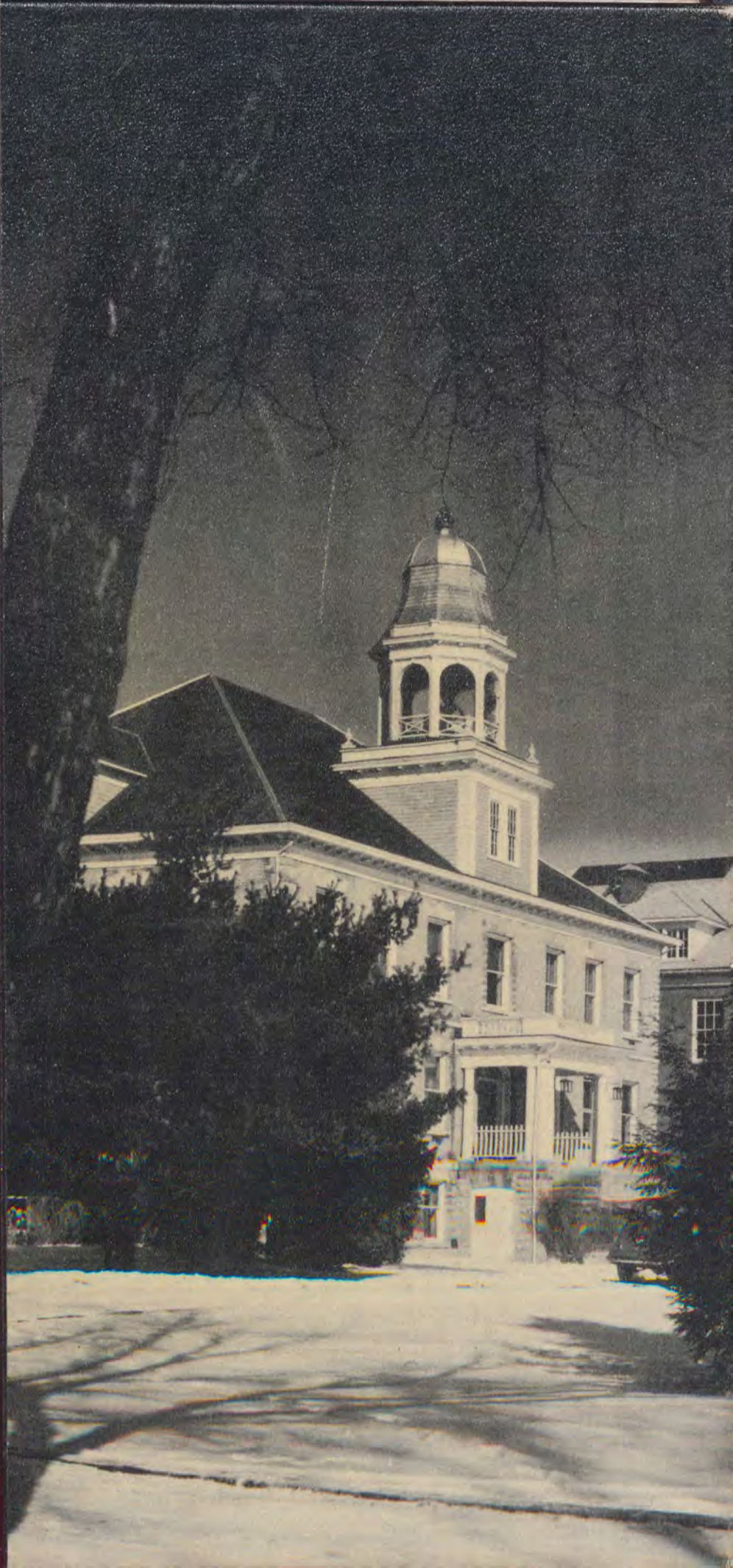
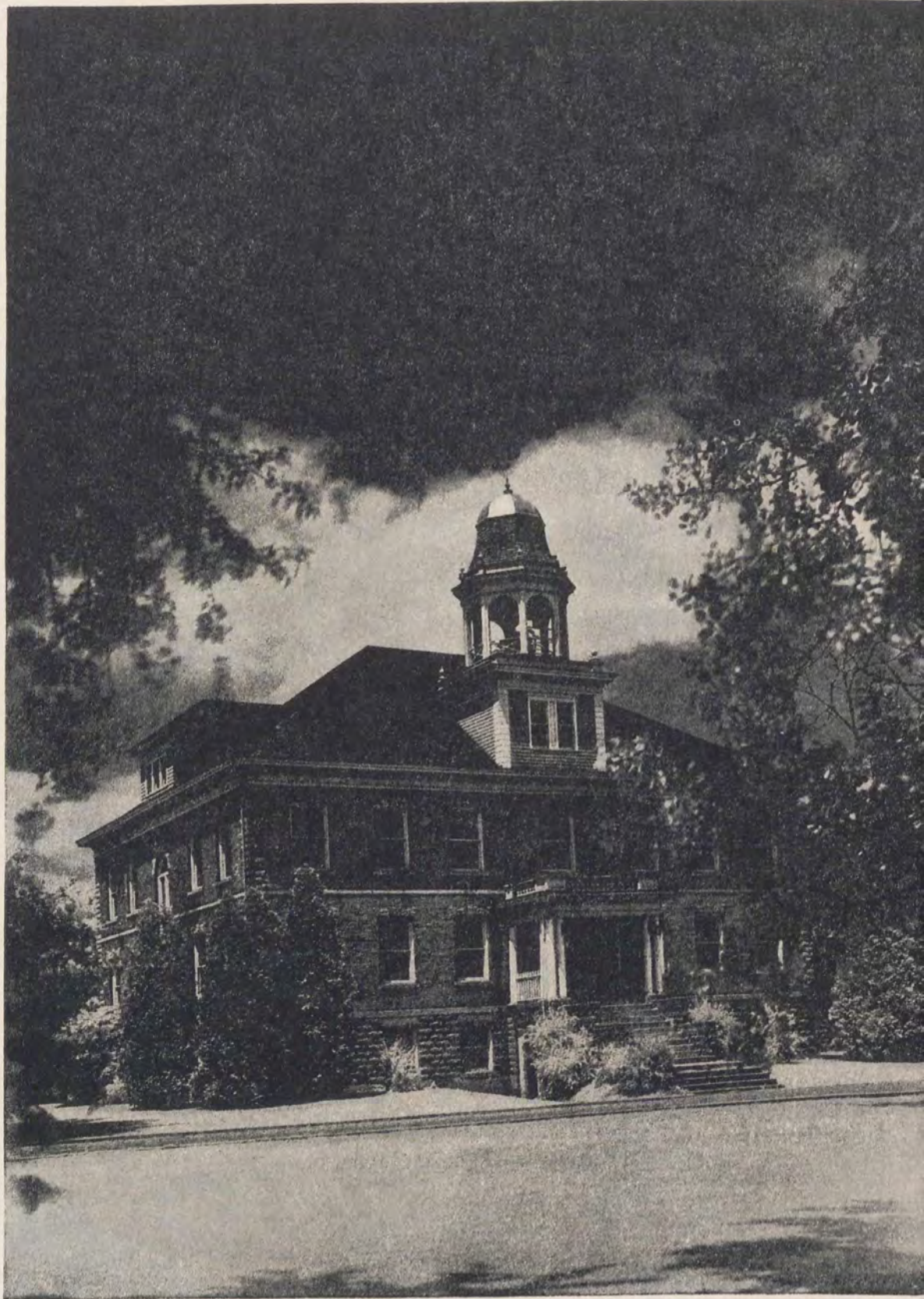

"There aren't enough chairs in this room. Anybody know where I could get some more?"

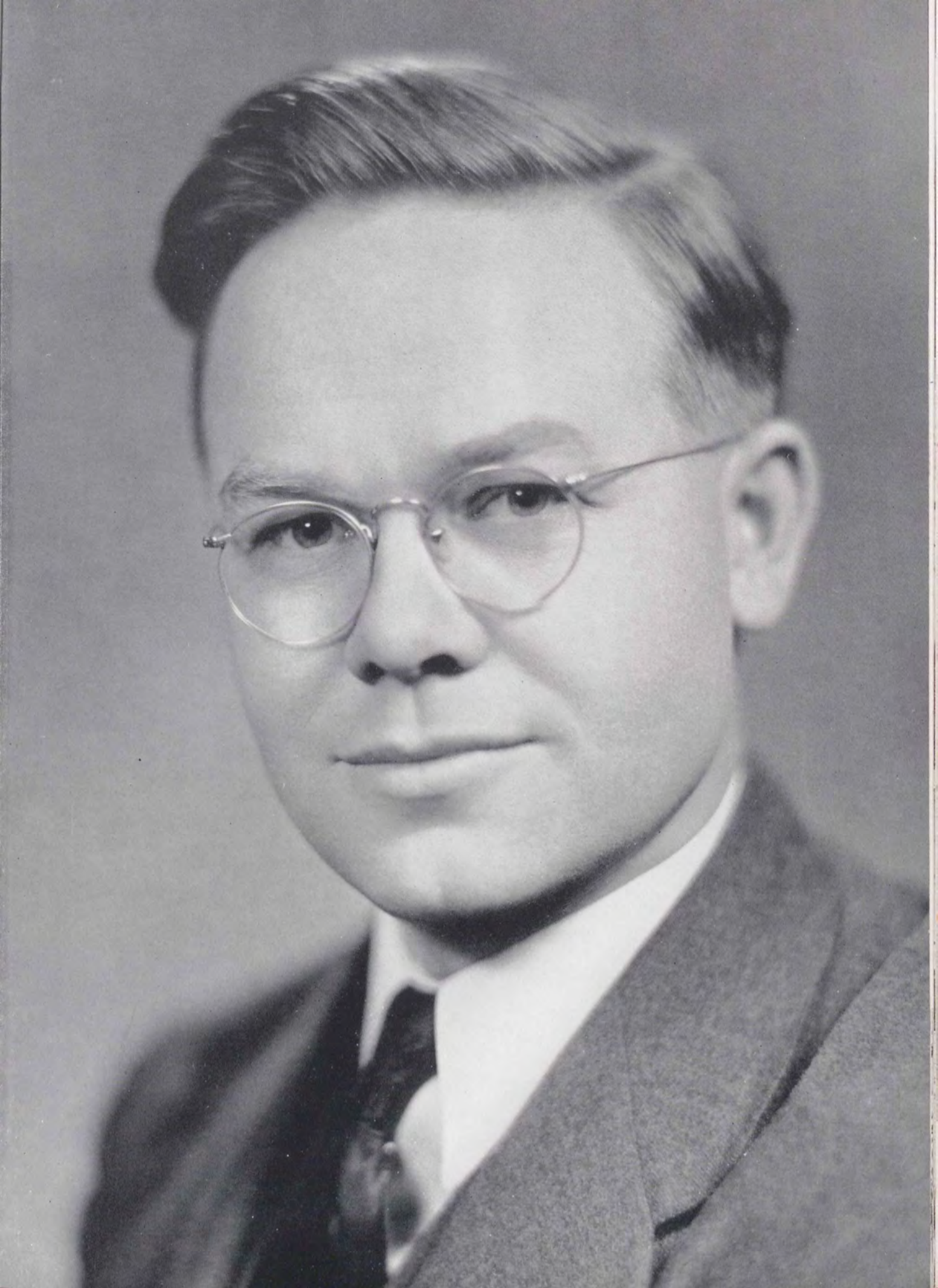
"Mr. Pryor might be able to help you."

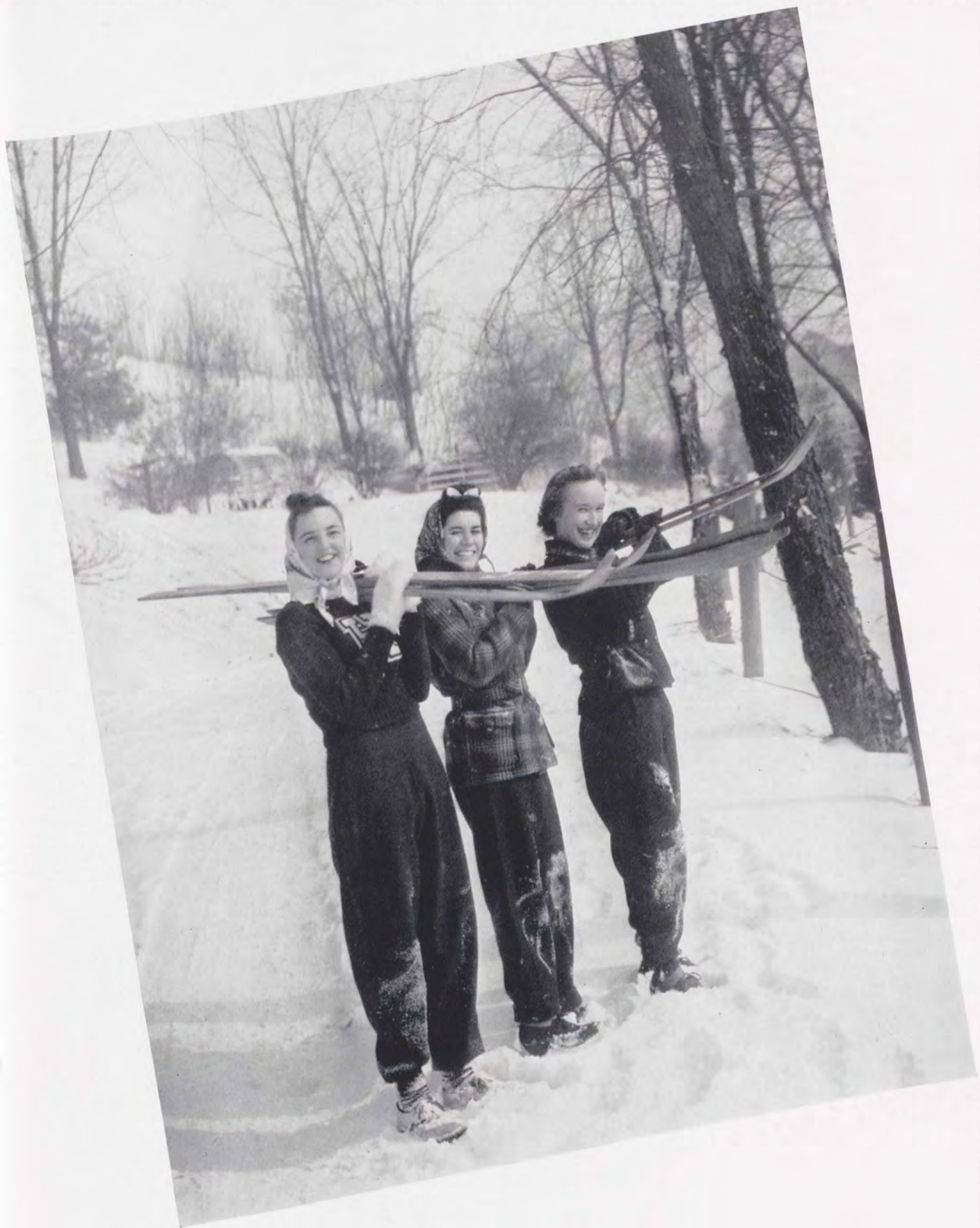

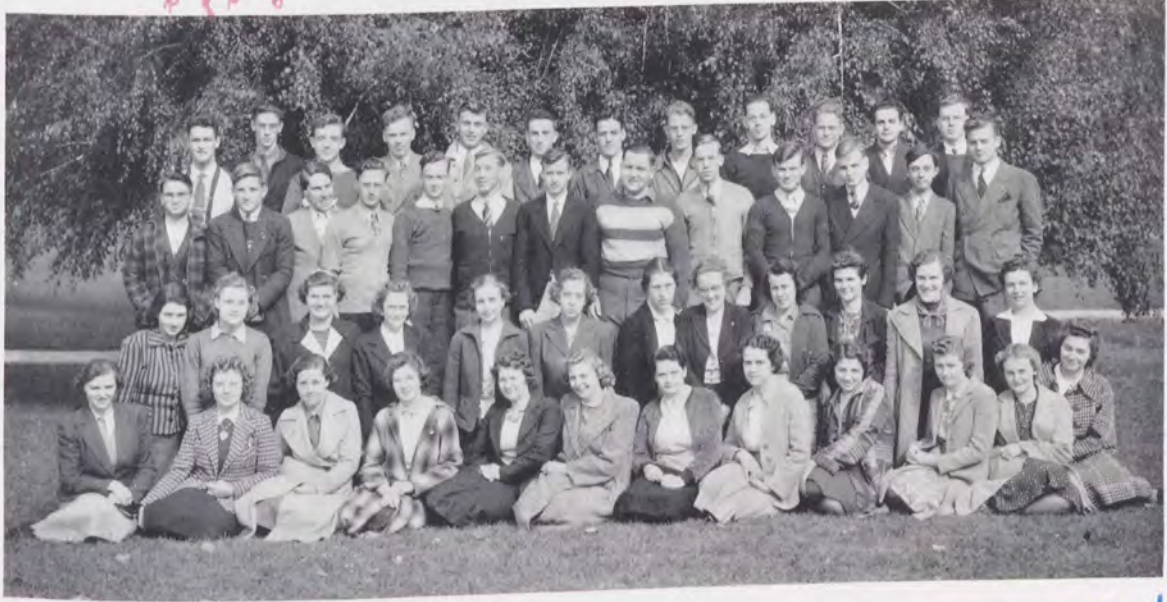

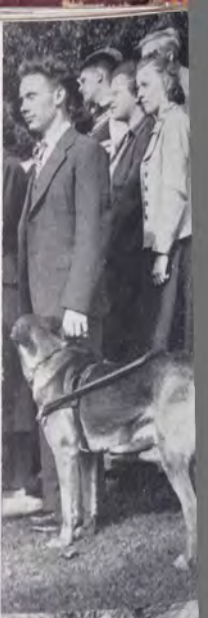

Have you noticed that other outstanding characteristic? Punctillousness or, more specifically, exactness and neatness in the form of the composition of the "*Hoton Weekly*," has increased the inter-

est of the student body in the publication. Clean cut news presented in a clean cut manner characterizes our publication.

In order to bring to the student body the best in editorials, there was formed this year an editorial board whose duties were not only to assist in the writing of editorials but also in the formulation of the paper's policies.

Among the other innovations which made for a better *Star* was the more extensive use of cuts and also the introduction of two new features. One of these is the Music Column; the other the "Literati," the material being supplied by English students, particularly freshmen.

Notoriously the *Star* staff does lots of work, takes lots of "gripes" and gets little recognition. 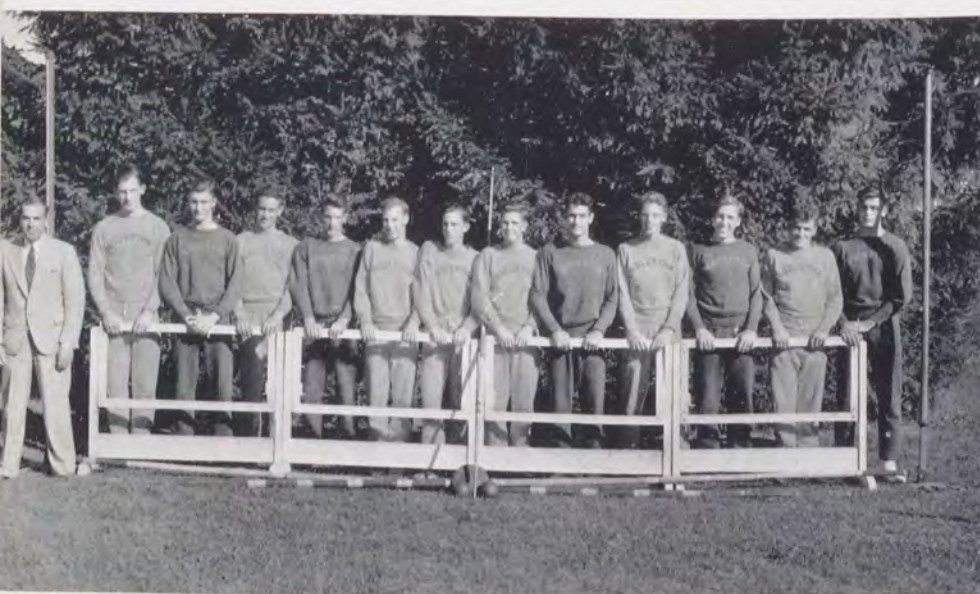
