



years—we dedicate this Anniversary edition of the Boulder.





As a mirror of student opinion and initiative, it is considered by the faculty especially important. It has a membership of twelve students and the Deans of men and women.



Membership is limited to pre-medic and pre-dental students, but honorary membership is granted to local doctors and members of the faculty interested in medicine.










### Big H Club







HOW TO OPEN YOUR YEARBOOK

# If you prize this book highly . . .

you will follow carefully the following instructions.

HOLD the book upright with its back edge on a smooth or flat surface. Let the front cover down, then the back cover, meanwhile holding the leaves upright. Next gently open a few leaves in the back, firmly pressing them down against the cover, then a few in the front, and so on, alternating opening back and front until the book is completely opened. Do this two or three times. If a new book is violently or carelessly opened for the first time the back binding may crack or loosen and cause a separation in the leaves. Never force a book open.

Your annual will be assured a longer life by following these instructions carefully.
