Water Flows Freely; Experiment Works

Since Saturday, November 23, water has been flowing freely through the pipes of the old water system for the first time in four years.

After having experimented for a week with compressed air in an effort to blow the algae out of the pipes, the water system workers drained the reservoir on Friday, and rearranged the pipes so that the well water could be pumped into the two inch water mains of the old system. When the well water was turned on at 11:30 a.m. Saturday, the water was pumped through the lines at 75 pounds pressure, breaking up and forcing out the algae which had nearly filled the inside of the pipes.

STUDENTS ENJOY PIANIST, QUARTET

The appearance of the Gordon String Quartet with Miss Ray Lev, pianist, received enthusiastic response from a full house on Friday evening. The program included numbers from Mozart, Tschaiakowsky and Schumann. Miss Lev assisted at the piano for the first and last numbers. SENIOR LASSIES REGAIN PRESTIGE

The senior girls came back after last week's defeat to win against the low scoring sophs, 46-10. The senior forwards were "on" last Thursday night as they scored twenty-one points in the first half, and twenty-five in the last. Peg Fancher started the scoring with a two pointer in the first period followed by a free shot by Humes. "B" Warren added three more buckets in the first half to help pave the senior victory. Bloss Thornton lead the scoring in the second half by scoring six field goals to give her a total of sixteen points. Fancher scored seven field goals and a free shot to give her a total of fifteen points. Andrews scored two baskets and a free throw in the first half and another one pointer in the second to give her six points, a high for the sophs.

Looking at the entire student body, the grade point figures run as follows:

32, or 4.5% - 3.5 or above; 136, or 19.1% - 3.0 - 3.49; 409, or 57.5% - 2.0 - 2.99; 47, or 6.6% - below 1.5.

The sophs bombarded the elite seniors last Thursday night to win an impressive upset by 54-41. Playing against a favored senior team, the sophs had to overcome an early lead to beat their opposition by thirteen points. The losing team fought all the way but lost their zeal in the last period when three of their players had to leave the game with too many fouls.

Dave Flower started a rapid fire scoring spree for the seniors when he dropped in two field goals and a free shot at the start of the game. Paine placed a two pointer to put the seniors ahead 7-0. Norm Walker retaliated by throwing in a free shot, the first tally for the sophs. Walker and Beach combined to score three field goals to give to sophs 7-10.

Iggy scored two baskets in a row in the second period and Brandt and Fenton scored a free shot and a field goal to keep the seniors ahead 13-11. Strong tied the score by sinking a set shot, and it was 13-13. Iggy and Beach put the sophs ahead 16-14, but Flower poured in five points to send the seniors ahead 16-14 just before the half. The second period ended as Walker tied the score with a free shot.

In the third period, the lead was exchanged many times before the sophs finally pulled away. With the help of Beach and Walker, the sophs led by seven points at the three-quarter mark. The last frame was all soph as they gradually lengthened their lead to 54-41 at the end of the game.

Norm Walker was high point man with 21, and Beach and Flower followed him with 17 points. This "win" places the sophs in a two-way tie with the seniors.
