# Special interest

ISA International Student Association, consists of about 70 students representing at least 22 countries from Argentina to Zimbabwe. There are also several American members. The purpose of ISA is twofold: to introduce international students to campus life in America, and to enrich the campus through the intermingling of cultures.

This year ISA sponsored a number of activities. Bi-weekly supper meetings, a picnic at Letchworth, an international dinner, carolling at Christmas, an international week in February, and the list goes on.

ISA has worked closely with Dave Pollock, the director of intercultural programming. He has guided ISA in its desire to bring understanding between international and American students.

# Christian service

These comments express the needs and opportunities for service in ACO, Allegany County Outreach. Through weekly visitation and trips to the campus for parties and activities, students share their lives and faith with families in Allegany County.

This year showed continued growth and support in ACO's outreach. The Christmas season was celebrated with a party, for which "Wild Puffalumps" were donated, and East Hall's food and gift drive helped several families enjoy the holiday.

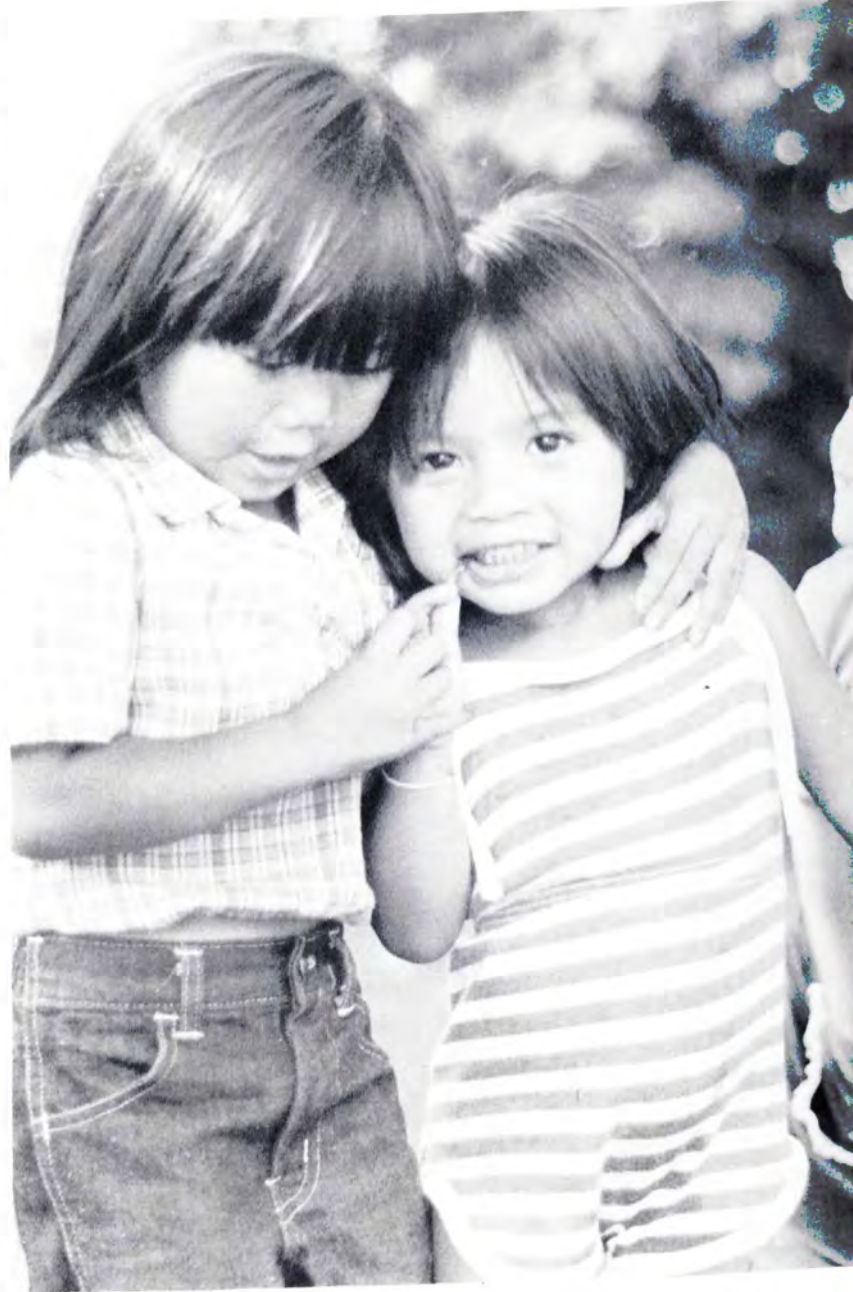
ACO is just one of several outreach groups on campus, others being Dayspring and CSO, Christian Student Outreach. CSO strives to spread the message of God's saving grace in Christ to people within the context of existing institutions. The Bible tells us to be doers of the word, and not hearers only (James 1:22), and CSO provides opportunities for this active faith. CSO has nursing home visitations, clown ministries, adopt-a-grandparent program, Craig Colony visitation (a home for mentally handicapped) and is in the process of forming a witness team.

This year's musical outreach groups are Malachi and Heirborne. They are sponsored by the Church Relations Office and are involved in a two-part tour: the academic year tour and the eight-week summer tour. The groups offer music and testimony in traditional church services, concerts, youth retreats and camps.

Malachi, established eight years ago, takes its name from the last book of the Old Testament which literally means "God's Messenger." It is to this purpose that this team ministers. They sing to share the message of God's calling to us and of our service to Him.

Heirborne was just formed this year. Citing Romans 8:17, which refers to all believers as "heirs" of Christ, they seek to uplift listeners and to be witnesses of the joy of serving the Lord. *Koinonia* is a greek word meaning fellowship or partnership. *Koinonia* groups consist of people who have made commitments to meet together once a week throughout both semesters in groups of about 6-10 for the purpose of fellowship, support, and Bible study with the goal of encouraging one another in his or her faith in Jesus Christ.

FMF, Foreign Missions Fellowship seeks to challenge the community to involvement in God's work around the world by informing the community of God's work, and by encouraging and supporting involvement in short and long-term missions.

Not only did they upgrade their production equipment, but they also painted and carpeted the offices to create a more business-like environment.

With a little help from two resident computer "experts," managing editor's Nathan Danner and David "Madman" Lennon, the *Houghton Star* staff got off to a wonderful start this year. News editors Darin Keesler

and John Bright consistently kept enhancing the quality and quantity of news copy. 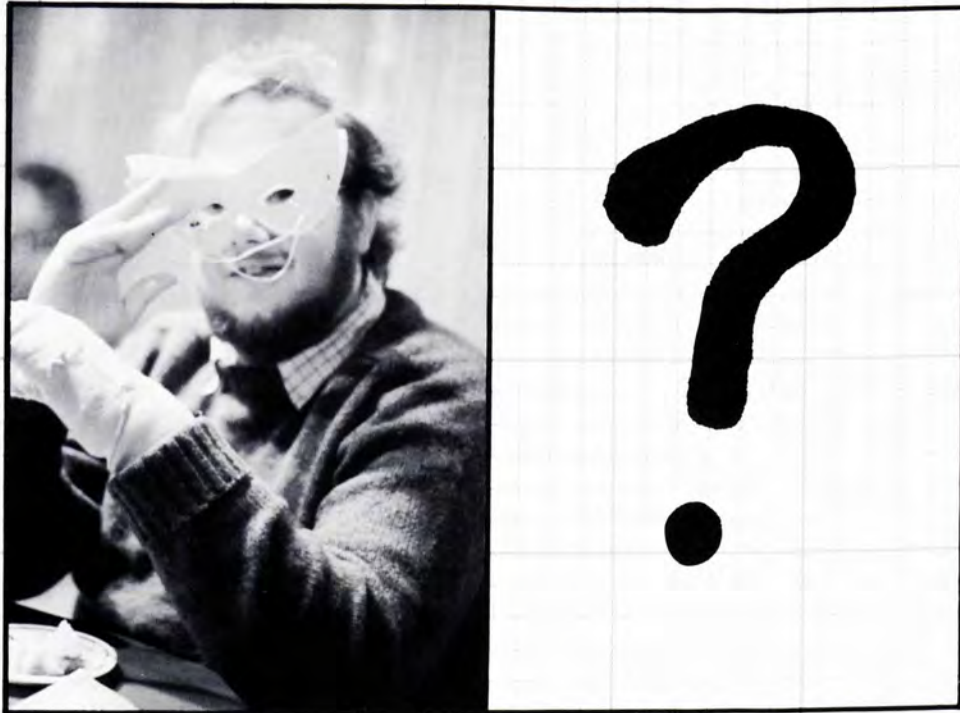

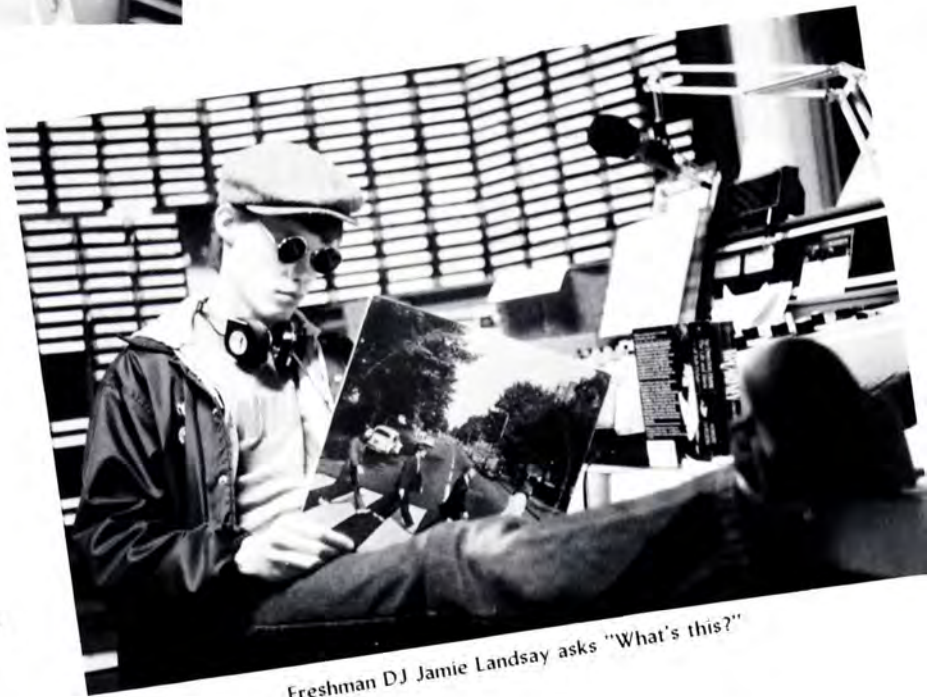

# Volleyball

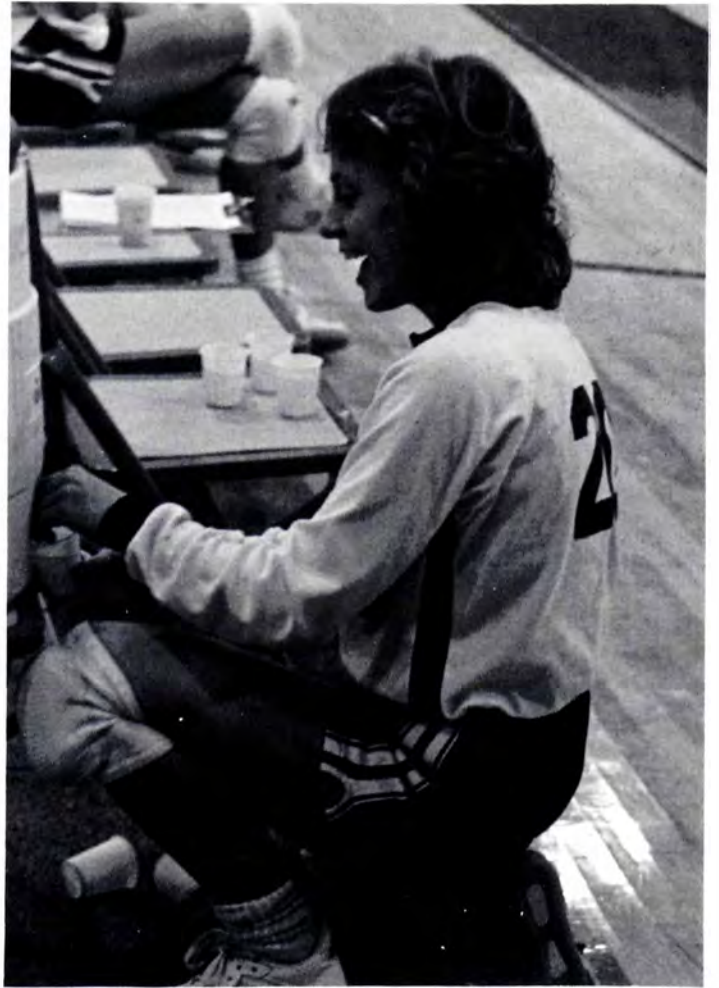

the dumper and your creativity is keeping it company. Eight blank pages are staring you in the face which is appropriate since you're facing the pages with a blank stare.

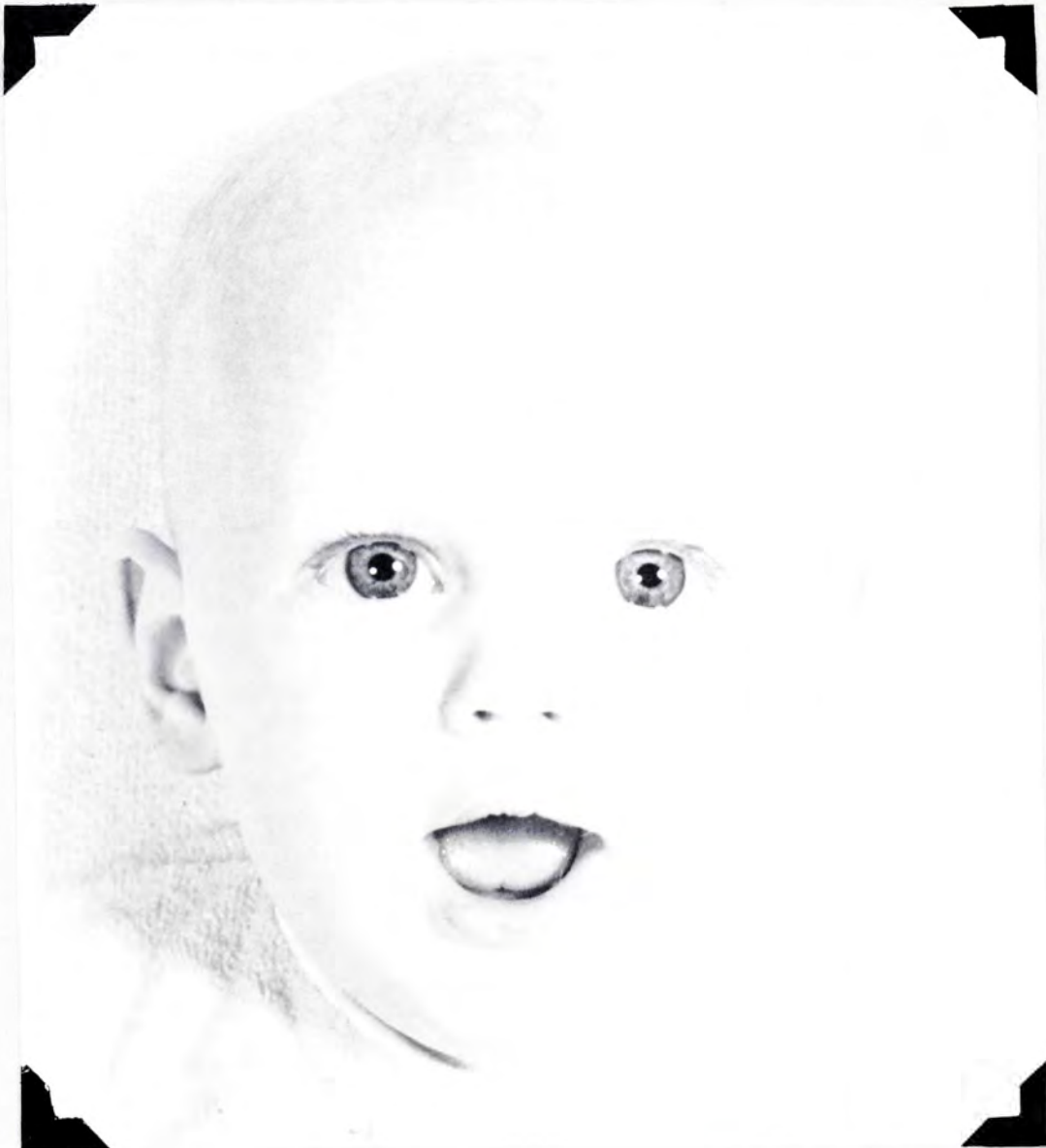

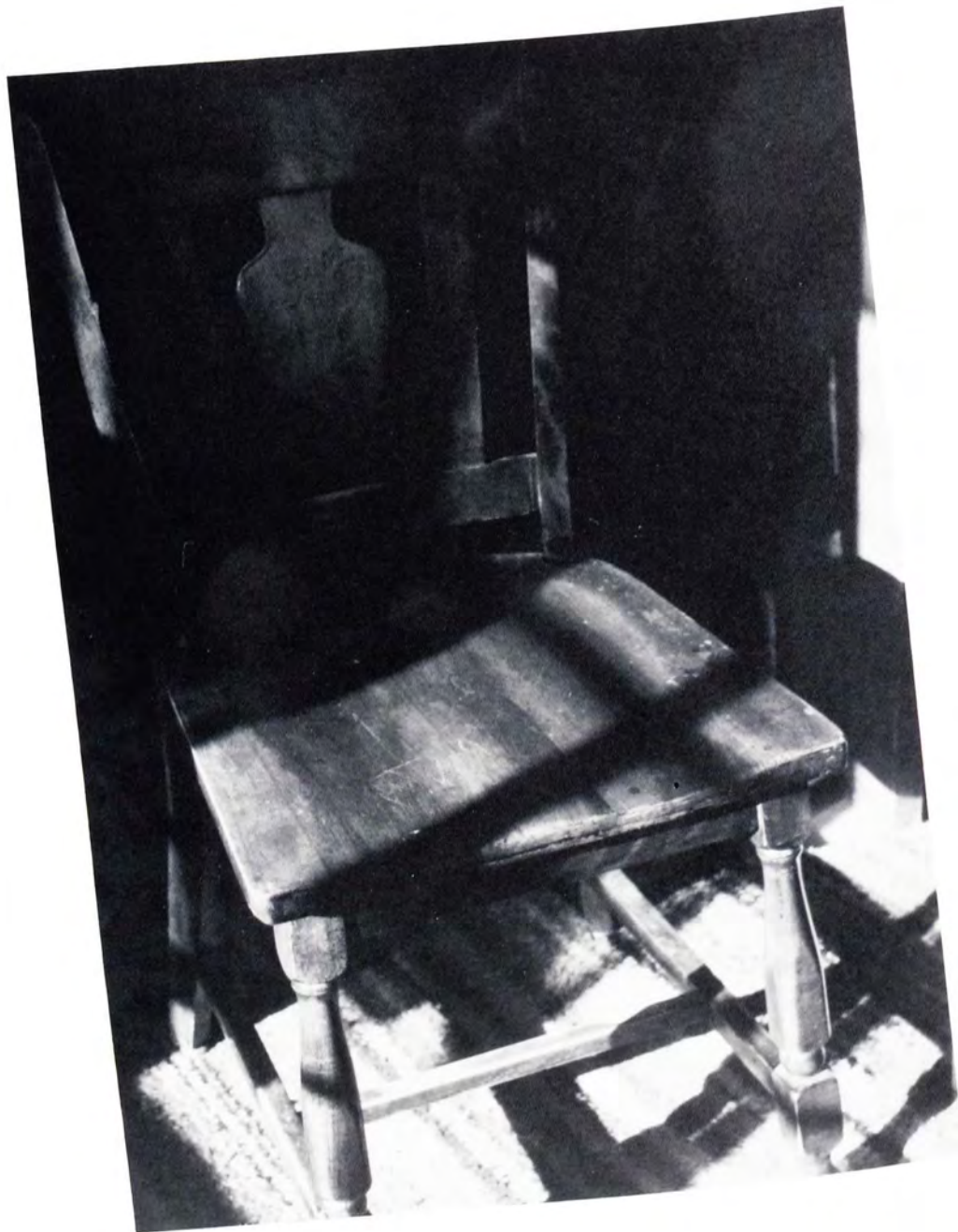

**T**he Houghton Village Church was built in 1933 to replace an older structure built in 1876. In the 1960's the educational section of the present church was added on. According to the most recent census, the population of Houghton is 1,604, of which approximately 1,175 are Houghton students.

**O**ne of the oldest structures in town, The Houghton Inn fell victim to an electrical fire on July 11, 1987. It was owned by Houghton College and known as The Twin Spruce Inn until it was sold in the early 1950's. Its many names included The Brass Unicorn, The Wooden Shoe, and of course, The Houghton Inn. It was also used as student housing for many of its years.

**H**oughton's rurality, if I may chance coining a word, is an old joke of a thousand variations. But before you "blink your eye in passing," think about the surroundings from a new perspective. # Fancher

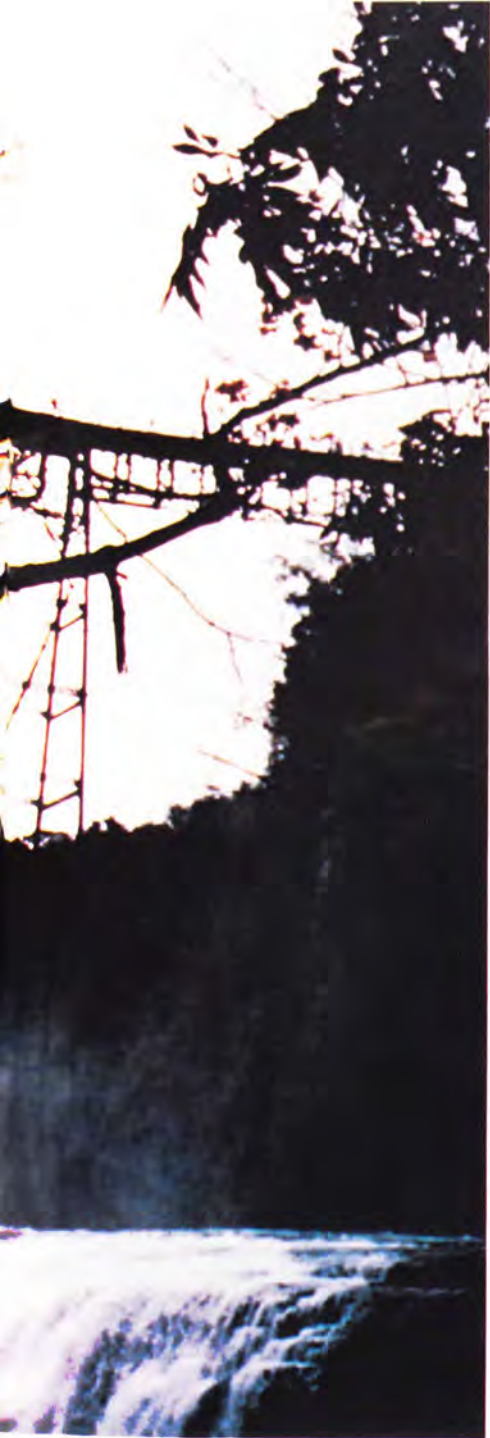
**B**uilt in 1904, alias Jennings Hall, and Old Ad, Fancher is one of the original buildings on campus. Fashioned after the seminary buildings of its time, Fancher is 76' X 56' X 60' and 725 tons of Houghton history. With the use of hydraulics, steel, and tires, Fancher made a safe pilgrimage to occupy the vacancy left by Gao. By the beginning of the academic year Fancher was ready for use by faculty and staff, with the finishing touches being added throughout the fall semester for classes in the Spring. By late Spring, the vacancy left by Fancher, and the demolition of Woolsey will be filled by the New Academic Building.

Unlike the city, change here at Houghton is built upon only one foundation, and we reach for the skies in a different manner. The ideal being: not the service of progress, but the use of it as a tool to serve. The service is shaping hearts and minds, and like the landscape; the old must die; the barren spaces filled; and the new erected. The only monument in such a task is further service.

# New additions



**W**ithin each of us there is the potential for reason and emotion. A glimpse of history reveals a dichotomy between heart and mind brought about by the advocates of each and their search for truth: poets and philosophers alike have argued which is the better part of man. Sometimes in the divergence, the spiritual aspect of man is forgotten, redefined, or relegated to monks and theologians. Throughout the different eras of history (the Enlightenment, the Romantic Movement, et cetera) the paradox has exerted influence upon the arts. Yet within art or music, tension is brought to aesthetic harmony; a balance is revealed in the technique, style, and passion, all coming from the soul of the artist.

Liberal Arts is a search for balance. The harmony is found in a community containing poets, philosophers, theologians, artists, and others of specialized fields, coming together to serve in that search. Progress is attained, not in total agreement, but in the continuation of balance, as excellence is achieved in education. In all of this, the purpose is to shape hearts and minds for the future: the move is ever forward, and the goal is Truth. The balance may be found at Houghton.

Throughout Houghton's history, the continuation of a balanced Liberal Arts education has produced the foundations of the various buildings suiting different areas

of balance such as the science building, chapel, and music/art buildings, which may be said to parallel the aforementioned aspects of man. Now, the hearts and minds of Houghton's community have come together in the Capital Campaign. Thus far the continuation of the campaign has seen the demolition of Gao, moving of Fancher, and awaits the departure of Woolsey Hall - with the construction of the New Academic Building to follow. From the same hearts and minds have come plans for a new Fine Arts Center.

The proposed center will cost an estimated \$3.1 million and will be erected after the academic building. The center will provide musicians areas of study, as well as places to practice and perform. Artists will work in aesthetically appropriate spaces where they may express and display their craft. Several smaller structures such as a resource center, teaching studios, and theater, will create a village effect near Wesley Chapel. With the improved facilities, Houghton will better serve those learning in aesthetic fields.

Thus growth is a fruit of effective balance, and Houghton continues to grow as a Liberal Arts institution. Once erected the Fine Arts Center will help continue the balance, serve in the search, and ring with the harmony of both with the single goal: Truth

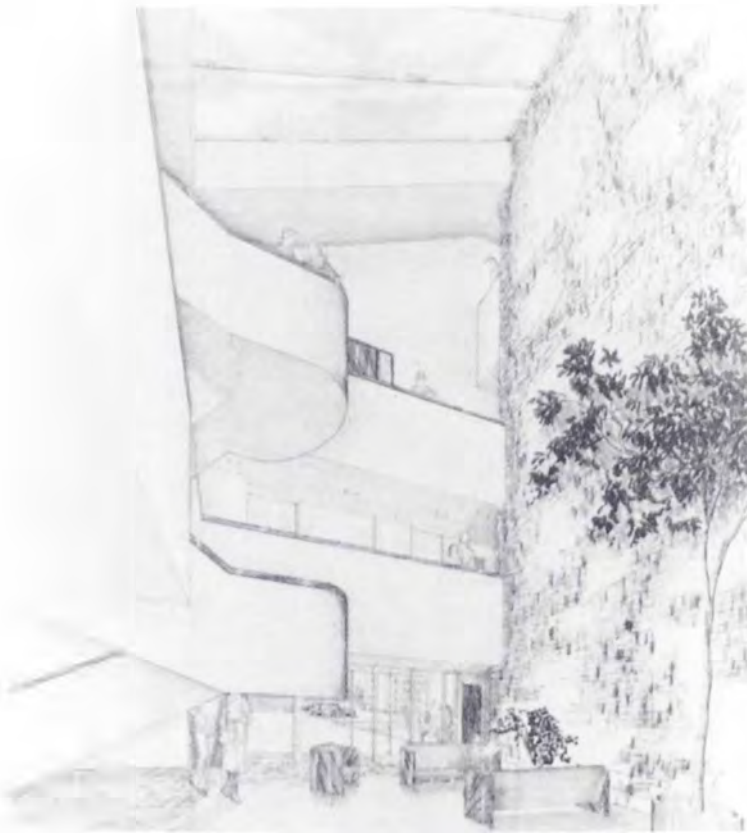

**A**t the end of this academic year, Woolsey Hall will join Gao on that great rubble heap of history. The foundation will not remain naked long as construction of the New Academic Building begins soon after. At \$4.5 million the new building is part of the Capital Campaign, Houghton's largest financial promotion in its history. The new structure will span three stories for a total of 45,000 square feet. It will house four of the six academic divisions providing labs, study lounges, and offices for each. Also provided will be 15 classrooms and 20 resource rooms including tele-link rooms, and an audio visual center.

Besides the obvious benefits of the new building, there are other "unmentioned" benefits that will also help in the education process here at Houghton. For one thing it will be a solid structure; no more squeaky floors that sag under the weight of students. From now on students may concentrate on studies, and not the number of students getting out of class above them, or the amount of sagging roof tiles charting a course for their lap. Another welcome benefit will be regulated heat: aah, to be comfortable when entering a building from freezing cold and not wonder if one should be wearing a towel and throwing water on heated rocks, or whistling a tune to the belch of a radiator. Finally, aesthetic appreciation is another benefit, of course this is a matter of taste depending on whether you prefer any of the latter benefits or not.

Aside from the benefits, one final note, and that on community. The new Academic Building will be constructed with an atrium. According to the dictionary, an atrium is "the central room of an ancient roman house." In the new building it will be symbolic of common ground for inter-disciplinary studies. However, when the books are put aside, it may be a place to reminisce former classroom tribulations.

# Madrigals



Since 1965, Christmas here at Houghton has witnessed the combination of the sacred and secular in what has become the traditional Madrigal Dinner. Historically, the Madrigal is a secular musical form, a type of musical word-painting in which the expression of the text is of utmost importance. Madrigals were sung at societal gatherings during the 16th century and flourished in England and Italy. Through the years, the form has been marked by the procession of singers in Renaissance costume, a small ensemble, and the incorporation of Madrigal and carol in the overall celebration of the Christmas season.

This year's 22nd annual Madrigal featured the combined efforts of former professor of music Dr. Donald Bailey, and this year's director Dr. John Jost. During Dr. Bailey's 14-year tenure

at Houghton, the Madrigals were establishing largely through his efforts. He expanded the tradition by designing costumes and writing scripts - including this year's. Under the direction and further development of Dr. Jost, the piece consisted of six fanfares, which in turn consisted of smaller numbers featuring animal titles (e.g., "The White Hen") except for the fifth and sixth fanfares in which Christmas carols were sung.

In the end, those who enjoyed the sumptuous dinner served, also enjoyed an evening of celebration and worship. A mix of the sacred and secular in the form of the Madrigal had but one result - "Joy to the World."

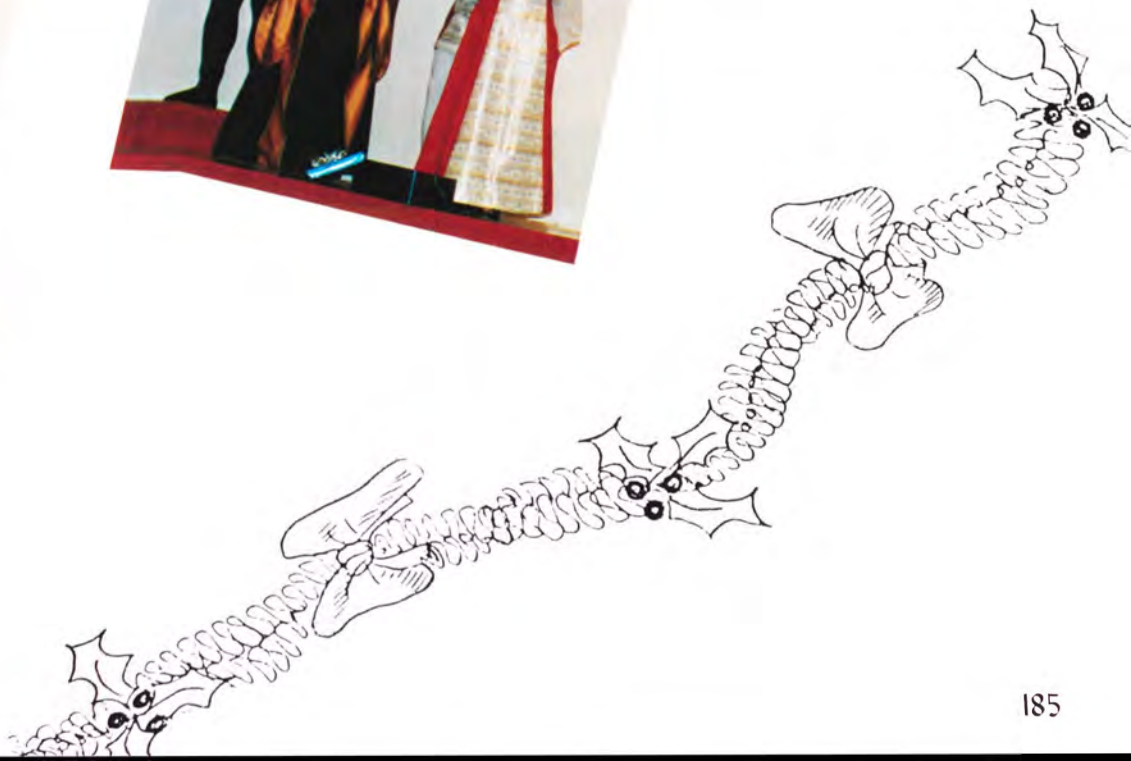
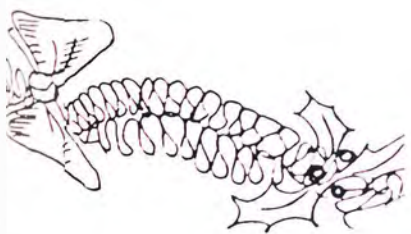

## The Soviet Emigre Orchestra

**R**eturning to Houghton two years after their successful debut, the Soviet Emigre Orchestra is an orchestra of inspiration. The only chamber group of its size and international caliber in the U.S., its "luxurious, passionate, and golden" sound touches its audience at the core.

Led by founder Lazar Gosman from the concertmaster's chair, the orchestra performs works from Bach and Vivaldi to Shostakovich and Barber. The success of the Soviet Emigre Orchestra has spanned three continents. A widely acclaimed South American debut tour in 1982 led to return trips in 1984 and 1986. The group's hugely successful European debut took place in 1983, and in 1984 the orchestra returned to fill houses in Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, England, Italy, Germany, and Holland.

# Sylvia McNair

Sylvia McNair, a wonderful soprano solo concert artist as well as opera singer, made her Carnegie Hall debut during the 1984/85 season in a performance of Handel's *Semele*.

A Wheaton College graduate, Ms. McNair has had recent concert engagements with the English Concert in New York, the Monteverdi Choir in London, and the Handel and Haydn Society in Boston. Her first disc, a recording of Poulenc's *Gloria*, with Robert Shaw and the Atlanta Symphony, received a Grammy nomination. The *San Francisco Chronicle* describes her as "a soprano of true gold."

## The Boston Camerata

The Boston Camerata is an internationally celebrated ensemble of singers and instrumentalists dedicated to bringing alive the music of the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, and the early Baroque. The Camerata brought its performance of *Nativitat* to the Wesley Chapel stage at a special Thursday night presentation featuring the Christmas music and costumes of the Mediterranean.

The Camerata's renditions of early music seek to combine historical accuracy - interpretations on period instruments, using old techniques of singing and playing - with commitment to high professional standards and a lively, vigorous, and engaging style of presentation.

Houghton College alumna Robert (Anderson) Dysert '77 is soprano soloist with the Camerata.

# The Eastman Brass and Barbara Harbach

Since its formation in 1964, the Eastman Brass has delighted audiences with its varied and imaginative repertoire. Travelling extensively throughout North America, the ensemble has appeared on major university and concert series in the U.S. and Canada, as well as touring in Israel, and Central and South America.

The members of the Eastman Brass are all on the faculty of the Eastman School of Music, and have variously appeared with many orchestras. Organist Barbara Harbach of Buffalo performed with the ensemble for this Houghton concert.

In addition, a combined work for organ, brass and chorus by Gabrielli, the College Choral Union and Brass Ensemble was featured.



# Gail Williams

**G**ail Williams joined the Chicago Symphony Orchestra in 1979 and was appointed Associate Principal Horn in 1984. Growing up on a dairy farm nearby in Rushford, she pursued horn studies at Northwestern University after receiving a Bachelor's degree from Ithaca College.

Ms. Williams has taught at Northern Illinois University and DePaul University, and has participated as clinician at workshops of the International Horn Society. She won the *Ein Heldenleben* International Horn Solo Competition in 1980. A recent concert here at Houghton was a stunning musical and artistic success.





# The Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra And . . .

**T**he Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra made its sixteenth appearance on the Houghton stage. Music Advisor and Principal Conductor Jerzy Semkow is a native of Poland, where he studied piano and conducting under Serafin in Rome and Bruno Walter in Vienna. This is his third season with the RPO.

Maestro Semkow continues an ambitious quest conducting schedule with the major orchestras of Europe and the United States.

Presently the RPO has a 49-week schedule, including a symphony series at the Eastman Theatre, Pops concerts, and numerous summer and educational concerts. Originally the RPO was scheduled to perform in the fall, featuring the piano mastery of . . .

# George Boespflug!

**W**hen a labor dispute caused the Rochester Philharmonic to cancel its Homecoming Artist Series concert just days before the event, faculty pianist Dr. George Boespflug stepped into the breach, performing a concert one colleague called, "brilliant and sensitive. He translated his confident command of the keyboard into warm communication with the audience. The result was personal, a memorable musical evening." Boespflug had been scheduled as soloist with the RPO for a performance of Rachmaninoff's *Third Piano Concerto*. Instead he performed works from a recital series he gave last summer in Spain at the International Institute of Music in Madrid, sponsored by a Madrid cultural foundation. A graduate of the University of Colorado and Eastman School of Music, where he earned his D.M.A., Boespflug has been on the Houghton faculty since 1985.



# Goodbye Woolsey

**W**oolsey, the scholarly, ivy-covered brick building so familiar to generations of Houghton students, has been razed. Since June, 1987 when the adjoining Fancher building was moved for preservation, Woolsey has stood alone, marked for demolition. Soon the plot of ground once covered by Fancher and Woolsey building will be occupied by a new academic building designed for the faculty divisions formerly in Fancher and Woolsey.

Constructed in 1922-23, Woolsey Hall was a vital addition for the expanding high school and college. Mr. Charles Pockock, now a retired high school principal, was attending Houghton seminary in 1922. "I remember when Woolsey was built, he said. "We could stand in the library in Fancher and watch them building it." By the fall of 1923, students were already swarming into the classrooms and study hall, though the building was not yet finished. As Houghton Academy's main building for approximately the next 35 years, it was originally called the "High School Building," but college students later referred to it as "Old Science." Not until 1973 was it officially named "Woolsey Hall" in honor of alumnus Dr. Pierce Woolsey. Before his death in 1957, Dr. Woolsey had served the college for 34 years as French professor and for 24 years as chairman of the Foreign Language Division. Most of his classes were taught in the building that was later given his name.

Woolsey has been in almost constant use throughout its 66 years of service. The Academy principal's office was located in this building, and many other divisions were temporarily or more permanently established in Woolsey. At first the basement floor housed mostly chemistry and high school science, while other high school subjects were taught on the upper floors. "Odors from the chemlab often came wafting up," said Mrs. Edith Pockock, a former teacher. The print shop also occupied this bottom floor, and later it was joined temporarily by the mailroom. Physics and biology shared the third floor. By January 1970, scientific activity in Woolsey had ceased, transferred to a new science building on campus.

Said Dr. Gordon Stockin, a retired chairman of the Foreign Language Division, "My offices were up and down through that building. I was chairman when the language lab came into being, and then my office was on the third floor. Before that it was a storeroom for the physics department." One large second floor room was originally a study hall, and then the library reading room, before being divided into two classrooms. At one time, the entire library was located in Woolsey. Foreign languages and history often held classes on the fourth floor, while art was taught in a fourth story room with a sky light. "Other departments would have classes in Woolsey when there was a free spot," said Dr. Stockin, "on any of the floors." English, writing, psychology, sociology, Bible, philosophy, audio-visual, and education have all used the building.

"The first radio broadcasts from Houghton were done from the fourth floor of Woolsey," said Herschel Ries, director of the physical plant at the college. "In about 1947, Perry Knitting Mills sponsored the broadcast. They set up an agreement that their program would start with music originating down here. The college lugged a piano clear up to the top floor for it."



Even on weekends, Woolsey's activity did not cease. Said Willard Smith, the retired college business manager, "Back in the 1920's the young people had no youth service at all. A bunch of teenagers like myself felt the need of getting together as youth. We went to the principal of the seminary and said we wanted to have an afternoon meeting. It got so that on Sunday afternoon we would have thirty or more young people. That was in the study hall, a big whole room on the second floor." High school Sunday school classes were also held in Woolsey as recently as 1986. In addition, the building has hosted after-hours activities such as discipleship groups, language club meetings, evening videos, and even individual studying.

In spite of its usefulness, Woolsey has a lot of structural problems. "From the angle of the maintenance department, it's not a good building," Ries commented. "It takes a lot to heat it. The thing wasn't built well."

Since money was scarce in 1922, the college had decided to economize by making their own bricks from creek bed clay and firing them in a kiln on campus. Also, much of the oak wood in Woolsey came from a large oak tree near the seminary. Bob Fiegl, head of maintenance from 1950-77, noticed quite a few problems with Woolsey. The heating system was poor, pipes would disintegrate, and floors would give way, requiring maintenance to crawl underneath to fix them. "They probably built it as they went along," said Mr. Fiegl. "I

had that idea when I was working on it. There was not much engineering, and probably not even a blueprint. They ran the joints the wrong way, and when they got it partway up they ran into problems because it started to spread on them. It's had quite a bit of renovating since then. We did a lot of changing on it."

So the workmen came, immediately after Houghton's May graduation, with hacking tools and wrecking equipment. One day later, many of the windows were gone, while piles of broken boards and fiberglass insulation lay strewn across the floor of nearly every room. "Class of '88" was scrawled in charcoal at the end of the arcade, and other classes had left their mark elsewhere. Each blow of the hammer — each bang and bump — made the remaining windows vibrate. An old textbook served as a doorstop, leaving the building open to final visits from community members driven by curiosity, sentiment, or the prospect of obtaining a keepsake from the building. Angela and Renee, two sophomores, emerged with their arms full of old books and posters. "Hi," Angela said. "We're just coming out with our loot." The books and magazines, lying in abundant heaps on the floors or shelved as they had been for several decades, were free to be carried off or destroyed. An old lamp sitting near the entrance intrigued Dr. Dub Bence, the college's academic dean. It was one of the valuable things being removed, in addition to paintings, lounge furniture, ancient light fixtures, oak paneling and bookcases, the sign "Woolsey Hall," and a piano.

What did the dean — himself an alumnus — think about the demolition? "It had to go. I'm not a sentimental person about these types of things," he said casually. "It's swell. I'm ready for a new building."

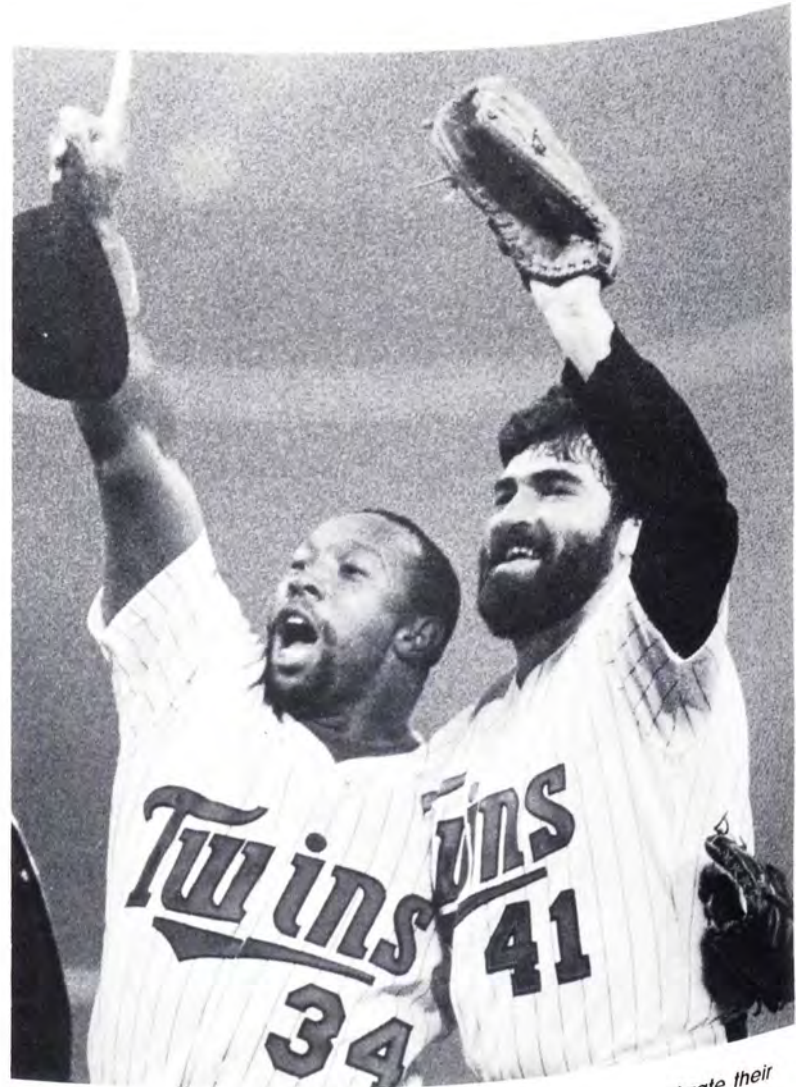
An earthquake that measured 6.1 on the Richter scale hit Southern California in October. It was not a catastrophic quake, but the damage was extensive.

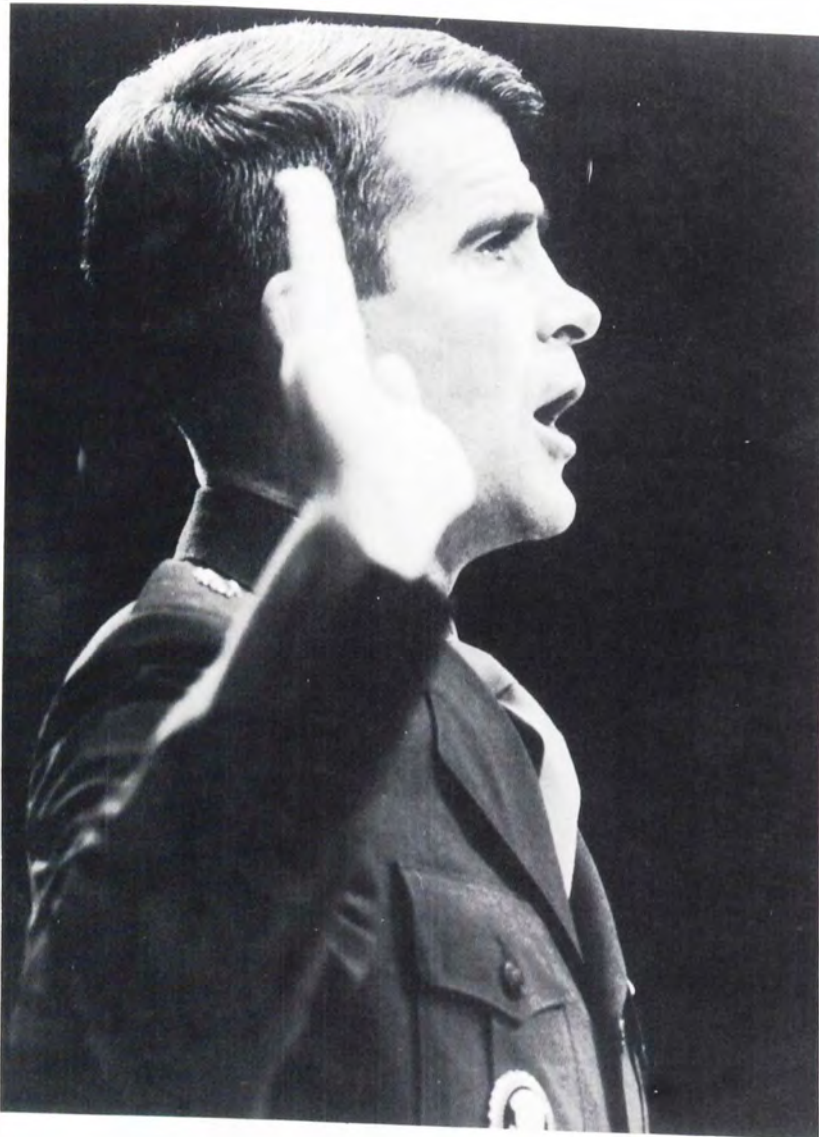

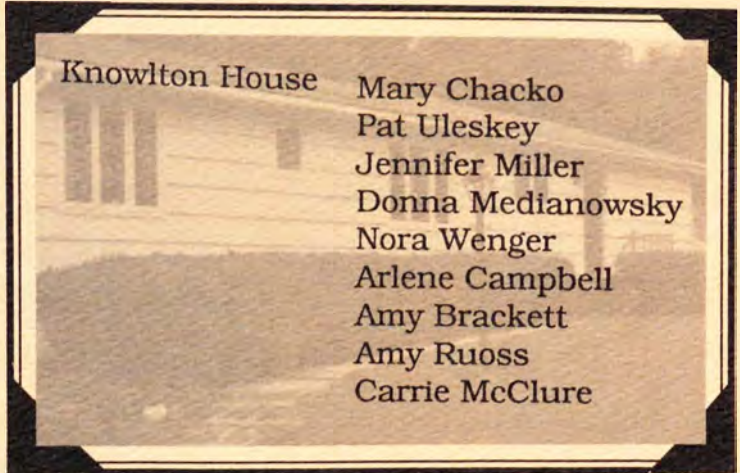

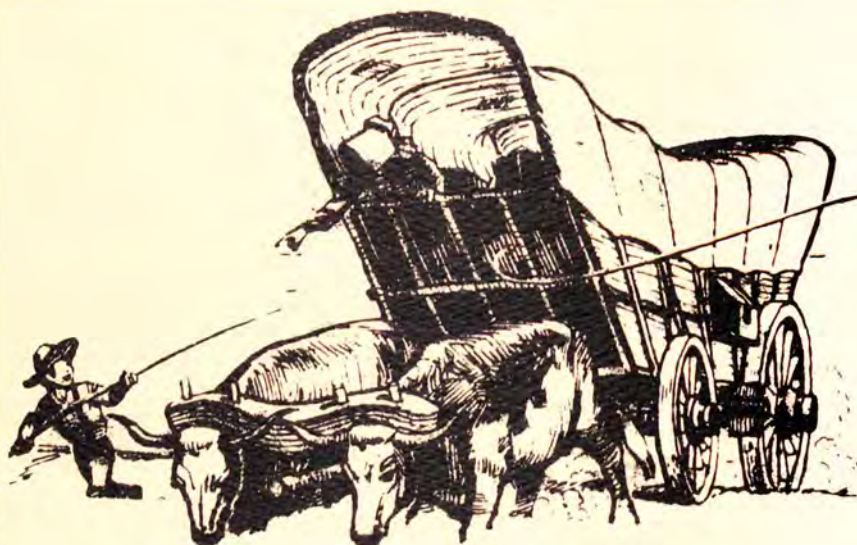
