n August 15, a large group of anxious new students arrived at Houghton for the 1993 Highlander program. They had no idea what the next ten days would hold, but everyone was excited. The sixty participants were divided into groups of about ten people including two or three leaders in each group. In the course of the trip, each group saw the best and worst of each other, people who until then they had never seen before.

The Highlanders travelled to Canada to go rock climbing, to the higher regions of Houghton campus to spend time at the ropes course, and to Pennsylvania to hike and camp in the widerness. At all three locations, the Highlanders learned stress management, to trust others, and to trust God, all the while growing closer to Him. While in Pennsylvania, each participant went on a thirty-six hour solo. The solo is a time of great self-realization and spiritual

growth because the Highlander has only the great outdoors and God.

As a Highlander myself, I can honestly say that the trip was one of the best experiences of my life. It was both fun and difficult. I learned to trust others with my life and in turn, they gave me control of the rope from which their lives hung. I climbed a huge rock, jumped from a thirty-five foot telephone pole, and hiked up Cardiac (we call it "Cardiac Arrest") Hill, all in ten days. The friendships I made will last the rest of my life, my leaders became my role models, and my Savior became much more real to me. Although I was sweating the whole time, tired most of the time, and complaining some of the time, I would not trade the experience for anything. The Highlander motto. "That which does not kill me makes me stronger" holds true; because of Highlander, I am much stronger.




ting to know transfers, and catching up with old friends.












A view of the Luckey Building shortly after a heavy snowfall. Fresh snow turns campus into a truly beautiful winter wonderland.













## CROSS COUNTRY


Both the men's and women's cross country teams had their most successful seasons ever during 1993.

The 1993 season provided Houghton players and fans alike with a season to be remembered for a long, long time. For, as one opponent's coach commented, "In my 10 years as a player and a coach in District 18, this year's Houghton team is the best team I have ever seen."










## CHEERLEADING





Senate has also dealt with other issues



member, posed as Santa and get erously handed out presents that cabinet purchased with money the Christian Life Fund. All who tended received a real blessing.













#### LANGUAGE LABS



he PACE (Program for Accelerating College Education) program, located at Houghton's suburban campus, is for adults who wish to finish their college education. This adult degree completion program is serving increasing numbers of Western New Yorkers who have dropped out to finish their work for the Bachelor's of Science Degree in Organizational Management.

The PACE program consists of three twelve hour terms. Each term is five weeks long, enabling students to earn their degree quickly. Meeting only one night a week, PACE students do a great amount of independent study. Classes begin every Spring, Summer, Fall and Winter so that students may start the program at the time most convenient for their schedule.

As they study together throughout the fifteen - month period, a strong bond develops among students. They all have in common what PACE aimed to allow - namely, an opportunity to finish a college education while still considering some of the important aspects of adult living - time, family, and work schedules.

#### THE SCHOOL OF MUSIC

he Houghton College School of Music offers a high quality program to both non-majors and those wishing to earn their degree in some aspect of music. Accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music, the program gives students the opportunity to major in Performance, Music Education, or Theory/Composition culminating in the Bachelor of Music degree. Other students may elect the Church Ministries program, the Liberal Arts Music Major (BA), or any of a number of several minors. Students choose to focus on a particular instrument for the duration of their studies. Private lessons are offered in voice, piano, organ and in brass, string, woodwind, and percussion instruments.

Both majors and non-majors participate in various performance groups such as Chapel Choir, College Choir, Women's







Darren reflects on his summer by stating "I learned how valuable it is to step out in faith sometimes, even when you don't want to do it.





Timothy has a heart for missions and enjoys telling stories about experiences in Haiti. He has strong relations with


New Missions in Haiti and encourages others to become involved with the organization. He challenges his audiences to set the sail of life and allow the Holy Spirit to direct

## Save Lenny Ho

Leonard Houghton and Hazlett Houses are college owned houses where Dr. Richard Perkins and his family developed a student fellowship living arrangement. For over fifteen years Dr. Perkins maintained student groups based on the Golden Rule and Christ's example. His wife, Valerie, said members signed a statement of purpose, which stated several promises. Among these were to not gossip and to show up on time for weekly meetings. Students learned to love Jesus by loving each other intentionally through practice.

The Perkin's fellowship ended in 1993, but the 1993-94 Hazlett and Leonard Houghton House residents proposed a loose continuation of its ideals. The fifteen men at "Lenny Ho" and nine Hazlett women reached out to the community by cleaning land near the soccer field, visiting people at the Houghton Nursing Home, and other activities. They learned

valuable community lessons and prayed together weekly.

Leonard Houghton House will be demolished this summer, according to school plans. The students living in Leonard Houghton and Hazlett Houses are strongly opposed to the administration's decision to tear Leonard Houghton House down instead of repairing the damaged foundation. The site, one block off of Route 19, near the Mobil Mart, was chosen to build seven new townhouses. The student protestors failed to "save Lenny Ho" but managed to communicate with administrators. These residents expressed that living in a fellowship environment has been a crucial element in the lives of past and present students and that the fellowship house idea should be preserved.


and our spiritual growth in God. The most valuable part of being long-term friends and roommates is the spiritual support and maturation we recieve from each other.





## Oregon Extension

Each September about thirty students from Christian colleges across the country converge on the tiny town of Lincoln, Oregon to spend a semester reading, writing, thinking, discussing... and chopping a little wood. Houghton College's Oregon Extension (OE) is an interdisciplinary program run by a community of five professors and their families on the site of a converted logging town on Greensprings Mountain in southern Oregon. Two Houghton students, Julie Squires and myself, joined students from Calvin, Westmont, Messiah, Bethel, Trinity, Gordon, Hope, Eastern, and Wheaton for a fall semester at OE '93.

The living arrangements were a refreshing change from two years of dorm life. I and eleven other students lived in three apartments in a remodeled bunkhouse, while Julie and the remaining students lived in cabins across the street. Since there is no board plan or cafeteria at the OE, a weekly shopping trip to the town of Ashland supplied our food needs. Most of us organized some sort of communal cooking arrangements with our cabin-mates. While some groups went all out for gournet dishes, our cabin specialized in creative ways to use up fifty pounds of rice.

I found the OE to be almost ideal from an academic standpoint. The program was divided into four segments of one class each. The first two dealing with issues of contemporary thought and society, the third dealing with the Christian faith, and the fourth with the human condition. Taking only one course of study at a time enables us to devote all of our academic energy to the subject at hand. Students were almost always prepared and willing to actively engage in lectures,


discussions, and presentation.






provides a place for study groups or when friends need a break, or to play a quick game of euchre or scrabble.



# A GREAT LEADER

In recognition of his thirty-six years of loyal service to Houghton College, we dedicate this year's Boulder to Coach E. Douglas Burke.

Born on December 16, 1928, Coach grew up in the mountains of West Virginia. After graduating from high school, Coach attended Wheaton College, where he received a Bachelor's degree in 1953 and, in 1954, received his Master's from Syracuse University.

Since coming to Houghton in 1958 to teach Physical Educaton, Coach Burke has been an intregal part in initiating many of the programs we enjoy today. He started the downhill and cross-country skiing programs and was also involved in the initiation and promotion of the Initiatives Course and Wilderness Program. Coach has also served as the Athletic Director of the college.

In 1967 he started the Men's Soccer Program and became

the first and only soccer coach the school has had, a position he held for 27 years. During that time, Coach, his teams and his players have all greatly achieved. Coach has been named the NAIA national coach of the year and has also been named area and district coach of the year several times. In November 1990 Coach Burke was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame and in February 1993 he was inducted into the Houghton Hall of Honor. Coach Burke is also a member of the NAIA Ethics Committee.

Coach Burke's teams have been very successful through the years. In addition to many district and area championships, he also coached the NCCAA National Champions in 1979, 1980 and 1986. During his 27 year coaching career, Coach's teams have compiled an overall record of 297 wins, 139 losses and 48 ties.

Under Coach Burke's leadership, his players have enjoyed

great success with the team and have earned many individual honors. Coach's influence has helped his players to excel, many of whom have gone on to become All-Americans.


Coach's dedication to his players is much deeper than their athletic achievements. He has taken a strong interest in the development of the guys spiritually, academically, socially, and athletically. Coach stresses honesty, loyalty, and committment, virtues that he lives by and that earned him the 1978 Olean Times Herald Man of the Year award.
