

As students return to campus this fall and head to the weight cage, they will find many pieces of new equipment. Veterans to "The Cage" will also find that some of the old equipment has been removed. All together there are about 16 new pieces of equipment. New equipment includes selectorized stations which reduce the need to carry free weights around the gym, allowing for a smoother workout. Some of the much needed equipment includes: crunch, toe raiser, pec deck, lat pull down, leg curl, leg extension, abduction, and adduction machines.

New cardiovascular equipment has been added to supplement the existing machines. Two new bikes and two new steppers should allow for less congestion and shorter waits to get on the equipment.

According to Skip Lord, the new equipment did not cost the college or the students anything. It was donated by the generosity of a former student, Sam Scales. ...WE WERE ONLY FRESHMEN

An unofficial look at the incoming Houghton College class for 1997-98 shows an increase of about 50 students compared to last year's entering class. Expected in the first year class along with 80-plus student transfers, are 202 women and 110 men. Last year's incoming class numbered 343. Twenty-four states and several countries are represented in the first year class.

Although the qualitative statistics are not finalized, they are expected to be on par with last year's entering class. Some of last year's averages were: average SAT composite 1179. 40% of the students came from the top 10% of their high school graduating class; 77% were from public high schools; 20% from private high schools and 3% were home schooled.

WOMEN'S SOCCER

The 1997 Houghton College women's soccer team is gearing up to play another outdoor season under the direction of head coach David Lewis. Joining Lewis, now in his seventh year, are new assistant coaches Danielle Phillips and Terri White. "This is the best team I've seen since coming to Houghton," says a hopeful Lewis.

The Houghton squad, with their national tive Keystone Empire Conference Title with an

rank of 23rd, will face a 17 game schedule with key matches against eighth ranked University of Findlay and 13th ranked Georgian Court College.

Key returnees for the Lady Highlanders include All-American Honorable Mention players, junior Heather Shear with 39 career

goals and junior midfielder Jen Mattison. Senior All-Conference selection Christy Curtis and junior Erin Warren join Mattison to provide a strong experienced midfield, while All-Conference selection sophomore Andrea Potteiger will anchor the defense along with senior Terri White, an All-Northeast Tournament selection in 1996. Sophomore Jen Hartenstine will try to add to her debut totals of 7 goals and 12 assists.

Some new faces appearing for the young Houghton squad are two time New Jersey All-State selection Kim Lewicki, second-team New

York All-State selection Sunshine Leonard, and goalkeepers Dana Blackmore and Erica Roggie.

Over the past two seasons the Lady Highlanders have compiled a 32-3-1 record while outscoring their opponents 164-18. Last year Houghton's squad led all NAIA schools nationally in team defense, were sixth nationally in team offense, and captured their fourth consecu-

According · to coach Lewis, "It should be an exciting year for Houghton Women's soccer. We return 18 players from last season's squad and we have had a solid recruiting year. Our schedule is quite competitive and I am optimistic about

this group of ladies-their work ethic and heart are admirable. . . it should be interesting."

The Lady Highlanders have been invited to represent the Charlotte Eagles next April in a soccer-related mission trip to Australia. The team will play matches against Australian teams and provide half-time and post-game gospel presentations. Currently 23 players, coaches, and support staff are raising their financial support to fund the endeavor. Please remember the team in prayer.



The Houghton College women's volleyball team returns this year with a very young team. After graduating five starting seniors last season, the team has recruited 6 new players, including five freshmen. "We are a young team, but we hope this will be more than just a rebuilding year, ' says head coach Nancy Cole of her Lady Highlanders. Key freshman players will be Linda Shea and Kristin Gurley both from Houghton NY. This year's major competition is Seton Hill; a team that has beaten the Highlanders in their last seven meetings. The 1997 season for Houghton women's volleyball kicks off on Saturday, September 13 with the annual Houghton College tournament. The Highlanders will be facing off against Daemen, St. John Fisher, and Medaille Colleges.

"If there was a playoff opportunity, we would have been a playoff team," says head coach Donna Hornibrook of her1996 women's field hockey squad. Unfortunately, without sponsorship from the NAIA or joining the NCAA as an affiliate, Houghton women's field hockey will never get an opportunity for postseason play.

"I want to give everybody the best field hockey experience possible," says women's field hockey head coach Donna Hornibrook. With a season-end record of 12-2-2 last year, things seem to be going very well.

The 1997 squad includes a mixture of veterans and fresh faces. This year the Lady Highlanders, led by co-captains Nora Griffiths and Linda Perric, take the field without five players from last year's squad, including two starters. Eight first year players hope to fill these important positions. Among these hopefuls are Kristen Dorsey, a forward from New Jersey, Laura Chevalier, another forward from Vermont, Christy Ware, a defender from Pennsylvania. Mechele Souder, also a defender from Pennsylvania, and Denise Dunkle, a midfielder from Delaware.

A key return for the Lady Highlanders is Sophomore forward and top scorer last season, Susan Ventresca. With Ventresca and Griffiths combining for scoring power, this looks to be a promising season for Houghton Women's field hockey; that is if injuries do not stop the charge. The team has been battling injuries including normal pre-season strains and bruises, while Griffiths and sophomore Sarah Oblander are both sidelined with injuries.


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MEN'S SOCCER

1996 saw the loss of five runners from a seven man varsity cross country team; and although the men have picked up some quality runners, they will be hard pressed to fill all five positions left vacant by last year's loss. In fact, the men's cross country team is still looking for a runner to complete their squad. Key runners for the men's team in 1997 will be Brent Wright, Felix Cheruiyot and Matt Dougherty. "Wright is the best (men's)cross country runner I've seen at Houghton," says head coach Bob Smalley, now in his

upgrade some of his equipment. During the time Scales was a student at Houghton there was little or no equipment to use. He had his own collection of weights in Shenawana Men's Dormitory. Scales hoped to some day provide Houghton College with workout equipment. Today, faculty, staff and students are the beneficiaries of this dream. The Universal multi-station unit that was removed from the weight cage was given to a camp which Scale knew was in need of such equipment.

When asked about the possibility of getting the indoor track resurfaced, Lord indicated that this was something that has been discussed and that he would perhaps like to see the new Senate's Special Project

Fund provide the means necessary. The existing carpeted surface sits on top of a concrete base and is not ideal because it can be hard on joints of the lower body. The carpet is due to be replaced as it is almost twenty years old. Lord said that an engineer would be brought in when the time is right to determine what should be done and exactly how. Little research has been done to determine the cost of a new indoor track, but Lord estimates it could cost will be affected. Lord said \$60-80,000.
