Dear Friends,

I have had a number of "new beginnings." The most significant of all would be my acceptance of Jesus Christ as my Lord and Savior and beginning an intentional relationship with Jesus as a teenager. Others have included starting college, getting married, becoming a father, beginning my first chief executive role and, of course, beginning a new chapter of work and life at Houghton College.

There is one particular beginning that I do not often talk about but which has had particular significance in my life. In August of 2005, Monica and I lost our home in St. Bernard Parish, Louisiana, to Hurricane Katrina. Knowing that a monster storm was approaching the Gulf Coast, we made the decision to evacuate. Thankfully, we had the means and ability to do so, unlike so many others living in our region. We fully expected to return home within a day or two, possibly with a bit of flooding. We had miscalculated. We lost our home and just about everything in it. I will never forget walking into our home for the first



time after being allowed to return to see our refrigerator at the staircase on the 2nd floor.

On the other side of Hurricane Katrina, our lives began anew. Much more important than anything we lost, here is what God taught us:

- » While you will have to weather some storms in this life, I will be with you, always. (Psalm 27:4-6)
- » I am able to keep you through the storms of life and restore you on the other side of those storms. (1 Peter 5:10)
- » I will make all things good for those who love me and have been called according to my purpose. (Romans 8:28)

With this issue of Houghton Magazine, as you read about the new beginnings of fearless Houghton students and alumni, I encourage you to identify the ways in their lives and in your life that God cares for us, equips us and strengthens us, even in our new beginnings. Our beginnings are often fresh opportunities for God to showcase His amazing power and continued faithfulness.

FAITH OVER FEAR

When the 286th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion of the Maine Army National Guard deployed to Kandahar, Afghanistan, in 2009, each member took a dog tag inscribed with Joshua 1:9: "Do not be frightened and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

Those dog tags were a gift from the unit's chaplain and from their commanding officer, **Diane** (Meserve '88) Dunn. For Diane, that scripture carried a vital message she wanted those under her command to remember—and one she also needed to reflect on regularly.

A life in the military comes with a great deal of transition, uncertainty and opportunity for fearless beginnings on a routine basis. So, when Diane retired from the National Guard in October of 2021, she was prepared to face an unknown future with a faith developed throughout a lifetime of learning to trust God with composure and contentment.

Diane came to Houghton in the 1980s, intent on a college degree but with no idea how she was going to pay for it. With help from **Troy Martin** '83 in the Student Financial Services office, scholarship aid, work-study and participation in Houghton's Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) program, God made a way for Diane to finish her degree in psychology and pursue what has become a remarkable career.

It was her experience on the Highlander Wilderness
Adventure—a program created for first-year students by
Doris "Mabel" (Garrett '71) Nielsen—that convinced
Diane ROTC was the right fit for her. The skills she explored—team-building, bonding, testing herself—transferred well to the life she would eventually lead in the National Guard. She learned to overcome challenges, to do things she didn't think she was capable of, to rely on the support of others, to trust in God's plan, and to apply leadership skills and mental health care skills to everyday life.

Diane tirelessly filled her college years in the classroom, on the basketball court under Coach Robert "Bob" Smalley '78, in the kitchen, in the Snack Shop under "Big" Al Rehn, and even babysitting for faculty and staff members like Dr. Paul and Debbie (Fero '76) Young '76. And, of course, the effort of service with ROTC—which took up regular weekends for training exercises—under the mentorship of Dr. Robert Danner, Vice President for Student Life.

Directly out of college, commissioned into the Maine Army National Guard, Diane took on work in the civilian sector for a community mental health agency. During her years in community health, Diane developed incredible skills, balancing her full-time job, raising a family and fulfilling her Guard requirements. Her plate was full, and when the opportunity came to combine the work she did in the civilian sector with a full-time military role, she took it.

Diane served full-time in the National Guard from 1997 until her retirement in the fall of 2021. At the time of her retirement, Diane held the rank of Brigadier General and was the first female general officer in the history of the Maine Army National Guard.

Her retirement brought a new opportunity for a fearless beginning for Diane. Today, the same as a decade ago when she was leading her unit in Afghanistan, Diane relies upon the wisdom found in Joshua 1:9—the truth that God is truly with her wherever she goes.

We don't have to be afraid; know for a fact that God is in control.

Diane needs that truth as she begins anew in the civilian world. Today, she serves as Special Advisor to the President at the University of Maine. Using all the skills she has developed over a lifetime of leadership, she is carrying forward a number of special projects. She's also adjusting to civilian life and the change in support structure from her time in the National Guard.

Over the last 15 years of her career, throughout her time in Afghanistan, Texas, Colorado and Maine, Diane developed a powerful connection with her Chaplain—who today serves as the State Chaplain for the Maine Army National Guard. As the only woman and as a leader, Diane often found she had no one in whom she could confide other than her Chaplain. He was, and remains, a faithful spiritual advisor and prayer support.

Diane is learning how to be a light in her current role. She's living out her Gospel calling in a completely different context, and she's realizing the continued need she has to surround herself with the support of a Christian community.

As Diane embarks on this new venture, she has some words of wisdom to share with others who are preparing to start their next fearless beginning. "Go big—fearlessly. Trust God, rely on your faith, and don't hesitate. Be at peace with the options God is presenting to you. Heed His call, and go for it with much prayer and faithfulness. We don't have to be afraid; know for a fact that God is in control. Know your job; do the best that you can. Be intentional, be present, and serve others. You're there for a reason."

Nuclear safeguards and nonproliferation. It takes a great scientist to understand this complicated topic and a great communicator to explain it to the rest of the world. Sitting with **Dr. Katrina Koehler '11**Associate Professor of Physics, it's clear she's both. In addition to being a physicist and communicator, Katrina is a passionate advocate for diversity in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields; deeply interested in advancing missions efforts around the world; and devoted to consistently practicing the spiritual disciplines.

These are the ingredients that make up an amazing professor—one who is uniquely suited to Houghton College and our students.

Dr. Koehler's Houghton story began at Rosslyn Academy in Kenya, when she met with an admission recruiter. Dr. Koehler was highly attracted by Houghton's low faculty-to-student ratio and by the first-year Honors program entitled "East Meets West."

Katrina came to rural Allegany County without a strong inclination toward a particular future career path. She considered math and physics. Literature, education and even a career in missions work in Islamic nations also made the prospective careers list. Even after Katrina settled on a dual degree in physics and mathematics, she filled her elective credits with a wide array of liberal arts courses, particularly in humanities.

Houghton's emphasis on hands-on science was a substantial boon to Dr. Koehler. She worked closely with her advisor, Dr. Mark Yuly, Professor of Physics, through five semesters of research and two summers in what is now known as the Shannon Summer Research Institute at the Los Alamos National Lab in New Mexico. Dr. Yuly encouraged her to present at a national conference during her undergraduate studies.

Her time at the conference and her experience with research led to a gap year at Los Alamos National Lab where she continued gaining research experience in a mentorship program.

Nine additional years at Los Alamos, with a break to work on her master's and PhD at Western Michigan University, saw Dr. Koehler promoted to research scientist at Los Alamos. She could have settled into a full-blown research career and the notoriety that comes with that type of profession. However, Dr. Koehler realized that the most fulfilling part of her work was the mentorship role she played for the aspiring student researchers who started their careers at Los Alamos.

When Dr. Yuly invited her to apply for the physics professorship opening, Dr. Koehler was excited for the opportunity to return to her alma mater to impact future scholar-servants. Pulling up the stakes she had planted in New Mexico, she moved back to Houghton and traded her lab for a classroom.

"As I thought about the change," Dr. Koehler shared, "I realized the question I needed to ask myself was, 'Do I want to work for The Kingdom, or do I want to work for my own kingdom?' It turns out, I want to do Kingdom Work, and here I am."

She did not just give up a chance at scientific notoriety by returning to Houghton. Dr. Koehler shares that the hardest part of a transition for her—and she's had many in her life as a "third-culture kid" and young professional—is finding a new church home. The church body is a place where one becomes deeply known, and the process of becoming known to a new group of believers is not easy.

Dr. Koehler shares that, in this season of struggling to become known, she is leaning into the spiritual disciplines. Relying on the encouragement of Dr. Richard J. Foster's Celebration of Discipline, Katrina focuses on a nightly prayer ritual and daily scripture readings. These things frame her day and encourage

"Houghton taught me to fix things wherever I go. Just as Jesus was sent, we're sent from Houghton into places that have 'leaky faucets.' The Lord is with us always, and he puts little things in our path which require attention; he uses us to build community."

It is a common feeling expressed by almost every person experiencing a major life transition: the need for deep connection with other human beings. In many ways, leaving Houghton amplifies this feeling because of the profound and life-changing relationships that develop here. The close-knit nature and the authenticity of the Houghton community are difficult to find anywhere else, and settling in a new place can feel like having the rug pulled out from under you.

In those times of missing interpersonal connections, we often find we have two choices: wait for community to find us or set out to build it ourselves.

Ryan Ozzello '21 is a builder.

"Leaving the connection of Houghton was hard, but I prayed about how I could bring what Houghton taught me about community and build that where I am now. There are ways we can improve things wherever we go. I decided to take the good things I learned at Houghton and build on them."

He uses metaphors like repairing leaky faucets and securing creaky stairs to describe the small tasks he is taking on to build an authentic community of Christ-followers, even when he feels disconnected.

Ryan graduated from Houghton in May 2021, facing a strange job market in the midst of the pandemic. He had just completed dual degrees in data science and computer science with a minor in mathematics. Ryan knew he loved analytics, but the complicating factors of the job market and the high barriers of entry to data science work caused him to question if God was calling him into something else.

After a semester in Houghton's distinctive Emmanuel Scholars program, Ryan was deeply committed to seeking out not just a job but God's vocational calling on his life. He spent time asking himself, "What do I see about God's world that is beautiful that others don't see?"

Emmanuel Scholars is designed to cultivate students like Ryan who are uniquely equipped for spiritual leadership by first developing in them a sense of calling and a firm foundation of spiritual disciplines. It also provides them with the tools necessary to serve their brothers and sisters both on campus and through their future vocations. In the context of a supportive cohort, students grow in their understanding of God's vocational calling on their lives and the ways in which they can serve as spiritual leaders wherever God places them. Students pursuing either formal ministry or personal ministry are fully equipped to have a Kingdom impact on their communities and spheres of influence.

Through the vocational searching built into Emmanuel Scholars and a keenly developed habit of prayer, Ryan came to see that God had gifted him with the ability to interpret, analyze and understand data that allow him to serve the world in a unique way.

When Ryan was offered two positions outside of data science—one in business analytics and one in performance engineering—at Rochester-based Paychex, Inc., the largest HR company for small to medium-sized businesses, he was courageous enough to be patient and respectfully turn them down.

It was a bold move, one that most career advisors wouldn't suggest. When declining the job offers, Ryan spoke—as he often does—with humble confidence. He told the team at Paychex he felt he was best suited to data science and analytics and that he could bring the greatest value to this Fortune 500 company in that type of role.

Ryan's outstanding resumé—complete with internships with the City of Rochester and Land O'Lakes—and the incredible communication and interpersonal skills he'd developed through Houghton's liberal arts education left an impression on the Paychex team. When a data science position opened up, they called Ryan to ask him to apply.

Although, on paper, Ryan wasn't qualified for the position because of experience, Paychex hired him anyway. The courage to pursue God's vocational calling led Ryan to his dream job as a data scientist in his preferred city.

As he's settling into Rochester, he's building community—just as Houghton taught him to do. He created a group chat called "Hungry for More," a faithful gathering of Jesus followers who meet regularly to encourage each other. Through Hungry for More, Ryan brings Houghton's lessons of intentional investment in others and personal connections with people to his new community.

Ryan has a heart for mentoring others who are getting ready to graduate from college and head for the job market. He possesses the gift of a shepherd, an encourager and a truth-speaker. "Don't act out of fear; I wouldn't be where I am if I had acted out of fear. It's much better to move forward with fearlessness. Fear doesn't control you, so you can live in the will of God."

Where does generosity begin? For Bryan and Robin Gerard, as for many of us, it begins with gratitude. Adam Gerard **'19** (pictured at left with Dr. Richard Eckley) graduated from Houghton with a degree in theology. He moved to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to being his career in ministry at Amplify Church while also working for Riverside Center for Innovation, a non-profit organization focused on economic development with minority-owned businesses. Adam plans to utilize his

education and life experience to bring restoration and the Gospel to the city and people of Pittsburgh.

Adam, and his parents Bryan and Robin, are profoundly grateful for his transformational Houghton experience, particularly the mentorship of Richard Eckley, Professor Emeritus of Theology.

A student in a number of Dr. Eckley's classes, Adam kept finding his way to the professor's office where he encountered genuine interest, concern and friendly advice. "Rich went above and beyond to mentor Adam in his academic pursuits, his vocational pursuits and his spiritual life," explains Bryan Gerard.

The Gerards are passionate about Biblical education and firmly believe in the mission of Houghton College. Because of these motivators and the impact of Professor Eckley on Adam's life, they were inspired to begin a conversation with **Ben Colter '82**, Donor Engagement Coordinator, about benefitting future theology students to help make Houghton even more affordable. That ongoing conversation eventually included Karl Sisson, Vice President for Advancement and External Engagement. Karl discussed the lasting power of an endowed scholarship with the Gerards. He shared how it could effectively be utilized to meet their personal goals while also paying tribute to Dr. Eckley.

Bryan and Robin made a verbal commitment to create the Professor Richard Eckley Scholarship and, in September 2021, developed the criteria for the award. The scholarship is offered to a student studying theology and planning to pursue a career in full-time ministry as either a missionary or a pastor.

This sort of fearless generosity inspires others. As others have learned about the way in which the Gerards have honored Dr. Eckley, they've chosen to create endowed scholarships as well. Shortly before the passing of his wife, Mary (Sell '56) Kingdon, retired theology professor Rev. Harold Kingdon '57 created the Harold and Mary (Sell) Kingdon Scholarship. This fund inspired others to give in memory of Mary after her passing. When college friend Rev. Charles Williamson '58 learned of the fund honoring the Kingdons, he and his wife Edna decided to give sooner than planned to experience the joy of helping Houghton students access a high-quality, Christ-centered education.

Dr. Eckley's investment in Adam Gerard inspired Bryan and Robin Gerard. The Gerards' generosity inspired Harold and Mary Kingdon, which, in turn, inspired Charles and Edna Williamson. There are future chapters of gratitude yet to be written. What chapter will you write?


MEET THE SCHOLAR-SERVANT:

FROM THE ATCHIVES

In 1923, President James S. Luckey began the process of transitioning Houghton from a seminary to a full college with New York State Regents accreditation to grant B.A. and B.S. degrees. "With all in readiness, application was filed and on April 7, 1923, the New York State Education Department granted accreditation. The first degrees were awarded by a quietly jubliant President to the twenty members of the Class of 1925." 1





The very first diploma (left) was granted to **Allen M. Baker '25**, who went on to serve Houghton as a Professor of French for nine years.

Athletics Inducts Four into Hall of Honor

Dr. Robb Moses '62, Wendy (Ivey '01) Rose, Angela (Layne '03) Meabon and Alicia (Campbell '02) Mucher were inducted into the Houghton Athletics Hall of Honor on April 1. All of these illustrious student-athletes made their marks on the basketball court and have continued to serve Christ's kingdom in their chosen fields since leaving Houghton. Moses starred during the Purple & Gold era while Rose, Meabon and Mucher were teammates during the women's basketball program's most successful seasons in the NAIA. The 2022 Induction Class brings the Hall of Honor roster to 60 student-athletes, coaches, teams and contributors.

KPAC Brings Visitors to Campus

The Kerr-Pegula Athletic Complex, particularly the Kerr-Pegula Field House, continued to be a center of activity for the athletic department, student body, and visiting student-athletes and schools in the region over the past year. In addition to team practices, competitions, fitness and wellness activities, and intramurals, the facility draws in thousands of visitors for high school tennis and track practices and for major track and field competitions. The college hosted more than 30 meets over 23 dates through the winter, bringing in close to 2,500 unique visitors each weekend.

Three Head Coaches Added for 2021-2022

Three new head coaches joined the athletics department during the 2021-2022 academic year. Chad Muise '15 (softball), Zach Shilvock '19 (men's and women's tennis) and Esther Webb '16 (women's soccer) are the latest additions to the head coaching ranks for the Highlanders. Muise came to Houghton from Messiah College where he had been serving as the top assistant coach for the baseball program for the past three seasons. He also was working in Messiah's office of admission. Shilvock was an assistant for the tennis program in 2020-2021 before being named interim head coach during the summer. The "interim" tag was removed from his title in December. Webb became the sixth coach for women's soccer since the program began in 1981. She came to Houghton after coaching for one season at Empire 8 institution Elmira College.

Nielsen Court Dedicated to Dix Family

Houghton alumni Dan '75 and Brenda (Cummings '76) Dix were celebrated at a basketball double-header in January as the Department of Athletics dedicated the Nielsen Center court in their honor. The dedication ceremony included the reveal of "Dix Family Court" graphics painted on the court.

Dix Family Court recognizes the family's unwavering support for Houghton College and Highlander Athletics. They have been faithful supporters of the NCAA's student-athlete model, and their engagement and generosity have been evident in a variety of academic and athletic initiatives through the years. Most recently, they significantly grew the Athletics endowment fund and created/funded endowments for Women's Soccer, Men's Soccer, Men's Basketball and Biology/Chemistry while also underwriting new bleachers in the Nielsen Center and paving around the Kerr-Pegula Athletic Complex.

Along with supporting Highlander Athletics, the Dixes contributed to the Professor Robert Cummings Scholarship, a gift with deep personal significance to the couple. This endowed scholarship fund provides financial aid to students who demonstrate significant financial need and is named in honor of Brenda's father, a Houghton alumnus of the Class of 1950 and a longtime Houghton professor of foreign languages. In addition to support of student scholarships, the Dixes have also contributed to renovations to the Paine Center for Science and created an endowed fund to support the acquisition of equipment for Houghton's program in biochemistry, Dan's college major.

The Cummings and Dix family have a long legacy in athletics. Brenda's mother, Marion (Thornton '47) Cummings, was a star athlete in the Purple/Gold era. Brenda's brother, Stephen Cummings '71, played on Houghton's first intercollegiate basketball team. All three Dix children, Rebecca '09 (Women's Soccer), David '11 (Men's Basketball) and Michael '13 (Men's Soccer), were intercollegiate athletes. Brenda, too, played varsity volleyball and basketball. Dan served as the Chair of the Athletics Advisory Board and was the 2016 Alumnus of the Year.

"We are extremely grateful for the generosity of Dan and Brenda Dix and the entire family. The impact they have had in our community is evidenced in both our athletic and academic facilities, which have been home to both Dan and Brenda as well as their children," said Houghton Director of Athletics Matthew Webb. "The facilities are wonderful, but the relationships with



the family are priceless. Having had the opportunity to coach Mike in the soccer program, I had the pleasure of getting to know the Dixes better, and then even more so when Dan served on the Athletic Advisory Board in recent years. Dan and Brenda have been instrumental in helping us all strive toward excellence for the Glory of God, and naming the court in their honor is just one way we can publicly express our gratitude."

Houghton Third in E8 Commissioner's Cup Standings After Fall Season

Houghton Athletics ranked third after the fall season in the 2021-2022 Empire 8 Commissioner's Cup standings. The Highlanders finished the fall with a percentage total of 0.566 after a runner-up finish in men's soccer and third-place finishes in men's and women's cross country.

Commissioner's Cup points are awarded based on each team's finish in the Empire 8 conference standings at the completion of the regular season and post-season.

The final standings will be released in May after the completion of the spring sports campaign.

Academic Accolades

A total of 62 Houghton student-athletes were recognized by the Empire 8 Athletic Conference for their classroom performance during the fall 2021 semester. These student-athletes maintained a 3.75 GPA or higher during the semester while participating in an NCAA-sponsored sport to earn a spot on the E8 Presidents' List. The total represents 28 percent of Houghton's student-athletes.

Houghton's 224 student-athletes maintained a 3.27 average GPA in the fall semester. Twenty-nine Houghton student-athletes achieved a 4.0 GPA during the fall, 107 had a GPA over 3.5, and 157 exceeded a GPA of 3.0. Additionally, 11 Houghton teams earned a team GPA of 3.2 or higher for the spring semester.

"I'm so proud of our student-athletes and their achievements in the classroom," said Houghton Director of Athletics Matthew Webb. "It's a true testament to

their ability to commit 100 percent to their academics while balancing the demands required by intercollegiate athletics."

In addition to the conference honors, several winter student-athletes and teams were recognized by the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) for academic performance. Women's soccer (3.59) and women's cross country (3.66) were named Scholar Teams for maintaining fall team GPAs above 3.40.

24 Highlanders were named NCCAA Fall and Winter All-America Scholar-Athletes for maintaining a cumulative career GPA above 3.40.
