

Some Summer Things

On July 26 Houghton College held an all-day acution of items stored in three warehouses-the former Brever milk plant, district school house and recreation hall. Furniture, fabric, kitchen equipment, musical instruments, a truck —all were objects of eager bidding that netted the college \$5,500. Too, the milk plant building was sold.

In the crowd observing the auction was Harriet Meeker, Class of '16, back in Houghton for the first time in 30 years. A retired teacher from Succasunna, NJ, she was visiting her onetime pupil, emeritus art professor Marjorie Stockin. During her visit Miss Meeker showed me the World War I memorial to her brother Harry, William Russell and Curtis Rogers-all alumni killed in that conflict. Three now giant hemlocks stand silent tribute to their sacrifice. Made a note to recommend formal demarcation of the trees at the October centennial planning comittee.

Officially representing the college among the many students in ministry over the summer was Son Touched, which completed its eighth tour-8,000 miles, 54 concerts in 48 churches before nearly 8,000 people. Group founder and Church Relations director Ralph Biesecker called the tour the best ever. Nine member Malachi, on its first outing, journied 5,000 miles to 31 churches and reached 3,000 people. Both groups overnighted in homes, another outreach.

This fall Blesecker is working with a group of 140 students interested in outreach to form several new teams for ministry this year. He also hopes to field an athletic team for camps next summer.

1980 PRESIDENT'S REPORT Houghton College

Education with Unity and Purpose

In the third century the Carthaginian Christian theologian Tertullian asked "What has Athens to do with Jerusalem, the Academy with the Church?" He answered his own question by stating "We have no

need for curiosity since Jesus Christ, nor for inquiry since Evangel." Sixteen centuries later John Henry Cardinal Newman took the opposite position when he asserted in The Idea of a University, ". . . all branches of knowledge are connected together because the subject - matter of knowledge is intimately united in itself as being the acts and the work of the Creator."

Houghton College insists along with many other Christian liberal arts colleges that Tertullian was wrong and Newman was right. Houghton affirms a long tradition which insists that it is appropriate and necessary that Christians pursue knowledge with assurance that such a pursuit can enhance our understanding of God and all that He has created.

Today many schools place great emphasis upon specialized and vocational education. The basic question such institutions pose in developing their curriculum and their courses is "What can the learner do with the information and the knowledge we provide?" The liberal arts college instead asks the question: "What will all this knowledge and information do to the learner?" As a Christian liberal arts college Houghton strives to provide the models, the knowledge and the understanding essential for students to recognize and develop every aspect of what it means to be human—body, soul, mind and spirit.

Addison Leitch in his essay A Christian View of Man captures much of the meaning and the method of the Christian liberal arts college when he states:

"This dust of the earth has to do with many of the subjects we teach - math and physics, economics and sociology for example, and I mean no minimization at this point. And you cannot teach Christian physics any more than you can teach blue mathematics. They are their own justified disciplines but there is a difference here in a Christian college; It is a question of the dust of the earth being inbreathed with the breathe of God. Is there any inspiration - about ends as well as means. about meanings, truth pointing to the Truth, about the wonder to be found everywhere? Higher physics and higher math will push a man into philosophy if only in a consideration of what he is doing really and why . . . it is very dangerous to try to make a Bible course out of physics or even of biology, but Christian liberal arts colleges can do two things in any discipline; they can hire Christian teachers and they then make living Christianity a live option . . . The advantage of the Christian college is that while choices are being made Christianity can be intelligently presented as one of the options."

This annual report includes information about people and programs and projects combining to create a climate that will help students grow in their commitment to Christ and in their concept of what it means to be scholar-servants.

Academics

Under Dr. Shannon's capable leadership curriculum is constantly added to or revised.

During the past year the faculty identified a need for improving student advisement, Mathematics Professor Fred Parker coordinated the development of responses to this need, signally the introduction of a mentor program. This program will quarantee each freshman an advisor who will be concerned about helping him or her understand all aspects of college life and participate fully in the wide range of opportunities available. Mentor activities will be closely coordinated with that of other faculty advisors who provide curriculum guidance. The program will also provide students additional information and assistance in selecting and entering careers. We anticipate that these improvements will increase student satisfaction and performance and so improve retention.

Since 1936, Houghton College has offered art courses. Ortlip family members introduced visual arts here and laid a firm foundation for the major approved last year by faculty, trustees and the State Education Department. Already the art major has attracted seven students and it promises to help Houghton recruit and retain many additional students in the future.

Added to the science program was a computer minor. Students now have access to additional courses in computer science and 10 computer terminals are used regularly by those minoring in computer science, along with students in other disciplines. The search continues for a faculty member with specialized com-

puter training and experience.

Last Spring the Carnahan-Jacksor Foundation of Jamestown, NY, approval Houghton's proposal for a \$50,000 granto improve audio-visual facilities and equipment with special attention to upgrading the television studio. That granhas been used to acquire new color equipment and the studio is being completed. These facilities will enhance educational opportunities for communication students and will enable the college to prepare video tapes for educational and promotional purposes.

Each year the National Science Foundation funds a limited number of student research projects at colleges and universities nationwide. Last year six Houghton students were honored when their project researching the antiseptic activity of silve electrolytes was selected for funding. Their work, guided by Professor Larry, Christensen, has been productive and wanticipate that the project will receive continued funding leading to publication of several professional papers.

Houghton graduates continue to be admitted in large numbers to some of America's finest graduate-professional schools in theology, medicine and law plus a wide range of other graduate schools in the 34 majors Houghton offers.

We applaud the outstanding work of Richard Alderman, Wayne MacBeth and the entire admissions staff. Their efforts, with major assistance from faculty, students and staff, produced a 22% increase in applications and the largest group of new students to enter Houghton for more than a decade.

Alumni

Throughout the past academic year Colonel Silas Molyneaux served as Alumni Association President and Dr. William Tromble continued to provide administrative leadership and assistance to the association.

For the first time in its history, Houghton had a separate annual alumni fund appeal this past year. Alumnus Chet Rudd was the national chairman for this drive and he was assisted by some 150 alumni volunteers. Their efforts produced nearly \$65,000. This annual alumni fund will support the alumni office expenses related to the fund itself. Additional monles will be applied to the current funds of the college, though in unusual circumstances the Alumni Board may identify a specific project as their choice.

In July the summer alumni weekend theme was It's About Time. Besides the sessions devoted to time use, highlights included special recognition and anniversary classes. The 300 alumni participating, enjoyed an antique auto show as well as an auction which included the sale of bricks from Bedford gym. (To be distributed after Bedford is demolished!)

Chapter meetings are one of the major activities of the alumni association. Thirty-six chapters help alumni keep informed about current campus happenings and provide opportunities for renewing personal friendships and shared college memories. Six Chapters have provided scholarship support, either for international students or for students from their own geographic area.

Most importantly alumni show their loyalty by urging their children to attend Houghton. Last year and again this fall, half a hundred new students were children of alumni.

Buffalo Campus

Dr. Ronald Strumbeck is in his fourth year as Buffalo Suburban Campus Dean. Under his leadership the Continuing Education program has grown rapidly and the number of regular and full time students has also increased. Last year that increase was almost 10 percent over the previous year. Enrollment approached 400 students in the regular Continuing Education Program. Another 600 additional individuals attended special "Walk Through The Bible" seminars.

During 1979-80 Buffalo Suburban Campus cooperated with five other area colleges in offering a college course by educational television. While enrollment was small the course brought Houghton College to the attention of many people in metropolitan Buffalo and has served as the basis for increasing educational television offerings this year. The number of student teachers and business interns from the main campus based at Buffalo increased significantly. This traffic helped increase use of dormitories and produced income from auxiliary services there.

A Ten For Ten Thousand fund raising plan was introduced at Buffalo campus. Using volunteers from the metropolitan area and assistance from the main campus, the program achieved its first real goal of raising \$10,000 to support Buffalo campus current expenses. It also laid a foundation for volunteer organization which will benefit the campus in the future.

The Buffalo campus budget remains a challenge and concern as we again had a modest deficit. These deficits are declining and the value of the campus is increasing. Too, we are within two years of liquidating the capital debt. Consequently we will be able to operate that campus with a balanced budget if we achieve another 10 percent enrollment increase there.

The Buffalo campus can help Houghton College to serve the greater Buffalo area effectively, while offering enormous potential for enriching and enlarging the educational options available to students at the main campus. In 1980-81 we will seek to capitalize upon these opportunities.

Business


Treasurer and Business Manager Kenneth Nielsen and those who report to him are responsible for budget preparation and control, management of auxiliary enterprises, maintenance of buildings and grounds, endowment investment and supervision or representation of the college in renovation and construction projects.

This past year projects have been finished and others are nearing completion in each of the above categories. The Fancher Hall renovation project was completed last March at a cost of almost \$249,000. Over the summer a modern, well-equipped Health Center has been built in the basement of East Hall, a CETA grant of \$248,000 helping to finance much of this addition. A gas well was completed and lines have been installed enabling Houghton to use its gas to heat five campus buildings. The \$175,000 cost of this project was met by grants from the Department of Energy and the New York State Energy Department.

The new physical education center was the most challenging and time consuming capital project this year. College trustee and contractor, Lawrence Olson, proposed a pre-engineered building which enabled the college to save a million dollars compared with the cost of a conventionally constructed building. Even at this reduced cost we have been able to retain the teaching stations and the recreational facilities of the original plan. Robert Fiegl, as the construction superintendent, and Kernielsen, as the college representative have worked carefully with Mr. Olson the help the college obtain a building that will add enormously to curricular and college contains a continuation of this center of October 11.

Of potential long-range value to the college was the creation of the Willard. Houghton Foundation to increase the flexibility of the college in receiving gift and making investments for Houghton benefit.

Despite careful cost controls by most dipartments last year, the college incurred deficit of more than \$50,000. For 1980-8 we have projected a surplus which we offset last year's deficit. Achieving this got will require universal adherence to budget plus God's blessing and help in meetic; fund raising goals. Especially important wibe additional major gifts for the gymnasium so that the college can avoid adding bulking debt service to the current fund budget.



The graphs above show where Houghton income dollars come from and point out the growing emphasis on tuition. Experts say tuition should constitute no more than one third of a college's budget.

Institutional Advancement

1974-80 was Dr. George Huff's fourth and final year as Executive Director of Institutional Advancement. Though he has retired, I am pleased that Dr. Huff will continue part-time as a deferred giving counselor. Again last year giving for all purposes—current funds, restricted gifts and capital projects—exceeded \$1,000,000. Of that amount nearly \$400,000 was for the new physical education center.

As the word "development" suggests. certain aspects of obtaining necessary financial support for Houghton require longterm cultivation, but their eventual impact is crucial. For example, during the past year the development office held several estate planning seminars to help people achieve Christian stewardship goals in planning their estate distribution. Out of these sessions nine individuals requested assistance in preparing wills that included Houghton. Others may have taken similar action without our knowledge or assistance. The eventual impact of such activity is illustrated by two estates closed this past academic year. One will provide music scholarships in memory of Dr. Robert W. Woods while the Werder estate has made a significant contribution to the construction of the physical education center.

For some people gifts in kind are most attractive and beneficial to the support of Houghton. During the past year major gifts in this category have helped in the completion of the Fancher Hall project, the new health center and especially the new gymnasium in which the plywood subfloor was provided by trustee John Mervine and the hard maple floors for the racquetball courts and the gymnasium were provided by businessmen Don Meyers and John Yansick. A major unitrust was also consumated during the year.

The most eloquent evidence of the success of the various development efforts is the listing of the thousands of alumni, other friends and organizations who supported the ministry of Houghton College in 1979-80. Broad based individual support—often sacrificial—is essential, both for the significant total it produces and for the gifts it enables us to attract from major donors, foundations and corporations.

Dr. Huff's anticipated resignation led to



a lengthy search for his successor. After identifying and interviewing many candidates. Dr. Jon Balson was chosen as Executive Director of External Affairs. His modified title Indicates an administrative reorganization in which the efforts of all those responsible for external affairs will be coordinated through Dr. Balson's office. I believe this modified structure will facilitate cooperation among and between these offices and so increase their effectiveness. Further strengthening the development effort has been the addition of Mr. Devo Montanye to direct government relations and Mr. David Jack to direct an expanded phoneathon for current fund giving.

The creation of the Willard J. Houghton Foundation (mentioned earlier) will complement the President's Advisory Council on Excellence (PACE), which continues to grow in stature and effectiveness. PACE through its group sessions or its individual members has provided helpful ideas about programs, facilities and financial support.





Student Development

Dr. Charles Massey has given creative and effective leadership to the Student Development office which, while it appears last alphabetically in this report, is a central and crucial part of Houghton College Life.

This office worked closely and carefully with the business office to plan the new health center and cooperated with the physical education department to develop policies and procedures for the use of the new gymnasium.

As a liberal arts college Houghton rightfully stresses the overall development of its students. However, an important and legitimate concern of students are the jobs they will have while studying at Houghton, as well as the careers they may enter upon graduation. To meet this need a Job locator Program was established to assist students in finding summer employment. It is a significant addition to the total services offered by the Career Development Center.

A major activity and accomplishment of the student development council was the creation of a new judicial system. Its elements relate to dormitory life as well as to to campus standards of conduct. Procedures and structures which have been approved by the faculty and the Board of Trustees include improved means for maintaining and enforcing the standards of the college while protecting the rights of individuals, striking a healthy balance between informal campus procedures and a highly technical, complicated judicial system.

Last year a new chapel seating and attendance taking procedure was implemented. Faculty and staff sit with groups of 12 to 15 students whose attendance they record. This encourages greater contact among faculty, staff and students and provides a more personal approach to dealing with chapel attendance problems-another example of continuing efforts to keep Houghton a warm, human and personal place.

The Student Development office with assistance from Conferences Director Barbara Hora, designed, advertised and implemented an Elderhostel program. This program which brings senior citizens to campus was very well received and we anticipate further expansion.

Enrollment Hits 1,200

With 436 new students admitted at the main campus and 132 attending at Buffalo, Houghton's enrollment is at a six-year high. Forty-five freshmen earned state regents scholarships and five are merit scholars. Women comprise 60 percent of enrollment and 146 students commute. Here 70l of the 1,140 students are New Yorkers, but 35 states and 10 foreing countries are represented.

Though 12 students transferred to main campus this fall, Buffalo's enrollment is up nearly 16 percent with even male/female distribution. Fifty-nine new suburban campus students are freshmen.

Main campus frosh number 357, accompanied by a record 116 transfers. Since there are only 218 seniors, odds appear good for a main campus enrollment next fall over the 1,200 mark for the first time in years. Another factor/goal in achieving that level will be improved student retention. (See President's Report, page 4).

Forty-eight seniors are student teaching in 15 western New York school systems—30 in elementary education, 5 in secondary schools and 7 in music. Six main campus students are particlipating in business internships in metro Buffalo.

Summer Conferences

Last summer the college hosted 21 conferences, 300 overnight vacationer/guests and participated in the national Elderhostel program.

Conference size ranged from 1,000 United Methodists to a 12-member Canadian family reunion. Cheerleading camps, church retreats, academic conferences and two daily public school recreation programs were some others.

Since the mid-'70s 300 colleges in 38 states have joined to offer Elderhostel—"vacation with a purpose for those over 60." Forty-five persons attended Houghton's initial five-day session in August. Drs. Stockin and Munro interacted with attendees over "Hot Issues in Bioethics" and "What's in a Word", and Dr. Gillette offered historical lectures. Elderhostelers attended a com-

munity youth play, visited Letchworth Park and participated in sports and socials coordinated by emeriti professor Alice Pool.

Gas Well Tapped

Fourteen months after Houghton College drilled an experimental gas well near its Stebbins Playing Fields, tests are complete, US Department of Energy and New York State Energy Resource Development officials call the well "above average" for its type, the valve opening ceremony is history and gas is flowing to five college buildings—Shenawana and East Hall residences, the new physical education center, Fine Arts and old Health Center. That's half of the college's needs.

Drilling and testing cost \$168,207 essentially paid for by the two agencies. Tests showed a daily yield of 135,000 cubic feet at 250 pounds pressure. Devoinian shale, the source of the gas in Houghton's well (see MILIEU, June 1979) covers much of New York's Southern Tier, and there is hope that wells similar to this one can reduce regional dependence on foreign sources.

Houghton must reimburse NYSERDA first year savings on gas, benefits thereafter accruing to the college. Treasurer Kenneth Nielsen, who spearheaded the project, says savings will be realized in 18 months.

Profs. McCallum, Hegberg Resign

Professor of Psychology since 1967, Dr. Floyd F. McCallum left in August to become Professor of Psychology at John Wesley College and Minister of Counseling at First Wesleyan Church, High Point, NC. In addition to teaching responsibilities, he will oversee the college's accounting procedures and offer a variety of counseling services through the church. Feeling "the Lord wants us to do this," he explained the new post permits him to continue his two major emphases-counseling and teaching-and adds the opportunity to preach. "All three areas of ministry will be available to me as long as I'm physically, mentally and emotionally able to serve-about as good a setup as you can have for retirement!"

Dr. McCallum views his Houghton years as ones of fulfilling counseling and teaching ministry—"The Lord enabled us to advance the psychology department in terms of numbers and strength and accomplish something worthwhile here." "Houghton is a good place to serve; we had planned to live here til retirement until this opportunity arose." McCallums will move into the Wesleyan Arms Apartments, the retirement center in the High Point Wesleyan complex incorporating grade school, nursing care facility, day care center, church and college.

Dr. Susan Hegberg, Associate Professor of organ last year, has accepted a similar post at Susquehanna University, Selinsgrove, PA.
