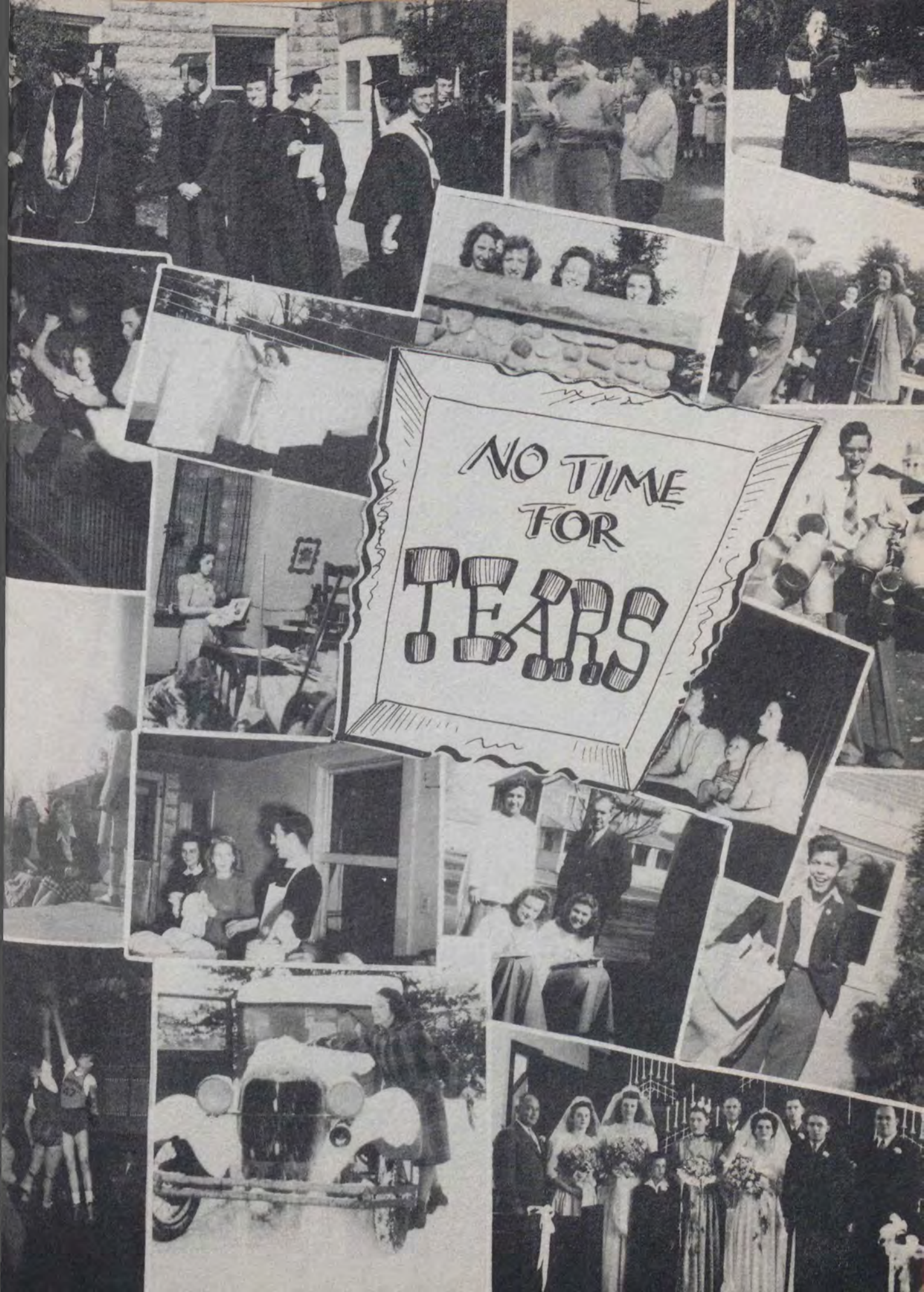

We had our meetings on Sunday evenings in the church with a student speaker, some good special music, and sometimes an opportunity for personal testimonies. Each class had charge of one service during the year. I especially remember a beautiful candle light program the juniors presented at Christmas time.

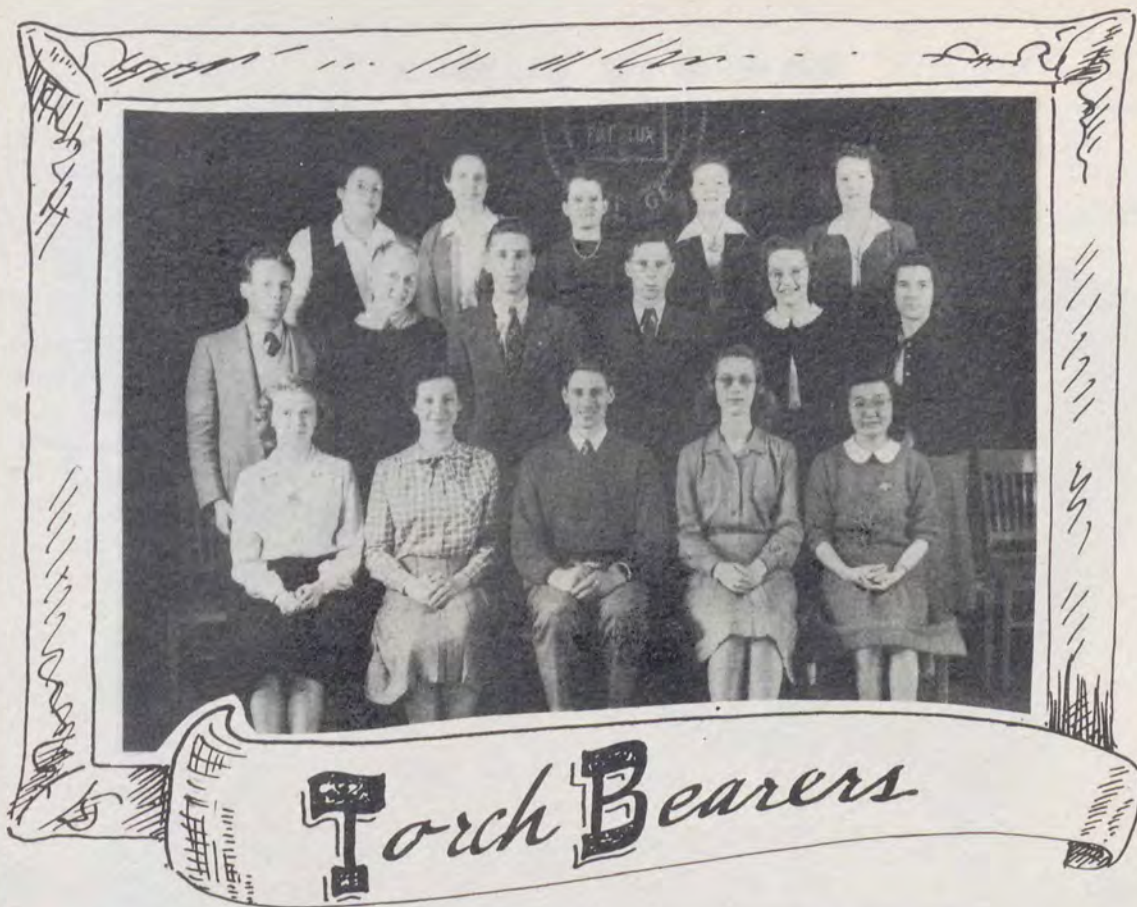
Student Prayer Meeting
