


























Much More Than Coach

that wins and loses together and plays the game for the love of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.



Among the records broken were: Most Consecutive Games without a Loss (18), Most Goals Scored in a Season (94), and Most Shutouts in a Season (11). The team landed a slot in the national ranks as 13th in the country. Plus, the Lady Highlander offense was ranked 4th in the nation (4.95 goals/games average) while their defense was ranked 3rd, allowing an average of 0.53 goals per game. Also for the third consecutive year the ladies maintained their championship of the Keystone Empire Collegiate Conference. In addition, the team received the NSCAA Team Ethics Award for receiving no yellow or red cards, only one of four teams to do so nationally.

The ladies' final regular season record was 17-0-0. This, too, was a record since no Houghton team, men's or women's, has ever had an undefeated season. The ladies lost their first match in Regional play against Green Mountain College in Vermont, just missing the National tournament.

Senior forward, Heidi Gugler, was named to the NSCAA-Umbro All-American team. Heidi, Erin Warren, and Danielle Phillips were named to the Northeast Regional All-Star Team. Amy Lemon and Rebecca Outt were All-Northeast NSCAA-Umbro Team selections.




























Guests on Campus






SHENAWANA DORM COUNCIL








THE BOULDER








HABITAT FOR HUMANITY




a result of this engagement, the group held its first gospel concert in April at the Houghton Wesleyan Church in the village.


IMPRESSIONS

Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?'



Volume 73 of the Houghton College 1996 Boulder was printed by Jostens Printing and Publishing Company,401 Science Park Road, State College, Pennsylvania 16804. Larry McCullen served as the Jostens representative. This yearbook was produced on Aldus PageMaker 5.0 using a Macintosh Performa 636CD and the word-processing was done on ClarisWorks. The press run was 1250 copies at a trim size of 9 x 12 inches, with 256 pages including the inserted, Jostens produced, World Beat which covers the year in terms of world events and popular fads.

The cover is Maroon 490 with a Mission 1212 grain. The theme "Stages" is debossed in a Carpenter font and runs into a tool line on both ends. "Boulder 1996" is also debossed and written in a block font. Endsheets were printed differently front and back on Agate 268 cover stock. Both Carpenter and Block fonts were used on the front sheet and the school seal was printed at 30% black. There were 29 pages of process color that were placed in the opening Campus Life section. All body copy and captions were printed in 12 point Palatino and 8 point Palatino, respectively.

The photographs were taken by the Boulder's photograpy staff or submitted by either students or faculty. All portraits of the underclassmen, faculty and staff were taken by Knack and Richards Inc. which was represented by Mark Gabler. About 20 members served on the 1996 Boulder staff, assisted by numerous people throughout campus.
