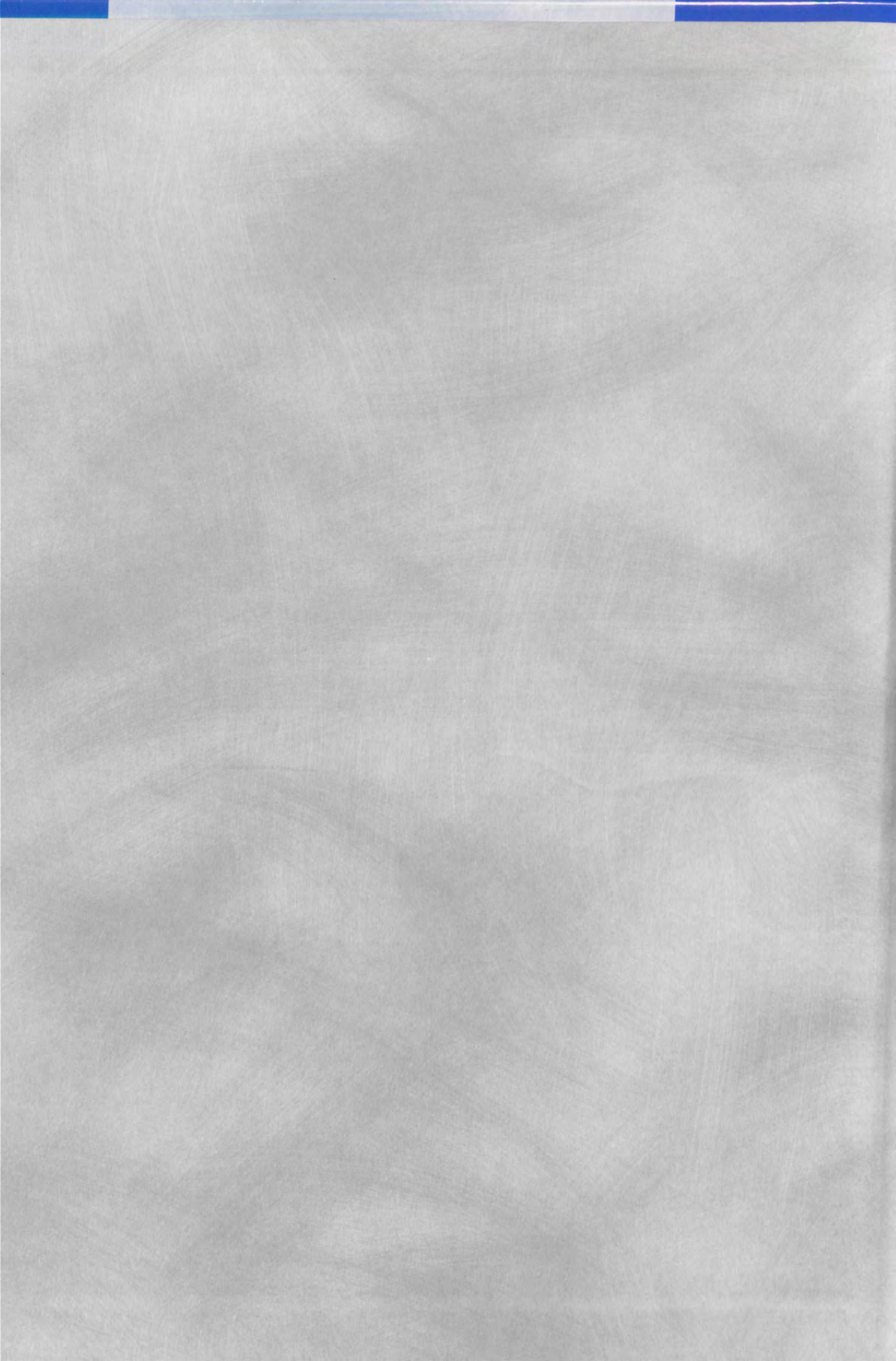

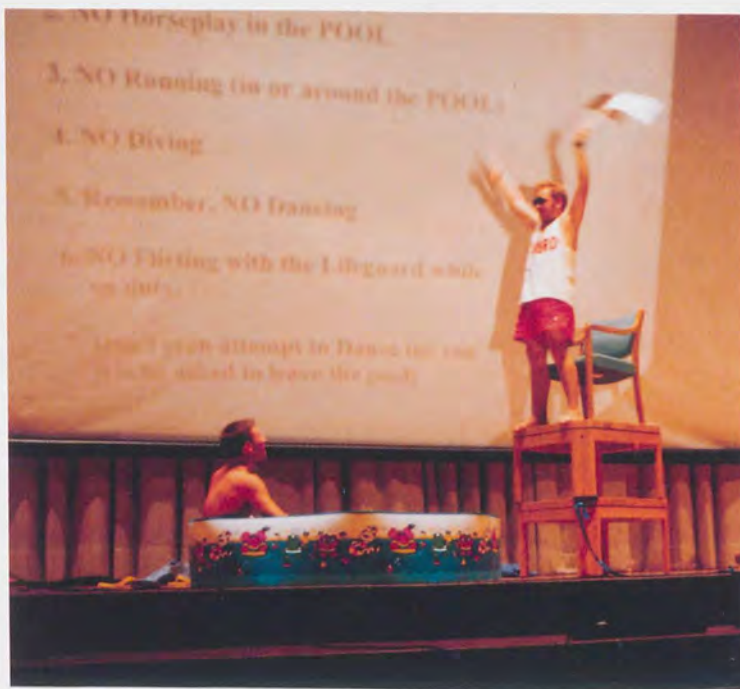

Houghton College Presents: "The Imaginary Invalid"



From the first practice until the final curtain call, Houghton College's fall performance of Moliere's *Imaginary Invalid* was drenched in laughter. After all, how serious can a play be when part of its third act sounds like an excerpt from the *Mighty Ducks*' quack attack?

The plot of the comical farce centered on a miserly hypochondriac, Monsieur Argan. His obsession with his ailments and treatments drove him to arrange a marriage between his charming daughter Angelica and the idiot son of a prominent doctor. But, Argan's plan was foiled as his daughter had fallen in love with a quite different suitor. A jealous stepmother, a scheming lawyer, and a handful of insane doctors further complicated this confusing situation. Yet, true love eventually prevailed, with a little help from Argan's brother and the conniving maid Toinette whose mischievous tricks created a whirlwind of double identities and general ruckus.

Rookie Houghton performers Andy Crowley and Shelly Forsythe led the cast with a powerful portrayal of the lead characters Argan and Toinette. The strength of the veteran supporting cast kept the audience on the edge of its seat during the entire play. However, the cast's acting ability faced its most difficult test as the audience's spontaneity and some unexpected mishaps made it difficult for them to keep their composure.

These "mishaps" began at dress rehearsal when the guys emerged from their dressing room in rainbow shades of tights. Who would have guessed that period costumes would entail dressing like Peter Pan?





On opening night while trying to keep Colin Beers (Angelica's love) from decapitating Peter Muesham (Angelica's suitor) in the second act, Shelly lost her balance and went sprawling out on the stage, accidentally dragging Colin down as well. The cast almost died trying to keep from laughing, as the audience roared in approval of what they thought was a carefully planned move.

Some of the most hilariously sticky situations on stage happened when lines were forgotten, added, or simply reworded, as Andy found out in the middle of the third act. When asked why he was arranging a marriage between his daughter and the dolt doctor, Andy replied, "To get myself a husband." He then suddenly realized his mistake and quickly added "...for my daughter!" Due to the large amount of lines in his part, Andy also had the second most hilarious line miscue. While vigorously explaining his matchmaking plans, Andy completely fumbled through an entire paragraph of script, but he recovered nicely by adding, "Oh, oh, I'm just so happy!" to the delight of a forgiving audience.

The audiences often interrupted the middle of scenes with thunderous applause, and they rewarded the hard work of the cast, crew, and director Bruce Brenneman with a sold out crowd the final evening and a tear-jerking standing ovation.

As everyone left the auditorium each night, the smiles on their faces proved that here at Houghton, laughter truly is the best medicine.

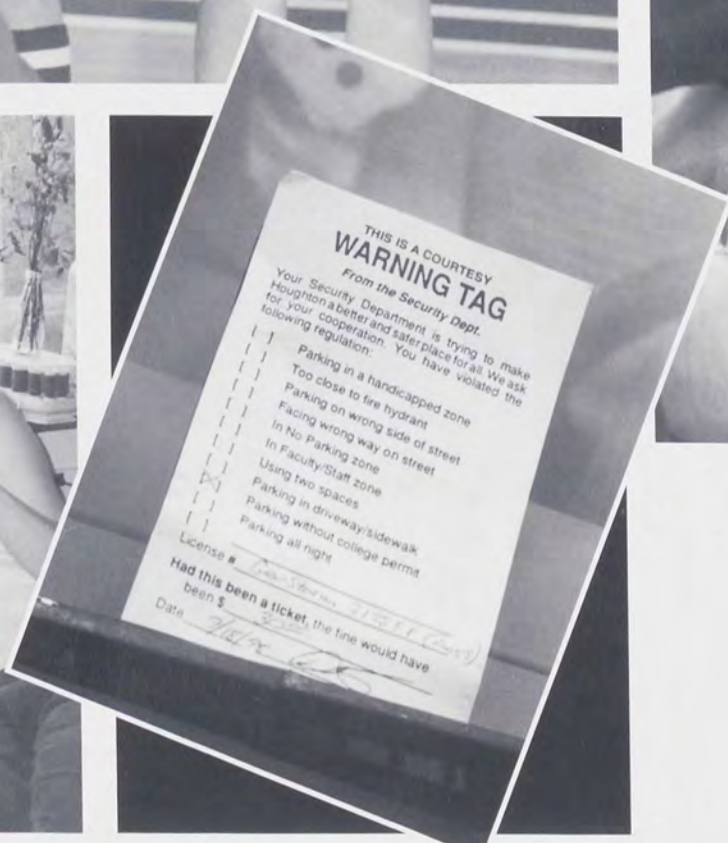
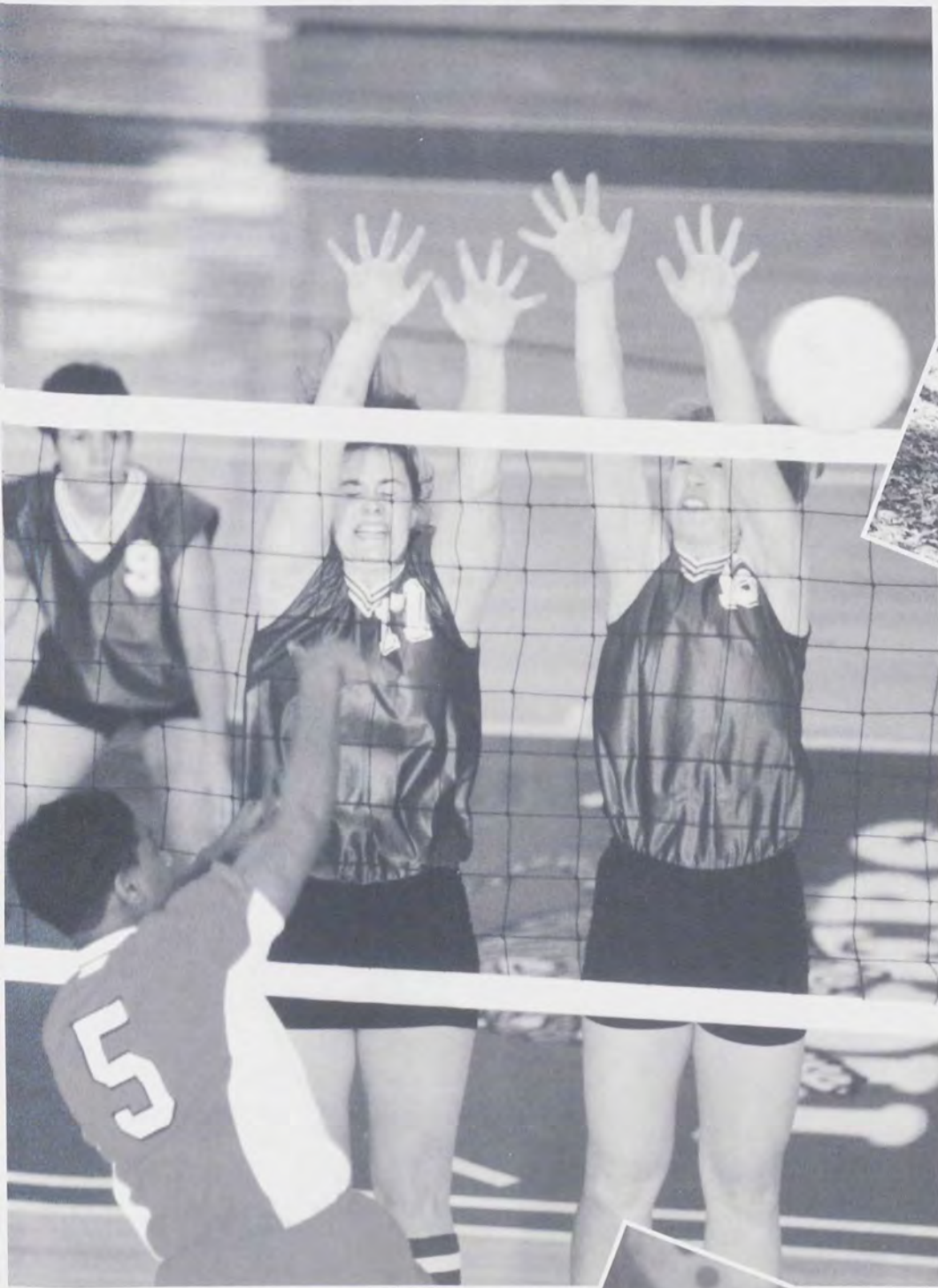

Women's Field Hockey

"The Program"

Even though it possesses one of the strongest programs on campus, the field hockey team is often underestimated because of its non-varsity status. However, after the 1998 season, this team will never again be perceived as inferior. After a strong season last year, the team was anticipating only improvement for this season. They towered above and beyond their expectations by finishing their season with a 15 - 1 record, the best record a field hockey team from Houghton has ever seen. The team's leading scorers, Judy Johnson, who smashed in two hat tricks for a total of 15 goals for the season, and Susan Ventresca, who pounded in another hat trick for a total of 11 goals, scored almost half of the team's total goals for the season. The remaining goals were well distributed between six other players.

The last week of the team's season was the highlight of the year. In that last week of October, an apprehensive Houghton team fearlessly met Mansfield University, a team who sent two players to the hospital in the 1997 season, in one of their best games of the season. Goals from Johnson and Ventresca propelled the girls to their defiant 2 - 0 victory. Later that week, the team clashed with William Smith College, the 1997 Division III National Champions and the 1998 Number One ranked Division III team, in a previously unscheduled game. Instead of attending a tournament, the William Smith team chose to play Houghton's team to prepare them for their National championships. In a close scrimmage, William Smith prevailed, concluding what was an exhausting, yet triumphant season for the Houghton team.

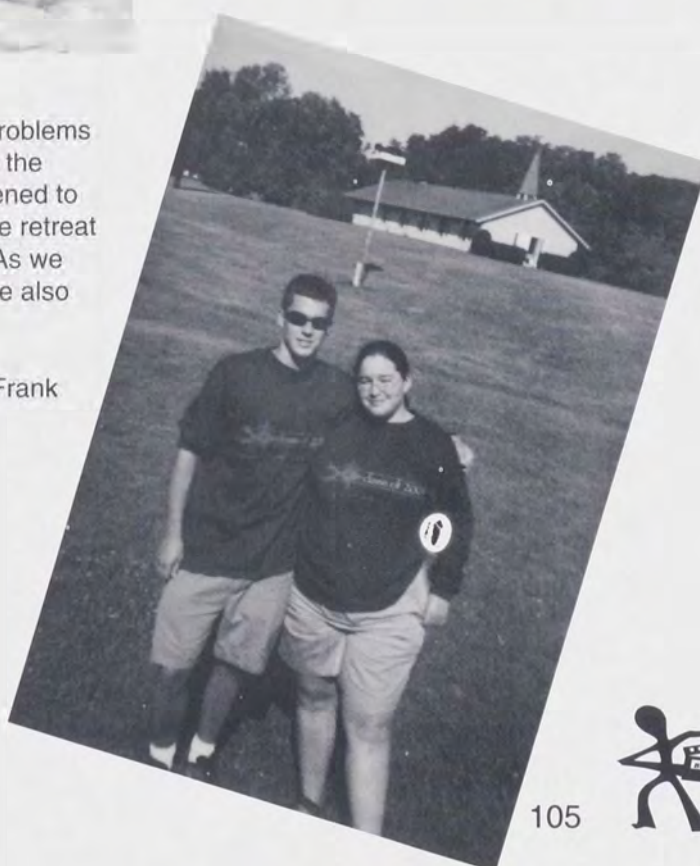
Class of 2001

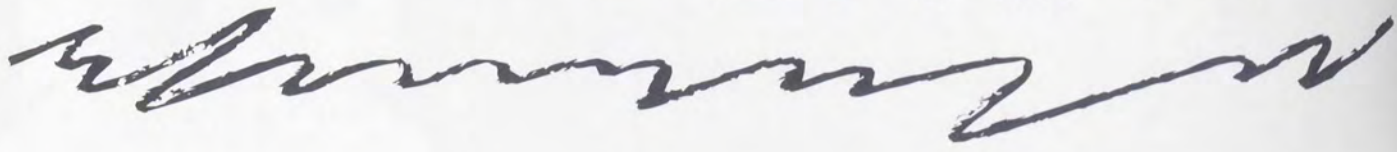

"The Odyssey"



My first communication class was "Oral Interpretation." We learned to read aloud -- poetry, Scripture, dialogues, and children's books. When we reached the children's lit assignment, Dr. Gaerte arranged for us to visit local elementary schools for a day and share our stories with live, squirming audiences. I declared a communication major that same afternoon and have enjoyed two years of communication classes now, with Dr. Gaerte as my advisor.

Houghton's greatest asset can be found in its professors and the quality of their teaching. This is certainly true in the Foreign Language Department. Over the past four years, this department has surged ahead, largely due to the excellent leadership of Dr. Henry Biggs.

Dr. Biggs initiated several major changes in the department. He improved beginning and intermediate language courses by implementing a new fourth-hour lab. Spanish and French majors can now choose between three different tracks to pursue - literature, linguistics or cross-cultural communications. In addition, Dr. Biggs was instrumental in renovating the language lab to make the language programs accessible on-line. At a time when many language programs are being eliminated from liberal arts curriculums, it is remarkable that Houghton's language department continues to see substantial growth.

His upper level literature majors will never forget the endless lists of vocabulary words, nor the one time he brought in his very own rap CD recording. We are daily privileged to be the recipients of their broad expertise; they teach us far more than just the language. Dr. Biggs -- we will remember you for being an incredible French professor and for bringing the Foreign Language Department to a new unprecedented level. 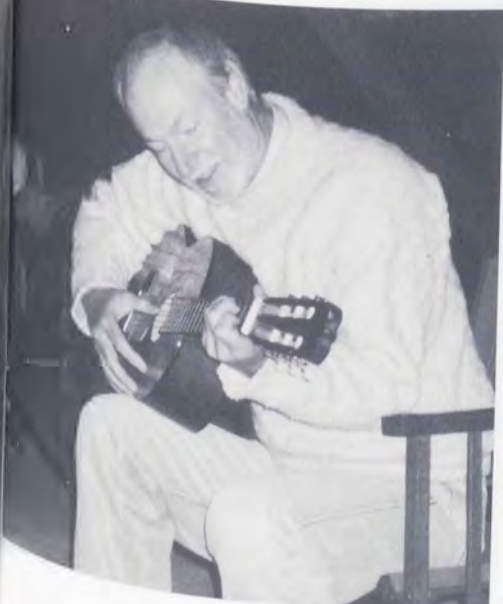
"The Great Outdoors"

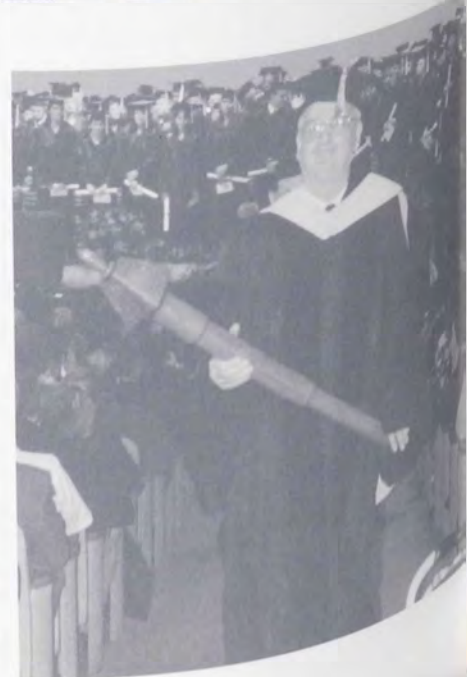

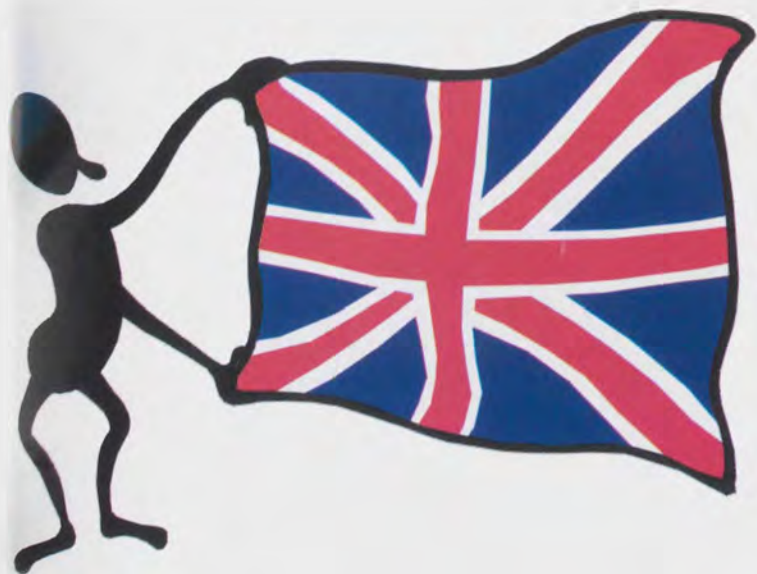

“Out of Africa”



A new study abroad program, Houghton in Tanzania, was launched in the summer of 1998. Under the guidance of Jon Arensen and Tom Kettelcamp and Tanzanian resident Dave Moyer, fourteen Houghton students and six students from other Christian colleges set out on the adventure of a lifetime! We all studied African Wildlife, History, and Anthropology and had the opportunity to take electives such as African Linguistics and Ecotourism, but we learned as much out of the classroom as inside of it. (Of course our classrooms had no walls in the first place.) Dr. Kettelcamp led us in village outreach programs. He also proved quite adept at getting us lost and then safely found again. Dr. Arensen's teaching was accompanied by many tales of his personal experiences in Africa, and his spiritual guidance influenced us all as we learned from the people of Tanzania and lived out adventures that would become stories of our own. There were adventures! Dr. Arensen's missing roll of film turned up months later after having spent time in the stomach of a hyena. It was returned to him after he was recognized in the developed pictures. The windshield of our van shattered on a trip halfway across the country. Of course, that was the only day we saw rain outside of the rain forest.

Much of the program took place next to a small village near the town of Iringa in southern Tanzania. Our education included many excursions, the first of which took us to the banks of a dry river bed where we camped near the Maasai people and had a chance to experience their culture first hand. Other safaris included a camp in a game park, a hike into a mountain rain forest, and a stay in a remote village. The trip ended with time spent in the north and then a few days on the tropical island of Zanzibar before heading back to the United States.

We lived in the same tents, ate the same food, and got sick at the same time. We experienced joy and poverty. We worshipped with each other and with our Tanzanian friends. We slept in houses with rats and took turns carrying baskets on our heads and pushing cars. Through it all, we grew closer to each other and to God. The world suddenly seemed a smaller place and God so much larger.

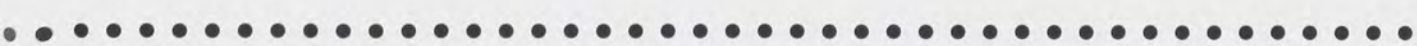

Houghton College Presents: **To Kill A Mockingbird**



In the spring of 1999, director Bruce Brenneman chose to produce the classic screenplay adaptation of Harper Lee's *To Kill a Mockingbird*. The play, in which three children learn the meaning of true courage, is set in 1935 Maycomb, Alabama. Lawyer Atticus Finch (Michael Jordan) teaches his children, Jem (Andrew Gaerte) and Scout (Taylor Bennett) as well as their friend Dill (Will Airhart) about tolerance and equality by challenging them to "crawl into someone else's skin." Finch defends Tom Robinson (Kenneth Melville), a black man accused of beating and raping a white girl, Mayella Ewell (Erin O'Brien). In spite of obvious evidence that Mayella's father, Bob Ewell (Jason Poole), is the culprit, the jury finds Tom guilty. This provocative play focuses on the difficult issues we still face today: racism, prejudice, justice, and tolerance.

Bruce Brenneman, with student director Jennifer Hartenstine, did a phenomenal job of pulling the diverse cast together and making the play come alive. While we struggled to portray this powerful drama, there were many lighthearted moments during rehearsals. Lawarran Dukes (Reverend Sykes) in a moment of Holy Ghost inspiration created sermons out of some un-sermonlike lines and Cheryl Morgan (Calpurnia) fell off the platform behind the Finch home. Jason Poole (Bob Ewell) landed a huge loogie squarely on Michael Jordan's cheek when he had no handkerchief to wipe it off.

The hard work of both cast and crew combined to present four fantastic performances for the Houghton Community. The cast members demonstrated talent and creativity in "becoming" their characters while the crew labored diligently on all the essential behind-the-scenes jobs. If the audience learned the lesson that all human beings are created equal and are loved by God, then it was worth every ounce of effort we all put into it.

Broadly defined, the SGA's mission is to represent the students, provide services to the students, and oversee the student organizations. Both the Senators and the Cabinet members worked hard together to make this year a very fun and productive year in the SGA. Some of our projects had high visibility, such as Staff Appreciation Week, the SGA-sponsored SPOT, and Big AI Appreciation Week. Other projects were less visible and will only have long range effects, such as an overhaul of the laundry system, which will result in free laundry next year. Significant policy issues that we worked on included a general Student Grievance Appeal policy, a resolution of scheduling conflicts between CLEW services and evening classes, and a major bill supporting the value of diversity on campus. The SGA provided student input on a number of issues, promoted community service, and supported the restructuring of WJSL into a student-focused radio station. We spent the Student Project Fund on a lighting system for CAB and a 24-hour paper processing center featuring \$.05 copies. Every Tuesday, we offered free coffee, tea, and hot chocolate to students, and we occasionally sponsored blood drives and trips to various malls.

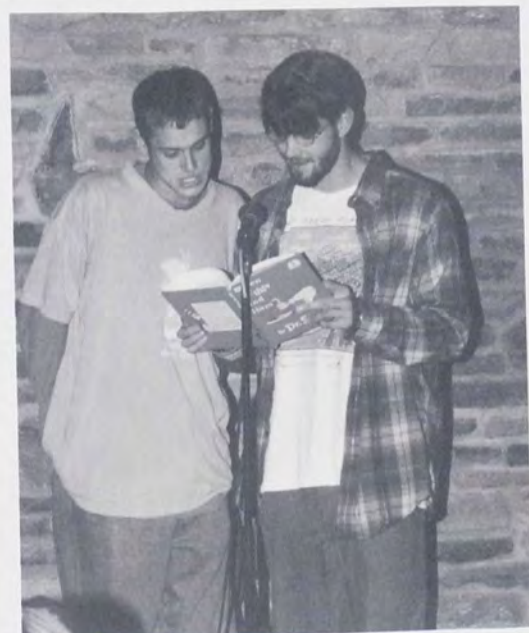
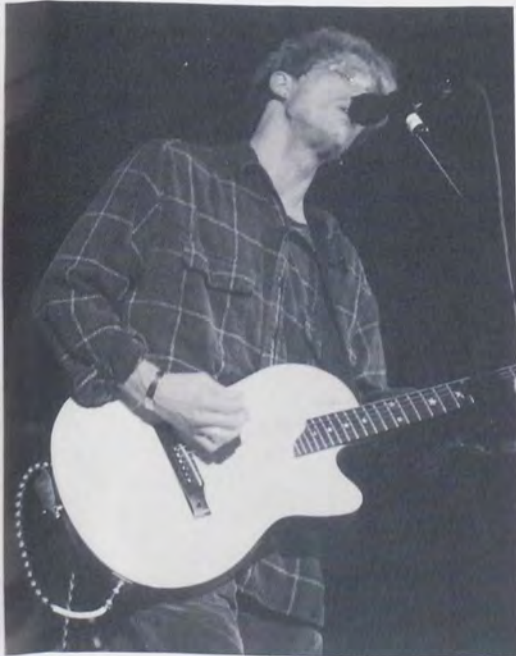

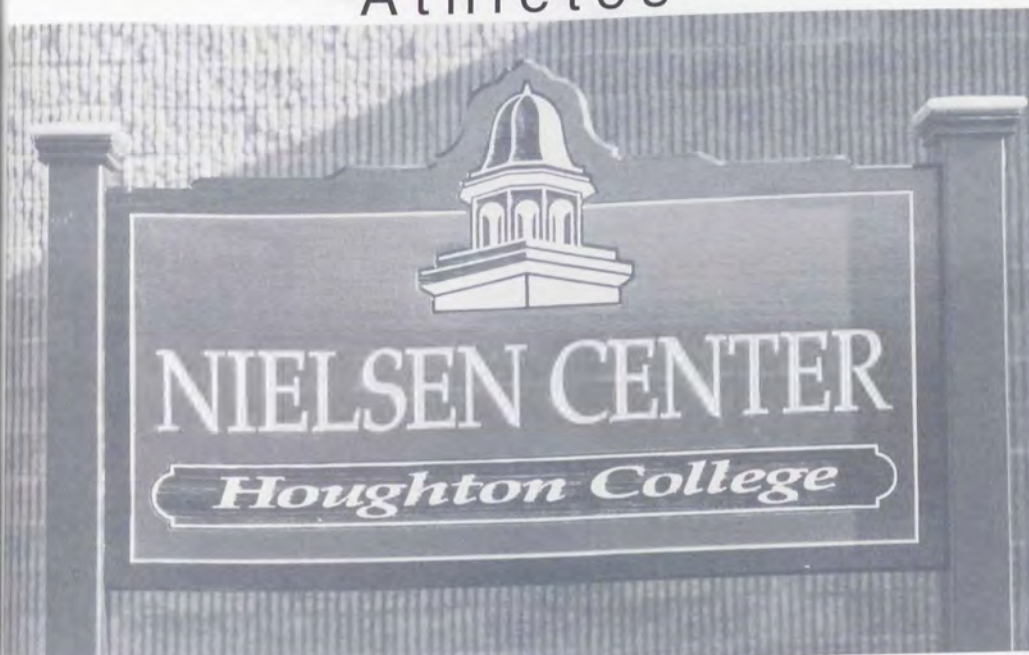
"Weird Science"

From Here To Eternity

Black caps, flowing robes, and tassels swaying in the breeze marked the end of one chapter and the beginning of another. The long-awaited day had finally arrived. On May 10, 1999, 248 seniors walked across the stage, received their diplomas and faced the future as college graduates.

The week prior to graduation was a flurry of excitement. Seniors rejoiced upon completing the very last finals of their undergraduate careers. On Thursday, the Class of 1999 traveled to Toronto for Senior Skip. For two days, they toured the city, drinking in the sights and strengthening their friendships. The seniors returned on Saturday in time to meet their families who were arriving to celebrate with them. That night they were treated to a special performance of the college choir followed by the Senior SPOT.

The baccalaureate service was held on Sunday at 10:30 a.m. in Wesley Chapel. Guest speaker Dr. Richard Allen Farmer expounded on Gideon's battle with the Midianites from Judges 7:2-8. His sermon titled "Redemptive Reduction" offered a ringing challenge to the Class of 1999. Dr. Farmer stated that God's strategy is to win by winnowing and to power up by paring down. "You cannot be too small for God to use," he said, "but you can be too big." He pointed out that in the same way that Gideon's success did not come from the numbers in his army, a Houghton College degree does not guarantee success in life. Dr. Farmer emphasized that the only guarantee of success lies in seeking first the Kingdom of God. He challenged the graduates to stop borrowing someone else's faith and dared them to participate with the Eternal in the outrageous. Dr. Farmer closed with the benediction: "May you lose your army and gain and regain the sense of trust in a God who is outrageous. Welcome to the adventure with Him."

That evening, the graduates, their friends and families gathered once more in the chapel for the Senior Vespers Service. Senior Class chaplain Melanie Swansfeger introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Paul Young. She commented on how much Dr. Young's emphasis on grace had affected her life. "I know now," she stated, "that there is nothing that I can do to make God love me any less and there

is nothing that I can do to make God love me more." Dr. Young spoke about Paul's prayer for the Church in Ephesians 3:14-21. Echoing Paul, he prayed that God would strengthen the graduates in their inner beings, that they would be rooted and established in love, and that they would be able to comprehend the incomprehensible character of God's love.

On Monday, May 10, after four years (or in some cases more), the long-anticipated graduation day had arrived. Following Dr. Chamberlain's welcome address, Dr. Nancy Nason-Clark addressed the Class of 1999 on "Scholarship and Social Activism: The Evangelical Challenge for the 21st Century." She declared that the challenge for Christians is to think and then act in a manner consistent with the gospel. "An educated mind is Houghton's gift to you," she stated, "how you use it is your gift to God." Dr. Nason-Clark invited them to set their scholarship goals high but stressed that the end goal of scholarship is serving others. She explained how she had put her faith into practice by joining the campaign against domestic violence. She called upon the Church community to condemn violence and to support victims of abuse.

After Dr. Nason-Clark's address, Dr. Chamberlain awarded honorary degrees to Dr. Richard Allen Farmer and Nancy Nason-Clark. Then, Elizabeth Sherwood, the Senior Class President, presented the class gift -- a stone table and benches. Finally, Dr. Chamberlain handed out diplomas to the seniors as the names were read one by one. After the ceremony, the graduates participated in the traditional photo frenzy to record this significant day.

At last the time had come to say good-bye. The seniors had been preparing for this day for the entire year but now they were truly leaving Houghton. After the last picture had been taken, the last suitcase packed, and the last hug given and received, the graduates said their last good-byes. For some, it would only be a temporary separation; for others, a lifetime. Filled with hopes, dreams, expectations, and even some sadness and fears, they left Houghton ready to face the future. Congratulations to the Class of 1999! Our hearts and our prayers go with you as you embark upon the next adventure of your journey through life.

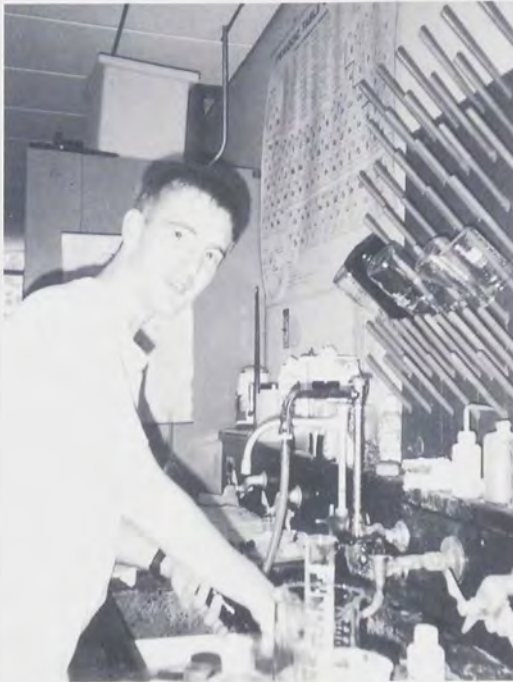

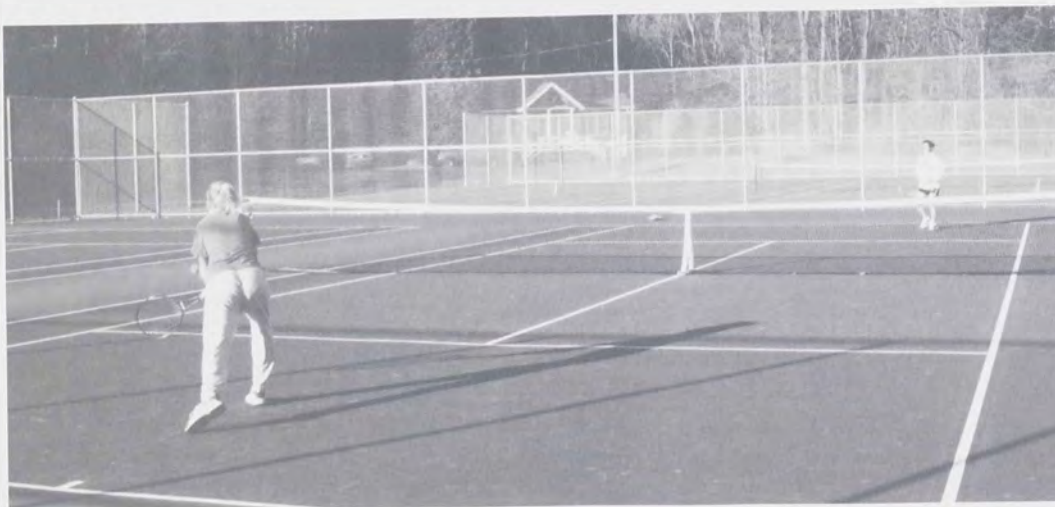
- Former pro wrestler Jesse "The Body" Ventura was elected governor of Minnesota.

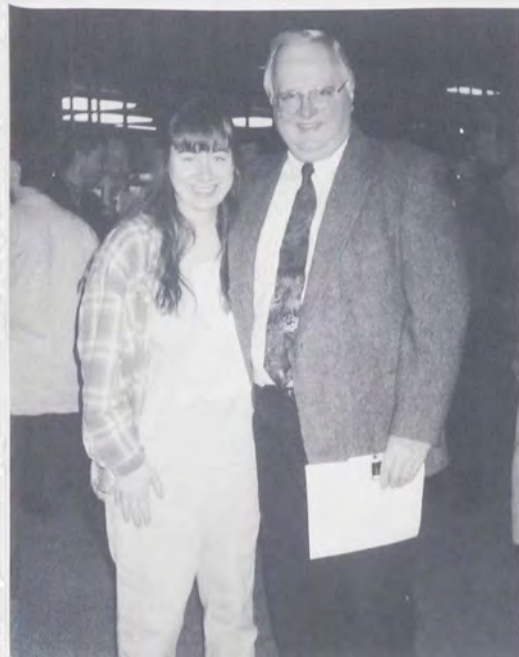

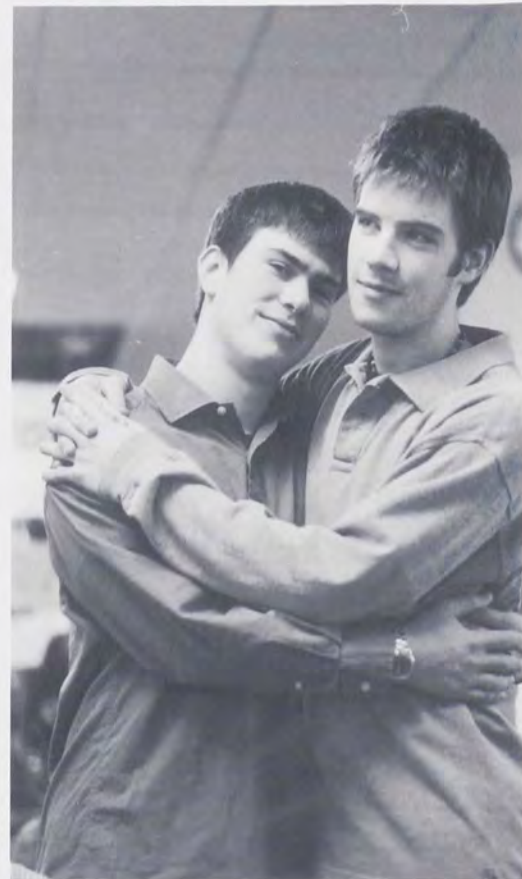

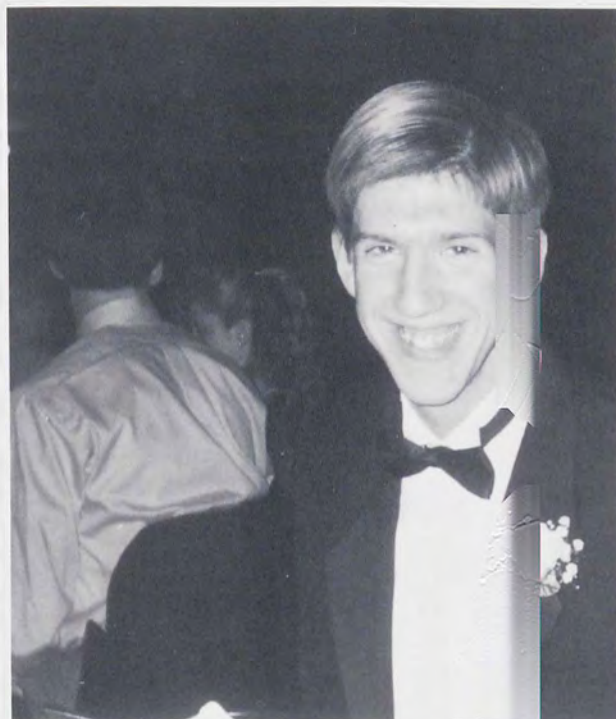
