The wholeness of our being

I requests. Each time they mention a physical need, I gain a fresh understanding of what a privilege it is for me as a physician to be a part of Christ's healing ministry. While I believe that "health," in its most complete sense, encompasses more than just our physical wellness, I am impressed by the fact that God cares about our bodies. He understands the wholeness of our being, and in His word He recognizes the connection between our physical bodies and our spiritual relationship with Him.

As in all parts of our lives, our outlook as Christians toward our physical bodies is to be radically different from that of the world. Scripture calls our bodies "temples" of the Holy Spirit. This image is usually invoked in discussions about how one cares for the body given that it is a dwelling place for the Spirit. However, I think it is equally important to consider the "temple" in the sense of "a place of worship." While it may sound obvious, what we do to and with our physical bodies matters deeply to God. To that end, I believe, He calls us both to stewardship and to sacrifice.

Called to Stewardship: "Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ Himself... You are not your own, you were bought at a price; therefore honor God with your body."—I Corinthians 6:15, 20

It matters very much, in practical ways, whether we consider something to be our own, or to be simply given to us in trust. We frequently hear of stewardship in the context of financial resources. We do not traditionally think in these terms when it comes to our bodies. We are inclined to say, "It's my body, I can do to it as I please." This way of thinking, however, is contrary to the idea of stewardship. We belong to Christ and are members of his Body. This truth ought to make a significant impact on our lifestyle choices, from our attitudes toward diet and exercise to our decisions regarding the use of certain substances and sexual behavior. We are not free to treat our bodies in any way we please, but only in accordance with the purposes of our true owner—Christ himself.

While the world prizes ownership, Christ seeks stewardship.

Called to Sacrifice: "I urge you, therefore, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God, which is your spiritual act of worship."—Romans 12:1

Not many of us will be called to sacrifice our bodies to the point of physical death, as Christ was. We as Christians, however, are charged to die to ourselves and choose daily to use our bodies in ways that would bring honor to God. This requires moment by moment decisions, out of obedience to Christ, to give up the urge to satisfy our selfish desires and ambitions. These choices have spiritual implications; everything done in the body can be an act of worship as we perform deeds of service and love. Ironically, we do not need "perfect health" to make a pleasing sacrifice. The frailty of our flesh allows the power of God to be manifest through us as we submit ourselves to him as instruments of righteousness. I have been blessed on numerous occasions by patients who have, in the midst of deep physical crises, yielded themselves by God's grace to be used by Him in their weakness to minister to me and others and to testify to God's faithfulness. While the world promotes self-gratification, Christ desires self-sacrifice.

This issue of *Milieu* considers various aspects on the theme of "health." In it you will find stories of stewardship and sacrifice. May the Lord challenge us to consider the wondrous gift he has given us in our bodies and may we endeavor to use them as instruments of worship.

It's not easy being Green...



Rod McCallum credited his choice of the Green Party as his political party to his finally having learned to "read" the Bible (which I wholeheartedly applaud), then trying to find a political party that would reconcile scriptural principles with his political views.

I have to question whether Mr. McCallum has taken as much time to investigate the philosophies behind the ten key values the party presents for public consumption as he has reading his Bible.

Starting with their ecological stand, the Green Party takes a New Age approach to nature. To quote them, we are "part of nature, not separate from nature" and need to "acknowledge and encourage respect for other life forms than our own." If one looks into the root of this "value," one finds that it is based upon the New Age tenet that all things are part of the "oneness" of the universe and are equal in value. Unlike the Bible, which teaches that we are a separate and unique creation in the image of God and have been given stewardship over the earth, they deny this truth in favor of worshiping the creature rather than the Creator. This philosophy leads to other "values," such as unrestricted abortion and homosexual marriages. You will not see these two ideologies listed in their ten values list, but deeper research shows that they are encompassed in their feminist and sexual diversity agendas.

Next is the rule of respecting and valuing others' religious and spiritual diversity. While we should show respect to others, the type of "respect and value" meant here is that we are not to witness to others about salvation, which is not only a biblical principle, but a mandate.

The Green Party desires a "sustainable society." Anyone who follows the rhetoric of politics realizes this phrase means limiting the size of society, which is accomplished through abortion, birthcontrol, euthanasia, and ultimately the removal of the "undesirable elements" of society (Christians).

They would have an economic system which will "offer meaningful

work with dignity, while paying a 'living wage' that reflects the real value of a person's work" and would only have independently owned companies that are "socially responsible." This sounds altruistic, but the actual practice is better known as Socialism/Communism. While we are told in Scripture to share our worldly possessions, we are supposed to do so from our heart because of our relationship to God, not because the government mandates it. There is no spiritual value in this type of forced equality, and I do not believe it is what Christ had in mind when he told us to give to others.

While I am all for peace and would have countries desire to maintain it as much as possible, every Christian should know that there will be no global peace until our Lord returns. I appreciated Rod McCallum's article. It is well written. I congratulate him. On the substance of his article, I offer a few points:

Mr. McCallum's attempt to equate the Green Party platform to the teachings of Jesus is seriously flawed. No political party mirrors the teachings of Jesus, although many have claimed to. Jesus' message was radical, but not political. "My kingdom is not of this world," he said. "Give Caesar what is his, and God what is His." All of Jesus Christ's teachings of radical selflessness are directed to the individual.

The Green platform is political, not personal. In fact, it is simply Marxism/socialism, with a dash of utopianism, dressed up in 21⁵¹-century clothing. It advocates using political power to compel actions the Greens think are "right" and "good"—actions that most citizens would not freely choose, but must be coerced into taking. At the end of the day, socialism always comes down to "redistributing wealth." It is all about the money—who has it, and who ought to have it. Always, those who have earned wealth are thought not to be the ones who should have it.

What of Biblical stewardship? In the parable of the talents, why did Christ not teach that the correct—the "selfless"—response is for each servant to donate all his talents to feed the poor? Could it be that Jesus did not expect every person to give away everything? Perhaps his command to the Rich Young Ruler was not general. Even Jesus did not always give all he had to the poor. It is dangerous to take a single passage of Scripture out of context and extrapolate it.

Mr. McCallum's education has broadened his thinking. Excellent. Narrow thinking is never good. Now, his next step must be to become discerning and ruthlessly analytical, the way a Christian scholar and activist must be.

The Greens do not have the answer. No human politics is the answer to mankind's problems. Only Christ is The Answer. He wants to change the hearts of men from the inside out. When we let Him do this, there is no limit to what can be accomplished.

HOUGHTON COLLEGE President Daniel Chamberlain received the inaugural Outstanding Educator Award from The Wesleyan Church at its General Conference in Grand Rapids, Mich. this summer. The newly created award went to Chamberlain because of his "exceptional and devoted service to the work of Christ and His church," said Dr. David Holdren, general superintendent of The Wesleyan Church.

Holdren also cited Chamberlain's years of dedicated service to education, his loyal churchmanship, and his leadership and membership on the General Board of the Wesleyan denomination. Chamberlain is beginning his 29th year as president of Houghton College, a remarkable distinction considering the average tenure of college presidents is seven years.

Two Houghton women honored by state

Shea, Seymour called "Women of Distinction"

A ILEEN ORTLIP SHEA, former art professor at Houghton College, and Carolyn Gifford Seymour '61, were honored as "Women of Distinction" by the state of New York this summer. The Woman of Distinction program was created in 1998 to honor exemplary women from across New York whose singular professional or personal achievements, commitment to excellence and accomplishments merit special recognition.

Honored at a special ceremony in Albany, the women, who were nominated by State Senator Patricia McGee (57th District),

received memorial plaques, Senate Proclamations and lapel pins. "It's great to see all of the wonderful things that women are doing across the state. Our honorees are outstanding examples of what all of us can accomplish if we work hard and aim high," said Senator McGee.

Shea, a longtime resident of Houghton, is a gifted portrait painter. In 1935 she won a Pulitzer Foundation scholarship which allowed her to study and paint in Europe. Upon her return she was instrumental in beginning the art

THE HOLTKAMP ORGAN installed in Wesley Chapel 42 years ago represented state-of-the-art American organ building at the time, and, abetted by technical updates, it continues to fulfill its role. However, research into some 600 years of organ building has brought into focus the artistic significance of the mechanical action (or "tracker") organ—the only type available until about 100 years ago. Most standard organ literature was created for such instruments.

Today, most colleges and universities which offer organ study have a modern tracker organ for undergraduate and graduate instruction and recitals. Houghton has two smaller, practice tracker instruments, but the addition of the graduate program has underscored the need for a larger, recital-grade tracker organ.

The organ at Houghton Wesleyan Church—installed in the 1930s—has grown increasingly idiosyncratic in operation, and the church has been considering a new one, despite daunting cost projections. So, with their mutual

need and collaborative advantage, the college and church are working together to replace the church organ with a tracker instrument. A committee of church and college representatives has selected an organ builder (James Louder Inc. of Montreal) and acquired cost estimates (\$425,000, including structural modification to the church).

If joint fund-raising efforts succeed in securing pledges for three-quarters of the total project cost by January 31, 2005, a contract will be executed with the Louder firm early next year, with the organ expected to be delivered by summer of 2007. The college has agreed to commit a total of \$100,000 to the project over four years. The church already has \$70,000.

New book by Wing tells story of Houghton up to 1972

Paint me as I am, warts and all," Oliver Cromwell allegedly instructed the artist who painted his official portrait. In American culture it has seldom been more acceptable or easier to gloss over defects and faults in portraying people, events and institutions. Following a decade's research and writing, Wing's analytical history of Houghton College includes sufficient warts to afford readers insights, illumination and understanding without sacrificing respect or affection for his subject.

Neither exposé nor whitewash, A Vine of God's Own Planting considers and correlates the social, religious, political and individual factors which gave rise to and determined the character of

the small, parochial seminary which became Houghton College. The title is attributed to Willard Houghton in characterizing Houghton Seminary. The book essentially concludes in 1972 with the retirement of President Stephen W. Paine. Clearly revealed as central to the consistency and continuity of Houghton's progress are tenacious, godly

men and women who through adversity, advancement and alternative visions remain faithful to Willard J. Houghton's founding principles while reinterpreting them for a changing world.

Wing's treatment is narrative, biographical and topical. This creates a modicum of repetition, but is a likely plus for

casual readers; a reinforcement of salient issues and points for others. In accounting for Houghton's origins and evolution from regional secondary school to liberal arts college of national repute, he reaches back to John Wesley, traces the transition of Methodism to America, and the evolution of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection and its successors, including their earlier educational efforts. He also touches on the impact of alumni and the institution over time. Wing employs historical records, 27 tables, and extensive quotes from individuals (he conducted some 120 interviews for this work). Following the main text are nearly 200 pages containing 14 appendices and eight pertinent documents.

Although their utility will be delayed,

unused portions of Wing's interviews for this project, now preserved on audio tape and by transcription in the college archives, will prove an invaluable resource for a future author charged with documenting, evaluating and interpreting institutional character, actions, personalities and events of the succeeding period, after its actors have vacated the stage.


Alumni get a taste of capital projects

New major will prepare teachers for dual certification

With the number of elementary students enrolled in some level of special education increasing an estimated 13 percent per year since 1999, a large number of these students may be in need of some degree of special education services. Houghton College has already made plans to prepare the teachers those students will need. Houghton's newly approved bachelor of science degree in Inclusive Childhood Education will equip the next generation of teachers to train and educate all of our children.

The new major prepares teachers for a variety of placements in first through sixth grades, including: the general education classroom, general education classrooms that include students with special learning needs, and special education classrooms. Students who complete this program will be recommended for dual certification in childhood education and special education, first through sixth grade.

"By receiving preparation in the education of exceptional learners, teachers are better equipped to meet the needs of diverse learners of ALL ability levels in the classroom," said Cathy Freytag, associate professor of education. "Many people in the field of education have traditionally regarded special education as a separate 'bag of tricks,' but it's not. Instructional methods and strategies that have proven to be effective for learners with special needs can also benefit learners of other ability levels."

The college hired Freytag—who has a background in special education—a year ago specifically to develop and provide leadership for the new major, which required the addition of a small number of new courses and major revisions to a number of existing ones.

Bressler named to dean's post

As EDUCATION DEPARTMENT CHAIR for the past three years, Darlene Bressler has guided the department through the beginning stages of national accreditation for its teacher education program and assisted in gaining New York state approval for a new major with dual certification in Inclusive Childhood Education. Recently she worked in a collaborative effort to help BOCES secure a 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant of \$4.45 million.

This summer, Bressler's faculty colleagues elected her as interim associate academic dean, describing her as "professional," "collaborative," and "forwardthinking." After all that, though, they cited her "proven scholarservant demeanor" as her most important attribute.

Bressler's involvement in education goes well beyond training the next generation of teachers. She has worked as a language arts consultant for the Letchworth Central School District and the Wellsville Central School District, emphasizing pro-

fessional development and evaluation in the K-Fifth grade classrooms and early intervention for struggling language and literacy learners in the K-First grades. Additionally, she was part of a cooperative effort among the education department faculty in providing training for parents who volunteer in the classroom at three other Allegany County schools.

Bressler graduated from Geneva College, *cum laude* and with comprehensive honors, then went on to complete her master's degree at Wilkes University in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. and her doctorate from the University of Rochester. She was recognized as a May Eddy Butler Scholar by the University of Rochester

and received the Gladys L. Mersereau Award from the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

Former students call Bressler a professor who is not satisfied with simply presenting information. She requires her students to become involved in research and to thoroughly know the topic. Colleagues recognize Bressler's "grace, strength, and discernment necessary to meet the demands of the tasks set before her." Friends recognize that "the interests of the entire Houghton College community will be well-served with Bressler in this post."

A healthy teacher—Education major Jen Sauer helped prove that Houghton's athletes are scholars, too.

"Asound mind in a sound body," wrote John Locke in 1693, "is a short, but full description of a happy state in this World." And it could well describe the scholar-athletes who play for Houghton's intercollegiate athletic teams. Of special note are the classroom achievements of Houghton's athletes in recent years:

- Thirty-one Houghton athletes graduated with honors (at least a 3.5 GPA) last May.
- The overall GPA of student-athletes in 2002-03 was 3.17, compared to 3.08 for the entire Houghton student body.
- The Salutatorians of the classes of 2001 (Laura Chevalier) and 2002 (Heather Mann) and the 2004 Valedictorian (Michael Diercks) were all varsity athletes.

Jennifer (Cadden) Sauer '04, ranked third in the class and won the 2004 award for Best Adolescent Education Student-Teacher. She majored in Adolescent Education and Mathematics and got a job teaching math at Saugerties (N.Y.) High School after she graduated last May. Sauer played on the women's basketball team, was a two-time NAIA All-America Scholar-Athlete and a nominee for the Champions of Character Sportsmanship Award. Before she graduated, Sauer spoke with Jason Mucher, director of athletic communications, about balancing her studies in education with her basketball career:

Mucher: How do you manage the workload between the classroom, sports, free time and other obligations?

Sauer: I always attend classes because then I do not have to study as much. I also plan my time so that I don't have to pull all-nighters. Studies have proven that those who spread their studying time out learn more in a shorter amount of time.

Why is it important to you to do well in your schoolwork?

I want to be a good teacher, and I take classes that will help me reach that goal. I also love learning about pretty much anything. I know that there is so much knowledge here,



and I want to learn as much as possible while I have the opportunity. I also am pretty frugal about money, and I want to get my money's worth.

Have you ever felt pressured to put your sport ahead of your school work?

At times I have felt this way, but it is out of my own obligation to the team and pressure I put on myself. Whenever I have had to miss something related to my sport for school purposes, my coach has been very cooperative. I think there is more pressure from some professors to miss sporting events.

What has your coach stressed to you about the importance of academics?

The beginning of our team mission statement says that we are Christian Scholar-Athletes. It is mandatory that we attend all classes except when we have a game. We have academic update sheets, and our coach always makes sure we are seeking extra help if the report on them is bad.

How has playing a sport helped you as a student?

I am more disciplined to manage my time. I also am motivated to do well in school to combat the negative image some have about student athletes.

How will being a part of a sports team help you as you go into the work world?

I am looking forward to coaching. As a future teacher, I think my involvement in sports will give me an extra area of ministry with my students.

B.O.C.E.S. to establish learning center at Houghton

With President Bush's "No Child Left Behind Act" as a backdrop. Houghton College worked with 15 school districts, the health departments in Allegany and Cattaraugus counties, the counties' youth bureaus, the councils on alcoholism and substance abuse, and even nonpublic schools to help the New York State Board of Cooperative Education Services (BOCES) secure a \$4.45 million "21st Century Community Learning Center" grant. The money will be used to establish four learning centers in the Southern Tier-including one on Houghton's campus-for middle school students as part of the "Schools Attuned" program at BOCES.

Houghton College students who are education majors will be able to apply their classroom knowledge in real-life situations at the four centers (the other three will be in Scio, Little Valley and Cuba), serving as interns—with opportunities to teach, tutor and mentor under the direction of teachers from the school districts that each of the centers serves.

Schools Attuned is a professional development program that provides educators with new methods for understanding and managing students with differences in learning styles. It is based on the work of Dr. Mel Levine, pediatrician and author. Levine says there are eight categories of learning which interact differently in each child's brain to create learning strengths and weaknesses. The Schools Attuned program allows teachers to identify which teaching techniques will help students overcome their weaknesses and develop their strengths.

The four learning centers will provide tutorial and academic en-

richment activities designed to help students meet academic standards in subjects such as reading and math. In addition, the centers will provide substance abuse intervention services, counseling, health and hygiene programs, technology training, and recreation programs.

This summer, Houghton
College's Upward Bound program offered a camp program that provided eighth grade students with an opportunity for career education and exploration, mentoring, and individual counseling and motivational encouragement. Augmented by the college's STEP Adventure Program, students also participated in outdoor activities that helped them to learn to trust and to enhance their emotional and social development.

Middle school students and their families will be encouraged to participate in the programs available at the centers through newsletters and parent-teacher-student conferences. Enrollment in the programs will be free and voluntary.



I was Quite happy teaching in the large suburban middle school where I was employed, and I saw no urgent need to pursue a different course. I had become quite comfortable with my role as an equipper of students. Why would I want to give up a fulfilling career in the K-12 arena to work in higher education? During the course of any given school year, I had the potential to impact dozens of children. Wasn't this a worthy calling?

Mostly certainly it was (and is!), but I had not considered the exponential effect of equipping future teachers for this important mission. Deep in the corners of my mind, I had thought, "Wouldn't it be nice to teach college someday?" but I never really gave it a second thought. Then God planted a vision in my heart—a vision that would effectively multiply the impact that I could have in the lives of school children, particularly those with special learning needs.

As I was completing my doctoral studies at a secular university, I reflected back on my undergraduate experience at a Christian liberal arts college. What was it about that experience that made such an impression on my life? To me, to be liberally educated at a distinctly Christian college is a privilege and a precious gift. In this atmosphere, we encourage students to become critical thinkers, to challenge ideas, and to articulate and defend personal philosophies in keeping with beliefs and convictions that are uniquely their own.

Having benefited from this experience myself, I deeply wanted to give back in the same way that I had received. Having benefited from rich mentoring relationships during my undergraduate years, I wanted to serve in a place where I could have an impact on students both in and out of the classroom. I wanted to teach in an environment where the integration of faith and learning was encouraged, not disparaged. God was preparing me for the challenge. What college would

be the right "fit" for me?


Houghton! People often ask me, "Why in the world did you leave

Florida to come to western New York?" The short answer is: God led me here. Granted, this move was a big change for me. There have been significant adjustments in terms of climate, geography and culture. but these have been



exciting changes—changes that I embrace. Each day brings a new adventure, and, by His grace, He enables me to handle each one. As I tell my students, what God calls you to do, He equips you to do!

Part of that equipping has come in the form of encouragement from the students, faculty, staff and friends who make the Houghton community so unmistakably special. Houghton is an extraordinary place because it is inhabited by extraordinary people. My work at Houghton affords me the opportunity to impact the future of education as I co-labor alongside student and faculty colleagues who embody the essence of scholar-servants. I am daily challenged to reflect on my own practice, to meaningfully incorporate a defensible Christian worldview in my courses, to be transparent and approachable, and to lead with a servant's heart. The people God has placed in my path here at Houghton are a living "cloud of witnesses" who encourage me in these pursuits. How blessed I am.



Take it or leave it: those were the food choices for college students 20 years ago. Actually, those may have been the only options just a few months ago for the latest group of Houghton freshman. Now on their own, these students have left the structure of family meals and have entered the land of the endless, all-you-can-eat buffet of the college cafeteria: pizza, burgers, fries, salad bar, casseroles, ice cream, cereals, deli sandwich bar, vegetarian dishes. Not to mention dealing with late-night munchies during long hours of studying. Add to that the "busyness" of the college lifestyle—with classes, labs, lectures, concerts, studying, and hanging out with friends—and students are left with precious little time to devote to physical activity and exercise.

That scary reality is what has led America into the heart of an obesity epidemic. Bill Swanson, chair of the physical education department, cites statistics that show that the obesity rate in the United States has increased more than 370 percent since the early 1960s. "At that time, the obesity rate for kids ages 6 to 11 was four percent. For kids 12 to 19, it was five percent. Today those numbers are 15 and 16 percent," says Swanson. "That's an alarming statistic."

For college freshmen, being away from home for the first time is an exciting experience, as students are faced with the freedom and the opportunity to make their own decisions. When it comes to food and health, however, recent studies suggest that those decisions are quite often the wrong ones. Researchers now say the freshman weight-gain phenomenon is no myth. A Cornell University study followed 80 students at the beginning and end of their first semester of college. Both men and women gained an average of about five pounds the first semester, which would total 15 pounds over a year if it continued at the same rate. The research did not indicate if the students kept the weight as they progressed through school.



the dreaded "Freshman 15" and should be a no-brainer. "Countless studies tell us how

much more energy you will have," he says. "You will eat better and sleep better. God made us to be movers, not to lie around. It's a natural thing. It's also great for stress relief. You've been laboring over books all afternoon? Go up to the gym for an hour. Get rid of the muscle tension. It's healthy stress relief."

The options for remaining active on the Houghton campus are numerous. Its rural location provides the perfect setting for jogging, biking, cross country skiing, and tennis, while the college pool and indoor track are available every day. Recent renovations to the indoor fitness facility have given students access to state-of-the-art cardiovascular equipment, including elliptical machines, stationary bikes, steppers, and treadmills, as well as numerous weight machines. Close to 200 Houghton students use the fitness center and another 270 use the pool in a given week. Other students remain active in the numerous exercise classes offered.

Almost 250 students are involved in the college's intercollegiate varsity and junior varsity athletic programs. These student-athletes maintain an active regimen during the playing season, but are also highly involved with their teams in the off-season. During the summer they take part in rigorous, well-planned training programs. For those not competing on the intercollegiate level, intramural sports provide a venue for students to keep their competitive fires burning and get some exercise. Approximately 800 students are involved in intramural team sports and tournaments.

Intramurals Director Todd Kleitz says he is looking to branch off into other areas, such as recreational and lifetime sports for those not interested in team sports. "We want to provide an opportunity for all students to become involved in a fitness-related activity," says Kleitz. "We are also trying to create lifetime movers, by developing interest in an activity that will carry over when they finish their time at Houghton."

Food-toxic society

With the wealth of opportunities available, are Houghton students making the grade when it comes to their health and physical activity report cards? Physical Education and Recreation Professor Thomas Kettelkamp says the evidence is not pointing in that direction. "The Houghton students of today are not as healthy as those who were here when I began teaching more than 25 years ago. Unfortunately, I see more of a reflection of society," says Kettelkamp, whose own studies have found that the body fat percentage of Houghton female students is well above the national norms. "I see a lot of misunderstanding and bad information about diets and eating habits. It's through television and infomercials and misleading and deceptive marketing.

We live in a food-toxic society. Never before has food been so readily available, so cheap, so commercialized, and so poor in quality."

Despite the numerous options for physical activity, there are almost as many options for eating, especially for those who take advantage of the college's all-you-can-eat dining hall. "My meals are not always healthy, as my eyes get the best of me in the cafeteria, and with there being so many choices, I don't always choose the best," says sophomore Alathea Young. "And I am always hungry, so I continue to snack in my room...on junk food."

Pioneer Food Services, which runs the college cafeteria, continues to reevaluate what they offer according to the demands of the students. Those demands of late have been for healthier foods. "We have more and more requests for healthy options," says Fred Libick, director of food services for Pioneer. "We don't cook as many fried foods as we used to. The foods we do cook, the students don't eat as much of."

Pioneer began offering a "Lite and Healthy All-You-Can-Eat Salad Bar" last year and serves two vegetarian options at each meal. Pioneer stopped offering whole milk when students stopped drinking it, and the cooks use less salt, more olive oil, and a better grade of beef in the meals. Libick indicated that the healthy food offerings will continue as Houghton students adopt the trends that are already sweeping across other campuses. "You don't realize how much eating habits change on a college campus," says Libick. "You graduate an entire class and bring in a new class that eats differently."

Learning about health

Beyond making healthy food more readily available, Pioneer is making an effort to keep the Houghton students educated on healthy eating and nutrition. They distribute a booklet called "A Matter of Choice" to all freshmen and routinely place table tents around the cafeteria, providing facts and tips on healthy eating. A dietitian is also available to answer any questions students may have.

Through his required Lifetime Wellness course, Swanson has a platform for sharing the benefits of a healthy lifestyle. "The importance is learning how to live a healthy lifestyle and maintain it through your life. You will be more productive and feel better," says Swanson. "We stress the importance of regular physical activity—find something you like doing—as well as eating sensibly. I always tell my students, if you eat a sensible diet and stay active, however you turn out, that's the way God intended.

"I love it when my students see me doing something active," says Swanson, who tries to run 45 minutes to an hour every other day. "They know I practice what I preach. That's important. It's neat to come up here at night and see the gym loaded with people. That's great. I love it."

Junior Chris Fiorello latched onto Swanson's enthusiasm when he took Lifetime Wellness from him as a freshman. He lost 30 pounds that year by exercising and making good food choices. "I owe my weight loss to Dr. Swanson's class, mostly the knowledge I gained that the biggest difference is a change from a sedentary lifestyle to a moderately active one," says Fiorello, who has been able to maintain his weight by playing racquetball and using the cardio equipment in the gym one to three times per week.

Unfortunately, a recent survey indicated that Lifetime Wellness was one of the classes that students would rather do without. Kettelkamp says it ranked second from the bottom, be-

hind FYI, in recent surveys. "Students are perceiving that class to be insignificant. That's shocking, but it's reflective of our society. Health and wellness is not a real issue to them," he says.

Developing habits

While other students haven't been as gung-ho as Fiorello, some recognize the importance of trying to stay active and eat right. Freshman Brianna Young does crunches and pushups for 10 to 15 minutes each night, but has been falling out of her routine of running two miles every other day. "It's not like I don't have the time. I just haven't done it," she says. "I don't like to do it by myself and it's hard to match up schedules with my friends."

Young says the high metabolism that runs in her family keeps her from gaining weight. But Athletics Director Skip Lord warns students to not get caught up in the myth that skinny is healthy. "People need to be active, even if they are not overweight," he says. "A physically active person who is overweight is going to be less prone to some of these diseases than someone who is not overweight but not active. Don't concentrate on what people look like. We want people to lose weight, but the bottom line is we want people to live an active lifestyle. If they are doing that and eating right, the weight issue takes care of itself."

Senior Amanda Shine says the majority of her exercise consists of walking from her townhouse to campus. Though she occasionally plays tennis, she struggles to find time to be active due to her busy schedule as a music major. Her eating philosophy is to try to stay balanced. "My meals are pretty balanced, but it's all of the extra eating that takes its toll," says Shine. "Studying is conducive to eating. When you sit down to read,

it's an immediate response to want to munch something."

Shine and Fiorello each live in the townhouses, which means they no longer rely on the cafeteria for their meals. For Fiorello, that means he eats less because he has to cook for himself. Shine, on the other hand, see positives and negatives to preparing her own food. "On the positive end, I can select and prepare foods that are health-conscious, but on the negative side, I have easier access to food all the time; it's no big deal to make a pan of brownies, to keep snack foods in the kitchen, to stock up on soda. And food is always there, rather than available only three times a day," says Shine.

Being able to make that choice not to "munch" or to not make those brownies is the key. "It has to be a conscious, disciplined, intentional plan to be physically active and to eat the right amounts of the right thing," says Lord. "There are all sorts of options on this campus to be fit. Students need to use what is available to build the habit, so when they leave here, they have the foundation to continue. As they get older their metabolism starts to slow down. They tend to be less active as

they are busy with academics and they have access to all-you-can-eat of whatever you want. It's an opportune time for people to start making healthy choices."

Kettelkamp agrees: "There might be an attitude of 'I'm busy now


as a student, but once I graduate, I'll get involved in physical activity.' It's a bad argument. Habits of life are developed now. They say 'I don't have the time.' I say you make the time. If it's important to you, you'll find the time. They don't always like that, but I'm not here to win a popularity contest. They don't truly understand the real benefits. You can't sleep? Go out and get your body tired. Then you'll sleep well. And that's important for a college student."

The whole person

A liberal arts education is about developing the whole person—mind, body, and spirit—says Kettelkamp, but too often one part seems to be left out: "We talk about developing intellectually and spiritually. What about physically? What about mind, body, and spirit? Scripture is very clear. I put it into the concept of stewardship of creation. Most say that deals with the environment, which is good, but the body is part of creation. It's inconsistent with Christianity to neglect health and body."

Sophomore Amanda Van Doren, who uses the gym one to three times per week, experienced some weight gain during her freshman year, mainly due to "lots of homework means not much exercise," she says. "But the accessibility of the gym facilities and healthy foods make it easier in some ways to be healthy. You just have to make the choice to do it."

EVERY WEDNESDAY night the Lighthouse Free Medical Clinic, located in an abandoned neighborhood on Buffalo's East Side, serves sick children and adults who can't afford medical care.

Students from the State University of New York at Buffalo School of Medicine staff the clinic. Before he graduated from SUNY in May—he was first in his class—Rick Newell '98, co-founder of the clinic, spoke with Cynthia Machamer about how the clinic came to be, his Houghton experience, and his future.

Machamer: Why did you start a clinic during your first year of medical school?

Newell: I went into medicine to help people. I asked myself, "Why not start now?" All of us who are in medical school are blessed by God. I believe we who are Christians have a responsibility to give back to the community. Also, I saw a lack of practical experience for medical students in

their first two years. Working at the clinic exposes students to the kinds of situations they'll face in practice.

How does the clinic work?

Second-year student administrators run the clinic. They do everything from updating the patient database and referral lists to stocking supplies and organizing fund-raisers. Out of 100 UB students who apply each year to work at the clinic with the administrators, six are chosen. This team, which is overseen by a doctor and a nurse practitioner, treat a variety of ailments and screen for such conditions as diabetes and hypertension. If patients need invasive procedures, laboratory tests, or x-rays, students can refer patients to another medical facility.

Do student doctors prescribe medicine?

Pharmaceutical companies donate various medications and supplies such as asthma inhalers, antibiotics, and antidepressants that are dispensed as needed under the supervision of a physician. We also have a grant through the AOA (a national honor society for physicians, into which Newell was inducted as a third-year medical student) that pays for medicines that the clinic doesn't have on site.

What was the most startling case you encountered during your time at the clinic?

I have seen numerous patients with extensive family histories of diabetes and symptoms of the disease for years who have never seen a doctor. They come into our clinic with blood glucoses elevated to the point of near catastrophe.

How is the Lighthouse Clinic funded?

Thanks to the fund-raising efforts of the Rev. Charles Biegner of Buffalo's Resurrection Church, the clinic runs on donations and grants. We don't receive government aid. Biegner's appeals to the Lutheran Church's Missouri Synod got us \$25,000 for medical supplies and vaccines and to help cover the expenses for patients who can't afford them.

How did your Houghton education prepare you for graduate school?

I received a strong foundation in biology. Dr. Boon's physiology and Dr. Cianci's anatomy & physiology courses shaped my thinking. I also learned a lot that I apply to medicine and being a doctor from Professor Gaerte's public speaking class and a class in the history and philosophy of science. It made me think about how science, medicine, and religion relate to each other. My Spanish courses were also invaluable, since over 60 percent of our patient population speaks only Spanish.

Did Houghton's Healthcare Symposium influence your thinking?

A lecture on death and dying by Diane Komp '61 has stuck with me. I also appreciated a lecture on obstructive sleep apnea. The symposium gave me a chance to learn about various medical schools and their strengths and weaknesses.

What issues in medicine have grabbed your attention? Bioterrorism, for one. Something that I've been working on is developing a Web-, phone-, or paper-based triage tool that determines if someone has been exposed to a bioterrorist agent. The tool is a series of questions that are scored in a certain way in order to predict exposure. It's a possibility that we will see this used with SARS and influenza in the future.*

What are your plans for the future?

I am a post-graduate intern in emergency medicine at the Los Angeles County/Harbor/UCLA Medical Center. I'll be completing my training in three years, at which time I hope to stay in the greater Los Angeles area. I hope to use my master's in public health (Editor's note: Newell earned this degree from Harvard University, between his third and fourth year of medical school) and move into hospital administration. I also hope to serve with Doctors Without Borders, or a similar group.

A nudge of motivation

Good intentions. We all have them. We intend to get up fifteen minutes earlier to exercise—starting tomorrow. We intend to stop eating between meals—starting tomorrow. We intend to see a doctor to have our cholesterol tested—tomorrow.

What does it take to move from good intentions to action? Let's be honest; while some of us are good at making smart health choices, some of us need a little push, a little nudge of motivation to begin taking action.

Houghton's president, Daniel Chamberlain, has a vision to see the college community given that nudge of motivation. A believer in physical fitness himself (he's well-known as a tough opponent on the racquetball court), Chamberlain would like to see faculty, staff, administrators, and students become fit while at Houghton. For instance, he hopes that, while at Houghton, every student will find a "lifetime sport" (such as swimming, tennis, walking, etc.) that he or she will be able to continue to enjoy after leaving here.

He is also interested in seeing the college community have opportunities for health screening. He tells the story of his own mother, who went to a health screening offered by a local service organization. She had no physical complaints, but went simply because it was convenient and free. The screening revealed that Mrs. Chamberlain was in the beginning stages of glaucoma. A subsequent visit to an eye doctor resulted in treatment, which probably saved her eyesight. Chamberlain is grateful that today his mother is still able to read, something that is very important to her at this stage in life.

Because of his mother's experience and his own belief in the importance of physical fitness, his vision would see the entire Houghton College community provided with similar screening opportunities, as well as access to tools for improving general health and strategies for providing the little push many of us need to engage in more physical activity.

Not long ago, Chamberlain shared his vision with Houghton's Executive Director of Human Resources and Budget Dale Wright, who "picked up the ball" and took the project to Human Resources Administrator Cindy Bradfield. They have since been working to make Chamberlain's vision become a reality for faculty and staff. Now a Wellness Program, designed by Bradfield, is beginning to take form.

Raising Awareness

The kick-off to the first phase of the Wellness Program was a health fair in October 2003, intended to raise awareness of the importance of fitness to every person on campus. The day began as 88 faculty and staff arrived to complete an early-morning, non-competitive walk/run around to wn. The walkers followed a one-and-a-half mile course. The runners completed three miles. Each of them received a water bottle to keep. The first 50 to sign up also received a pedometer from Community Blue, Houghton's health insurance carrier.

Throughout the day, 140 people participated in the many

activities offered. Forty-five people received personal wellness assessments from C & K Preventive Health, which also offered "Be Informed" sessions attended by 31. (A week later, 14 additional personal assessments were completed and 39 people attended another "Be Informed" session.) Allegany County Screen for Health Partnership provided bone density testing and a breast cancer detection model. The Houghton College Health Center offered blood pressure screening and vision testing. An Allegany County Health Department RN administered free flu shots, a joint effort coordinated with Community Blue. A Boise Office Solutions representative, along with several other corporate representatives, demonstrated ergonomic workstations. Pioneer Food Service provided healthy snacks and juice for the crowd. Two local eateries, Subway and Deb's, participated as well. Also at the health fair were representatives of the American Red Cross, the American Cancer Society, and Iones Memorial Hospital.

Building Knowledge

The second phase of the Wellness Program, after raising awareness, was to build knowledge. In February, 2004, the college offered the faculty and staff two seminars aimed at informing the participants on the best nutritional choices "for heart and health." Jointly funded by Community Blue and Houghton College, the seminars were conducted by C & K Preventive Health. Each of the 35 attendees received a copy of a 1,200-page cookbook from the American Heart Association, courtesy of the college.

To further encourage the college community to take positive steps toward good health, the college has hosted a chapter of Weight Watchers on campus since February 2004. The first 12-week session attracted 31 faculty and staff who lost a total of 520 pounds. Buoyed by such success, a second session of Weight Watchers progressed into the summer. (Each participant has paid his or her own membership fee.)

Physical Fitness

The third phase in the Wellness Program actively encourages physical activity in the community. We all know that physical activity is good for us. The Wellness Program aims to help us move from good intentions to action. To launch this physical fitness phase of the program, plans are developing for a competitive departmental walking challenge. Exercise is often more enjoyable when shared with friends. That enjoyment, when mixed with a dash of the Houghton competitive spirit, could prove to be the nudge towards fitness that we all need.

The Future


Will President Chamberlain's vision for the college community lead to a Houghton College faculty/staff team in the next Olympics? Probably not. However, with the assistance of David Brubaker, the college's physician and director of health services, plans are continuing to find even more creative ways to meet the fitness needs (and schedules) of Houghton's faculty and staff.

Houghton ranks first in walkers

Ask any doctor and they'll tell you that the easiest and safest exercise program is walking. And what could be an easier way to get your daily exercise

than to walk to work Well, if walking to work is a measure of health, then Houghton is part of the healthiest town in the country: Caneadea, New York.

That's right, Caneadea-the town that includes the hamlet of Houghton-has the highest percentage of people who walk to work, according to the 2000 U.S. Census. As you might expect, the list-which you can find on com/top10/walkable_small_



second on the list.) One of the most faithful walkers in the Houghton community is Rich Perkins, professor of sociology, who regularly walks several miles to and from the college each day. Milieu asked Perkins if he'd mind sitting with us and answering a few questions—he suggested we go for a walk:

Milieu: Why do you walk to work?

Perkins: I like to introduce a little exercise into an otherwise sedentary existence. I also use the time to slow down: to think, meditate, and pray. We actually bought our property with the idea that it should be close enough to the college that I could walk to work. [It's approximately three miles, about a 45-minute walk.

Do you accept rides?

Yes, but I had to develop a system. I turned down enough rides at first that my friends stopped asking. Now I wear a white handkerchief on my backpack to signal when I would like a ride. This works well when the afternoon turns stormy.

What's the hardest part?

Big trucks that create noise and pollution. They zip along Route 19. Sometimes the snowplows coat my glasses with snow.

Do you feel better since you started walking?

Yes. Walking isn't aerobic, but it's an effective full-body exercise. And, as I mentioned, it lets me slow down and think and pray.



Active for life

A NYONE WHO KNOWS Doug Burke knows he couldn't stay away from coaching and teaching after his retirement from Houghton College in 1994. He just moved on to a new team and new students. And his fellow retirees (students) couldn't be more pleased.

For the past ten years Burke has been leading exercises for a group of 40 or so retirees from the Houghton community. The group meets in the Nielsen Center every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday morning for a few hours of stretching, walking, weightlifting, cardio exercises, and a whole lot of talking.

The group members come in at 8 a.m. and use the machines in the college fitness center or walk the indoor track. Then at 8:30 they gather together for a period of Burke's stretching and flexibility exercises. He also offers advice on weightlifting techniques and is available for any questions they may have.

"It's important to stay active," says Burke, who adds that the group ranges in age from 50 to 80. "As you age, you lose flexibility, you lose balance. Weightlifting is also important to increase bone strength."

"It helps me get out of bed," says community member Will Zike. "I've always exercised, mainly jogging and cycling, but I got out of it for a few years. For me, the best part is stretching and staying flexible."

Though he leads the group through its paces, Burke is quick to point out that this wasn't his idea. Retired history professor Kay Lindley suggested it to him in 1994 while walking around the indoor track. "We started out with four or six people and gradually grew," says Burke, noting that they've had as many as 60 attend.

When Burke is away, different members of the exercise group take turns leading the stretching. "I led this morning and they gave me a hard time," says retired chemistry professor Fred Shannon. "If I spend too much time on this exercise or that, they let me know."

The members agree that it's not all about the exercising. "I think the group enjoys being together. There's a lot of time for talking and fellowship," says Burke. "For me, personal fitness means I can enjoy life and it's a chance to fellowship with friends in the community." Those friends include names recognizable to many Houghton alumni: Woolsey, Lindley, Pocock, Shannon, Keith, Wynn, Johnson, and more.

Burke says the group has also seen attendance by retirees from the surrounding communities of Fillmore, Belfast, and Rushford. "It helps these people to understand more about what Houghton is. It breaks down some of the barriers."

Although the exercises are important, Shannon points to the time spent with friends as the part he enjoys most. "It's interesting. We see each other every other day, but we always have something to talk about," he says.

The group has also become a starting point for other group activities during the day. Shannon says he and ten other gentlemen follow their exercises with fresh coffee at the Subway restaurant downtown. There, they will spend an hour getting caught up on all the news of the day. "It's remarkable how many international problems are solved down there," says Shannon. "Of course, there's always a lot of joshing that goes on." The activities don't stop with coffee. Shannon and a smaller crew of six often golf together, something that is aided by their morning exercise routines. "It helps me with my golf, but not my score," he adds.

Lindley enjoys the talks she can have about travel, health, and family. "We have this great time to fellowship with each other, without having to be at work," she says. "It's a good group. We can tease each other if we want to, but we look after each other. We will stop and pray if someone has a particular need. We are supportive, but not obtrusive."

Both Lindley and Shannon point to Burke's unwavering commitment to his "team" as the key to its success. "Doug has been very faithful," says Lindley. "I don't know if we are a very good team, but we support him." —Jason Mucher

Checking Houghton's Vital Signs

"The Great Physician" is one of the titles we give to our Lord, and it is certainly appropriate for this "annual check-up" on the health and status of Houghton College, for it is truly the Lord who is at the center of our health and well-being—both as individuals

When we consider the traits of a well-trained physician, we and as an educational institution. quickly recognize two qualities that we have prized for many years at Houghton: scholar and servant. We want our physicians to be scholars who have mastered the knowledge available to them through the latest research and collective experience of their peers. Additionally, we want them to treat us with the heart of a servant, caring for our well-being above all things. That combination is a wonderful picture of our Lord. He is omniscient, yet cared for us so much that he willingly gave His life for us.

Christ, the model scholar-servant, has long been our ideal at Houghton College. Our mission clearly states that we want students to leave here equipped to lead and labor in the world. So it is fitting that we pause each year to assess our health—to ensure that we are meeting the needs of our students and that they are, indeed, prepared for a lifetime of learning and service.

In the pages to follow we invite you to read our chart which will give you a picture of the health of Houghton—its growth, its vital signs, and maybe even a wrinkle or two.

When a doctor examines a patient, he checks the vital signs first: heart rate, temperature, blood pressure, etc. The college is organized into five vital areas:

Academics, Advancement, Enrollment
Management, Finances, and Student Life. Here are some important "signs" from each of those vital areas:

Academics

Academic initiatives this year focused on developing curricula rich in both service and research opportunities. Both are critical to the preparation of scholar-servants. Service-learning continued to grow, with an increasing number of academic disciplines involved. Service-learning options were available in 29 classes during the academic year. The development of greater research opportunities for students focused this year on science. A series of breakfast meetings with the science chairs and the vice president for advancement resulted in modifying the curricula in biology and chemistry to offer regular research opportunities to students. These programs join physics in making research an integral part of the science curricula.

This past year New York State approved a new major in Information Technology Management, to be offered jointly by our Business and Computer Science faculties. A proposal to create an Inclusive Childhood Education major that will enable each graduate of the program to be eligible for dual certification in childhood (formerly elementary) education, grades 1-6, and special education, grades 1-6, was adopted by the faculty and sent to the state for approval (which the state granted in August 2004). The Greatbatch School of Music admitted its first graduate students, looking toward full implementation of the graduate program in the fall of 2004.

The Academic Policies Council finished work on capstone experiences proposed by each of the academic majors. Soon, all Houghton students will complete a "capstone experience" during their senior year.

Advancement

In Advancement The Campaign for Christian Liberal Arts, reached the \$33.9 million mark. The campaign, which runs through June 2006, will make a special emphasis on the capital projects in the remaining months. The Houghton Fund raised \$999,436 in FY04—giving by alumni, friends, and parents all increased.

The Advancement Office won a national Circle of Excellence award for overall fundraising improvement from the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education (CASE). CASE also gave Advancement Services a Circle of Excellence award for its creative solutions in data management and receipting activities. Finally, Public Relations won a Bronze Award from CASE for its community newsletter Friends & Neighbors.

The Alumni Relations office introduced the idea of "Cluster Reunions" at the summer (2003) alumni weekends, then ended the summer with an eight-day alumni tour of the Swiss Alps. Throughout the fiscal year there were 12 alumni gatherings, from Florida to Toronto and from Boston to San Diego.



Enrollment Management

In September 2003 the college welcomed 382 first-year students, up 34 from 2002. Those numbers included 293 freshmen (up ten from 2002) and 85 transfers and students who have returned after a year or more away from campus (up 28 from 2002). Overall full-time undergraduate enrollment for fall semester was at 1226, up 25 from 2002. In addition to the students enrolled in programs through the main campus, another 140 students were enrolled in the Program for Accelerating College Education (P.A.C.E.) at locations throughout western New York and 43 took courses toward an associate's degree or certificate through the Pastoral and Church Ministries Program in Buffalo. Spending on college-funded financial aid was less than expected, yet helped support an enrollment that exceeded budgeted targets.

Church relations purchased an additional sound system, allowing ministry teams to travel on the same weekends. All three ministry teams received very positive evaluations from camps, churches and other appearances, both for their musical contributions and for their servant-like attitudes. Enrollment in the Equipping for Ministry program increased, serving more students and approaching break-even financially.

Finance

From a current fund standpoint (cash available for use in traditional operations), the college delivered an improvement in its unrestricted cash surplus equal to roughly 1.5 percent of the total budget (\$400,000). We have a long way to go to reach the accepted standards of 10 percent of a college's annual budget that should be available in the accumulated surplus fund, but we are making progress. Enrollment above the budgeted number and financial aid below expectation helped. Revenues from P.A.C.E. and auxiliary enterprises far exceeded plan, offsetting major investments in marketing.


Perhaps the most significant accomplishment feeding into the positive results was the implementation of five-year financial disciplines in association with the budgeting for the year. Those standards include reduced reliance on unpredictable sources of revenue, increased financial aid for our students, adoption of conservative enrollment and donation expectations, cost containment, dedication of additional funding to address facility renewal requirements and limitations on tuition increases. Each of these disciplines was implemented this year, and it is clear that the rigor of these various constraints will eventually change the financial profile of Houghton for

the better.

Working closely with Student Life staff, the college directed over \$100,000 to dormitory improvements: new furniture, carpeting and windows in Lambein, specifically. By adding to this total every year (\$125,000 is planned for FY05), improvements to our residential facilities will accelerate until deferred maintenance will be a thing of the past.

The college extended wireless network access to more areas on campus and all new laptops included wireless access built-in. Once again, we were able to reduce the prices paid for new laptops and printers. Acquiring laptops prior to December 31 allowed for substantial savings. IBM also allowed for extended payment terms so that the cash impact on the early delivery was minimal. Tech Services operates with fewer personnel than it did five years ago.

This was the first full year for our new investment consultant for the endowment. While the market struggled for much of the period, the number of endowed funds at



less than their original capitalization declined by 40%. We hope to have all such funds returned to par within the next two years. Through careful review of interest rates, the college saved \$500,000 from interest rate swap transactions, bringing the total to nearly \$900,000 over two years.

Vice President for Finance Jeff Spear '79 was named chair of the chief financial officers' group of the Council of Christian Colleges and Universities. That group will hold its annual conference in Houghton next summer (2005).

Student Life

The year was the first for the newly created position of Dean of the Chapel, capably filled by John Brittain. This position focuses on development of students' spiritual life and the new programs he helped implement included: the first pastors' day and church fair in some years; a campus-wide retreat on the gospel of John underwritten by the Hein Foundation; a visit by Perry Bramlett focusing on the works of C. S. Lewis and J. R. R. Tolkien in chapel services, classrooms and informal gatherings; and the organization of an urban mission trip to Buffalo during February break. Unfortunately, two of the most significant spiritual gatherings on campus were memorial services: one for student Kada Burton, the other for adjunct faculty member David Pollock.

In residence life, each residence hall sponsored at least one service project each semester, including: three clothing drives and two food drives, a Harvest party for community children, and a joint service project with the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation in Rochester. Every resident assistant participated in the

college's Martin Luther King Service Day. Each residence hall conducted a Saturday morning breakfast series, in which, once a month a faculty or staff member shared significant issues in their faith journey with the students.

Last year's generous contribution by the Student Government Association began the process of upgrading fitness equipment. This year Bob VanDyk '75 provided the resources for a new fitness center in the Nielsen PEC. The Manley Foundation also provided a grant to remodel one of the racquetball courts into a weight room. Both of these projects were begun before the end of the fiscal year. Athletics also established an Allegany County "Champions of Character" Leadership Award, recognizing one outstanding junior from each high school in the county. These students, along with the overall county winner, were recognized on campus during a presentation on character development by former Penn State Academic All-American and Kansas City Chief Quarterback Todd Rutledge. Other athletic accomplishments included having 11 Houghton College student-athletes named NAIA Academic All-Americans (for the second consecutive year) and having soccer player Michael Diercks named valedictorian of the class of 2004.



As you can see, the college is healthy, vibrant, and flourishing. We thank God for his continued blessings that have made it so. However grateful we are for the past, we don't intend to live there. So we ask God for his continued providence and that he will allow Houghton to continue producing scholar-servants for many years to come.



One measure of Houghton's "health" is the support the college receives from alumni, friends, churches, foundations and corporations. These donors show their confidence in Houghton through their gifts—allowing the college to do its work of transforming young lives. We are grateful to each of those listed here.

The number that appears to the left of each name shows the number of fiscal years (a maximum of 28) in which that donor has given as far back as our current computer records go. George E. Moreland

NE OF THE GREATEST nonpresidential forces in the history of Houghton as a college was George E. Moreland, who served from 1941 to 1966. The character of his work as professor of zoology and chair of the science department is legendary, and his influence on multiple generations of students led some 170 (by one count) to become physicians or dentists.

George Moreland was born in Brooklyn on July 10, 1895, and attended Manual Training High School, from which he graduated in 1913. He worked for two years before entering Greenville

College in 1915. His college training was interrupted for two years while he served with the U.S. Army Medical Corps as part of the American Expeditionary Force in France. After the war he returned to Greenville and completed his degree in 1922. He immediately began work as an instructor in zoology and taught at Greenville until 1941. By attending summer school, he earned a master's degree from the University of Michigan in 1929.

During his early faculty days at Greenville, he met a young English teacher, Frances Woods of Rushford, N. Y. They were married in 1923, and through her WNY contacts he came to know about Houghton College. Following completion of his Ph.D. in parasitology from Cornell in 1938, he inquired in early 1940 about a Houghton post in zoology but found no opening. When shortly before commencement that year Dr. Raymond Douglas died unexpectedly, he was offered the vacancy but felt his commitment at Greenville must be honored for that year. He came to Houghton in 1941, and within a year he became department chair. In 1943-44 he was also dean of men, and in 1944-45 he served as acting dean of the college.

During his Houghton years, Moreland was described as displaying a boyish enthusiasm for his teaching and other duties, which he performed with integrity and excellence. According to one biographer, "Dr. Moreland's reputation and that of the pre-medical program he built [at Houghton] grew to a point where some said his name on a recommendation was tantamount to a ticket into medical school." The 1961 Boulder



was dedicated to him with these words: "When a man has so thoroughly steeped himself in the search for knowledge that his students thrill with learning and has been established in the minds of all who know him as the epitome of unhurried, orderly Christian living, it is only fitting that such a man be accorded honor."

Moreland served as a professor at Houghton until 1966 and chaired the science department from 1942 to 1960. A strongly spiritual scholar who grew up in the Free Methodist Church, he reportedly looked askance on the "secularization of campus dress" in the '60s.

Subsequent to his retirement, Moreland's lifetime of educational excellence was recognized with two honorary degrees. Houghton awarded him a doctorate of pedagogy in 1966 and Greenville a doctorate of science in 1977.


In retirement, he sought vigorously to catch up on his reading and to pursue his avocation as a birder: "Observation of birds is my main hobby." Asked a decade after his retirement to comment on Houghton, he said, "Houghton's scholarship standards and teaching qualifications cannot be matched among Christian colleges."

Following the death of Frances in 1967, he resided for nearly 20 years with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Collins. Moreland died March 25, 1987, in Newfane.





Willard G. Smith '35

Former Houghton College treasurer and business manager Willard G. Smith '35 passed away June 9 at the age of 92. He was the firstborn son of faculty members Henry R. Smith, a professor of English, and Lois B. Smith, who taught English and art at Houghton Seminary. He was also the grandson of the Rev. Henry Reed Smith, who was a member of the 1902 committee which selected the present campus site of Houghton College. Smith began serving the college immediately following his graduation, working for Dr. James Seymour Luckey as assistant to the president, or in Smith's own words, "Choreboy for J.S.L."

In 1936 Smith became the director of public relations and was married to Mae (Young) '33. In addition to his public relations responsibilities, Smith taught education courses part-time at the college and worked towards his graduate degrees from New York University, for which he would commute to New York City by train on weekends. It was also during this time that he took on the role of father to his six daughters, Lois Thomas '60, Evelyn Day '63, Nancy Troyer '63, Eileen Siglin '66, Aileen Brothers '67, and Wilna Jean Calder '70, who all survive him.

Smith changed positions, becoming business manager and treasurer in 1945. He served the growing college in this capacity until his retirement in 1972, the same year the college bestowed on him an honorary doctorate.



Smith continued to live an active life after his retirement from Houghton. From 1972-1978 he served as general treasurer of the Wesleyan Church at the world headquarters in Marion, Ind. He traveled with his wife Mae, achieving her personal goal of visiting every state in the United States. He was also involved in many committees, served as an organist in church services, and was a 1,000-hour volunteer gardener at Bok Tower Gardens in Lakes Wales, Fla.

Smith was predeceased by his wife, who passed away May 10, 2000. In addition to his daughters, surviving family members include a sister, Florence Foster '35, a brother, Allen Smith '43, and many grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and great-great-grandchildren.

Surviving Smith family members are making it possible for donors of \$30 or more to the Willard G. and Mae L. Smith Scholarship (which supports students preparing to be church musicians) to receive, upon request, a copy of Dr. Smith's history/autobiography, 90-Plus, noted in the Winter 2004 Milieu.

Paul Snyder died December 30, 2003. A WWII veteran, he worked as an elementary school superintendent for 28 years. He is survived by his wife, Irene (Butts '43), as well as two children and two grandchildren.

Providing contact points

I worked in the Central African Republic for Grace Brethren International Missions from 1985-1996. My responsibilities alternated between directing a dental nurse training program and serving as the missionary team leader. One of the fun things about my job was that, after their 14-month dental nurse training program, I got to sit back and watch them work.

Three Central African dental nurses I had trained were working at rural mission hospitals. A typical day for them included doing lots of extractions, placing a few fillings and maybe taking an impression (mold) to replace someone's missing teeth. Their expertise continued to develop with periodic in-service sessions. So I was "supervising" their work that day at the Yaloké Hospital.

There was a dusty courtyard in the middle of the hospital complex. Following morning devotions, patients queued up for medical consultations and were referred to the pharmacy, x-ray, laboratory or dental buildings. We were working with a portable dental unit and a small generator; 12-volt-powered automotive fog lights; and black, cast iron U.S. Army field unit dental chairs. There was no air-conditioning, only fans to keep both the patients and dental nurses cool.

Around noon I heard a huge commotion in the courtyard, so I went to investigate. I arrived in time to see a rusty-blue, 4 X 4, Toyota truck with threadbare tires come to a screeching halt. Loaded to twice its capacity, all passengers but one quickly disembarked. The air filled with infant cries and the chatter of animated women dressed in colorful Arab attire. I saw some men gently lift a female patient out of the truck bed onto the ground. She was cradled in a blanket, somewhat like a hammock. Then I saw the blood.

Amidst the confusion an African nurse who was on emergency call came over to assess the patient: pulse, blood pressure, pupil response. Bits and pieces of her story became apparent as those who brought her to the hospital began to mingle with the crowd.

A week before, back at her home, this woman had gone into labor. Her normal delivery resulted in welcoming twin girls to the village. Relatives and friends were ecstatic! In seven days they would name the twins. It was their cries I had heard in the background. They sounded hungry and anxious to cuddle with their mother, but she made no move to comfort them.

At first everyone in the village had expected the bleeding to stop. After one day, Mom was too tired to walk. After a second day, Mom was too tired to nurse. On the third day of serious, post-delivery bleeding—when Mom could not talk—they made arrangements for a truck to take her to the hospital.

After his brief physical exam of the patient, the African nurse slowly stood up. The air seemed strangely still. The nurse looked for the patient's husband, and, after a few words, shook his hand and walked away. No pulse, no blood pressure, no pupil response.

The scene left me with two haunting questions. (I was not worried about the care of the twins—family members would take over and raise them.) What bothered me was: "Had the Mom ever been told about Jesus?" If we had missed that opportunity, my second question was, "Who will tell these two girls the story of Jesus when they are old enough to understand?"

Myron Glick '88

Myron Glick '88 grew up as a missionary kid in Central America. He earned his M.D. from SUNY Buffalo School of Medicine then felt the call to start a medical practice—one that would reach "the least of these." In 1997 he founded Jericho Road Family Practice (JRFP) in a Buffalo, N.Y. neighborhood populated largely by refugees from war-torn and needy countries. Today, JRFP provides holistic care for over 7,000 patients from 50 countries, treating medical needs, but also building relationships and providing for the "foreigner in your land." Glick also co-sponsors a project to teach medical students cross-cultural medicine and expose them to a diverse patient population in the clinical setting.

The SUNY Buffalo Department of Family Medicine recently honored Glick as the Volunteer Faculty Teacher of the Year and the SUNY Buffalo School of Medicine gave him the Leonard Tow Humanism in Medicine Award. On Founder's Day, Houghton honored Glick with its Distinguished Service Award.

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
