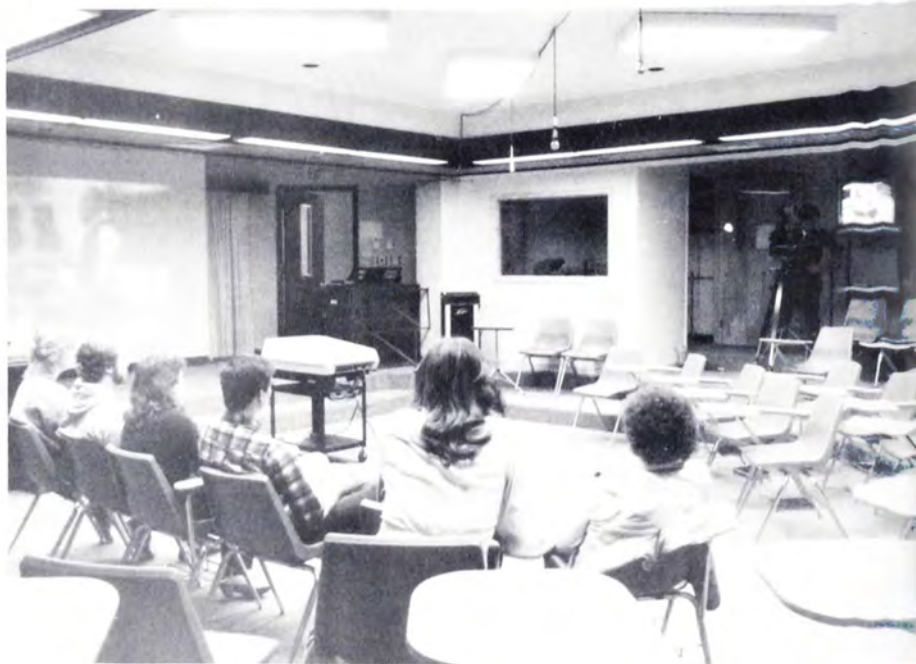
Student Senate

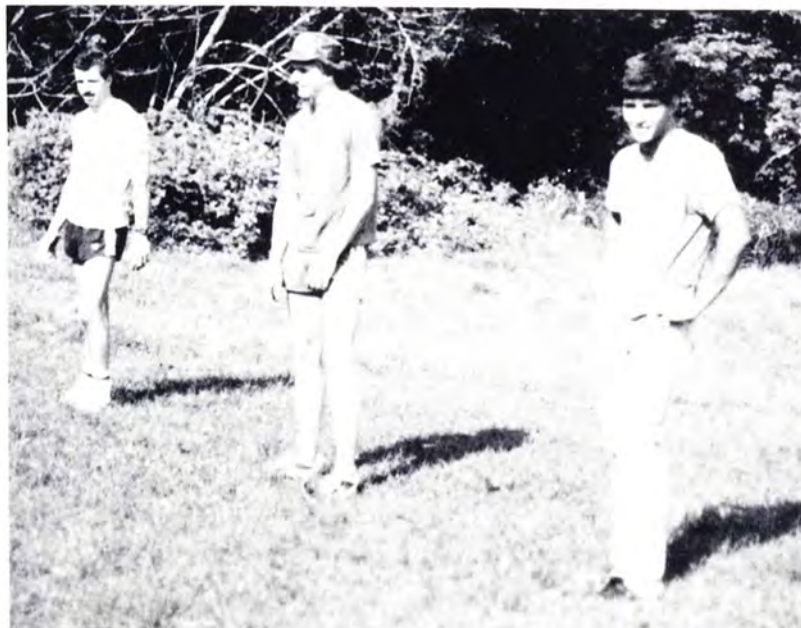

The Artist Series began its season on the Houghton Campus on October 12, 1984, with a performance by the Elmer Iseler Singers under the direction of Dr. Elmer Iseler. This twenty member group, which was formed in Canada, was in Houghton in 1982.

The concert began with "Gloria Deo" written by Healy William. They held a warm rich legato tone throughout the piece. They performed three motets from the choral words of Johannes Brahms. "Del Jubilo" was composed by Dutch composer Robert Keppener. The choraliers performed their final number, a suite of twentieth century Canadian music composed by Harry Somers with flair and charm. The two arousing encores brought a proper conclusion to a fantastic performance.

The second Artist Series of the season, Anthony and Joseph Paratore, two brilliant pianists, provided an exasperating experience in the art of duo-pianism. The captivating repertoire including Poulenc's Double Concerto and Brahm's Sonata with two pianos was performed with intensity and intrinsic harmony. □

Dr. Budd Bence was the 1984 CLEW speaker; he was a 1966 graduate from Houghton and is now teaching at Marion College in Marion, Indiana. He claims to have been intimidated by the fact that he was to speak to a 1984 Houghton audience. "If I was on another campus, I wouldn't be making the kind of transferences and identities from my college days. I would simply go to Wheaton and talk to the Wheaton students of 1984. When I come to Houghton, I'm so wrapped up in the nostalgia that I end up talking to my peers and my class and then totally miss the point, that is, where the students of 1984 are today."

From his point of view "the spiritual growth should not be a crisis. Afterall, it is a must." Even though cultural standards and values are different, spiritual needs always remain essential. The same questions that were raised in the 60's are still being asked today.

Spiritual growth should be like a doorway which Christians open but never pass through. Bence refers to the fact that this is where culture affects the Christian campus. However, the problem with our society today is apathy. "We're living in prosperous times, we're basically at peace, and it's well documented that collegians today are wrapped up in themselves and a 'who cares about the rest of the world' attitude. That transfers immediately to the spiritual life. There's a lack of passion, of intensity."

A good beginning to spiritual growth and being intense about it is "reflection." Consider your actions, and the verses you read, and then apply them in your life. "The real spiritual growth doesn't come when you read a chapter a day but when we apply that chapter and ask ourselves how it really affects us."

The CLEW services during the fall semester of 1984 were ones that many students will hopefully remember and use in their daily lives. □

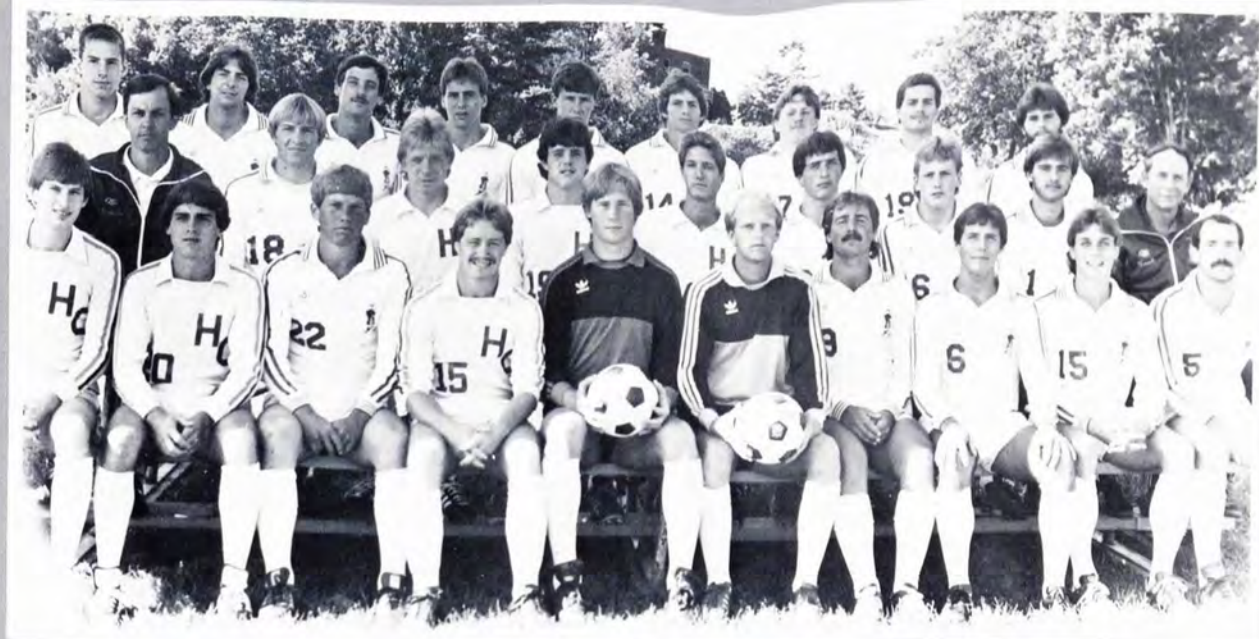

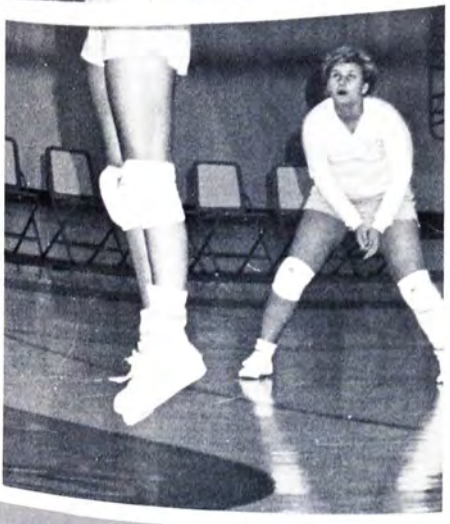

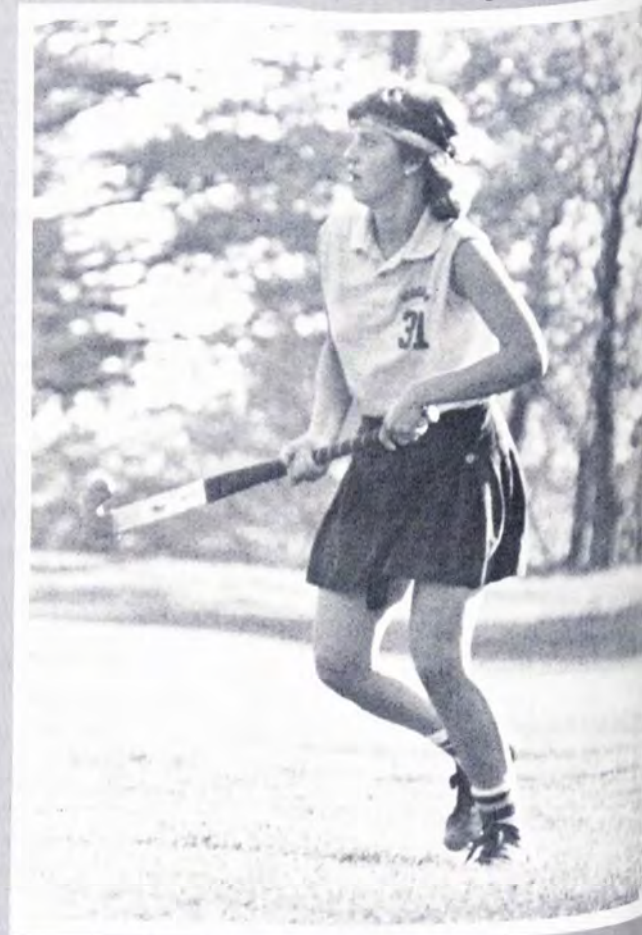

What's Happening

The United States hosted the Summer Olympic Games, held in Los Angeles, for the first time in 52 years. Despite a boycott by the Soviet Union and 13 allies, there were 140 countries present and 7,800 competitors; the boycott did not mean a second-rate Olympic Games.

Highlights of the 1984 Summer Games

Carl Lewis of the U.S. received four gold medals in the long jump, the 100-meter, the 200-meter, and the 4-100 relay.

Mary Lou Retton won the all-around gold medal and led the gymnastic team to a silver medal. Retton won over **Ecaterina Szabo** of Rumania with a .05 point victory.

Alexi Grewal led the U.S. in the men's cycling with an average time of 23.6 m.p.h. **Bauer** of Canada took second. **Connie Carpenter**, also of the U.S., took first in the women's 79.2 kilometer road race. It was the first women's cycling event in Olympic history.

Michael Goss of West Germany took the lead over **Mike Heath** of the U.S. in the individual swimming. Nevertheless, the U.S. team took the win; Canada also won their first gold in swimming since 1912.

Five out of six U.S. men were among the top ten scorers out of 81 competitors in gymnastics. The Americans received the first gold medal in 52 years in this event. The U.S. Olympic team, led by **Bart Conner**, a third-time Olympic team member, took the over-all lead from China and Japan. □





The fall of 1984 initiated the presidential elections, with Republican candidates Reagan and Bush and Democrats Mondale and Farraro. For the first time in U.S. history a woman was running for the vice-presidency.

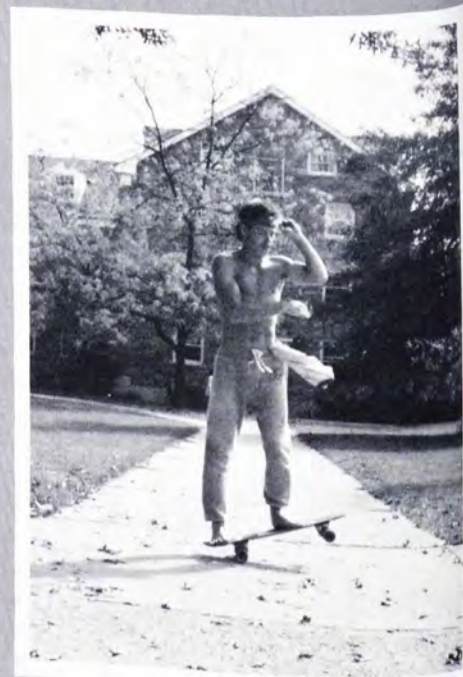
Voters showed an unprecedented amount of support for the incumbent President Reagan. Reagan achieved his goal of "sweeping the 50 states." He received 525 of the electoral votes, winning all sectors of the population except Minnesota, Mondale's home state and Washington D.C., which traditionally votes for the democratic ticket.

Regan and Mondale took issue on foreign policy, nuclear arms, and the recovery of the economy. Political analysts believe the country elected Reagan for his "media presence" and for his ability to powerfully convey to the public his image of a strong and prosperous America.

Mondale's campaign and his running mate "gave women a foothold in high political offices." Farraro was quoted as saying, "women will never again be second class citizens." Mondale himself said, "We did not win but we made history, and that is the beginning of the battle."

Other major events of 1984 were: Princess Diana gave birth to Prince Henry and his brother Prince William was two years old; the Statue of Liberty celebrated her 98th birthday; and a two-year restoration program began in July which included a new, gold plated torch. □

Men's Basketball

The 1985-86 Houghton men's basketball team will have the arduous task of replacing four seniors that led this year's squad to 19 wins and the District Championship.

Jeff Anspach again was the man his teammates looked to for scoring. For the second straight year Jeff chipped in over 19 points per game and ended his career as Houghton's #2 all-time scorer with over 1700 points. The two year captain's most productive effort came against rival Roberts Wesleyan, a contest that saw the 6'5" forward explode for 36 points. Honored with numerous all-star and all-tournament selections, Jeff finished his four years in a Highlander uniform as the team's MVP his last two years and a NCCAA second team All-American.

Also a four year starter, Derrick Barnes, who played at point guard was the unquestionable catalyst in the Houghton offense. His spectacular moves with the ball amazed players and fans alike while he became the second all-time carrier assist leader among New York State's colleges and universities. Combined with his nearly 800 assists, his 1200 career points make him one of the most productive offensive players that have ever worn the purple and gold. Derrick was honored with the 1985 Special Recognition Award.

Through hard work Ron Duttweiler emerged as the cog in the Houghton defense. A three year recipient of the Most Valuable Defensive Player Award, he led the team in steals and joined Anspach in rebounding honors. Houghton College awarded Ron the Male Athlete of the Year Award and further recognized him with the Athletic Sportsmanship Award. Ron's inspiration to the team proved to be as important as his outstanding athletic ability.

Transfer Bill Dockery played only a season and a half for Houghton but quickly became a favorite of the Houghton crowd. His smooth outside shot and thunderous slam dunks provided much of the excitement for a team that won eleven of thirteen games at home. "Doc" will be missed most for his ability to bring the Highlander squad alive with only one play — a capability that helped Houghton rally and defeat many outstanding teams.

Many highlights filled the 1984-85 season. Included was a two-week trip to Hawaii and a chance to play some of the NAIA's perennial powers. Also memorable games were three straight victories over nationally ranked Hartwick, Buffalo State and Geneva Colleges.

Beyond the four seniors, underclassmen played a supportive role during the season. Sophomore guard Josh Merrill nailed down a starting position second semester and was one of the top shooters in the district. Junior guard-forward Bill Greenway proved for another year the importance of the sixth man offensively and defensively. And even newcomers David

Women's Basketball

The women's basketball team finished their season with a 10-9 record — quite an accomplishment over last season's 6-10 record. This marks the first winning season for the women in many years. Coach Bob Smalley cites that the winning season resulted from the recruitment of new players adding height and improved skill to the team.

Though the team had a slow start, losing eight of its first 11 games, five of those losses came against traditionally tough teams such as Buffalo State, University of Buffalo, Alfred State, and Alfred Tech. The team bounced back at the end of the season winning seven of its last eight games. The two heartbreakers of the season occurred against Pitt-Bradford. In both games, Houghton led throughout the game, but lost in the final seconds.

Smalley believes the future for the women looks promising — four out of five starters are returning and the team will lose only one starter, senior Jackie Woodside who led the team in assists.

Freshman center Jodi Carlson had a phenomenal season. The 5'10" freshman led the team in scoring (372), shooting percentage (51%), rebounds (284), and blocked shots (53).

Returning Captain Patty Ryan led the team in free throw percentage (65.2%). Smalley is convinced the 1984-85 season saw the promising development of junior Lisa Starks as a defensive guard. Coach Smalley cites transfer Sondra Brockman as a potential threat to Houghton's competitors next season both defensively in scoring.

Coach Smalley would like to extend his "special thanks to all the individuals who gave support and worked as assistants during the season." □





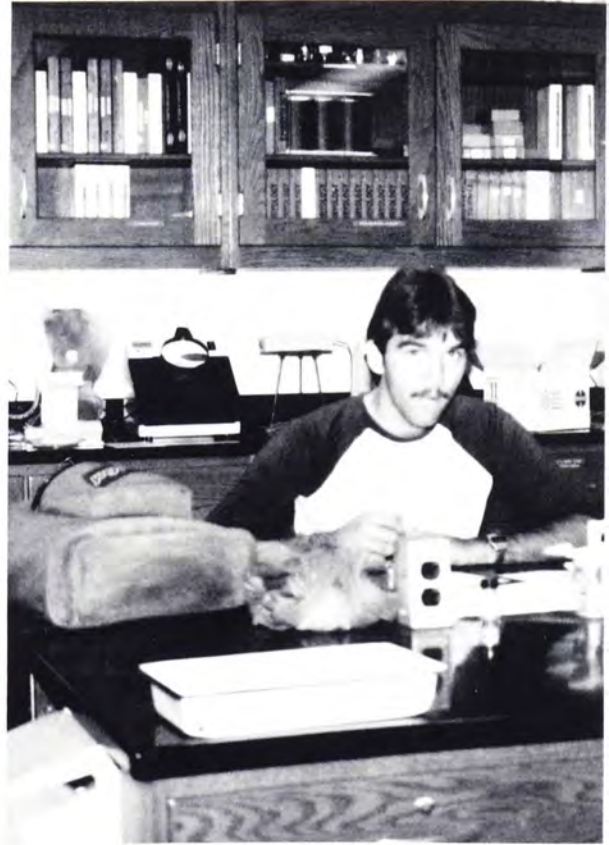

Current Issues Day

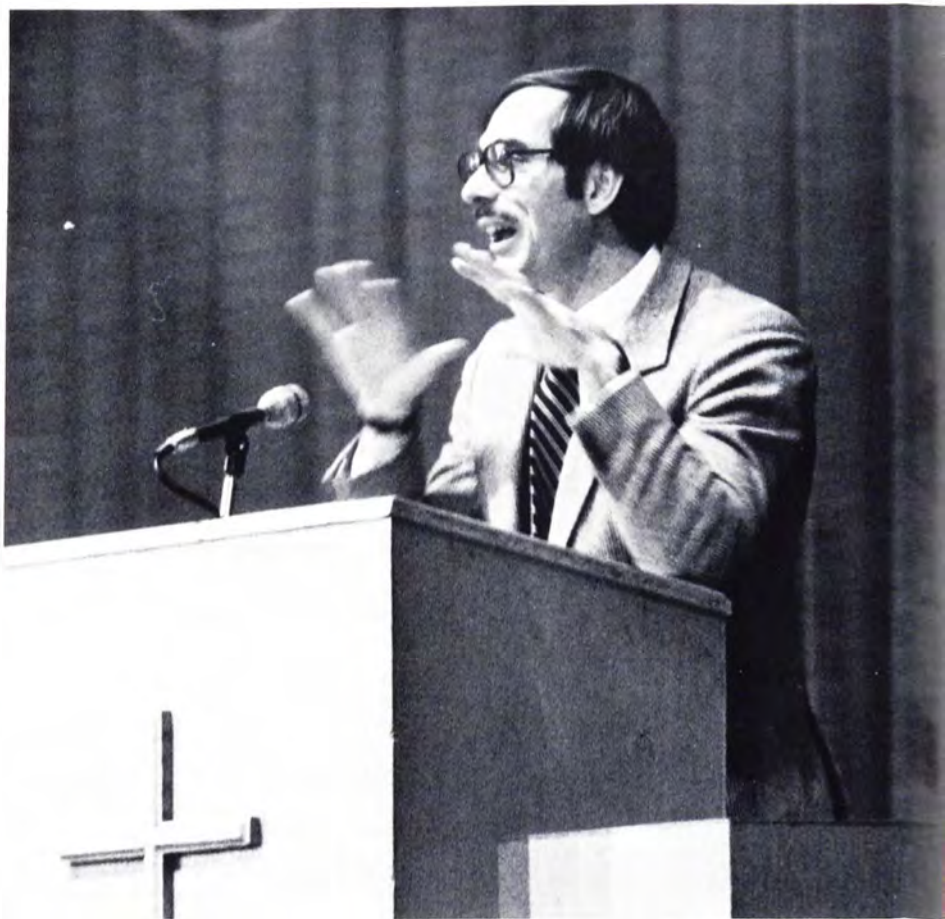


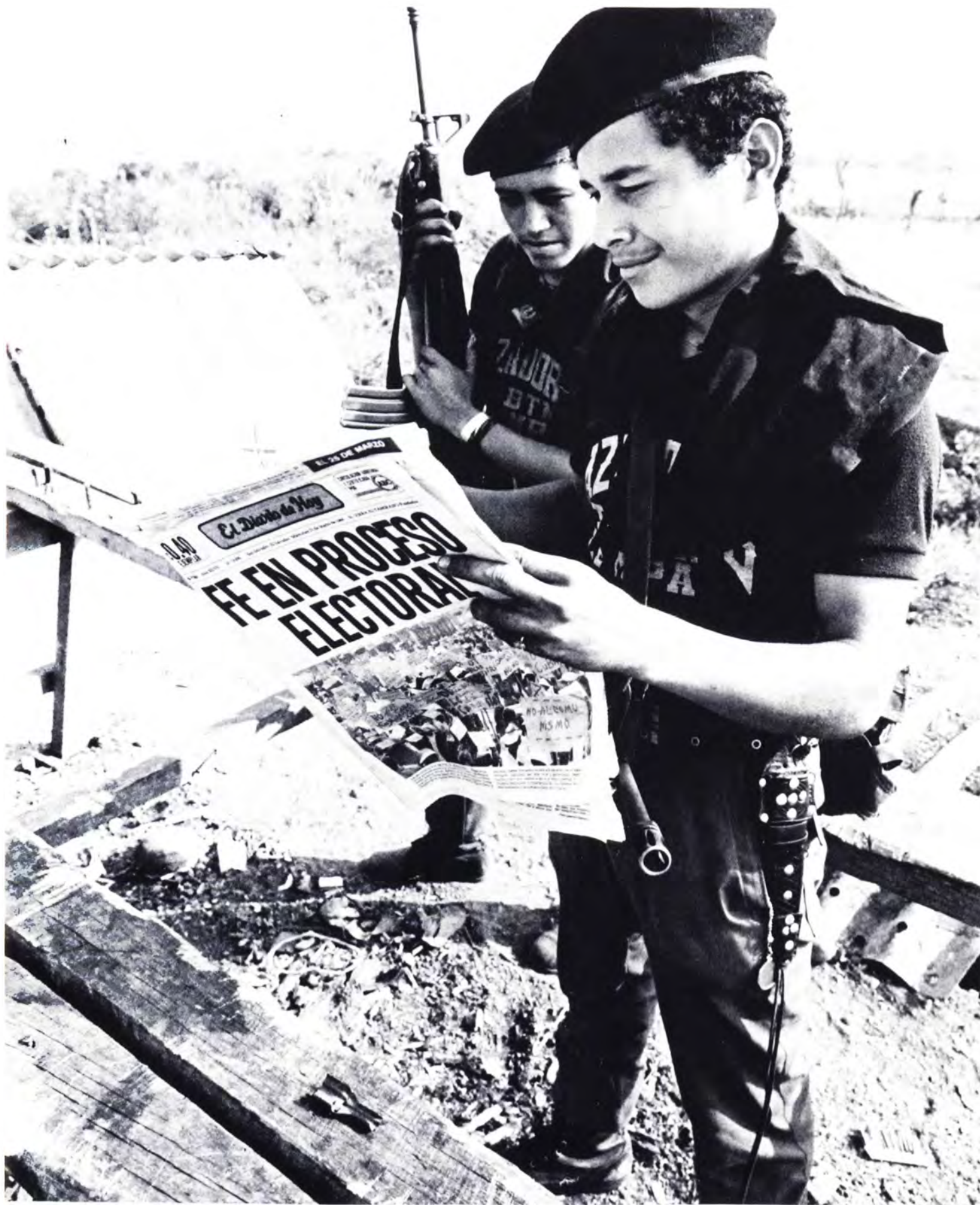

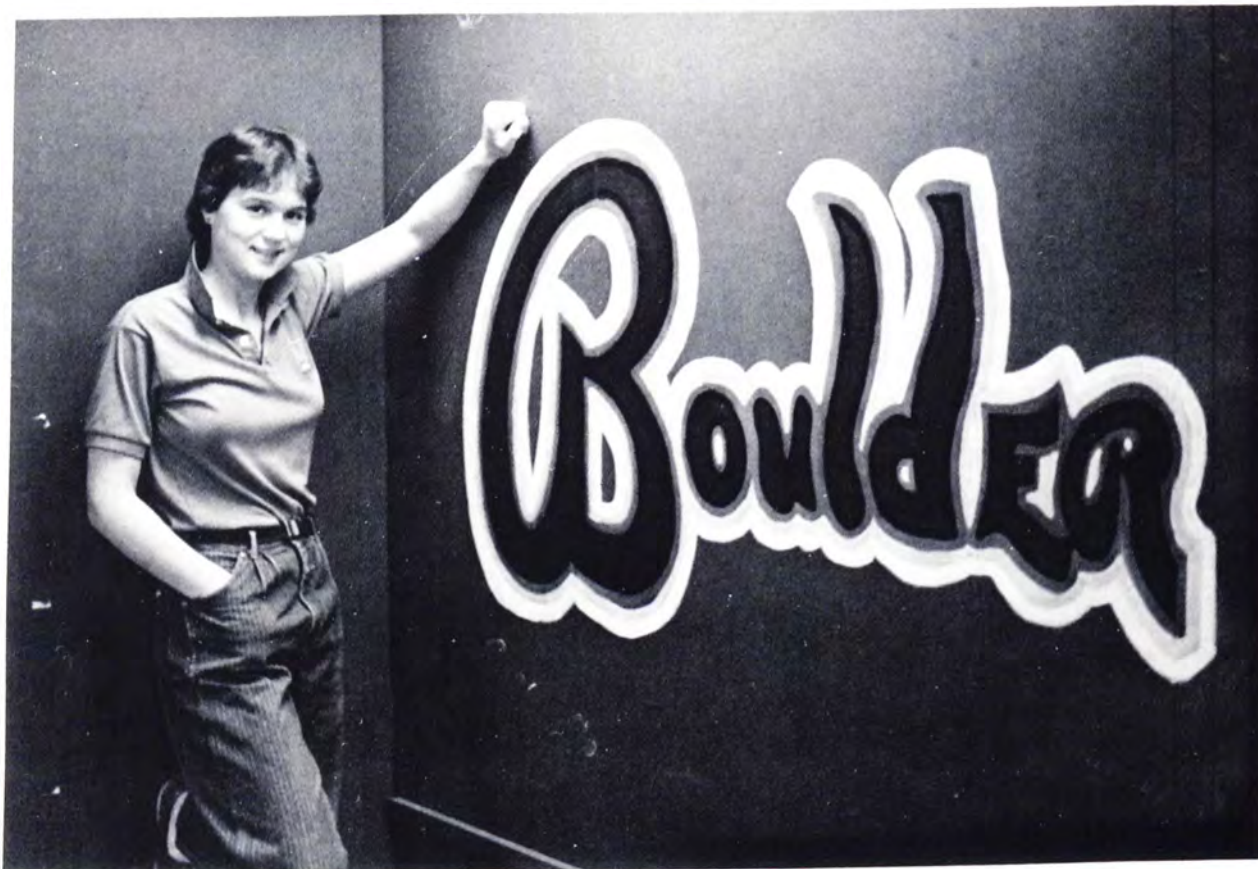
James Buschman, Director of Michigan State's Latin American Studies Center, urged students to avoid unreasoned answers.

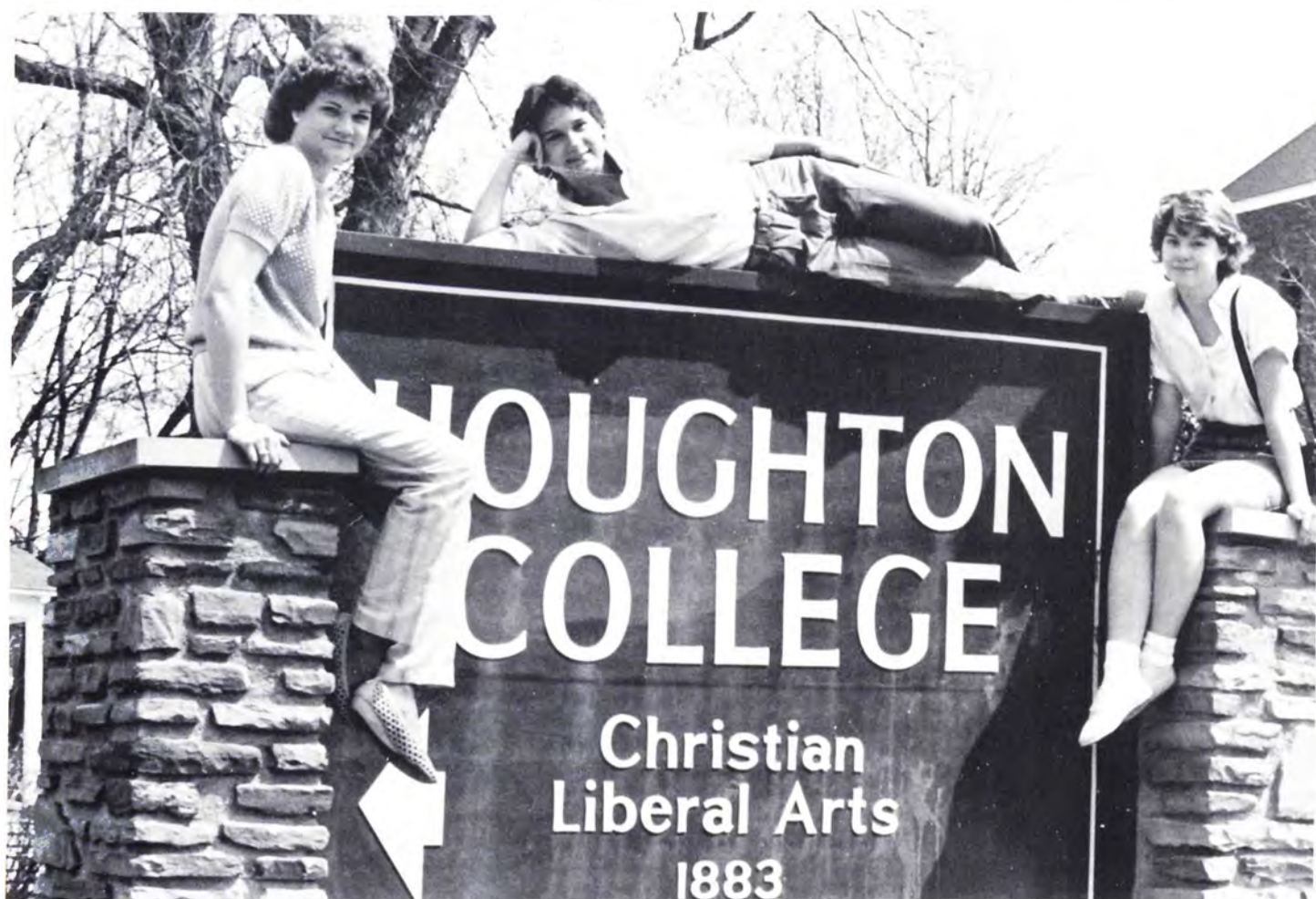

Will New York state residents get an increase in TAP? Not this year, Froy Martin, Financial Aid Counselor and leader of a recent lobbying effort in support of the issue explains why. "Last week there was a big push to increase TAP. At the same time there was also a strong push to increase aid in schools. The Legislature had to choose what to do on the back burner."

Another reason for the delay is the tax cut recommissioned by Governor Cuomo. "A \$100 million tax reduction was a laudable effort because Congress has passed larger tax cut programs such as TAP, or Tuition Assistance Program, is state supplied to students residing in New York. The proposed legislation would have increased the amount and availability of aid to students in both undergraduate and graduate programs.

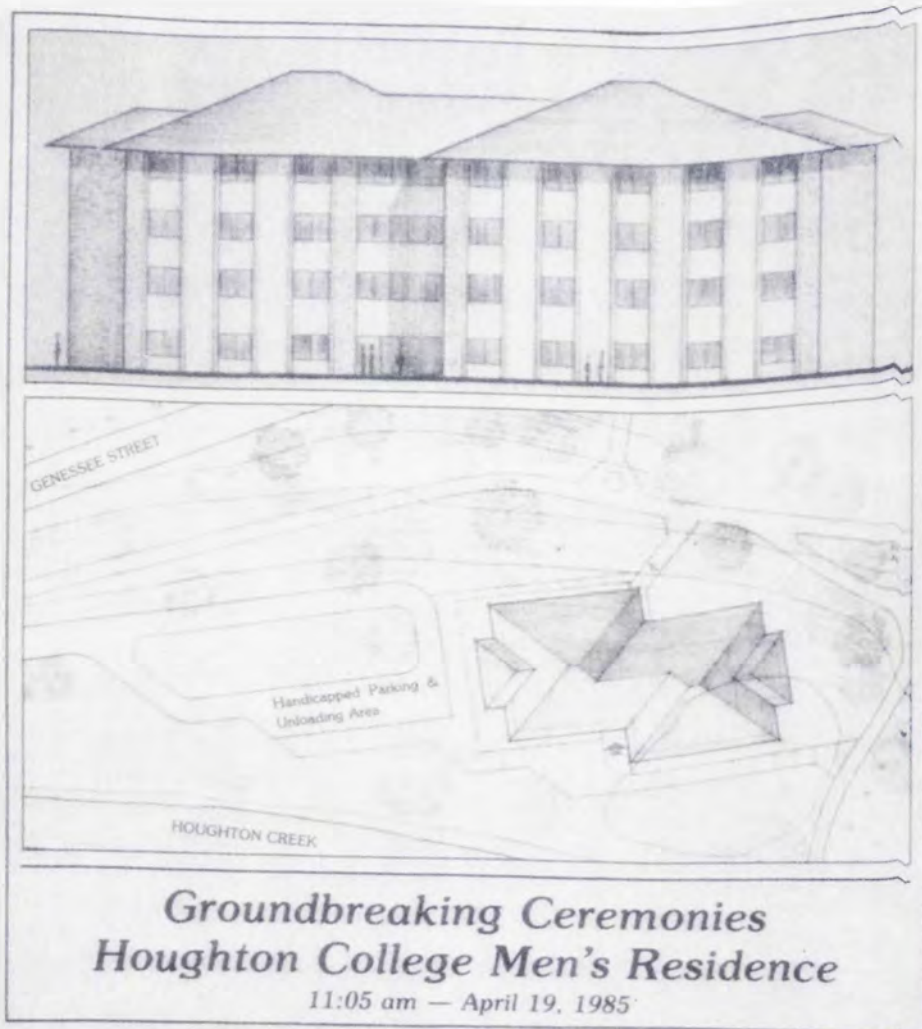


Project History

No Houghton building is conceived or constructed without prolonged planning or internal anguish about finances, and the residence for which we broke ground is no exception. But it is Houghton's first structure to have a student protest demonstration in its genesis.

Replacing 80-year-old Gaoyadeo figured in long-range plans for years, but student complaints about its condition and upkeep focused attention during Founders Day of 1979. A dormitory facility student committee was established that weekend with the interest of the trustees, and conditions in Gao were corrected. Over the next two years, the committee projected space requirements, discussed possible building sites and determined specifications.

Treasurer Nielsen explored various financing plans that might obtain construction money below market costs, necessary because of existing indebtedness and a trustee mandate that the new building be self-amortizing. Then last fall, generous friends enabled the college to take advantage of a federal program to liquidate loans on existing dorms by immediate payment of 50 cents on the dollar. This cleared the way to finance the new residence.





Last September trustees decided to contract two residences, placing one adjacent to the gym on land newly acquired from the Wesleyan Church Western New York District, the other along Houghton Creek at the front of the campus. Delays arose as the architect submitted various designs conforming to the sites, then couldn't meet a March 1985 deadline for plans. The college then became acquainted with Mr. Carl Brandt of the Albany architectural firm of Brandt and Poost, and asked both architects for quotes on plan development and specifications for finished buildings. Mr. Brandt was low bidder.

Further site exploration proved the upper campus unsatisfactory. Most other college land close to campus was hilly, had poor soil conditions or was prone to flooding, so the committee chose to erect a single four story residence on the creek-side site while maintaining original floor arrangements.

Traditional native stone facing will be incorporated and ground-level access for two floors will be assured by ramp and bridge. The floor plan eliminates long halls with rooms on either side, in favor of living units for 12-24 clustered around study space, kitchenettes and bath facilities. This is intended to foster closer student relationships and unity, reduce noise and increase versatility for summer conference housing. Building dedication is planned for July 1986 with occupancy that fall. □

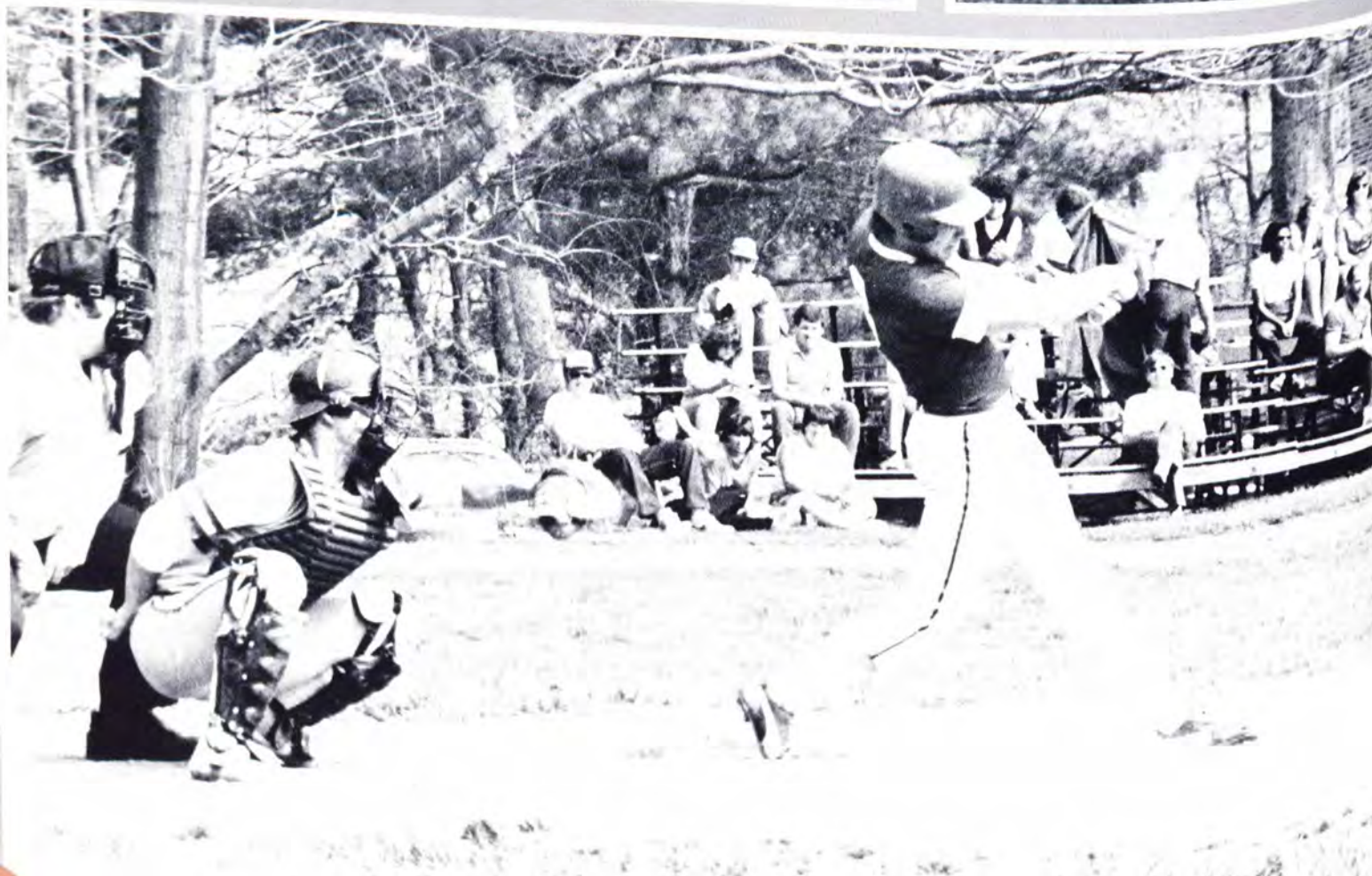
Baseball Lives On

New Coach Leads Team To Victory

This year's track teams both men and women marked victorious seasons under new coach Ken Heck. The women's record was 10-5, which gave them second place in districts. The men's team record was 11-1 with a first place victory in the district competition.

Districts were filled with places for each track member. Ron Duttweiler topped his opponents in the high hurdles (16.86), the high jump (6'2"), the javelin (155'5") and jumped to 40'11¼" in the triple jump for fourth. Coach Heck mentioned that Ron's graduation will leave a gap in field events for next year. Paul Allen sped to a 23.59 win in the 200 and anchored the victorious 400 relay team, that included John Monroe, Greg Gidman, and Kevin Coughanour. Monroe sprinted to two seconds in the 100 and 200. Coughanour grabbed fourth in the 100, while Gidman and Monroe went 1-2 in the 400 with times of 51.8 and 53.1, respectively. Rob Coy also added a third in the 1500 (4:11.53) and a second in the 5000. Wes Dunham then joined Rob to take 1-2 in the 800. Rob's winning time was 2:02.1.

Dave Reither hurdled to a second in the intermediates (1:00.45), and Coughanour added a fourth place in them. Randy Duttweiler stole third with his 17:40.32 in the 5k. Paul Raduns and Ned Farnsworth endured the sun to place second and third in the 10k, respectively. Finally, the mile relay team of Gidman, Hillis, Dunham, and Monroe ran. Their time of 3:35.75 dusted the competition.

When the points were tallied the men Highlanders had scored 79, topping King's 29, Baptist Bible College's 38, and Robert Wesleyan's 37. The victory marked Houghton's first ever district win in NCCAA competition.

The seven Houghton women turned in excellent performances. Gloria Mosher brought Houghton wins in both hurdles, a 17.95 in the highs and a 1:14.96 in the intermediates. She joined Stephanie Button, Virrna Virdaurri, and Julie Button for a winning time of 56.1 in the 400 meter relay effort, and then McCullough joined the Button sisters to win the 1600 meter relay with a time of 4:25.26.

Mary McCullough led the team by winning the 1500 (4:57.19), 800 (2:25.59), and the 3000 (11:42.79). Julie and Stephanie Button finished 1-2 in the 400. Julie then went on to claim second in the 200, fourth in the long jump, and third in the triple jump. Stephanie added a fourth in the triple, and then joined Virrna to place third and fourth in the high jump (4'4").

Virrna's 99'10" in the javelin gave her a second, while a 94'5" by Beth Markell brought her a third. She also took a fourth in the shot with a toss of 25'1/2". Wendy Harris displayed an awesome kick as she sped past opponents in the final stretch taking thirds in the 3000 (12:58.73) and 800 (2:43.09), then a fourth in the 1500 (5:40.82).



In the final tally Houghton fell one point short of King's 65 points; however, they defeated Baptist Bible's 23 and Robert's 17. Coach Ken Heck added; "Even though the women didn't win, they won." With few team members, he feels they put in better performances than all the teams present. He also said he is very pleased with the track team and is looking forward to building on the core that is already present as shown by this year's winning season. □

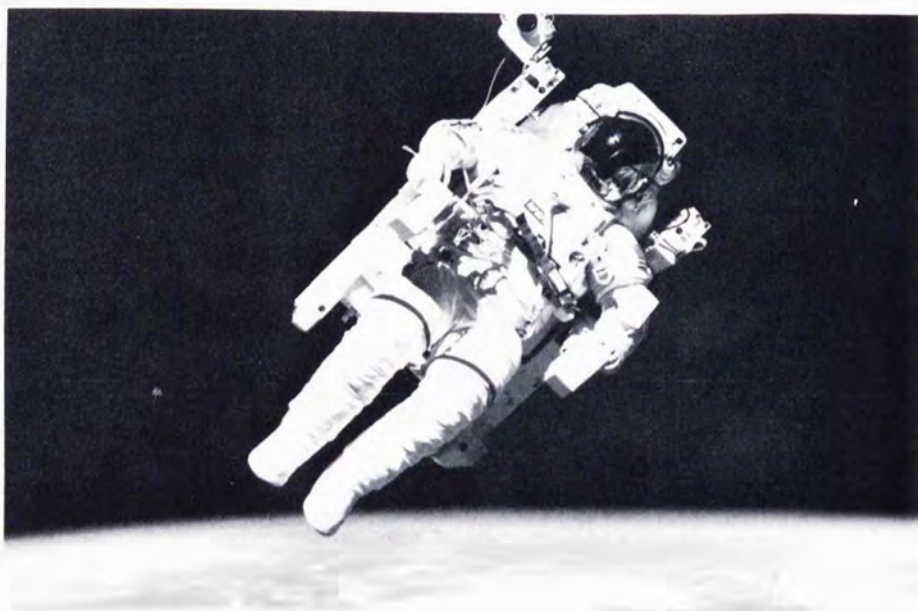

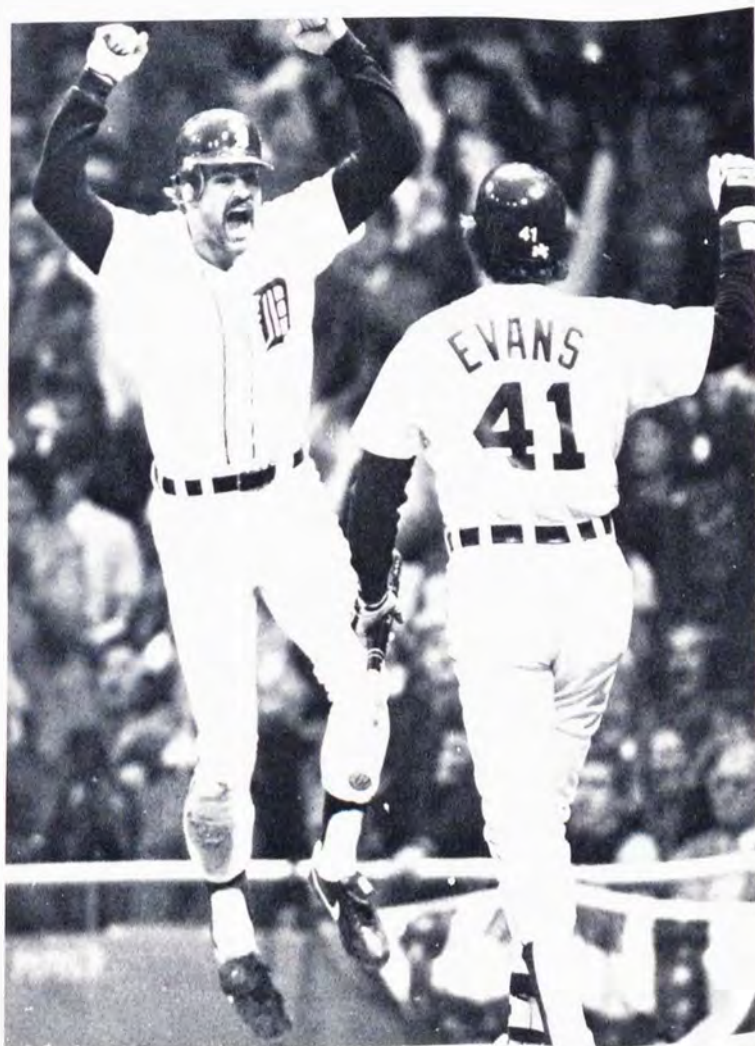
