

She also oversees the decoration of the lounge and makes sure all the guest rooms are in order.

Mrs. Brenneman goes about all these duties with an air of approachability that students and visitors really appreciate. She especially seems to thrive on conversation, whether chatting in person with people at the desk or greeting phone callers. "It's the greatest job!" Kathy enthuses. "It lets me talk a lot."

# What direction we're taking

All around us at Houghton we see transition as we face the task of trying to meet the challenges of a world that insists on progress while keeping alive our tradition-filled past. It's always difficult to reconcile the old and the new, and a lot of discussion and debate has been necessary, on everything from pursuing the Campaign for Houghton to implementing college music policy change.

The campus itself is adjusting to a transformation. In the past four years, we've said goodbye to both Gaovadeo and Woolsey. Fancher Hall, at "eighty-four" the oldest building on the present Houghton campus, still maintains its classic grace despite the indignity of being moved onto the previous site of Gao in the spring of 1987. Now it watches as the New Academic Building quickly takes form where Woolsey once stood. Also finished this year were renovations turning the Wesleyan Campground Dining Commons on the hill by the gym into a new facility for the art department. The Stevens Art

Studios were dedicated this past September.

The money raised in the Campaign for Houghton has exceeded the original goal of \$13.5 million, and we look forward with excitement to what these funds will mean for Houghton College. The target date for occupancy of the academic building is September 1989, and plans are in the works for a new and badly needed Fine Arts Center. These ambitious projects reflect Houghton's strides to keep up the competitive pace of higher education. College rules and policies have been revamped, too. This past year we have tightened security at the library and increased the number of dorm open houses. Some say these changes clash with traditional Houghton values; others feel they are simply realistic adaptations to a changing world.





It became an international effort of good will. Russians and American rescuers cut through the ice in Alaska to save two California gray whales. The whales were trapped in the ice for more than three weeks.



Particularly popular was the thought-provoking exhibit of "Christian Imagery in Contemporary Art." 



#### **WJSL**

WJSL has long been recognized for its efforts to bring the Houghton community and the surrounding area Christian programming as well as news about current events both near and far. Its primary target area runs from Castile in the north to Wellsville in the south; it also extends twenty-five to thirty miles to the east and west. The actual radius in which WJSL can be heard reasonably well is in the forty-five to fifty-mile range.

For about nine hours per day, WJSL carries the Mars Hill Network (WMHR) in Syracuse, whose wide variety of broadcast features includes Focus on the Family, Insight for Living, and many Bible and children's programs. At other times, most notably early mornings and evenings after eight, student DJs are on the air with Christian music and news, weather, and sports. New this year are the Solid Rock hour (note the clever reference to Jesus as our Rock), which showcases heavy Christian contemporary music from 10:00-11:00 P.M. weekdays, and a well-received concert hour weekdays from 2:05 to 3:05 P.M.

WJSL provides student staff opportunities for professional growth as they develop practical skills in broadcasting and formulate a more general philosophy on being Christian communicators. Besides its twenty-five-plus student DJs, WJSL has six student managers—Mike Virga: Control Room Coordinator, Brennan Smith: Production Co-ordinator, Mark Hollamby: News Co-ordinator, Stephen Manney: Sports Manager, Becky Lutz: Librarian and Traffic Coordinator, and Jeff Kennell: Engineering Assistant.

Manager David Manney says he is very pleased not only with his staff but with the growing number of positive reactions he has received as people have become aware of WJSL. He points out that just before Christmas the station gave away twenty-two new Bibles in a contest, some to as far away as Bradford, Pa. Says Manney: "We have some excellent opportunities to serve."



#### Amnesty International



#### Habitat for Humanity

The site: downtown Buffalo, at the intersection of Mortimer and Genesee St.

A lone black prostitute shifts restlessly from leg to leg on a nearby corner. Across the street lies a yard of smashed, forgotten cars. But in a boarded-up, four-story warehouse, a group of Houghton College students are hard at work, tearing down fire-damaged walls and ceilings, chopping up frozen debris from concrete floors, carting usable lumber into piles, wearing work gloves, dust masks, and eye-goggles, but all loving every minute of their shared toil. This is Habitat for Humanity, one of Houghton's newest chapter organizations (as of October 1988), in action.

Bridging the social and economic gaps between people is what this international Christian organization strives for. Habitat bases itself on a "partnership model" where, according to advisors Jeanne Ortiz and Troy Martin, "people share skills and donate time to tangibly provide interest-free housing to families who would otherwise not have adequate housing." Houghton's warehouse project in Buffalo will serve a double use: upper floors are being renovated into housing for the homeless while the lower floors store Habitat equipment and supplies.

On campus, too, Habitat made waves this year. Thanks to the efforts of fundraiser Tim Swauger, a highly-attended basketball game between the Buffalo Bills and Allegany faculty all-stars took place on April 14. The profits benefited the fledgling Genesee Valley (of which Houghton is a part) and Buffalo Affiliates of Habitat for Humanity.

For the volunteers involved, "getting their hands dirty for the Lord" has proven to be exciting. Whether fellowshipping with new Christian friends from other affiliates or just being visible witnesses to the Genesee St. neighborhood, all joyfully participate in a practical expression of God's love for others.








The year's theme was "reaching out and in," descriptive of BSO's effort to support the Black students on campus and educate the college community as a whole about the reality of Black culture.

**Clown Ministry** 





At Christmas time, they, Chapel Choir, and the SUNY-Geneseo Chamber Singers combined for performances of Handel's Messiah and Bach's Cantata 63 with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra. In March at the Eastern Division Music Educators National Conference in Boston, College Choir and vocal soloist Nicole St. Victor presented the U.S. premiere of a Haitian folk mass for choir and orchestra. They were accompanied by selected instrumentalists from the Houghton College Philharmonia and from Port-au-Prince's Orchestra Philharmonique Sainte Trinite.

Later in the spring, the College Choir returned to New England for an extended tour over Easter vacation. To close the year, they provided music for Baccalaureate and gave their annually popular Home Concert and Parent's concert.


he field hockey team ended its season with four wins and eleven losses, but both the team and their new coach, Connie Finney, feel this record does not represent all that was achieved.






Womerball Basketball










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# "Alive 'N' Kicking"

Houghton's fine arts division has been spreading its wings this year, and that undoubtedly means good things for everyone—even those who have never picked up a paintbrush or sat down at a piano.

King says that in addition to the new facilities, he anticipates a joint music major with the Language and Literature Division.



### The Business of Change

The Division of History and Social Science is one of the most diversified divisions at Houghton College, with departments of Business Administration and Economics, Psychology, History and Political Science, and Sociology and Social Work. These depart-


ments contain two of the three largest majors—Business Administration and Psychology which together comprise approximately twenty-five percent of all declared majors. Interns from these two departments as well as from the Social Work department give the Division a major role at the Buffalo Suburban Campus. Three new majors were offered this year. One is an accounting major, which is now being approved by the state. Admissions personnel and administrators found that there was a areat demand for this major and feel, to quote new accounting professor Mr. Myron Hubler, "that it is a bold strategic move" for Houghton College. A new Social Work major is being offered through a collaborative effort which allows interested students to spend their first two years at Houghton and their finishing two at Buffalo State University. The third change is a revamping of the Psychology major.

Formerly, two psych. majors were offered—a B.S. of thirty-six hours and a B.A. of twenty-four hours. These have now been combined into one thirty-one-hour major which is believed to be a "happy medium" between liberal arts and psychological specialization.

Department and Division leadership are also in a somewhat transitory stage. One of the more noteworthy changes is that Dr. John Van Wicklin is stepping down as division chairman. Dr. Daryl Stevenson will hold the office next year. Another change is the retirement of Dr. Arnold Cook, who had been the department head of Business Administration for twenty-nine years. His role has been taken by Mr. Richard Halberg and his teaching duties

An important aim of any college is to produce students who are aware of what's going on in our world and are capable of coping with progress. At Houghton, many divisions are working toward that goal with new faculty, classes, and programs. Science and Mathematics division chairman Fred Shannon thinks that's great, but he is also proud that his division has seen relatively little change this year. The Science and Mathematics faculty exhibits generally low turnover. and Shannon feels this lends stability to a division that has to deal with a lot of "outside-world" innovations in everything from medicine to physics.

Even so, there have been some interesting developments this year. For one, Dr. Shannon is new to the division chairman position.

Marine biologist Dr. James Wolfe has also joined us. Several professors carried on important research; particularly notable is Dr. Bernard Piersma's project in electrochemistry—a field in which he is recognized by academic circles as far away as Moscow. The math department, under Dr. Richard Pocock, welcomed the Derek A. Zave Mathematics Library, a gift of a thousand math books and several hundred computer science and physics books.

The division, says Shannon, is continually seeking ways to improve teaching methods and the program as a whole. Its most pressing goals for next year is to identify potential financial resources to replace several badly needed scientific instruments.

### Achievement and Evaluation

For Houghton's Religion and Philosophy Department, the 1988-89 academic year has included many individual achievements. Several of the faculty have, in addition to their Houghton commitments, pursued various outside projects. They have published works in such diverse periodicals as Christian Scholar's Review (Dr. Carlton Fisher), The Wesleyan Advocate (Dr. Brian Sayers, Dr. David Meade), The Preachers' Magazine(division chairman Carl Schultz), and Decision (Dr. Warren Woolsey).

In addition, several of the faculty are at work on books, volume segments, and courses. Dr. Schultz has recently completed studies on Job and Ecclesiastes for the Asbury Bible Commentary and on the Psalms for the Wesley Study Bible. Dr. Harold Kingdon has instructed Albany-area teachers in Biblical Literature via the Op Tel system. Others have delivered addresses at colleges, Christian Fellowships, and divisional symposia.

This year has also been one of departmental evaluation.

The division has been considering possible revisions in the philosophy major and the missions minor, as well as the development of a new masters program in biblical and research studies.

The students within the department garnered their share of honors as well. Most notable among them was Jeff Crosby, voted the recipient of the American Bible Society Award. This award is given annually to a selected outstanding senior Bible major.


The end of exams in May is cause for stu-


#### Dear Graduates:
