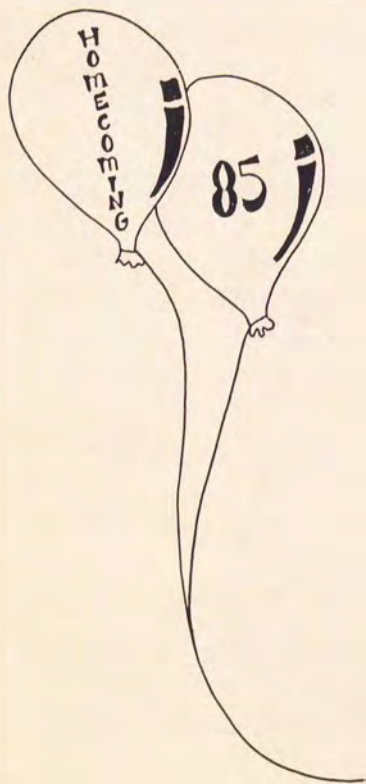




# Homecoming

# Christian Life Emphasis Week

Pastor H. Mark Abbott faced a big responsibility as he walked to Wesley Chapel on Tuesday morning, September 10, 1985. The Houghton Wesleyan Church had flown him in from Seattle, Washington, to solve a perplexing case for Houghton College students: "The Mystery of the Christian Life."

Even with years behind him as a pastor, especially five years as pastor in Houghton, he could not solve the mystery alone. Searching God's word with the magnifying glass of the Holy Spirit, Abbott examined a different subject during each chapel address and evening message of Christian Life Emphasis Week (C.L.E.W.). Every day he uncovered new "CLEWS," including the need to demonstrate Christlike love, waiting on the Lord, using our talents for His glory, receiving God's forgiveness, living a pure life, and believing that God will heal our hurts. All of these "CLEWS" point to the verdict that Abbott and his jury of listeners reached: a mandatory walk of love with Jesus Christ.

The case, difficult to decide, was time consuming for the investigators; it lasted a week. But the solution was worth the time involved because the verdict is a matter of life and death.







# Founders Day

"An Inheritance Worth Keeping." Quoting the apostle Paul from Romans 12:15, he urged us to "Rejoice with those who rejoice . . ." He remembered back to his first contact with Houghton College. As a child he used to watch his father load coal bound for Houghton. Back then the school was a "final destination for Dad's coal." Eventually the younger Bence enrolled as a student. Returning years later as a Homecoming speaker, he admonished students to learn things that textbooks do not cover, and to admit ignorance and to get help even at the possible expense of looking dumb.

In his next point, he defined heritage as "a treasure which should be shared and protected." Bence drew this point from the biblical story of Nabath and his vineyard (1 Kings 21), which he used as a parallel with Houghton. Both Houghton and the vineyard were inheritances given by fathers. Houghton's inherited aspects include her high quality of academics, demonstrated by graduate placement into professional schools and career positions. The faculty also accepts lower pay to insure a quality education at a reasonable cost. Houghton's biblical heritage continues as well. Standards of conduct have changed, but biblical commandments have not. Like Nabath's vineyard, Satan does not want Houghton to be effective for the Lord. As a result, Bence believes "we need to protect our heritage as an inheritance for those to come." He concluded that it should be "protected from erosion and cultivated by stewardship; it is a heritage worth keeping."

Following the address, Herbert Stevenson, chairman of the board of trustees, conferred an honorary doctorate of divinity upon Bence. Mrs. Bence joined her husband on the stage for the presentation. Dean Barnes introduced James Bence as "a giver of good fruit." He has pioneered two churches in Rochester, served as Central New York district Wesleyan Superintendent for thirty years, and he was a member of the Houghton College Board of Trust-

ees. His son Bud is a current trustee. In short, James Bence "has attained good things through diligence," according to President Chamberlain.

Next Alumni Association President Roger Nelson presented Judith Errick-Markham as the 1985 Alumna of the year. Markham, a member of the class of 1963, currently is an editor for Zondervan Publishing Company. Zondervan hired Markham as an Assistant Book Editor in 1968. Since then she has held the positions of Project Editor, General Editor, and Editor-at-Large. In 1982 Zondervan introduced a new imprint in its general division, Judith Markham Books, in recognition of the editorial excellence she has achieved during her years in religious publishing. This imprint is noted for books of exceptional literary merit which make a significant contribution to the world of religious literature and incorporate a unique expression of truth."

The final awards of the Founder's Day convocation went to Seniors who were admitted to Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities. According to Dean Danner, the distinction of being named to Who's Who Among American Colleges and Universities is the highest honor a Houghton College senior can receive. Houghton never selects the quota allowed by Who's Who because Danner believes the award should be more selective. Houghton's criteria for nomination includes academic excellence, involvement in extracurricular activities, good citizenship, service, potential and Christian maturity. The selection committee named fourteen seniors to Who's Who for the 1985-1986 school year. President Chamberlain and Danner presented the certificates to the following students at the end of the Founder's Day convocation: Beth Allen, Jon Bershe, Tom Brookhout, Lucy Figuerua, Merrilie Goodison, Bill Greenway, Joey Jennings, Wendy Kipp, Jamie Mullen, Laura Trasher, Mary Beth Van Antwerp, Bill Wichterman, Ann Wight, and Holly Winters.

Despite a significant cut in student attendance, the Founder's Day convocation commenced on October 11, 1985 at ten o'clock a.m. As always, President Chamberlain shared his opening remarks. He related the college's motto, "Founded on the Rock," to the occasion. "God is the true founder of Houghton." Chamberlain stated that Founder's Day is a day of recognition for those who have demonstrated many years of service to Houghton College. He specifically recognized James Bence and family, present in full to witness the presentation of Bence's honorary degree.

As an interlude between the opening remarks and the Founder's Day address, the Houghton College Choir, with Professor Jean Reigles conducting, ministered through song. Their anthems, "Praise the Name of God with a Song," and "Agnus Dei (O Lamb Of God)," set the tone for the celebration of God's faithfulness.

In his address James Bence, referred to Houghton's heritage as

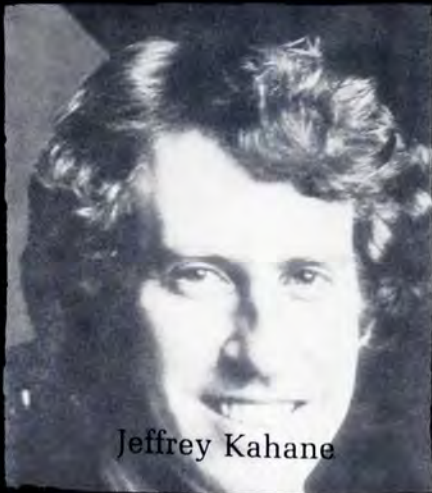

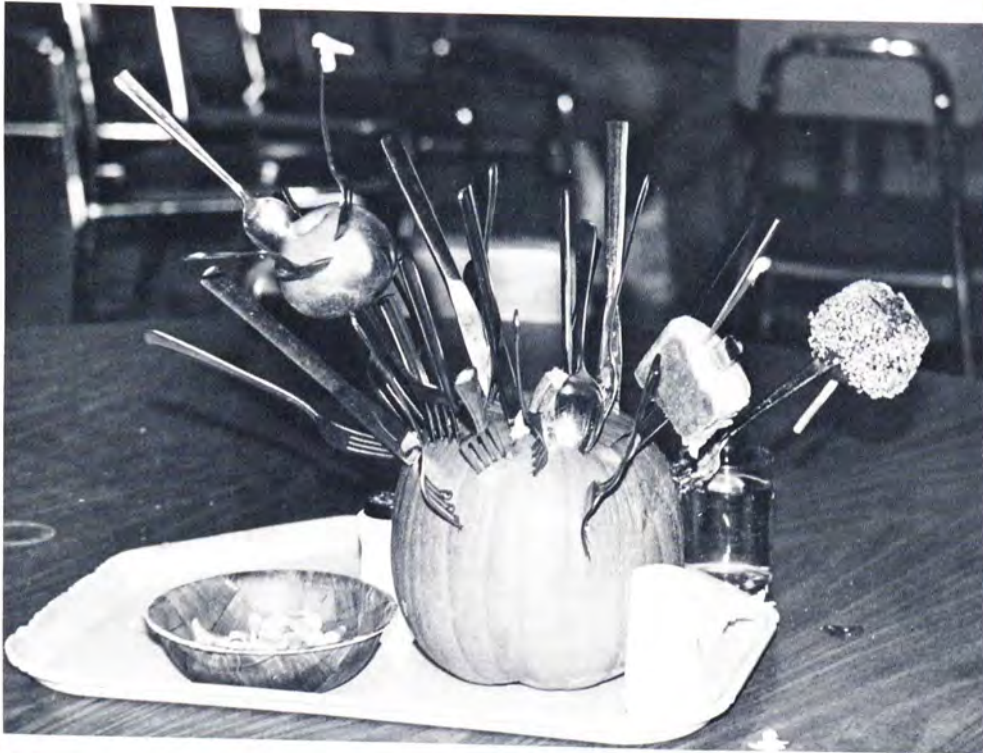

# Cross Country

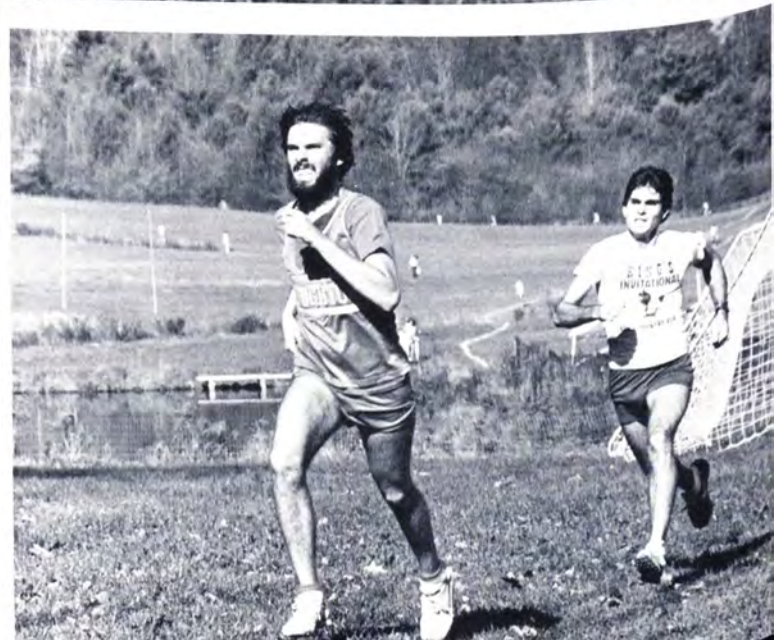

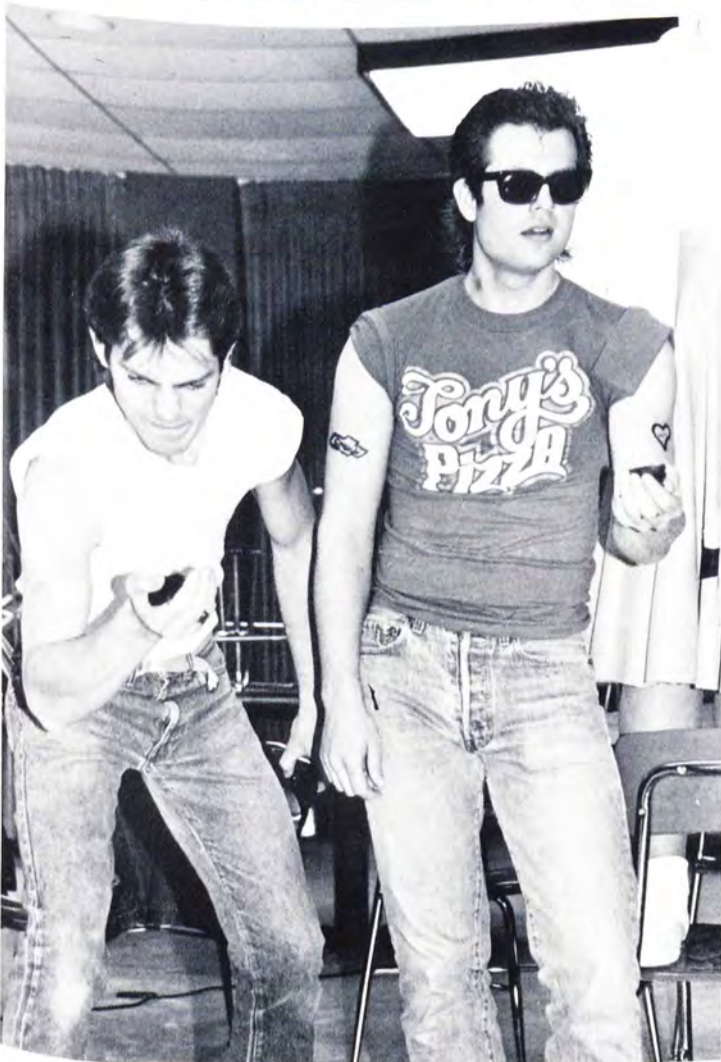














# Meet The Snow King

Although Marion is his home, he spends much of his time away on speaking engagements. This year, he is scheduled for about 150 engagements. These include speaking at colleges, highschoools, camps worldwide. Besides lecturing, his duties as Secretary of Youth also involve writing literature, and directing youth programs.

Commenting on his week as CLEW speaker, Drury said that it is among the most difficult kind of speaking engagement he has, especially at Houghton where students are taught to be critical thinkers. He was very pleased with the seriousness and attentiveness with which the students approached CLEW. His theme of conviction followed by obedience was, to him, his most important message, and he was excited about student decisions to live lives of continuing conviction and obedience.





# Current Issues Day



This year's topic for current Issues Day was Apartheid in South Africa. How should we respond to such injustice as both Christians and American Citizens?

We heard different policy positions articulated by three Christian speakers. Mr. Richard Sincere, the assistant to the president for research of the Ethics and Public Policy Center in Washington, D.C., supported a position similar to constructive engagement. Ms. Di Scott, a native of South Africa who is presently in exile, advocated divestment and shared with us from her personal experiences in South Africa. We also heard from Mr. James Skillen, the director of the Association for Public Justice, who called for action resembling that of the Sullivan Principles.

All three speakers argued a convincing case, at times citing quite contradictory "facts." We were again reminded that policies are more than just policies — there are real and hurting people involved. We were reminded of as well of the complexity of issues and the impossibility of making just decisions about such matters without prayer. Perhaps the words we needed to hear most came from Reverend Samuel Hines of the 3rd. St. Church of God in D.C., who insisted that the only solution to the situation in South Africa is reconciliation. Yes, the blacks, coloreds, and Indians are in bondage to the whites but so too are the whites in bondage to the hatred and bitterness of those they are exploiting. Hines called for forgiveness, humility and love on all sides. This he argued, is the only answer.

# Making Lasting Impressions: Houghton College

**H**OUGHTON COLLEGE PRESS has operated continuously since the teen years of the century. There careers have been determined, romances have hatched, character has been demonstrated, philosophy discussed, and pranks pulled.

All of this has been achieved together with the shop's original mandates: to provide convenient, inexpensive, quality printing, and use student labor. Begun with a 12 by 18-inch, peddle-operated job press, a 28-inch cutter and some hand-type crowded into a Fancher Hall basement room, the shop's next home was a double-sized room in Woolsey Hall. It moved again during the '30s, to the newly built lower arcade between Fancher and Woolsey buildings.

In the early days a faculty member or a student manager ran things, but that changed in May of 1946 when Allen R. Smith took charge. Now, four decades later, Al will retire in July, and college press facilities will be leased to outside management. Al recalls beginning as a printer's "devil," working for his brother, Willard, who'd become manager in 1930. Willard remembers: "Al was a good learner, and rapidly mastered the techniques of our operation." He became a linotype operator as a high school junior.

Al worked in the shop through college, graduating in 1943. Leaving his new wife (Esther Fulton '43) and baby daughter, he began duty as a navy communications officer aboard the USS Minatour off Okinawa. When he mustered out, Al accepted then President Paine's invitation to be shop manager and began work.

Al ticked off changes he's presided over. As volume grew in the '50s, it became impossible to schedule sufficient student labor and the shop added full-time staff. Even so, Al often worked 50-60 hour weeks to meet demand. A student worker

of that period remembers him creating "family time" by cutting his boys' hair in the shop during an evening press run.

It was in 1954 that Esther Smith began working nearly half-time as a linotype operator. With time out for two more children, she continued until 1964 when a full-time letterpress/linotype operator was hired. Subsequently, Esther has been receptionist, written up job orders and handled billing.

Introduction of offset printing followed in 1957. Letterpress is still used for specialty jobs, but its decline began then. The shop moved to expanded, air-conditioned space adjacent to the new maintenance center on July 4, 1962. Now offset volume has passed 1,000 jobs a year, a quick print system purchased five years ago is approaching five million impressions.

College press produces resumes and recital programs, memos, syllabi and tests. Longer runs range from *Milieu* and the *Star*, to alumni and development mailings, letterheads and envelopes by the 100,000. Outside jobs run from church bulletins and district journals to golf score cards. Under the lease agreement with Register Graphics of Randolph, NY, the shop's remaining four employees will continue to produce much of that work. Register Graphics will upgrade some equipment and become the supplier for all four-color production. (See trustee item on page 21).

Such is the stuff of business as usual and balance sheets, but remarks by former shop workers, many of them associated with printing to this day, suggest the larger impact of College Press and the Smiths.

When Jim Bence '37 arrived at Houghton as a freshman, the print shop staff numbered three. One of them, Barney Howe, was a senior, so a general chore boy and (eventual) linotype operator was wanted. Bence got the job, learned well enough to run linotype for his hometown paper in the summers,

then managed the shop after he graduated in 1937. He had more than 20 student employees, but recalls of the youthful Al Smith: "He was very dependable and proficient. . . less involved in some of the shop tom-foolery than some of the other employees, including his older brother, Willard." Later as a pastor and district superintendent, Bence continued to use college press for printing, receiving "quality workmanship, courteous and prompt service."

Oliver Karker '45 learned printing as a student in the 1940s. "Back then we all filled in wherever necessary. . . I was always grateful in later years for the all-around knowledge," he says. For 30 years Karker was a missionary to Swaziland, administering the printing work of the Nazarene Church, then spending five years in Beirut evangelism, "where my knowledge of printing helped in making contact with a firm which willingly accepted our layouts for printing in Arabic and Armenian. . . I am certain that the opportunity for service as missionaries would never have been ours had it not been for the printing experience gained at Houghton College Press. . . During my work there I gained respect for the concept of doing the best possible piece of work on every job at all times."

Henry Koval '51, who has been with World Book for the last 25 years, recalls his print shop days. "We worked all kinds of hours; before classes, after classes and late at night. . . I remember hand-setting posters for Artist Series. . . I remember Al most of all as a good friend. We all respected him as a boss, but it was more than that. . . Al encouraged me." On a social note Koval concludes: "My friend Merle Baer, who ran linotype, and his girl friend Marge Helfers, thought I needed more dating. . . They bugged me to the point I needed to date someone to get them off my back. Marge suggested her roommate, Anne. . . Anne and I have been married 35 years now! I recall that Al smiled a lot at all this."

Priscilla Bence Andrews '61, was shop receptionist-proofreader for four years. She observes that "In the days before college counselors, Al and Esther fulfilled the role of mentor to shop employees. . . They worked well as a team. . . as few husbands and wives can in the work world and at home, too." Priscilla ends, "Al was fair, but demanding. When something went out of the shop it was done right and we were all held responsible for our part. . . Today in an administrative position I expect my secretary to send out 'perfect' letters, but I also try to follow [Smith's] example of being sympathetic, understanding and caring."

One-time *Star* managing editor Dean Wilson '68, worked at the shop for 13 months after he graduated. Today as a fire protection engineer with Industrial Risk Insurers, Wilson observes: "Many times I have used knowledge gained from Al in working with large printing houses on problems at their facilities. . . But more than this, Al taught me the importance of expending

whatever effort was needed to do a job in the best possible way. . . I was extremely impressed with Al's dedication to his family and to the family of God."

Warren Foulk '56, in the printing and publishing business for 30 years, says, "Al inspired me to seek for excellence in printing. Whenever I return to Houghton, I usually go to the print shop first." Foulk printed at Houghton for five years as a student, and was on staff for two years. He adds, "Esther shared Al's interest in the press and made an important contribution to its operation."

Harris Earl '46 has been a Wesleyan missionary-printer in Colombia, SA, for 30 years. It's a large operation printing tracts, brochures and books. In 1944 Harris was learning the game at Houghton press when "press work and head-waiting were the top paying student jobs at 50 cents an hour." Earl credits then manager Willard Smith for suggesting missionary printing as a career possibility, and says Al has been a valuable consultant, "especially when we converted to offset and again before we got computer typesetting equipment in 1984."

When Ray Coddington '47 was working on the *Star* as a freshman, he little knew that he was laying the foundation for employment during periods of furlough from missionary radio work in Liberia, and for the past 15 years, during which he has specialized in camera work. Of Al's witness, Ray says: "Al openly shares personal and spiritual experiences with salesmen."

During his 40 years as manager, Al's community involvements have included 33 years as a volunteer fireman, 20 years as justice of the peace and more terms than he can count as a church trustee. Then there have been crash printing courses for missionaries on furlough, plus trouble shooting by tape and short wave radio.

Concurrent with all of this has been a 20-year involvement with the Amateur Radio Missionary Service organization. Much of that time Al has been treasurer. Since 1971, when he and Esther spent three weeks at mission radio station ELWA in Monrovia, Liberia, Al has purchased and shipped supplies for the mission press he helped set up there while he was working at the radio station. In retirement, they envision the possibility of service on other mission fields.

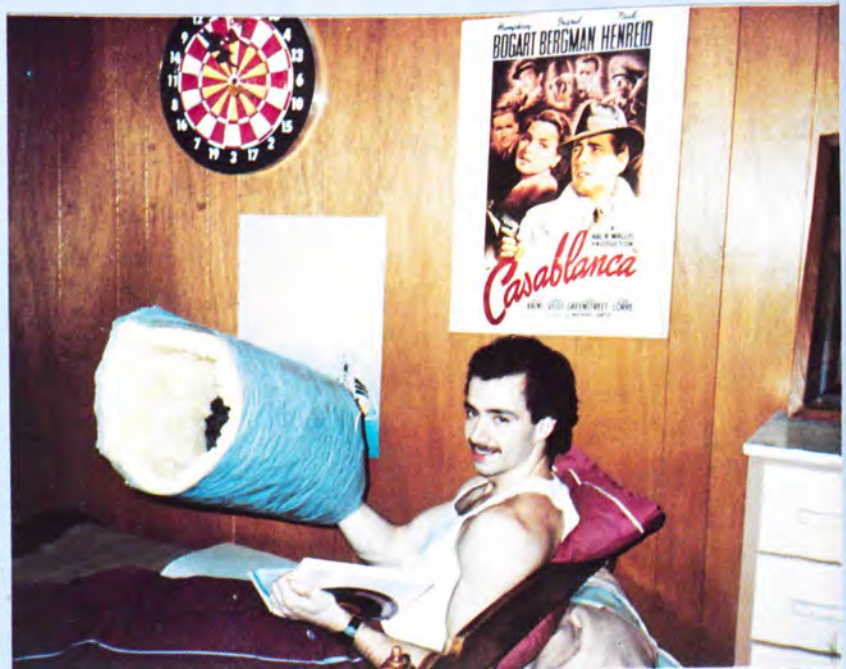












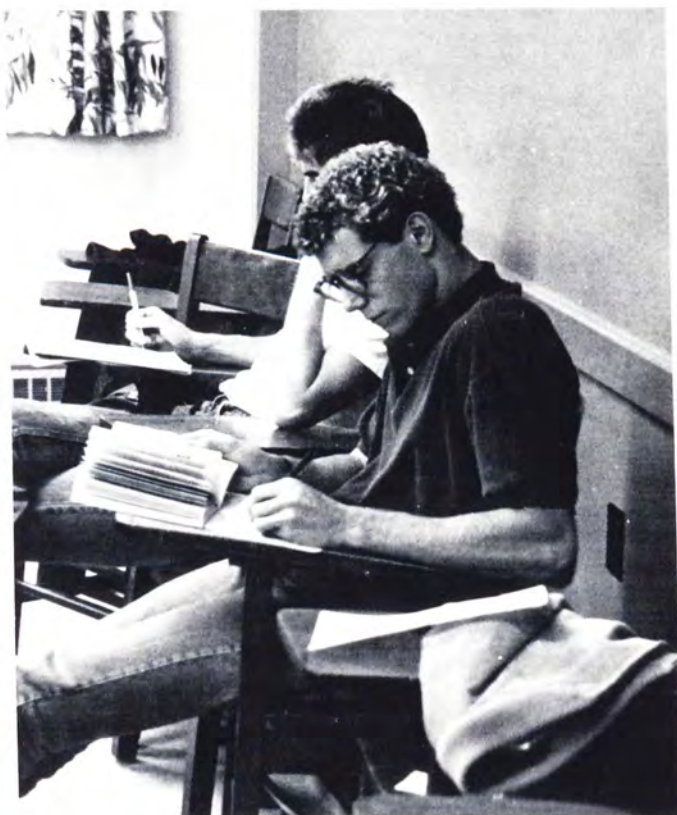














# ORGANIZATIONS

At the NCCAA National meet in Marion, Indiana, Mary McCullough finished third in both the 1,500 and 3,000 meter races. Paul Allen took fourth in the 400 meter dash, and third in the 1,600 meter relay with teammates Wes Dunham, Greg Gidman and John Monroe.

Houghton records were set by the 1,600 meter team at 3:27.8 and by Paul Allen in the 400 meter dash at 50.2.

The Women runners set more records as Stephanie Button took the 400 meter hurdles at 1:27.4 and Julie Button took the 200 meter dash at 27.2 and the triple jump at 32' and  $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Crystal Climenhaga tied Carol Wyatt's meter record at 13.2 and Gloria Mosher finished the assault on the record book by taking the 100 meter high hurdles in 17.2.



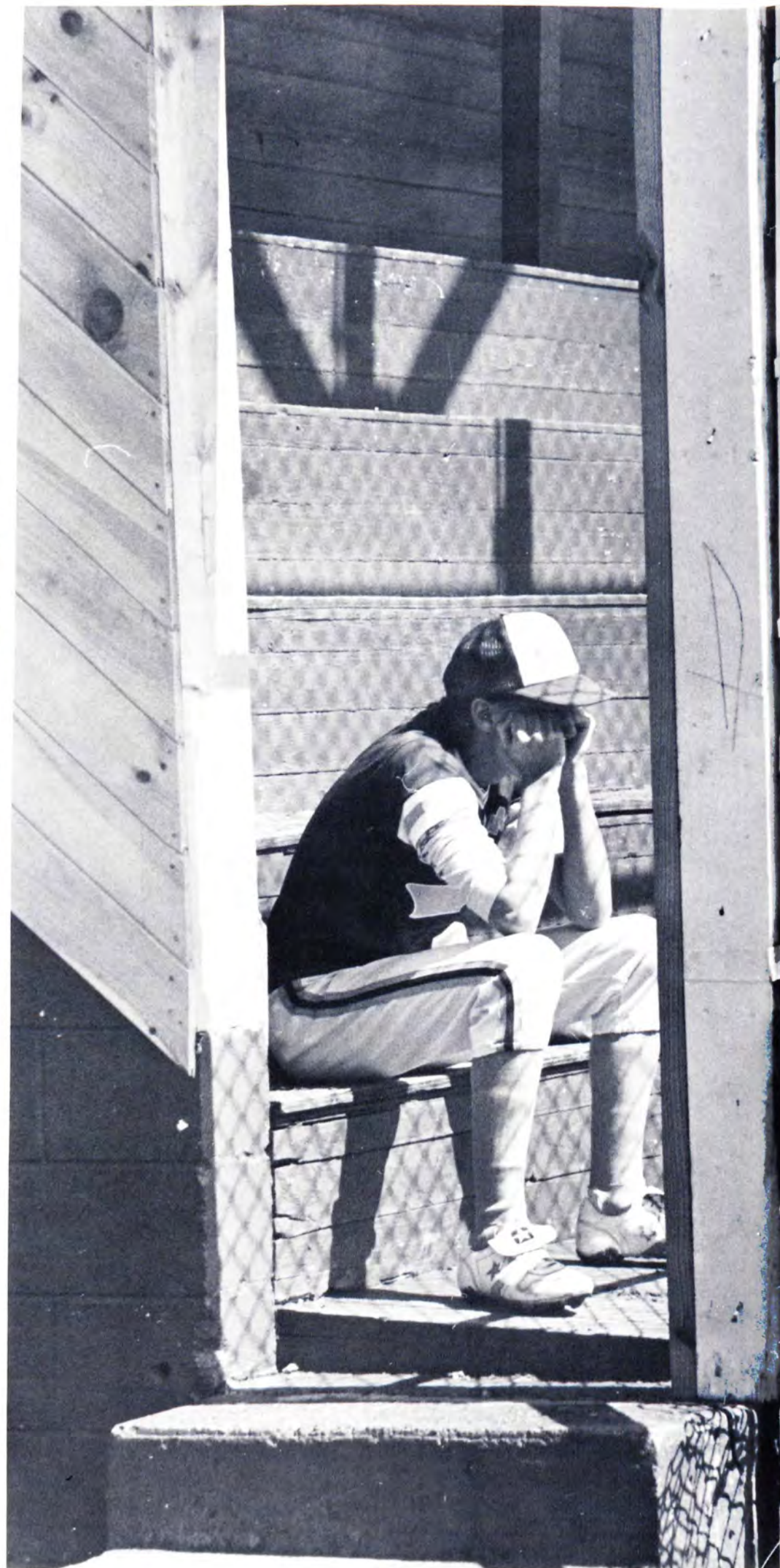

# What's Happened?

Super Bowl XX pinned the Chicago Bears against the New England Patriots. After their wide 46-10 victory, the Bear's Jim McMahon and Kevin Butler celebrate on the sidelines.



Apartheid continued to be a major issue in South Africa. In the photo, a white man flees from a jeering group of stone-throwing blacks in downtown Johannesburg. President P.W. Botha continued to "keep order," claiming that "nobody is going to stop me."



International terrorism increased in 1985. On the right, Shiite hijackers overtake a Trans World Airline jet with 145 passengers and 8 crew members. From Greece the terrorists took the plane to Beirut, then to Algeria, and then back to Beirut. They released most of the passengers within days, but 39 were held for 19 days. One American hostage was killed. Because of instances like this, many tour groups cancelled trip plans.







NASA made history when the agency selected school-teacher Christa McAuliffe to be the first civilian to go into space aboard the shuttle Challenger. Millions watched during the January 28, 1986, launch. Seventy-three seconds after liftoff Challenger exploded, killing all seven of the crew, including McAuliffe. Amidst a nation of half-staff appreciation, President Reagan said, "they slipped the surly bonds of earth to touch the face of God." Critics jeered NASA for proceeding with the space program before pinpointing the malfunction that caused the explosion.



Ronald Reagan frightened the nation when he needed surgery to remove a malignant tumor in his lower intestine. The 74-year-old president was back in the Oval Office within weeks hardly acting like the Nation's oldest president ever. Upon resuming his powers, Reagan quipped, "Gimme a pen. I feel fit as a fiddle."



# What's Happened Con't

1985 marked the ten-year anniversary of the fall of the Saigon government in Vietnam. Many Vets from the conflict made the pilgrimage to Washington to honor the more than 58,000 dead or missing in action whose names are inscribed on the Vietnam Memorial. One vet said, "Most Vietnam Vets greet one another by saying, Welcome home. We do that because no one else did."

Philadelphia police created a stir when they dropped a small bomb on a building to evict the radical group MOVE. Instead of destroying only the MOVE fortified rowhouse, an entire city block burned destroying almost sixty homes. One Philly resident reacted by saying, "The neighborhood was here and now it's gone."

Cincinnati Reds player-manager Pete Rose surpassed Ty Cobb's record of 4,191 hits in September of 1985. The historic 4,192 hit was a single to left field on a 2-1 pitch from San Diego Padres right-hander Eric Snow with one out in the bottom of the first inning. Said the humble Rose, "I think people will forgive me for breaking Cobb's record. We both loved to hit and hated to lose."

1985 was the year of the Boss. Bruce Springsteen toured the nation, warbling tunes about Vietnam veterans, steelworkers, and factory workers. Reminding concert goers that he was "Born in the U.S.A." (New Jersey, to be exact), Springsteen heightened American Nationalism.







In November 1985 a long dormant volcano erupted leaving over 20,000 people dead or missing. Entire towns virtually disappeared under molten rock and mud. Countries throughout the world responded with disaster relief funds amounting to millions of dollars. Houghton raised \$2,862 through the Senate Charity Drive to aid the volcano victims.



November's Geneva summit between President Reagan and Soviet Leader Mikhail Gorbachev did not accomplish a whole lot, but it increased hope for improved U.S.-Soviet relations. For a better relationship to emerge, things will not come easily. According to Gorbachev, "If we really want to succeed, both sides are going to have to do an awful lot of work."



The American people rushed to the aid of earthquake victims, paying for clean-up and restoration projects which will take years to complete. "It looked as if a giant stepped on the buildings," said John Galin of the earthquake that hit Mexico City, leaving some 20,000 dead in September 1985. The devastating series of quakes registered 8.1 and 7.5 on the richter scale.

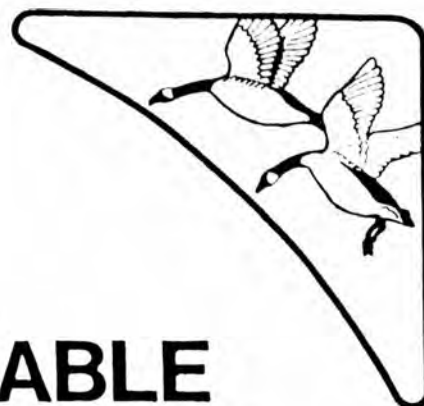
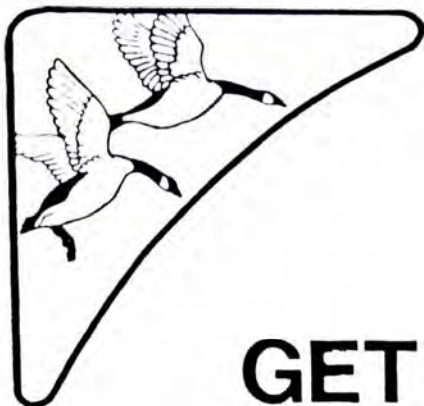

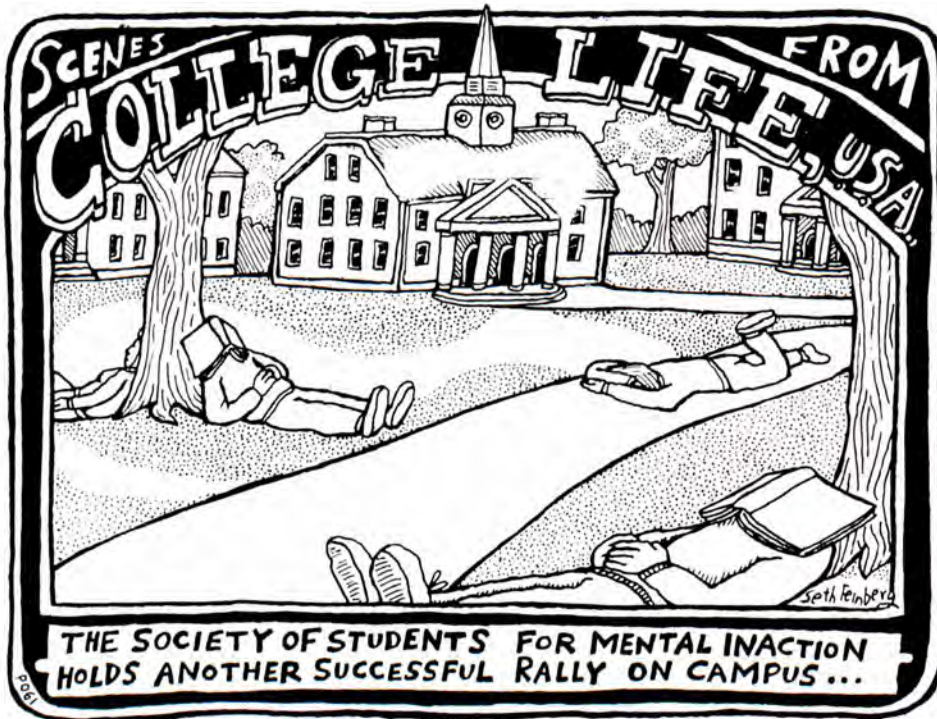
